Parliamentary Bombshell to Aid Nationalizing Of Steel

LONDON (CP)—Legislation to nationalize the gas industry and to amend the powers of the hereditary House of Lords was forecast in the Speech from the Throne read by the King at the opening of the third Parliamentary session of Prime Minister Attlee's Labor government.

The gas bill will bring under government control the last of the "fuel industries" since coal was nationalized at the government's first session and electricity at the second.

In the only reference to the Upper House, the Speech from the Throne said: "Legislation will be introduced to amend the Parliament Act of 1911."

Action on the House of Lords presumably to obviate possibility that the Peers might try to delay nationalization of the steel industry until after the next general election which must be held by 1950. It was last-minute action by the cabi-

Even without this bombshell, however, Parliament faces one of the busiest sessions since the Attlee government was elected in 1945.

In brief reference to the international situation, the Speech promised continued efforts towards European reconstruction, expressed the hope that the foreign ministers' meeting in November would result in "measure of agreement" for the reestablishment of Germany and Austria on a sound basis and urged early conclusion of a Japanese peace treaty.

It was a big day for Princess Elizabeth who accompanied the King and Queen to the opening of Parliament, riding in a separate carriage and sitting in a special throne.

AYLMER, Ont. — "The railways of Canada have now reached the point where, with existing freight rates and in the face of rising costs and fixed charges, they face slow but sure strangulation," stated J. F. Pringle, vice-president, central region, Canadian National Railways, in an address Monday night before the Aylmer and district Chamber of Commerce. Accompanied by a group of regional officers on the occasion of "C.N.R. Day" here, Mr. Pringle spoke at a dinner which climaxed the visit.

"Railway management is dong and will continue to do its part in applying sound operating practices to all phases of operation but this is a point beyond which ingenuity and wit of management cannot go," the speaker declared. "There is no other form of transportation on land, water or in the air which can do the job the railways are doing, either physically or at such low cost. We have no quarrel with competition by road, air or water, provided the competition is on an equal basis of costs and regulation. The rails must take any, or all traffic offered, at rates fixed by governmental authority."



York-Sunbury

COLIDITY OF THE GOVERNMENT in a sound I and steady-going Maritime seat was indicated by the result of the federal by-election yesterday in York-Sunbury, New Brunswick. The seat

had been made vacant by the death of Hon. H. F. Bridges, minister of fisheries. The Liberal party had as its candidate the new minister, Hon. Milton Gregg. There was no particular point for the seat to change political color at this time. It was not expected that it would do so so there was no surprise in the result and no particular significance can be read into the outcome.

The Progressive-Conservatives had a distinguished soldier as their candidate and Lt.-General E. W. Sansom received a very substantial vote, higher probably than the party would have got had there been an ordinary candidate.

York-Sunbury has a large percentage of industrial vote but the showing of the C.C.F. candidate was almost negligible.

RAILWAY STRIKE

T IS TO BE hopefully prayed that the railwaymen's strike, now called for November 3, will not come to the point of materialization. We have been close to general railway strikes in Canada before but, it is to be recalled, they were generally averted along toward the fast minute.

The railway strike in itself, involving idleness for 125,000 workers, would be bad enough. But more serious would be the reaction on other services and industries which would very soon, if not almost immediately, throw as many if not many more people out of work due to the paralysis in transportation. Every business in the country would be affected to some degree of seriousness. There would be no compensation whatever for many of the workers during their enforced idle-

One does not need to have much imagination or think very long to picture just how serious a thing a general railway strike would be for the whole

Therefore, it is to be expected that all avenues of compromise and negotiation will be exhausted before it is permitted to come actually into being.

SASKATCHEWAN'S LEAD

THE SASKATCHEWAN GOVERNMENT took forthright action to deal with the meat packers' strike when Premier T. C. Douglas announced that, if the strike was not settled by November 1, his government would take over the plants and operate them.

Saskatchewan, in so doing, would have merely taken the lead which other governments would have been quite justified in following if the intolerable tie-up had been allowed to continue. Obduracy of companies or unions or both could not be allowed indefinitely to prevent people from getting food and the farmers from disposing of their product which means their bread and butter-and at a particularly critical season right now.

The companies, as usual, might not stand to lose a great deal except inconvenience and disorganization. The workers, in the long run, would, of course, be severe sufferers but that was a situation to which they would be consenting parties. The really intolerable thing was that the consumers and the producers, who were no party to the dispute which was no fault of theirs should also have to suffer.

So it is interesting that at least one government-even if it was a C.C.F.-was resolved to take decisive action to break the strike-caused tie-up, whether or not the labor people liked it.

ANNIVERSARY

Members of H.M.C.S. Chath- Adams, M.A., D.D., Archbishop Try a Daily News am, Prince Rupert naval reserve division, are observing a dual anniversary today - Trafalgar Day, the one hundred and fortysecond anniversary of Nelson's greatest victory fought off the Spanish coast on October 21, 1805, and the first anniversary of the founding of the post-war local naval division.

H.M.C.S. Chatham was commissioned as a reserve establishment on October 21, 1946, resuming the activities of the pre-war Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, which sent many of its members on active service during the war.

No celebrations will mark the dual anniversary today, although the division plans a Trafalgar Day dance in the naval drill hall Saturday night.

Trafalgar Day observance in active naval establishments takes the form of special prayers in the morning.

At Cape Trafalgar, Admiral Nelson, commanding 27 vessels, met and defeated a combined fleet consisting of 18 French and 15 Spanish men-of-war. The!
