## If City is Ready to Proceed With its Part, Government is Ready to Start Road Now

"The outstanding question as far as Prince Rupert is concerned is the road out of the city," said Hon. T. D. Pattullo at the meeting Saturday night. "I regret that we did not have more reliable information about it. If we had, I would have felt better and the people would not have had undue hopes.

"A reconnaissance has, however, been made from Tyee to Terrace and the cost of a road between those points is now estimated at over three million dollars. It would be the height of folly for me to stand here and say that it would be started and






