September was a month of cloud weeping as far as Prince Rupert was concerned, according to monthly report issued by the Dominion weather station at Digby Island. Almost a foot-10.47 inches—of rain fell during the month and there were showers on 18 of the 30 days. This gave September the dubious honor of being wettest month so, far this year, barely nosed out by January with 10.63 inches. However, September of this year had less rain than the same month last year when there was 13.43 inches.

The total rainfall for the first nine months of 1947 has 62.45 inches while for the same period of 1946 there were 64.85 inches.



Canadian Austerity

THE RECENT ACTION that Britain has taken In the inauguration of an austerity plan raises an interesting question as far as Canada is concerned-Will it happen here, and if so, in what form? The British austerity program is designed to achieve an adjustment in the adverse balance of trade by restriction of imports and expansion of exports. Canada faces a comparable, if less acute, trade situation. Consequently, the possibility that similar austerity measures, differing only in degree, might be in store for Canada does not appear illogical. Certainly, definite action of some kind must be taken soon—the drain on our American dollar and gold resources is becoming serious. A program involving substantial reductions in U.S. imports, plus the promotion of our export industries and the encouragement of a greater degree of self-sufficiency in respect to some basic commodities, is not too difficult to visualize. In any case, this possibility might well be kept in mind.

In some cases reduced U.S. imports might benefit Canadian producers. For example, cotton and rayon fabricators might be expected to do somewhat better-at least until British textile products appeared in volume on a competitive basis. The drive for exports also would favor certain industries such as pulp and paper, and lumbering. A cheaper dollar would prove a decided stimulus to the expansion of production for export. Lower tariffs on Canadian farm products entering the U.S. would assist materially in correcting our trade deficit but such reductions are believed politically inexpedient.

In the longer run the implications for Canadian industry in general would be-increased output, larger markets and in some cases larger profits. Nevertheless, for the near term such a plan would involve dislocation and necessity for reorientation of all Canadian business, as well as relatively large capital expenditures. Near term uncertainty, particularly in respect to business dependent on imports, should not be minimized.


