Advantages of City Manager Plan of Civic Government set forth by George Rorie at Gyro Club Dinner

That the present system of civic government is not satisfactory either in Canada or the Old Country was the opinion expressed by George Rorie at the Gyro Club dinner last night in the St. Regis Cafe when he was the chief speaker of the evening with President Milton Gonzales in the chair and a large attendance of members and guests. The speaker drew attention to the weaknesses of the present system and advocated in its place a system under which the executive should be a manager with full powers subject to a small unpaid council, whose duties should be only legislative.
