

American people" in campaign to keep presidency in Democratic hands. Nominated on third ballot, the 52-year-old Illinois governor is reported to have chosen Senator John Sparkman of Alabama for vice-presidential candidate.

A Good Catch for Democrats

MINATION of Adlai Stevenson as Demo-V cratic candidate makes the U.S. presidential campaign a unique contest between two reticent politicians.

Although he threw his cap in the ring earlier than Stevenson, Dwight Eisenhower initially displayed no interest in being standard-bearer for the Republicans or anyone else. When he was advised in Europe of the mounting clamor for him, his first comment was "Baloney."

Stevenson betrayed even less desire to live at the White House and with evident sincerity protested right to the end that he did not want the nomination.

Clearly, however, he is a good catch for the Democrats and they could not let him off the hook. As Governor of Illinois he pulled the state from a scandalous condition of government to a good one. He is a politician who made him way without recourse to machine politics. Having helped to organize the United Nations, he also has a broad understanding of foreign affairs.

The selection of Stevenson and Eisenhower proves that behind the carnival atmosphere at Chicago there was a great deal of good hard sense. For Canadians, as for every other friendly people, there is the gratifying thought that, whether his name be Stevenson or Eisenhower, the next president of the U.S. will be a man with vision to see clearly beyond his own borders.

He Was A Simple Christian

THE largest diocese in British Columbia mourns the sudden death of one of northern and central British Columbia's most devoted churchmen and his loving wife.

The Rt. Rev. and Mrs. J. B. Gibson were oldtimers here and as such have taken with them a part of Prince Rupert. But more, they have left behind them a record of service to the community which will not be forgotten.

The Bishop of Caledonia never endeavored to put on the cloak of greatness, even though his position would have made this possible. In simplicity itself, he was great. He led the life of a simple, humble Christian.

While rector of the Anglican Church here for 17 years, he was beloved by his followers. As the the great nationalist and anti- and I were thinking about when Bishop, he lost none of his love for humanity.

Covering the largest diocese in area in the province, Bishop Gibson left no corner of it unvisited. He had just returned from a stay in the Peace River district. More than 10,000 church members and a host of others in the great, spread out northern and central B.C. area knew him and honored him.

Every year he made a visit up the Naas River, to the native churches, and to the scattered villages along the coast. Wherever he went, he made friends, renewed acquaintances and left behind better men and women for knowing him.

He did not look at a man to condemn him, but to find the best in him.

Bishop Gibson, a Rotarian since his arrival here, was also greatly beloved by that service club. Most of the present members of Rotary in Prince Rupert were installed into the club by Bishop Gibson.

In his wife, the daughter of an archbishop, the Bishop found an ever ready staff on which to lean. She was his right hand. She spread a great influence among the church members and was a most energetic organizer of women's work in the city,


Mrs. Gibson was also highly interested and conversant with the history of Prince Rupert and the north, having pioneered here with her father in 1906. She wrote and had published a history of the diocese of Caledonia, which now stands as a memorial to her service.

The two were such a devoted pair that in their closeness to each other lies a note of solace to the bereaved in the midst of this tragedy-that even in eath they were not divided.

New Drug Combats Dysentry

AND SHIPYARD NEW YORK-Amebic dysentry among the most widespread of human infections and one which has defied medical science for centuries, is being successfully combatted by the broad-range

antibiotic terramycin. Fighting a severe and extensive epidemic of acute amebic dysentry in Southern Korea, medica investigators of the United States Army recently found terramycin to be 97.5% effective against the disease. In a series of 538 cases, "terramycin gave the best results" of several remedies tested, including other antibiotics, especially in combination with

other drugs. Results of the large-scale Korean study were presented at the recent meeting of the American Medical Association by Dr. W. W. Frye, Dean of the Louisiana State School of Medicine and a member of the U.S. Armed Forces Commission on Enteric Dis-

"Rigid" therapy tests were applied, Dr. Frye said, employing standard anti-amebic drugs, terramycin, and two other broadrange antibiotics. Terramycin, when used individually, "gave the best results with only one failure during the six weeks followup period," while "results were poor" when the standard amebicidal drugs were used. Combination of the standard drugs with an antibiotic such as terramycin "gave the best over-all results," Dr. Frye said.

The new study confirms earlier reports by clinicians in Mexico, Egypt, the United States and other countries regarding superiority of this antibiotic in treating amebic dysentry. The disease has decimated civilian populations and armies alike throughout history. It is caused by a microscopic, transparent, onecelled animalcule called Endamoeba histolytica.




