



Case of Hugh Dalton

CHANCE MISPLACED confidence in a newspaper reporter has brought about a major political repercussion in Britain—the resignation on a point of honor of Rt. Hon. Hugh Dalton, Chancellor of the Exchequer and one of Britain's most important respected public men. Mr. Dalton has and is entitled to the sympathy which was expressed for him not only by Prime Minister Attlee but by Mr. Churchill. Mr. Dalton was indiscreet, no doubt, in revealing budget secrets, even in confidence, it is simply something that is not done, but despicable was the reporter who took advantage of the indiscretion.

The reporter discredited his journalistic profession for, contrary general supposition notwithstanding, the good newspaperman often possesses many confidences and information that he does not talk about, much less publish. Fortunately, such glaring incidents as this of breaking the code are so rare that they are sensational. In this case it was unfortunately tragically fatal to a good and valuable public career.

An American tourist who recently made the trip from Prince Rupert to Vancouver in a Jeep and trailer has written E. T. Applewhaite, secretary of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, telling of his reaction to the highway. Condition of various parts of the road are different, according to the letter, the section between this city and Terrace ranking as "good."

"The road from Prince Rupert to Terrace is good." the letter says, "and on to Hazelton it is somewhat narrow with a few bad slides around Skeena Crossing. There is a section of bad road, narrow, winding and greasy, around the Perow area

"I think the worst section is in the Cariboo, being between 83 Mile House and the Chasm, and the hill outside 100 Mile House. These spots are rough, choppy, greasy and just plain bad.

"However, they are straightening and fixing some of the spots in these areas and the new road will be open next year. The hard surface starts at Cache Creek and from there to Vancouver it is fine. There has been considerable straightening and widening along the Fraser River can-

I guess just about the hardest thing to figure out is what part of the cost of things we consume is represented by wages and salaries. A lot of people would say about

That's the cost of using saved-up capital, of buying the brains of people who run businesses. The rest (even taxes) goes to wages and salaries, directly and indirectly

That must be the reason why the business of trying to jack wages up the undersigned intends to apply suddenly and not raise prices is about as profitable as chasing the weasel round and round the mulberry bush!

CAPE TOWN (P)-The number of parcels being sent from South Africa to Britain has become so large that the government is to be asked by the Union-Castle teamship Co. to reconsider the inancial terms of the sea-mail inancial terms of the sea-mail contract.

Under the existing contract the company undertakes to carry all mail for a specified yearly sum of money. This includes all parcels. At the time of the signing of the agreement it was not expected that the parcel freight would increase to the enormous proportions which it has reached today as a result of the South African response

to the food-for-Britain appeal. The problem of shipping food parcels from the Dominion to Loose \$11.00 per ton Britain has already caused concern to London authorities. Australia has suggested the food should be sent in bulk to a central point in Britain. There voluntary workers would receive it and share it into standard sized parcels before distributing to the people concerned.

In this way valuable shipping space would be saved and speed-up in deliveries would be effected.

The Johannesburg post office has reported an increase of almost double last years Christmas postings of food and gift parcels and an extra receiving counter has had to be installed.




