The following are highlights of the Speech from the Throne: Measures aimed at meeting Canada's shortage of American dollars will be submitted to Parliament for approval.

Further Canadian assistance to European recovery will have to take into account exchange difficulties which have arisen. Government officials have been directed to keep under constant 5° supervision conditions of production and supply which tend to raise the level of consumer prices.

Parliament will be asked to consider plans for a low rental housing project for veterans.

A federal labor code and bills amending the Income Tax Act .. the Elections Act and the Canada Shipping Act, all introduced at the last session but not considered, will be re-introduced.

The Speech said that a bill to consolidate all statutes relative to defence will be placed before Parliament.

A measure relating to war vet-

erans will also be introduced. The select joint committee on human rights and fundamental freedoms and on revision of the Indian Act will be re-established.



Russia Stops Peace

A NOTHER Big Four foreign ministers' confer-A ence in London is proving disappointing as far as accomplishments are concerned. It is not accentuating the alarm of shooting war which it seems to be generally admitted no one is very anxious about having. On the other hand, it gives anything but reassurance of peace among the nations.

It is quite obvious that Soviet Russia intends to continue its war of nerves and propaganda and Mr. Molotov, as the United States delegation appears to sense, is even using the conference as firing ground for that war.

Meanwhile the growing communist-inspired industrial and political unrest within France and Italy and its admitted bearing upon the international idealogical scene is transcending the Big Four conference itself in the news picture.

NEWSPAPER COSTS

THE management of the Daily News, which is probably the only business in Prince Rupert which has not increased its charges for either advertising or subscriptions in four years, has been seriously studying its own costs. Within that period of four years our mechanical department's basic wage rate under union agreement has advanced just over 35 percent. Within the same period the. cost of newsprint has advanced nearly 100 percent and the end is not yet. Other costs, as any one who does business knows, have advanced correspondingly.

Notwithstanding these factors, the circulation of the Daily News today is the largest that any newspaper in Prince Rupert has ever enjoyed, not excepting the abnormal boom days of the war.

Possibly Prince-Rupert people do not realize the good value and the good service they have been getting from their newspaper at a price to themselves the reasonableness of which is the marvel of other newspaper managements who hear of it.
