FRANCE IS THREATENED WITH REVOLUTION

ANOTHER BOLD ATTEMPT WAS MADE TO ROB VANCOUVER BANK YESTERDAY

Lone Bandit Demands \$7,000 But Is Given Only \$365 by Teller

VANCOUVER, Dec. 20.—Another bold bank robbery was pulled off here yesterday afternoon but only \$365 was secured. Entering the Bank of Nova Scotia at the corner of Davie and Granville Street, a lone bandit—a young unmasked man—coolly walked to the teller's cage and presented a slip on which was written: "Pay over seven thousand dollars." The teller threw out a partial package of five dollar bills containing \$365. This the bandit seized and walked leisurely out, jumped into an automobile and escaped.

THIS SLEUTH TOO CLEVER

Prohibition Commissioner at Portland Apologizes for Raid Made on British Steamer

PORTLAND, Dec. 20.—George Clever, state prohibition commissioner, who on Wednesday night led 25 officers in a raid on the British vessel London Merchant seizing a quantity of the ship's liquor and who on Thursday were charged by the federal government with illegal search and seizure, on Friday appeared before the United States Attorney Coker and agreed to return all the liquor seized and also to write a letter of apology to Captain Anderson and the owners of the vessel. Clever admitted that he had a mistaken view of his powers as state prohibition commissioner and also that his raid was not based on any evidence of law violation by either the officers or crew of the vessel.

WORLD FLIGHT BEING PLANNED

Another Attempt to Fly Around World Under British Auspices Next Year Being Considered

(Special to Daily News)
LONDON, Dec. 20.—Another attempt to fly around the world will probably be made under British auspices next year. This time it is expected that the attempt will receive the assistance of the government which was not accorded to the ill-fated Stuart MacLaren expedition last year. Already the Royal Air Force is interesting itself in the matter and tentative plans have been advanced. The question of route is an important one and, while the course followed by MacLaren may be the route again, there is a possibility that the direction may be changed and that the aviators undertaking the globe-encircling flight may go west instead of east.

SESSION ENDED AT NOON FRIDAY

Legislature Prorogued, Private Members Leave Victoria to Spend Christmas at Homes

VICTORIA, Dec. 20.—The Legislature prorogued at noon yesterday and by today, the most of the private members were out of the city on their way to their respective homes for the Christmas holidays.

ALASKA WOULD CHEER FOR NORTHERN LINE

Juneau Paper Says It Can do Nothing But Hurrah and Wish Project Well

Discussing a proposal to build a railway to Stewart and Hyder by way of the Bear River from the Peace River country the Juneau Empire says: "Let us hope that our Canadian friends may be able to bring about the construction of a railroad from Portland Canal eastward to connect with either the Canadian Pacific or the Canadian National Railways system. If such a road were constructed the advantages that would accrue to it and to all concerned by its continuation to Hyder are too obvious to require elaboration. Of course, Alaska wishes the project well, and the Juneau Chamber of Commerce did the right thing in expressing its approval of the project. "It is difficult to see how Alaska can further the project beyond wishing it well, endorsing it and hurrahing for it, but undoubtedly she will do all those things with enthusiasm and without mental reservation of any kind."

BOOZE KILLS MANY PEOPLE

Poison Holiday Liquor is Being Sold in New York City

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Poison holiday liquor caused 31 deaths in New York City since December 1, Dr. Charles Norris, chief medical health officer, reports. Officials have been unable to trace from whom the liquor was bought. It is feared that the alcoholic death toll will mount steadily throughout the holiday festivities.

BIG BOAT RACE

LONDON, Dec. 20.—The date for next year's boat race, in which Oxford and Cambridge renew their struggles for rowing honors, has been set for Saturday, March 28.

FIRE AT TRAIL

TRAIL, Dec. 20.—Fire last night destroyed the receiving bins at the zinc plant of the Trail smelter and the Canadian Pacific trestle connected thereto. The loss was \$25,000.

LUMBER MARKET IS ON UP GRADE

Immediate Improvement is Predicted by Victoria Authority

The lumber business of British Columbia, which has been in the doldrums for the past six months, after a period of unprecedented prosperity shows signs of picking up according to S. W. Dafeo of Victoria, an authority on the situation.

Exporters who have been struggling against adverse conditions, including falling markets and falling prices, are more hopeful as to the future outlook of the industry than they have been for some time. Queries from foreign importers indicate that from now on there will be a steady development both in the demand for the product of the forests of the province and in prices. In a few years they expect to see the province the centre of the greatest export trade on the Pacific coast.

The development in the export lumber trade since pre-war days can best be illustrated by a reference to shipping figures. In 1923 twelve steamers plying to the ports of the province were able to handle the business. During the 1923 season, which represented the peak of the lumber export trade the cut was sufficiently large to provide business for 191 steamers. Improvements in the value of sterling, it is anticipated by the trade, will again make of Australia one of the best and most consistent markets for the products of the B.C. mills. In the past normal demands of Japan have exceeded those of the United States, but the exchange situation has been working against the Japanese buyer who has had to pay \$37.50 of his money for \$30 worth of Canadian lumber.

New Zealand Trade

Present indications in the lumber trade are that business with New Zealand is due for a pick-up although British Columbia exporters object to having to make use of American shipping board vessels to carry lumber to that market. Business with South Africa will improve although Sweden is a strong competitor in that market and it is difficult to get a satisfactory volume of orders at any time. Where transportation facilities are improved the east coast of South America is going to be a big market for the lumber of this province, while China is expected to be in the market for big orders as soon as the political situation settles down.

CROPS IN RUSSIA FAIL AND IT WILL NECESSARY IMPORT

MOSCOW, Dec. 20.—Owing to the failing beet crop, the Soviet government has authorized the importation of three million pounds of sugar from the United States, Czechoslovakia and England. It will also likely be necessary to import considerable grain.

PASSES EXAMINATION

At the recent examinations of the B.C. Institute of Chartered Accountants George Rorie, jr. of Prince Rupert, was among the successful candidates in passing the Intermediate Examination.

CROW'S NEST STRIKE OVER

Newly Formed Union and Coal Companies Sign Four Year Agreement

FERNIE, Dec. 20.—Following an overwhelming vote of acceptance at a miners' mass-meeting on Tuesday night, the newly formed B.C. Miners' Association, a breakaway from the American Federation, on Friday signed a new scale of wages for four years with the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company and the Coal Creek mines. The mines will reopen on Monday with full crews.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 20.—Frankie Neill, once a famous professional featherweight boxer, died here yesterday afternoon of pneumonia. He reached the peak of his boxing career in 1902 when he met Abe Attoll for the world's championship.

Rumors of Red Outbreak Are Rife in Paris and Warnings Are Voiced by Authorities

PARIS, Dec. 20.—Rumors of a "Red Revolution" on Christmas Eve have been rife during the past few days. The authorities are not so much concerned over the alleged plotting as over the spreading of such reports.

The police promise rigorous prosecution with the expulsion of foreigners and those who are found guilty of disseminating such reports.

The opposition press continues to warn against Communist activities.

Accounts of a plot for the seizure of Amiens are printed in Laborite papers.

OLD PORTLAND CANAL TUNNELS MAY RESUME

Company Known as Phoenix Silver Mines has been Formed in Victoria to Continue Work

A company known as the Phoenix Silver Mines Ltd. has been incorporated in Victoria to continue development work on the old Portland Canal Tunnels which was started during the original boom in Stewart some twelve years ago. Recent development in the Glacier Creek neighborhood has prompted the belief that the original project of the tunnel was well conceived. The location of the claims is most promising, the group being across Glacier Creek from the Dunwell mine. An eminent engineer is to be employed to pass upon the whole situation and, upon his advice, work will be prosecuted.

The new company has the following directors: George W. Mitchell, Otto Netzer, Dr. C. Denton Holmes and Thomas Mercer. H. E. Hunnings is financial agent. The capitalization is \$500,000.

FORD SALES NOT SO HIGH IN 1924

Decline Recorded in Quantity of Cheap Cars Put Out and Sold

Ford Motors of Canada experienced a decline in sales for the first quarter of the fiscal year, ending October 31. Sales were 12,895, production 11,167 compared with 16,706 and 15,443 respectively, a year ago. Of these figures exports totalled 6,162 cars or 48 per cent of total sales as against 9,213, or 55 per cent, of total sales in the first quarter of preceding fiscal year. October sales, foreign and domestic, of 4,190 units and production of 3,816, compared with 5,273 and 4,778 respectively in October, last year. While Ford of Canada's first quarter business registered effect of recession of recent months, in common with most motor car manufacturers, decided improvement is in prospect for immediate future, according to the sales department.

ALASKAN FISHING REGULATIONS ARE NOT NECESSARY

JUNEAU, Dec. 20.—New fishing regulations applying to southeastern Alaska are unnecessary and destructive of all hope of the herring industry Mayor Gallatas of Douglas told the Chamber of Commerce here. A committee was named to prepare a protest for submission to Secretary Hoover.

COUNTRY-WIDE SEARCH IS ON

Effort Being Made to Apprehend Bandits who Robbed Georgia Banks and Fired Valleyview

GAINESVILLE, Georgia, Dec. 20.—A country-wide search is proceeding for the robber band which looted vaults of the First National Bank and the First Guaranty State Bank at Valleyview and set fire to the buildings housing the banks causing a loss of over \$120,000. The robbers escaped with \$190,000 in cash.

GREAT BRITAIN AND REPARATION

Note to be Forwarded to United States in Hope of Solving Problem

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Great Britain is expected to make a detailed reply to the United States on reparations claims. It will suggest a solution of the problem in terms acceptable to Great Britain and will include all demands of the United States.

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Looks Like Mill Will Start Soon.

It appears very likely now that the big sawmill at Seal Cove, which has been idle for the past four years, is to be reopened at an early date. It will mean a great deal to Prince Rupert—perhaps more from the standpoint of actual employment than the elevator when it gets in operation. Such a payroll is needed in the city.

With lumber market conditions improving and the outlook for demand during the coming year very promising, several concerns have had their eyes on the local plant which is strategically located from a shipping standpoint. Yesterday the Daily News carried an interesting and authoritative announcement from Vancouver that a deal had been consummated for the sale of the plant with a view to its immediate operation.

Both Mr. Smith and Mr. Bell, the principals to the purchase, are well known operators of the province with many years experience behind them. It may be expected, if satisfactory arrangements are made with the city and railway company, that the plant will be operated by them on a large and permanent scale.

It is stated that the pulp and paper project may also be matured in connection with the mill. This has been said by prominent operators to be the logical course to follow here but it will take time to develop and, in the meantime, everybody here will be satisfied with having the plant in operation again as a sawmill. This has been hoped for a great deal lately and a number of projects have been announced during recent months but the present one seems to be the most promising of all.

Hemlock Or Fir For Elevator Here.

It is stated here that the specifications for the terminal grain elevator, construction of which is to start shortly after the first of the year, call exclusively for the putting in of fir piling. Enquiry of one local firm with a view to obtaining this variety of piling was made by one of the prospective bidders this week but the matter had to be turned over to a Vancouver dealer.

The local hemlock, it is generally conceded, is just as suitable for piling as fir is. This being the case it would seem unfortunate that the specifications do not allow for its being used. Any of the commodities to be used in the construction of the elevator should not be brought from outside if just as good can be obtained locally. Perhaps designers of the mill were not aware, when they turned out the specifications, of the suitability of the local timber.

Anyox Parent Teachers Oppose War; Urge Teaching of Music and in Favor of Bible Teaching

ANYOX, Dec. 20. — At the last regular meeting of the Anyox Parent-Teachers' Association a communication was read from the Provincial Parent-Teachers' Federation, which stated that that body had decided to present certain requests to the Educational Survey Commission, the most important being the following:

That music be placed on the list of optional subjects for matriculation;

That all children be given an opportunity to learn to sing;

That physical training, including organized and supervised playgrounds, be made an integral part of the school curriculum;

That fewer changes be made in text books and a better system of distribution be arranged.

Resolutions that were submitted by the Provincial Federation to the local association were dealt with as follows:

"Resolved that we place on record our determination to create public opinion against war by stimulating interest in the education of every boy and girl, man and woman, through the elimination, as far as possible, in the reading and observation of all the glorification of the forces of destruction as contained in text books, general literature and pictures, that they may become healthy in body, intelligent and pure in thought, desirous of living and serving in the interests of a peaceful world, and by so doing efface the conditions that lead to war." This was carried.

The resolution dealing with excessive amount of home work brought out considerable discussion. It was pointed out that the School Act recommends that not more than an hour's work be given. All agreed that this was not excessive. The value of home work in developing the personality of the child was emphasized and the assistance given by parents to children in the performing of their allotted task was strongly condemned as being an injustice to both parent and teacher. In doing their home work, pupils were thrown on their own resources to meet the difficulties encountered and the effort put forth to overcome these was an important factor in their training for the battle of life. It taught a child to think for itself.

Harmful Magazines
 A resolution favoring a strict form of censorship being exercised in the matter of certain harmful magazines which were being freely sold in British Columbia and purchased by teen age boys and girls was heartily endorsed. The subject of Bible teaching in the schools also came up for discussion. The value of Bible teaching and the adoption and practice of the principles contained therein, were strongly advocated as being a solution of the problems confronting the present generation. It was the only book which held the key to the moulding of a cosmopolitan population after the most desired fashion. Through the neglect of parents the only opportunity given the majority of children to become acquainted with the literature of the book was that of the Sunday schools and these were handicapped by the short time at their disposal once a week. The Anyox Association went on record as follows:

"That the School Act be so amended as to permit of one public school period per week being allotted for Biblical instruction, when such instruction could be arranged to be given by accredited Bible teachers, independent of the school teaching staff and of ordinary educational funds."

Jas. Mitchell reported to the meeting that the privilege of using the gymnasium five afternoons a week had been given to the school children. The school concert had been postponed to January 16. The president, Mrs. McAllister, occupied the chair.

After all business was transacted, Mrs. Bert Scott served refreshments.

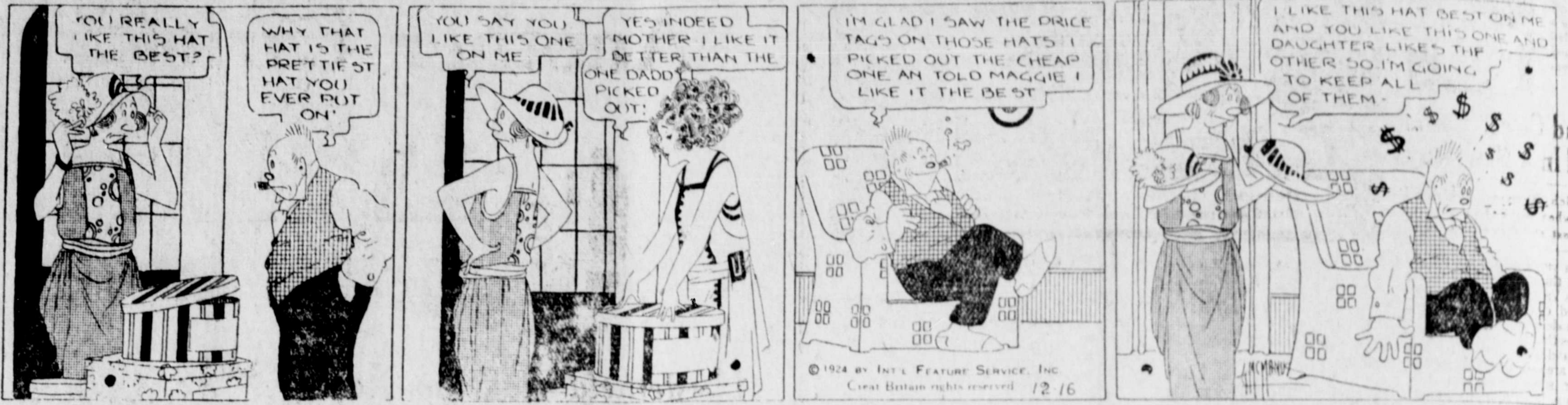

On Wednesday night the bag amounted to five splendid rodent specimens in one trap which speaks for the possibilities of John's new invention. The trap, which was originally built as a mink trap, has been converted into a rat trap and to say the least is ingenious in construction. The trap is made of wood and lined with zinc to prevent the rats from gnawing their way out. It is oblong in shape with two collapsible ends. When the trap is set the ends are lifted up and suspended from two cross bars by strings. The ends are fixed to a perfectly balanced piece of shingle caught by a wooden trip on the outside. 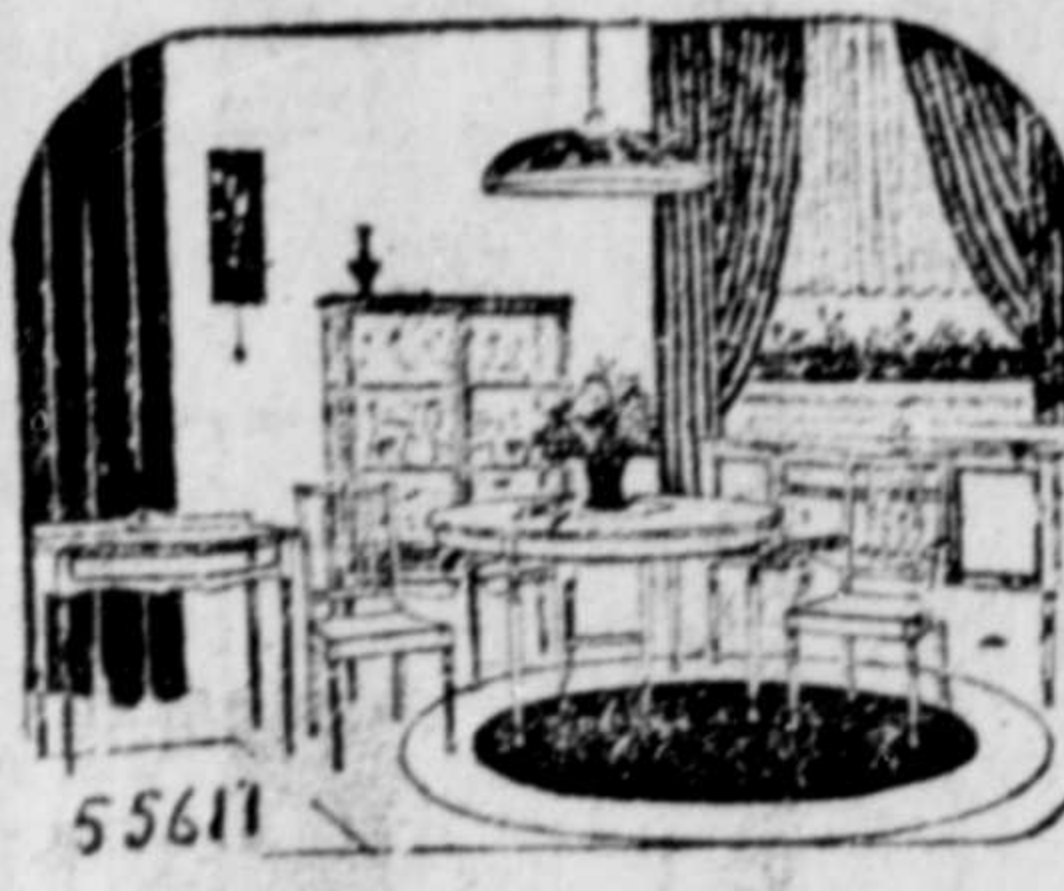

CANADIAN NATIONAL LAND SETTLEMENT

Sales to End of November Greater than for Previous Year During Same Period

WINNIPEG, Dec. 19.—At the annual meeting of the C.N.R. Lands and Colonization departments of the western region Commissioner Field announced that land sales to the end of November showed an increase compared with the same time last year.

Capt. L. B. Boyd of the U.S. Agency also gave a satisfactory report in regard to sales and people sent into the country.

Nearly 13,000 immigrants from overseas passed through the Winnipeg office since January 1 last of which nearly 5,000 had been placed in farm positions, while employment had been found for several hundred in timber and pulpwood camps and elsewhere.

A vigorous campaign is to be continued.

THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT

FAMOUS OLD BANK BUILDING IS CLOSED

Magnificent New Seven Storey Structure Will Replace it in 1935

LONDON, Dec. 20.—(Canadian Press).—The passing of the old Bank of England Building, which has seen some of the most stirring sights in London's ancient and chequered history, was sounded when the Exchange clock struck 12 on a recent Saturday and the great double iron doors at main entrance closed, not to re-open for at least 40 years.

The housebreakers have begun their task of demolishing the internal buildings of the Bank to make way for the magnificent 7-storey structure to be completed in 1935. For the last few weeks daily consignments of papers and ancient records have been removed to temporary quarters in Finsbury Circus.

The wonderful interior of the Bank by Sir John Soane will remain untouched. The foundations will be laid 40 feet down in the ground, and three floors, holding the great new vaults, will be built below the street level. Five floors will rise 80 feet above the ground, and two more, slightly set back, another 20 feet. It is expected the foundations will be commenced in the spring of 1925.

HOARD OF ROMAN SOLDIER IN LONDON

Coins Dun up Have been in Ground 1600 Years: Minted in 320 A.D.

LONDON, Dec. 19. — Some time in the fourth century a soldier in the Roman army occupying London—or it may have been an Imperial paymaster—hid in the ground of what is now Russell Square a hoard of about 500 small coins. There they lay for perhaps 1,600 years, until a working mat, digging out the foundations of the future Royal Hotel, turned up a heavy lead box. It was crammed with small bronze coins about the size of a sixpence, the centenials, a bronze coin originally covered with a thin coat of silver, of which there are some traces. The British Museum experts found that the coins belong to the date of the great Constantine and his family, and were minted on the Continent round about 320 A.D. It was the kind of money in which the Roman soldiers were paid.
