ANADIAN STEAMSHIP COMPANIES, with • steadily expanding services, are showing their good faith and interest in the Alaska trade and are anxiously awaiting the day when present shipping restrictions will permit the Alaskans themselves taking more full advantage thereof. Pioneering a new extension of service is the Union Steamship Co. whose steamer Camosun inaugurated a service from here at the week-end to Wrangell and Petersburg, the furthest north the company has so far ventuerd with its ship. The Camosun, incidentally, is now rendering a new direct 36-hour service between Prince Rupert and Vancouver. Other Canadian steamship companies will soon be bidding more for the Alaska trade including Canadian National Railways whose new Prince George will be on the run next year and the Canadian Pacific which will have its present Pacific coast flagship, Princess Kathleen, on the Alaska-- Margan Marga route in 1949, planning particularly for the carcarrying trade from Prince Rupert to Haines for connection with the Alaska Highway.
