Of 20,000 persons rescued from inundated buildings 200 were unconscious. Twenty-five dead bodies were found. There is debris, and desolation everywhere. Thousands of people are homeless and the hospitals are all crowded.

The flooded area covers 50 miles and it is estimated that the property damage will amount to \$100,000,000.




