## TEACHERS ARE ROTARY GUESTS

Entertained at Dinner Last Night Along With Members of Schoolboard

### INTERESTING SPEECHES

The teachers of the High school and public schools of the city and the members of the schoolboard were last evening guests of the Rotary Club at dinner in the St. Regis Cafe dining hall, this being the third time on which they have been entertained since the formation of the club. Last year the Rotarians were guests of the teachers.

W. T. Kergin presided and George Munro had charge of the program. The speakers included J. C. Brady, principal of the High School, D. H. Hartness, principal of the Booth School and S. E. Parker, chairman of the school board, for the visitors and in addition to the chairman Thos. McClymont, Fred Stork and M. P. McGaffery for the club. Songs by Mrs. Fraser and Mrs. Jarvis McLeod and a piano solo by Mrs. Kenny were much enjoyed and there were a number of community songs led by Consul Wakefield.

### Welcomed by President

In his opening remarks Dr. Kergin welcomed the guests and spoke of the important positions they filled in the community, and of the wonderful influence they wielded. He told them something of what the club was and what it stood for and particularly its interest in young people. Because of this they had much in common with the teachers and he promised them co-operation in anything they set out to accomplish.

Thos. McClymont gave an interesting address showing the value of education. In Prince Rupert the cost of education was about 10% mills on the dollar, more than was spent on any other department of city government. Vancouver spent 7 1/2 mills and some cities much more one going as high as 19 mills. Prince Rupert was below the average.

### Healthy Fiction

J. C. Brady urged the value of healthy fiction in the education of boys and girls. Also he mentioned the harm done by pernicious books and magazines read by many. In order to provide good fiction Mr. Brady urged that the children's section of the public library be increased by the addition of more good fiction and that provision be made for magazine reading there. The ordinary boy or girl loved literature.

D. H. Hartness asked the co-operation of parents for the backward pupils. Some pupils took so long going through the public schools that they were too big to go on into the High School. He also spoke of the need of a public gymnasium or some such institution for the use of the pupils of the schools between school dismissal and supper time when the weather was not suitable for outdoor play.

Fred Stork mentioned the value of travel in connection with the teaching for history and told of visiting Runnymede where Magna Charta was signed, the place where Gray's Elegy was written and the historic school of Eaton.

M. P. McGaffery spoke of the value of education, especially in a country where people of all nationalities gathered as they did here. The schools were the melting pot where Canadians were moulded.

S. E. Parker urged support for the Board in the erection of playsheds. They wanted one at Borden Street and another at King Edward school. He thought it might be wise to have a bylaw to provide for these and make them so good that they could be used for the city basketball games. The one at Borden Street would be centrally located and suitable. The Elks hall now used for the purpose had too little accommodation for spectators.

The gathering dispersed after a vote of thanks had been passed to the members of the club for their hospitality and interest in school work.

Peter Jelic of Ketchikan arrived in the city from Vancouver on the Venture this morning and is registered at the Prince Rupert Hotel. He will continue his journey north on the Princess Mary on Monday.


