

THERE ARE A COUPLE of islands up north so near to one another that the distance is trifling. It is less than six miles, one hears. The flag of Russia floats over one and the other is under the Stars and Stripes. It is here that American and Soviet authority face each other, almost literally. Alaska and Siberia each do a bit of contemplating close enough to be neighborly. One can almost imagine either, every now and then, sailing across to borrow something or spend a social hour. Or one can imagine something else.

DAYLIGHT SAVING

IT IS NOT NECESSARY at this time to go into a discussion of the merits of daylight saving. Some of us think it is desirable. Some of us do not. Our individual feelings on the matter are actuated to large extent by our individual circumstances and inclinations. It is fair enough to suppose that it is a matter upon which the minority might adjust themselves to the wishes of the majority whatever they might be.

Regardless of our personal opinion in respect of the merits or demerits of the principle of daylight saving, it is to be hoped that at least a uniform national plan will be ready for next year if the policy is to be continued. It might be a little too much to expect that an international agreement can be reached, say one between the Dominion and the United States.


Will be Made One of World's Most Beautiful Cities



School Student Cost \$91.50 Each

It cost the school district of Prince Rupert \$91.56 for the education of each student during the school year beginning August 1946 and ending June 1947. This figure was given out by the board secretary, Mrs. M. M. Roper, in the financial report read at the last meeting. The calculation was made on the basis of the June attendance of 1114. Total expenditure for the school district was \$154,291.93 which includes \$13,423.90, the school's share of the city debt. Deductible from the total expenditures are government grants amounting to \$52,-285.92.

Freezing Methods Change Fishing

Dr. G. A. Reay, director of 19search, speaking at Grimsby, England, recently, gave a forecast to the general effect that the whole structure of the fish industry from catching to consumption may require modification to take advantage of the virtually perfect method of quick freezing. It will, he predicted, bring steady prosperity to the fishing industry. But the fish must, at all times be really fresh when frozen.

Farm Population Of U. S. Shrinks


