FIRE DESTROYS VANCOUVER LUMBER MILL

RUM RUNNERS SUFFER WHEN FIRED ON BY COAST GUARD CUTTER, SEATTLE

Hanbury Mills at Vancouver are Destroyed by Fire Which is Spreading to Other Plants

VANCOUVER, June 28.—Fire broke out at the plant of the Hanbury Lumber Company at False Creek shortly after noon today and destroyed the plant. Fanned by a strong northwest wind the fire is sweeping into the mill and machinery depot district in that industrial section. The entire brigade is out fighting the flames which at 1.15 this afternoon had not yet been brought under control.

The loss will be heavy.

RESCUE PARTY BACK IN NOME

Schooner Herman Forced to Return When Shaft Broken — Bear Still Detained

NOME, June 28.—The gasoline sailing schooner Herman has returned here in distress and plans for the rescue of the party of 13 left by Harold Noice last year on Wrangell Island are in abeyance. Having left here June 11, the schooner got as far as Diomedes Island in the middle of Bering Strait when she broke her crankshaft and came back here under sail.

The cutter Bear is still detained north of Bering Straits. She was last reported off Kotzebue Sound having been carried by drift ice into the Arctic.

MANY IMMIGRANTS ARRIVING THIS WEEK

Selling Canada To Canadians.

There is an article in the Journal of Commerce, published at Montreal, in which the question of selling Canada to Canadians is discussed. The writer tells of a party of immigrants passing through the city on the way to the United States. Someone asked them why they did not stop off and locate in Canada instead of going to the States. They said they would do so if they could be shown. The person asked was unable to give them a good reason for so doing so they proceeded on their way and Canada lost a group of intelligent settlers.

The difficulty is that we are not sold on our own country. We are too ready to tell of the wonders of the south or the east or somewhere else than Canada. We do not know Canada sufficiently.

If we knew our own country we should be so overcome with the possibilities of greatness that we should urge the whole world to come here and make the country its home. There is however a growing feeling that this is the country of the future just as the United States has been the country of the past generation. Day by day the idea is growing and if we can make Canadians all see it, we shall very soon find that it will become an established fact.

Not only must we sell Canada to Canadians but we must sell Prince Rupert to the people of Prince Rupert and the rest of the world. The sale is being put over. Today there is more optimism here than there has been for many a day. Today we are more in the eyes of the world than has been the case for a long time past. Today we begin to see that we are "it" and that if we have faith in ourselves and sell the city to ourselves and to the rest of the world we shall get results.

CENOTAPH TO BE UNVEILED

Archbishop Du Vernet Sends Message to People of Stewart to be Read There

Archbishop Du Vernet, who while slowly recovering his strength, is still unable to travel, has sent the following message to the people of Stewart to be read Sunday by the Rev. Arthur Ashley:

"To the People of Stewart: While I cannot be with you in body next Sunday as desired I shall be with you in spirit as you participate in the ceremony of the unveiling of the cenotaph to commemorate the memory of the brave men who laid down their lives in the Great War for the cause of the freedom of the world. The sacrifice of self in the service of others is the highest thing known to us. 'Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.' In erecting this cenotaph you are helping to make true the patriotic words, 'Their name liveth for evermore.'"

"I am glad that you have in your midst a clergyman who served as a private at the front during the Great War. He can speak to you more feelingly than I can as he can realize more vividly the greatness of the sacrifice made."

CATHOLIC CLERGY TOURING CANADIAN FRENCH SETTLEMENTS

One Hundred Are Visiting the West to See Opportunities Which Await Settlers

MONTREAL, June 28. — One hundred members of the Roman Catholic clergy of the province of Quebec and the New England states left Montreal last night on a special train over the Canadian National Railways for Edmonton, Alberta, on a trip which has as its object the investigation of the French Canadian settlements in Northern Quebec, Northern Ontario and the western provinces.

Representatives of all the French daily newspapers are accompanying the party under the guidance of Claude Melancon, French publicity representative of the Canadian National Railways.

The party is in charge of Father J. A. Guellette, director of the Federal Bureau of Colonization on Craig Street, Montreal. The trip is the result of negotiations begun some time ago between Father Guellette and C. Price Green, commissioner of colonization and development of the Canadian National Railways.

It is a well recognized fact that in many of the well established parts of Quebec young men are deserting the farms to go to the eastern states. Various measures have been taken to try to stop this emigration and it was thought that if the leaders of the communities and these are usually the parish priests, could see for themselves the opportunities which await the French Canadian agriculturist in other parts of Canada their influence could be more strongly exerted in preventing the regrettable emigration of French Canadians across the border.

The trip is in no way a sight-seeing tour, in fact the only large centres being visited are Ottawa, Cobalt, Winnipeg, Regina, Moose-jaw and Edmonton. All other stops are being made at small towns, which are the centres of French Canadian farming communities, and these stops are of sufficient length to permit the travellers to secure a great deal of first hand information on the subject they are investigating.

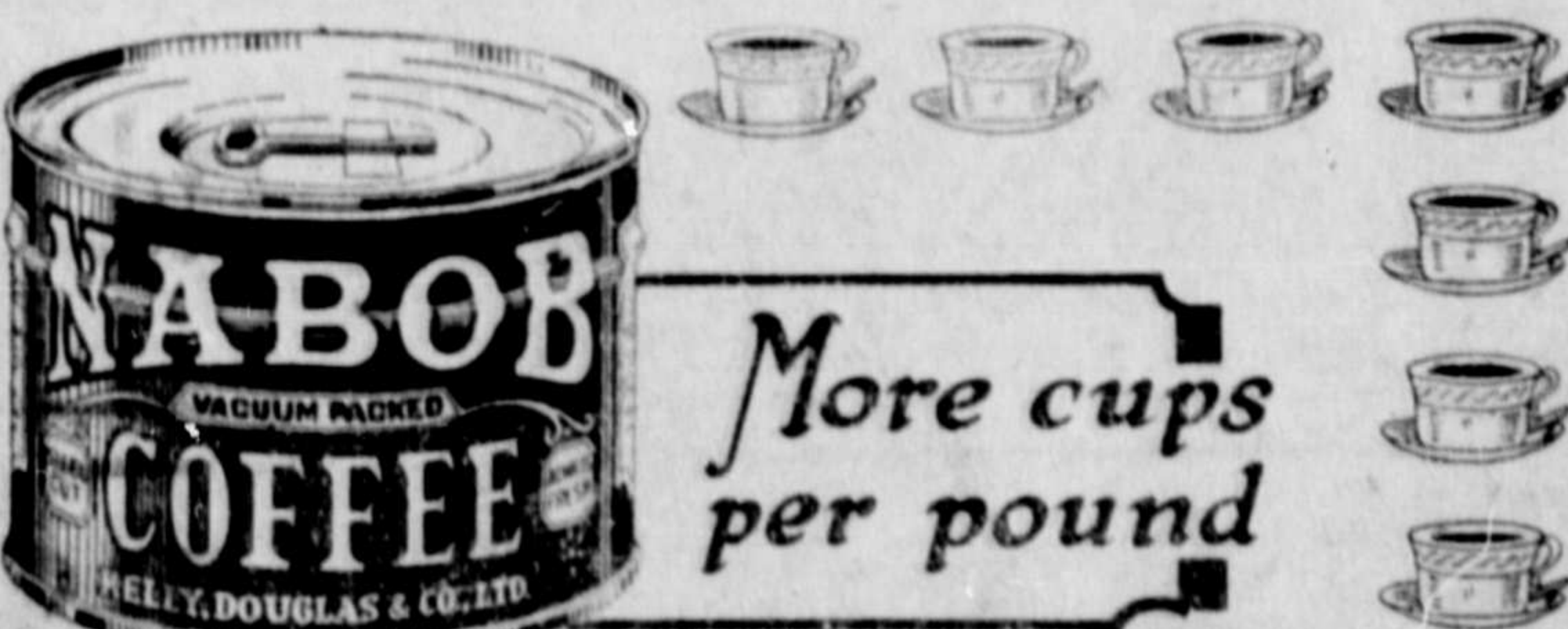

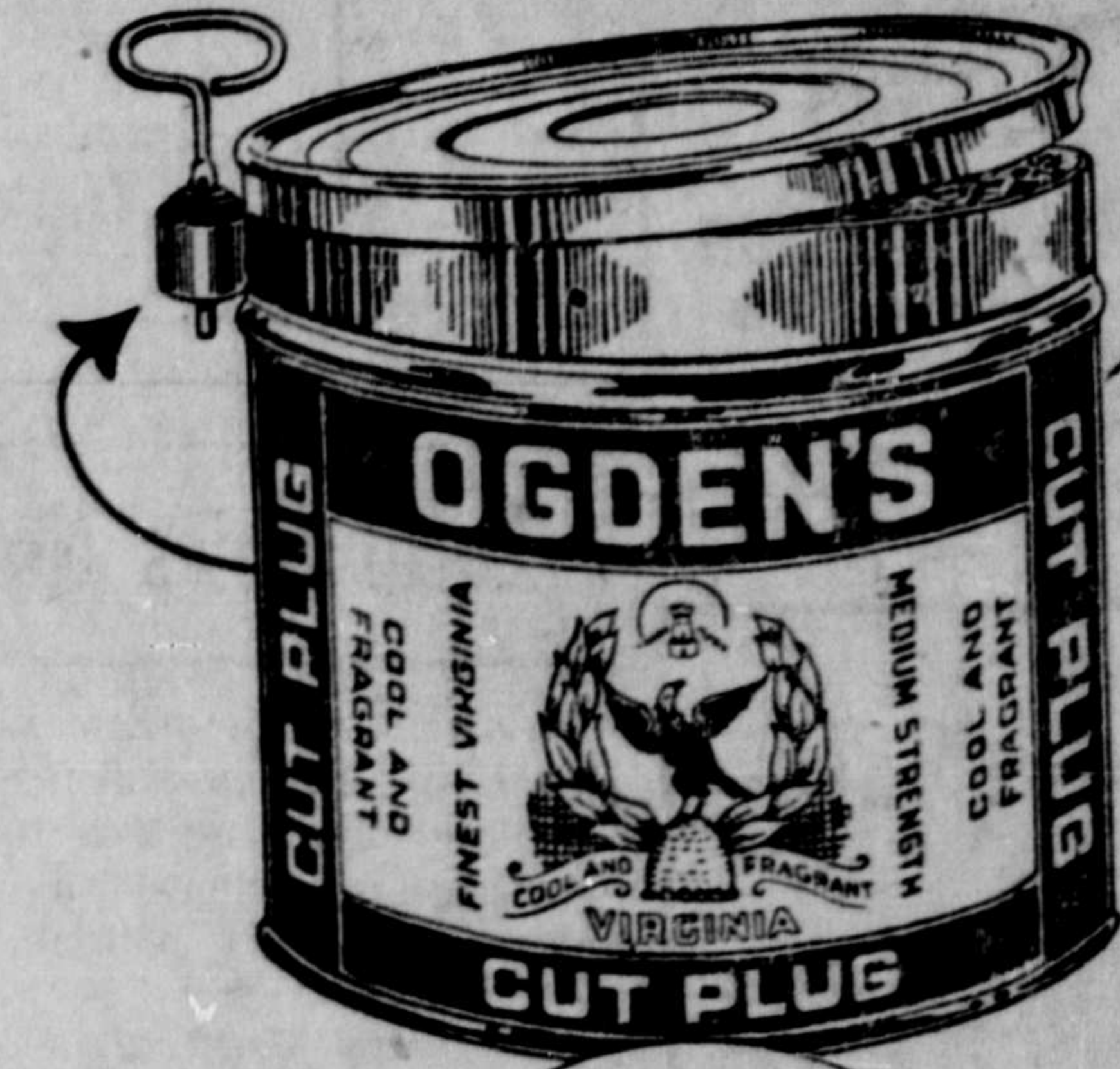

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet which is the chief source of Prince Rupert's prosperity

With good weather prevailing on the deep sea fishing grounds, good use has been made of the long summer days and boats of both the Canadian and American halibut fleets have been bringing in some healthy catches this week. Prices have remained very steady for both Canadian and American landings and fishing has been of a remunerative nature. Boats of the home fleets, both salmon and halibut, are conspicuous by their absence and Cow Bay has a deserted appearance. The mid-season repair work has been practically completed and all boats are now engaged plying their trade on the high seas.

The work boats are fully occupied in towing and other miscellaneous duties. The Prince Rupert Boat House and the Ketchikan float are veritable hives of industry with the Salt Lake trips and public hire service in full swing. With brilliant summer weather "on tap" last Sunday the Cow Bay floats and the Yacht Club floats were besieged at an early hour by parties of picnickers and all boats in commission were requisitioned for exploring purposes. Several boats of the halibut fleet, which chanced to be in port over the week end, took parties out to distant points. The evening fogs have been causing amateur skippers quite a deal of worry, although fortunately there have been no serious accidents.

Fish Business

From Monday to Friday 576,500 pounds of halibut have been marketed on the Fish Exchange. Canadians were high at 13.5c and 8c, and low at 11.5c and 6c. Americans were high at 14.4c and 8c and low at 12c and 6c. Arrivals were: Canadians—Prosperity, Fisher, M. M. A Novel Vacation

Frank Dowling and Barley Number, of Dominion government telegraph and banking fame respectively, have decided to spend their summer vacation in a novel and remunerative manner. With this end in view they are fitting up a gill net boat at the Bone Yard Creek ways in which they intend to fish for salmon on the Skeena river. The boat will be powered with a 6 horse power Caltee-Perfection engine, which, if it goes alright will give them a fair turn of speed. The engine is yet to be covered in and the cabin in the bow fixed up. Judging from appearances the sleeping accommodation will be rather cramped when the two "huskies" get fitted inside. It might be a good suggestion to fix up masts, one on the bow and one on the stern, and sling a hammock in between. This would save Barley a lot of time in getting to bed and give him infinitely more comfort to say nothing about giving Frank a little more room in which to stretch his rather extremities. It has not yet been definitely settled as to which one of the boys is to be skipper and which the first mate. Probably a pack of cards

will play a prominent part in the solution. When the boys go out, the best wishes of the nauticals will go with them.

A new 22 foot launch is being constructed at the Cow Bay creek ways for W. E. Collison. The launch is a useful looking craft of the canopy top type.

Naas River Trial Trip

A trial run was made to Bartlett Rock on Wednesday night of the new power boat Naas River, recently constructed at the Shockey ways by John Darby, of Yukon fame. The boat is a beauty of its class, being especially designed for transportation work on the Naas River from which fact she derives her name. The trial trip proved very satisfactory and a normal speed of 18 miles per hour was attained. The boat is fitted with a 200 horse power Van Blerck engine of eight cylinders. Mr. Darby, who is designer, builder and owner of the boat, expressed much pleasure with the manner in which the high speed engine behaved and is certain that after she is tuned up properly, he will easily get an additional two miles out of her. The Van Blerck is a solid looking piece of machinery and is one of the premier high powered engines on the market today. The operation is comparative simple for such a high powered machine and with her automatic oil feed, double spark system and self-starting arrangement, is an ideal engine for the work in which she will be engaged. Fred Schafer, who tuned up the engine, was engineer in charge during the trial run. The passengers on the trial trip included John Darby, owner, Mrs. Anderson, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Bruno, H. Sedan, Capt. George Newcomb, S. Suga, Jack Cook and Jim Hubber. Mr. Darby expects to make the run to the Naas, which is 60 miles distant, easily in four hours. He will leave for the north shortly.

The power boat Eleanor Mae, Capt. W. Dass, is on the Cow Bay creek ways to have a new false keel fitted.

The power boat Leinsh, owned by Alderman Theo. Collart, has recently had a new stern post fitted.

Geo. Thane is having a launch built on the Cow Bay creek ways. Her dimensions are 23 foot long by a five foot beam and she will be fitted with a 6 horse power Fisherman engine.

The power boat Shawatlans, owned by W. E. Williams, recently underwent a general overhaul on the Prince Rupert Yacht Club ways.

Skipper Steve King, while out with a swimming party aboard the good ship Faith on Tuesday night, headed into a heavy fog on the return trip and made the Prince Rupert cannery in good time much to the surprise of the passengers. The folks aboard thought they were returning to the Yacht Club, as did skipper King, but somehow or other the course would not hold straight with the result that the absent compass was not conspicuous.

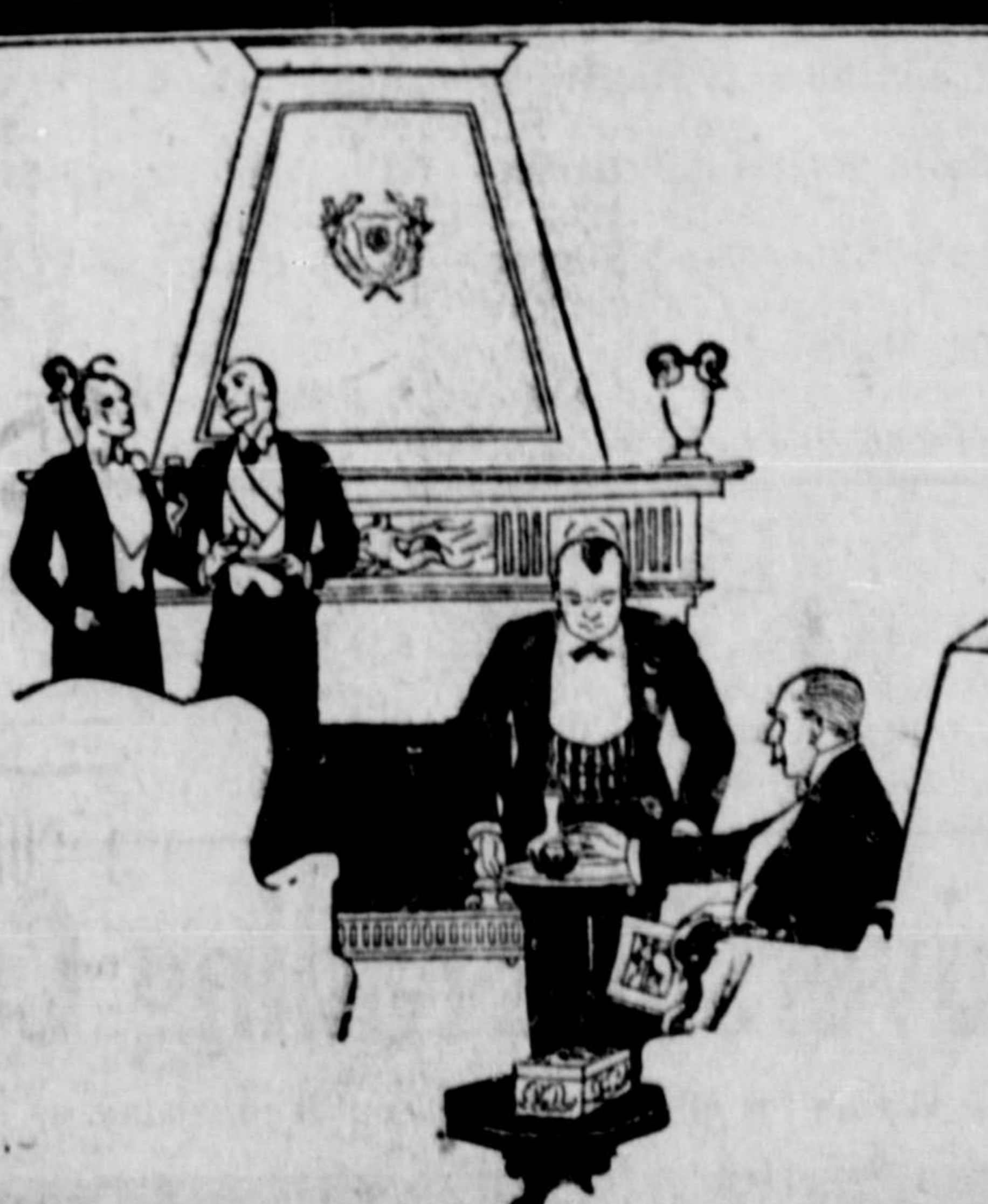
