A Lesson from Boss'

/ICTORIA correspondent Jim Nesbitt made a point which has been too generally overlooked when he commended Premier Johnson for the honesty and courage of his politics, and for the dignity of his defeat.

When the heat has gone and the book is being written, the figure of the Boss will emerge in distinguished contour. The politicians whose names are remembered to their credit are usually those who are not particularly adept at politics. They reject the smaller game in favor of the larger purpose.


There is no better example of this than Premier Johnson's stubborn defence of hospital insurance. His earnest and challenging conviction of its rightness led him far along a lonely path. Yet, though the Premier fell, hospital insurance will not.

At the hands of a lesser man the program would have been eased aside long ago, or probably never attempted. The fruits of this advanced legislation would then have been lost to this province until the slow groundswell of public approval dictated other-

Those younger men, such as Prince Rupert's Jack McRae, who were associated with the Premier in the last government could not have had a better schooling. From the close-up view their tutor's resolute kind of approach may not look as though it works in politics. But it does.

It is to be hoped that their lesson will be a source of encouragement, not despair, and that in years to come they will use it to the benefit of their province and country.



Little Theatre is concerned with drama, but what is drama? Where, why, and when did it begin? For the answer, let's go way back in time to Greece in-550 B.C.

The religious leaders of the day were trying to impress upon the people the powers of the various gods. Thespis, a man of ingenuity, found an effective way to do this. He arranged, upon a stage, a chorus which sang mournful, tragic chants while a lone actor portrayed the sufferings of a man tortured by the gods for his disobedience.

Another man of ideas, Aeschylus, added co-actors and coswas born on a farm in tumes to the performances.

Rome saw the entertainment value rather than the religious power in this early form of drama and began to copy and modify it. Since then drama has grown and spread throughout! the world. In its early stages it was confined to tragedy, but comedy was later introduced.

As the centuries passed, pantomime, farce, mystery, melodrama and other branches of the art were added. We shall have a look at these in later columns.
