This is the only mica mine in Canada, according to the same authority and it is controlled by Edmonton and New York capital. They are spending a lot of money in proving the property, cutting a ten mile trail through the woods and driving a tunnel to prove the underground quality of the mica.

HALIFAX, Aug. 29 .- The gale that swept the Nova Scotia coast Tuesday night took the lives of seven men including the captain and crew of five of the fishing schooner Anna Macdonald at Yarmouth Bar. It destroyed the fishing boat Lizzie E., a Ney York yacht, Shanghai, the schooner Lady Thorburn, the coasting steamer Aspy and schooners Golden Cup and Bridget. Passengers and crews had in many cases miraculous escapes from death.

The country in there is in the same state that it was when Sir Alexander Mackenzie and Simon Fraser first arrived. Fraser established Fort McLeod in 1805 and it had been open continuously since that time. St. James was established the following year. It was the capital of British Columbia for several years when the country was known as New Caledonia. It had the largest group of whites in the country.

The reason why the Carriers were so named was given by the speaker. The widows carried the bones of their dead husbands on their backs after the process of incineration which was practised. They were kept until a sufficient supply of furs and other goods could be gathered for a potlatch.

The Babines were named by the coureurs de bois, the name being given them because of the practise of the young girls on reaching womanhood of carrying a bone or piece of hardwood between the teeth and lower lip. Babine was slang word for "big TI lip" in French.






