LIFE in this Prince Rupert by BIDDEE JINKS

With the great day—Christmas—gone after weeks of hustling preparations, I am left with much cold turkey, a grated finger (done as usual in the dressing), and a feeling of great quiet. That the weather was one day behind in its calculations is my only irritation.

Morning... ah, morning... arrived at but 3:30 a.m. Happily it had not come to stay, for certain members of the family carried special items back with them to a warm and waiting bed—and Christmas Day arrived the second time much later.

ONLY SPIRIT OF SANTA REMAINS CONSTANT Toast was a slice of bread browned over the coals in our world. And someone sitting by the street talking to himself in utter profanity on Christmas Day was a horror reserved for much later life—a thing on which my children hardly make comment.

Then it was a time of great family gatherings. Our house, chosen probably because of our family equation of seven-and-two make nine, was the scene of these parties. From noon-time onward, the excitement mounted among the young household, and the exquisite feeling of Christmas Eve fell like a blanket.

Eventually they were all there—aunts, uncles and cousins galore. Fun ran rampant that night, fun of the old-fashioned calibre, which allowed Grandpa to play a game much older than himself, and he took his turn at being blindfolded after he was caught and detected by his wealth of beard.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN AGES DISSOLVED Now, I think it was that very thing we anticipated most, the dropping for one evening and the next day, too, of the rigid line of deference and respectful distance that existed between parent and child, or between older and younger. For the most part, for the rest of the year we lived in one world and they in another. I never thought the

thought, or dreamed to tell my mother she looked "oh, about 17." Of course she didn't; but it was her clothes and the knowledge that she was past 30 which made her so, not in the fact that her hair was more beautiful than her daughter's and her figure something to envy.

Our gifts were of a practical nature or were of the mechanical kind over which the whole family watched and laughed until they wore out that first day. We did not think of them as practical. Skates were skates, and a new dress was a dream come true. One most pleasing gift received on my third Christmas, was a pair of shoes, shepherd plaid but with patent trim and purple lining. They sat a little by themselves under the tree that morning, and my delighted eyes knew them as mine for those just older and just younger were of the other sex.

We lived much as everyone else lived for miles around. We had no more, and no less, except that our horses shone a little fatter and our driving sleighs were long and well-turned. My father loved horses. The harness was kept in perfect shape with the addition of Scotch-tops with their red plumes. For the Yuletide, sleigh-bells were polished and fastened to the backband to set us and the frosty air a-thrill with a tinkling in tune to prancing feet.

Then as now, Christmas past meant New Year not far away. One recovers from the first barely in time to make a few well-chosen resolutions for the other. By times these brief forms take the shape of wishing... for things as impossible to find as are the resolutions to keep alive.

Just now, one wish is constant. It would need a magic wand to bring one of those pages back, not for myself but for my children—yet I would have it so. Knowing, even hearing after it was done and once more folded away, a "Gee, Mom, I like it this way best!"

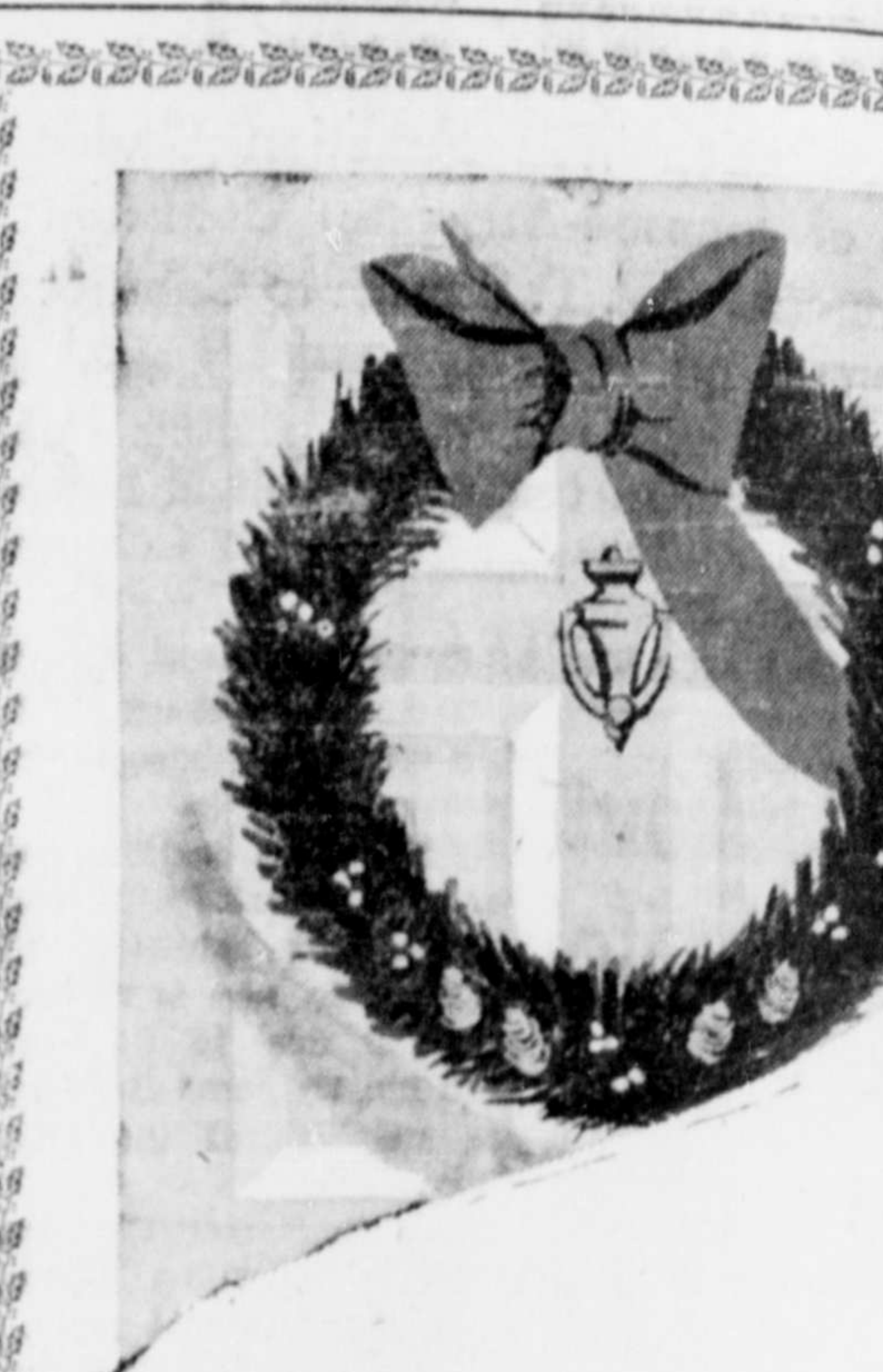

ROLLING OUT THE BARREL PLEASURE

Former Flying Officer Finds What It's Like to Have a Barrel of Money

SANT JOHN, N.B. — Many men may wonder how it feels to have a barrel of money. Ralph Lawton not only wondered, but he found out something about it until his barrel came true.

The story started more than 10 years ago following his demobilization as a flying officer with the RCAF. Years in uniform had trained him to neatness and he acquired a daily habit of setting aside accumulated pennies. Soon overflowing,

a tray on his dresser was replaced by a candy box but that too became full and the pennies kept coming.

"Just for the novelty of it," Lawton recalls, "I took an empty nail keg, put a new head on it and cut a slot in the head just big enough to admit a penny, and duly installed it in a corner of my room. I had to take a lot of kidding from the family, of course, but I just kept dropping pennies into the slot."

"A couple of weeks ago, when I just couldn't force another penny into that keg, I decided to open it and bank the works. The kidding changed to envy and admiration and, even I was shocked when the flood of coppers rolled out."

COUNTING BIG JOB

The keg had grown so heavy it couldn't be lifted and Lawton's mother had many pointed comments about the impossibility of sweeping that corner of the room.

A whole week of evenings was required for Lawton to count the pennies while his girl friend wrapped them in rolls of 50. The final count was 21,000 pennies, or \$210.

"I took them to the bank in \$20 and \$35 instalments," says Lawton, "taking care to explain how it happened. I was making such extensive 'copper' deposits in case they thought I might have come by the money by some unorthodox means."

"In case you're interested, the head is back on the keg and I've begun on my second barrel of money. My girl friend's only comment was that it might be a good idea to save quarters instead of pennies, but that would be a bit steep these days."

POPE URGING HONEST MEN GUARD PEACE

VATICAN CITY — Pope Pius in his annual Christmas message declared today the "policy of insincerity" among nations was blocking the path to peace and called for a "league of honest men" to safeguard the world against war.

The Pontiff specially blamed "a growing tendency toward insincerity" for the collapse of the foreign ministers' conference which, he said, left the world "further than ever from true peace." He named no names in placing the blame for the present state of world affairs, but his 4,400-word address contained many passages which western listeners, at least, interpreted as condemnation of Communism and of post-war policies of the Soviet Union.

City Pioneer's Son Buried At Vancouver

Hugh M. Dunn, 65, retired customs official, who will be remembered by friends in Prince Rupert, died in Vancouver recently. He lived at 3950 West 35th Avenue.

Mr. Dunn was a son of the late Thomas Dunn, a member of Vancouver's first city council and who, in the early days of Prince Rupert, established a hardware store here. The father built the first frame residence of any size in this city. It stands at Second Avenue and Seventh Street.

Hugh Dunn is survived by his wife, Freda; a son, Ted, Vancouver; two brothers, Earl, Vancouver, and Nelson, Los Angeles, and three sisters in California. The funeral services took place last Tuesday in Vancouver.

LONDON SHOWS SMART SHOES

But Most of New Styles Are Slated For Export

LONDON — The first spiked heels to be seen in Britain since the war share prominence with the flat walking shoe in production this winter, with most of the new styles earmarked for export.

Also on display at the exhibition of Quality Footwear, where designers showed new models, was the Oxford style, with a high lacing front, pointed toe and medium built-up heel.

In the high heel, adaptations of the Louis styles were evident. The high frontage, carried out in various designs, emphasized the arch and the ankle.

Lightweight suede, satin and kid hold the first place in dress afternoon and evening shoes. The more frivolous designs bring back the decorative perforated and stitched designs so popular in the '20s.

In the open front designs the sling-back still holds prominent place. The new low-cut front and double cross-straps or ankle straps take advantage of the new height in heel, and open toes in these styles are the most popular.

Few Platform Soles

Platform soles, so prevalent recently in high-heeled styles, have disappeared from all but a few of the latest designs. Their heaviness was not popular with designers seeking an impression of delicacy and femininity.

Crepe-soled flat-heeled shoes in suede and calf are back for home and export. Normally-soled walking shoes, with hand-stitched welts, contrast with the heavier models. These and lighter shoes are being made in lizard skins.

A highlight of the show was the variety of design and color in the high or ankle-length bootie or overboot, available for export only in the higher lengths.

The very low slipper-type Brevit is still on the market, providing a light walking-shoe flattering to town wear. There is also the new high-backed, hidden heel shoe, where the suede or leather is brought down to the sole of the heel.

The wedge heel still holds prominence in all flat styles and boots, being specially noticeable in all sandal types.

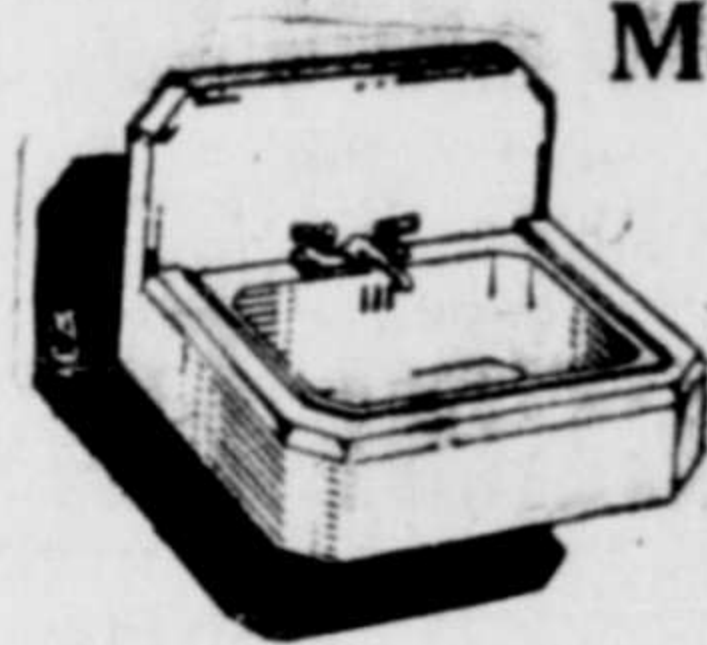

WOMAN PIONEER STAYS AT HOME FOR 64 YEARS

Frightened By Indian, Never Visited Village 12 Miles Distant
MOOSE JAW, Sask. — A gun-toting Indian went after Mrs. Margaret Bennett back in 1883 when Moose Jaw was just a settlement of tents and railway cars and frightened her so much she has remained at her home in the Qu'Appelle hills, 24 miles north of here, ever since.
For 64 years she hasn't been more than half-a-mile from her farm home and she has never seen a motion picture, although aircraft flying overhead and cars and buses speeding along the highway have kept her partially in touch with the 20th century.
"When you stay that long in a place you just won't want to leave," she explains.
Now 97, Mrs. Bennett has lived here since she and her husband moved from Moose Jaw 64 years ago. She never returned to the city, and hasn't even visited the village of Tuxford, 12 miles south of her home.
Born in Scotland, she moved to Winnipeg with her parents when she was 17 and came to Moose Jaw where she worked for the railroad and met her husband, also a railway employee.
They left Moose Jaw soon after the incident with the Indian, and she never returned. She now spends her time knitting and reading the Bible—which she knows from cover to cover although she won't go to church because "they won't preach from the Bible."
"What do you want all this trash about me for?" she asked a visiting newspaperman and photographer, then hastened after the cameraman and offered him the burned-out flash bulbs he used to take her picture.
"I thought you might forget these," she said.

YEAR-END REVIEW—

Canada Assumes Bigger Role
in International Affairs

By ROSS MUNRO
Canadian Press Staff Writer

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada in 1947 took a determined stand in support of the rights of middle and small powers to participate in the peace settlements with Germany and Japan.

This diplomatic fight reflected the Dominion's broadened status in foreign affairs, despite failure so far to budge Russia in her opposition to such participation.

The Soviet Union is adamant that the big powers alone will write both treaties, as well as the Austrian settlement.

Early in the year, Canada presented her case for participation in the German treaty-making to the deputies of the Council of Foreign Ministers meeting in London.

In the late winter and early spring at the Council of Foreign Ministers meeting in Moscow, Canada again, through the British and United States delega-

tions, urged that she and other middle and small powers who contributed to victory over Germany should have an adequate share in peace-making.

Skillful, patient work was done in Moscow through private talks with delegates by Dana Wilgress, at that time the Canadian ambassador to Russia. But the Soviet Union refused to yield an inch. It must be a big power peace, despite the war-time contributions of the other Allies.

ISSUE WILL
BE REVIVED

As the year wore on, the importance of this issue tempo-

arily evaporated before graver disputes between the Big Four over Germany. But it will be revived in time and if a separate peace is made by Britain, the U.S. and France with western Germany, Canada and the other interested states will likely be granted the participation they desire.

The same issue is involved in the pending Japanese settlement. But it appears that the Commission, other than the Soviet Union, will disregard the 10 countries on the Far Eastern Russians and go ahead and draft a treaty without them. Canada is a member of this commission.

The United States has taken the lead in trying to get all the countries on the commission to share in the settlement and Canada heartily approves this plan.

The struggle for participation is a carry-over from the 1946 Paris peace conference, which drew up treaties with Italy and the four German satellites—Hungary, Rumania, Bulgaria and Finland.

Canada, Australia and several other states battled in Paris for the principle of participation and won a partial victory, although the big powers had the final say.

Lord Beaverbrook
Restoring Burial
Site As Memorial

Area Includes Grave of
Pioneer Who Founded Masting
and Other Industries In
Northern N.B.

NEWCASTLE, N.B. —The resting place of William Davidson, one of the first English-speaking settlers of northern New Brunswick, lies in a graveyard Lord Beaverbrook has undertaken to restore and preserve them in his boyhood town as a memorial to early British settlers.

Until recent years the burial ground was a beautiful pine grove. Then the standing timber was sold and the pines cut, leaving stumps and debris with Davidson's railed grave plot the only clear space. Last year the United Church of Canada here conveyed the land title to Lord Beaverbrook, the legislature made provision for a roadway and the work of restoration started.

The Davidson grave, marked by a large, cracked sandstone tablet, is near the junction of the Northwest and Southwest Miramichi rivers. He died in 1790 when 50 years old.

Born in Scotland, William Davidson established a salmon

fishing and fur trading business on the Miramachi at the age of 25. When American privateers plagued him during the Revolutionary War he moved to Maugerville on the St. John River and pioneered New Brunswick's masting industry.

Supplying masts for the Royal Navy, he received prices ranging from £10 for a stick 18 inches in diameter and 72 feet long, to £136 for one 36 inches by 108 feet.

After the war he returned to the Miramachi, revived his business there and had a brief but colorful career in politics. His great rivals, both in politics and trade, were the Cunards, of subsequent steamship fame.

W. H. Davidson, Newcastle lawyer, has published a sketch of his ancestor, Dr. J. Clarence Webster, noted New Brunswick historian wrote in the foreword: "His untimely death undoubtedly greatly retarded the development of the Miramachi area of New Brunswick."

PAY UP OR ELSE

FOUR TREATIES
SIGNED BY CANADA

This fall, Canada formally signed the treaties with Italy, Hungary, Rumania and Finland. There was no treaty signed with Bulgaria, for due to an oversight Canada never officially declared war on that Balkan country.

Canada was invited to the western hemisphere defence conference in late summer at Rio de Janeiro, but declined. The government felt that the present defence arrangements with the United States are adequate enough without further commitments with Latin or South America.

In the sphere of trade Canada took a leading part in the International Trade Organization conference in Geneva from April to October and also was represented at the world trade conference at Havana which followed.

The diplomatic service continued to expand during the year, with several score young men being taken into the External Affairs Department.

Senior diplomatic changes were not numerous but the chief ones involved the transfer of Mr. Wilgress from Moscow to be minister to Switzerland, and the switch from Rio de Janeiro of Jean Desy to be ambassador in Rome. Maj.-Gen Victor Odium was appointed ambassador to Turkey and E. J. Garland became minister to Norway.
