

# Martin's Plane Struck Low Foothills When It Was Wrecked in Alaska

PORT MOLLER, Alaska, Aug. 16-William Sullivan, a fireman at the fish hatchery, reported at the Pacific American Fisheries cannery station here that he found the airplane wrecked on April 30 by Major Fred Martin, then commander of the American round the world flight.

Sullivan said the plane struck on gradually sloping ground and that there was no mountain within a mile of the spot. He expressed the opinion that Martin was flying very low when he hit. If he had been 150 feet from the ground he would have






