Ernest Bevin on British Economic Crisis Hazelton Highway Essential In Defense Against Russia

ENGINEER REPORTS FAVORABLY

All claims in favor of the western route for a road to open Northern British Columbia and a route to Alaska have been vindicated. It is a route which for the greater part will follow a low and level country and for long distances can be made as straight as an arrow. It is a road which will open many thousands of acres of first class agricultural country and large sections of heavy timber, mostly balsam and spruce. Until the road reaches Telegraph Creek the highest elevation is 2,000 feet and the snowfall is very light. It is exceptionally easy country to build a road through. It will connect with the Alaska road and will also give access to Stewart and the Alaska Panhandle. There is a low pass to the Groundhog coal fields and also an easy and low pass through to the Peace River country.—P. M. Monckton, B.C.L.S.



Newspapers and Libel

IT HAS LONG BEEN the law that an author or publisher bears full liability for what he writes or publishes, regardless of his intentions or his innocence. This is only another way of saying years ago now but I still well gave delightful concerts last what Chief Justice Mansfield said in England 150 year's ago in much better language, that "Whatever a man publishes, he publishes at his peril." The result has been that just as long as there have been newspapers published there have been libel suits brought; and all that has changed is the increasing number and complexity of the actions launched and the claims made. The risk of libel actions is the risk that every publisher must assume. It is no more possible to operate transportation in these days of heavy traffic without expecting to defend many negligence actions than it is possible to publish a newspaper without offending, if not damaging, many people. Indeed, the only surprising feature is that more libel suits are not launched, when one thinks of the hundreds of assertions of fact and expressions of opinion contained in every edition of a newspaper. Human frailty being what it is, mistakes are inevitable and, quite from the ently, costly.

GOOD OLD TIMES!

MHO CAN HAVE ANY PATIENCE with the ex-VV pression "the good old times?" Try and analyze them. Heaven knows, there is trouble enough today, but what man would, if he could, turn back the clock? There is widened knowledge, if widened obligations and responsibilities. But welcome them! Take Labor, for example! So far as that goes, everybody works for a living. There is no comparison between the position of the average individual today and what it was only a few generations ago. Get a strangle hold on the real causes of world wars and life will indeed be worth the living!

ALBERNI HARD HIT
