MACDONALD TALKS PLAINLY TO POINCARE

THIRD PARTY COMPLAINS CANNOT GET EVIDENCE BEFORE COMMISSION

Open Diplomacy Policy Begins Between Britain and France Macdonald Speaks Mind Plainly

LONDON, March 3.—Premier J. Ramsay Macdonald, in a desire to create a favorable atmosphere for the initiation of negotiations which he hopes may result from the committee of experts in Paris has had a further exchange of letters with Premier Poincare, the text of which has been issued from the foreign offices both here and in Paris.

The correspondence is noteworthy on Premier Macdonald's side for extreme frankness in stating the British viewpoint and his own opinions on the French policy since the war. Not before has the British suspicion of French action been so candidly stated. The fact that Poincare takes no umbrage at the frankness is considered a favorable sign.

Premier Macdonald again shows that his main hope is to attain such a state of affairs in Europe as to induce the United States to co-operate in the reconstruction of Europe.

Repudiates Annexation

In his reply Premier Poincare repudiates any design to annex a portion of German territory and concerning British suspicions of French motives in giving military assistance to the little entente he declares that the French aims are absolute peaceful and he only desires that England co-operate with the same group of countries for the purpose of maintaining the peace of Europe.

The bill before the National Assembly provides for the abolition of the religious head of the Moslem world and the external expulsion of all members of the Caliph's family within ten days.

DECIDED INCREASE CUSTOMS REVENUE

During February 1924, \$33,532 Was Collected Compared With \$19,612.69 Same Month Last Year

Local customs and excise revenue during the month of February was decidedly higher than the same month last year according to returns issued this morning by Jarvis H. McLeod, collector of customs. During the past month the revenue totalled \$33,532 as compared with \$19,612.69 in February 1923. This represents an increase of \$13,919.31.

TWINS WERE BORN ON NATIONAL TRAIN NEAR EDMONTON THIS MORNING

EDMONTON, Mar. 3.—Twins were born on Number 2 train of the Canadian National Continental Limited this morning shortly before the arrival here to Mrs. P. Rokaski of Bruno, Alta., who was on her way to the hospital when the stork arrived. She is doing well.

FORMER ATTORNEY GENERAL IS DEAD

Charles Wilson of Vancouver Was Member of Sir Richard McBride's Cabinet

VANCOUVER, Mar. 3.—Charles Wilson K.C., barrister, died here on Saturday at the age of 83. He came to British Columbia in 1862 from England and in 1903 was appointed attorney general in the cabinet of Sir Richard McBride.

WORLD RECORD SKATER

CHRISTIANIA, Mar. 3.—Oscar Matheson, professional skater, established a world record in the Terrace bridge construction, 1,000 meters of 1 minute, 31 3/5 seconds.

PRINCE MATSUKATA RETURNED TO LIFE

TOKIO, Mar. 3.—Prince Matsukata, whose death was announced Saturday, is alive and has a chance of recovery. He was pronounced dead after his heart and respiration stopped. Shortly thereafter he came slowly back to life. Meantime the Japanese newspapers carried the story of his death and lengthy obituaries.

LABOR SPEAKER SAYS ANOTHER ELECTION IS LIKELY BRITAIN SOON

GLASGOW, March 3.—Neil McLean, a Labor member of parliament, speaking at a labor demonstration, counseled his audience to expect a general election late in the summer. He expressed doubt if the present government would last through the autumn.

CANNERY DEALS HAVE BEEN MADE

Northern B.C. Fisheries Sells Namu Plant and Leases Those at Bella Coola and Port Essington

Several deals for the lease or sale of canneries in this district have been made during the winter and others are pending.

The Namu cannery of the Northern B.C. Fisheries has been purchased by Gosse-Miller Ltd. It is a two-line plant and a good-sized sawmill and box factory is included in the deal.

The Talho cannery of the Northern B.C. Fisheries at Bella Coola has been leased by G. R. Draney for the season.

The Northern B.C. Fisheries have leased their cannery at Port Essington to the Anglo-British Columbia Packing Co. for the season.

GIBRALTAR BOAT TO BE OBTAINED

Vancouver Report Says C.N.R. Has Found Boat for Q.C.I. Run in Old Country

Final negotiations for the purchase or charter of a steamer at Gibraltar to be used by the Canadian National Railways in the Queen Charlotte Islands service are now under way according to Vancouver reports. The vessel was found by Capt. D. Donald, master of the steamer Prince Rupert, who was sent to the Old Country by the company for this purpose.

CANADIAN NATIONAL PRESIDENT TALKS TO WESTERN EMPLOYEES



FOLLOWING up the first successful experiment in remote broadcast from Winnipeg made about ten days ago, Sir Henry W. Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, appears above talking, a few evenings ago by long distance telephone from his room in the Fort Garry Hotel, Winnipeg, to the company's em-

ployees throughout Western Canada via Calgary radio station CFCN. It is Sir Henry's intention, as soon as the company has completed its string of radio stations from coast to coast, to use this medium as often as possible to establish a personal contact with those he terms his "fellow employees" of the Canadian National system.

NO ELECTION UNTIL AUGUST

List of Voters Which Closed Recently for Beer Plebiscite Only

VICTORIA, March 3.—Premier Oliver declared today that the Government was not contemplating an appeal to the electorate in the immediate future and that there would be no election on the basis of the special April revision of the voters' list. He explained that the idea of the April revision was to have an up to date list in case it should be decided to have a beer plebiscite in the early summer.

The probability is that there will be no election until at least August or early in September.

ISAAC SWALWELL DIED IN GENERAL HOSPITAL

Was Well Known as Cook on Fishing Boats and in Logging Camps

Isaac Swalwell, aged 45 and a native of England, died last night in the Prince Rupert General Hospital after a brief illness which caused his admittance to the hospital last Friday.

Deceased had been a fishing boat cook up till ten months ago. Since that time he had been cooking in logging camps at Alice Arm and on the Queen Charlotte Islands. He was a single man and is survived by a brother residing in Middlesboro, England. He was on active service during the Great War and was a member of the G.W.V.A. as well as the Moose Lodge.

KING GEORGE HAS COLD AND CONFINED BUCKINGHAM PALACE

LONDON, March 3.—King George is confined to Buckingham palace suffering from a cold. On the advice of his physicians he has cancelled various important engagements made for the present week.

Provincial Party Preparing to Back Down from Inquiry by Charging Scope too Narrow

VANCOUVER, March 3.—The Provincial Party today formally requested that the Lieutenant-Governor in Council instruct Mr. Justice Galliher, the commissioner examining the P.G.E. railway charges, to go outside his commission in order to permit evidence to be adduced, which they allege will support their charges.

The counsel of the Provincial Party partially withdrew from the probe last week, contending that the instructions to the commissioner were much too narrow to cover all the charges made.

PARLIAMENT IS AGAIN ACTIVE

Gets Down to Business This Afternoon with Opening of Debate on Address

OTTAWA, March 3.—The House of Commons gets down to business today with the opening debate on the address. The length of the debate is unsettled but it is expected to run into the next week.

Foreshadowing of tariff reduction contained in the speech from the throne is likely to arouse considerable discussion and there are a number of other questions including banking and credit and labor conditions in Cape Breton that are likely to be brought up in the course of the debate.

DECLARIES INQUIRY TRAGEDY FOR B.C.

Money and Energy Being Spent on Trying to Burrow Way to Power When Work Needed to be Done

Says "The Hook," Vancouver's weekly paper: "What a tragedy to behold! The cream of the forensic talent of British Columbia—like a grub boring into a fat cheese—gathered at the provincial capital to ply their skill. The hotel lobbies filled with eminent K.C.s, with red bags over their shoulders and blue ruin in their hearts; sifting buried garbage dumps in the vain quest for some token of corruption; snatching at uninformed street corner and poolroom gossip; burning the midnight oil as they cudgel their high-priced legal brains to think of some line of pernicious questioning, in the hope that the public confidence may be undermined and their clients, their friends and themselves enabled to burrow their way to power.

While all the time the real P.G.E. question is how to fill up the great aching plains of the Cariboo and the Chilcotin; how to colonize our great inland Empire, garner in the fruits of its timber and mineral wealth, create traffic and freight for our railroad and bring confidence, peace, prosperity and contentment to the people of this province.

And we must pay for the enquiry they have forced.

If not already on the voters' list no time should be lost in calling at the Court House and getting registered. Often issues arise during an election which would make a person wish to vote when otherwise he would not be interested. The only safe thing to do is to register. It costs nothing and the vote may be needed.

**Leader Of Reds
Gloats Over Revolution.**

The chairman of the executive of the Third Internationale, the central red organization, gloats over the prospect of a revolution in Japan and suggests that "revolution will march through Europe by way of Germany." Whether the prophecies are to come true or not, none of us can say, but what we do know is that they are aided and abetted by the organization of reds with headquarters in Moscow. They would delight to see one class against another and citizens of the same country killing each other in a struggle over methods of government. The members of the organization have nothing to lose and everything to gain from a change. Most of them are the disappointed ones of the world, the failures, and they look to violence as a remedy where their natural ability to make good failed.

**Are Now Working
On P.G.E. Accounts.**

If there is anything wrong with the financing of the P.G.E., we want to know it. Just now the auditors and lawyers of the Provincial Party are combing the books and accounts and other documents of the railway for the purpose, if possible, of substantiating their charges against the government and of providing for themselves campaign material with which to fight the next election. They have two weeks in which to do the work and they will then have an opportunity of examining witnesses and airing in public their views on the work done by the railway company. It is their last chance. They have failed to make good on their charges against Hon. William Sloan and W. J. Bowser and if they fail in the other charges they may well retire into obscurity. It is on the ground of such charges as these that they have got their party organized. The next sessions of the commission of inquiry will be watched with great interest.

**Asking Bids For
American Ships.**

It may be possible that one or two of the American ships which are to be sold may suit the Canadian National Railways for their coast traffic on this ocean. Out of 1335 offering there ought to be some suitable for the coasting business, but if there are they are likely to be picked up quickly for that is the class of steamer in demand today.

The sale of the American ships is an indication that government ownership of mercantile marine has not been a success in that country, but neither has private ownership. The United States laws do not make for success in the steamship business. In Canada conditions are somewhat different and today the Merchant Marine operated by the government is doing excellent work in developing commerce between Canada and other countries. It should at least be given a fair trial.



MISSION BOAT DRIVEN ASHORE AND IS BURNED

Deck of Gasboat *Lois* Lifted by Explosion and Rev. G. J. Beck Burned

Total destruction by fire of the gasboat *Lois*, owned by the Presbyterian Missionary Board and operated in this district, was reported from Hoonah to Rev. S. Hall Young, superintendent of Presbyterian Missions in the Territory, says the Juneau Empire. Rev. George J. Beck, father of George Beck, of Ketchikan, who had charge of the vessel was painfully burned in the accident.

Mr. Beck, according to reports received by Dr. Young, was standing in the engine room when the accident occurred. The force of the explosion lifted the decks from stem to stern, the pilot house, cabin, masts and steel rigging and hurled them ashore. The accident happened on the night of February 20.

Driven Ashore

The *Lois* had been driven ashore by a large and heavy ice floe earlier on the same day.

Late in the evening, Mr. Beck took his lantern and went across to see if the boat was in a safe position.

It was lying on its side on the beach. He entered the vessel through the pilot house and went direct to the engine room. As he went in, he said, he heard a peculiar hissing sound, and in a single instant the whole place was in a mass of flames. He turned to escape and found the steps to the pilot house to be in splinters. Climbing over the gas tank he made his way to where the pilot house had been and to the gunwale. On the land side a wall of fire 50 feet shut off his escape. He finally made his way ashore over floating ice. He was severely burned about the face, eyebrows and lashes burned, and the rims of his eyeglasses partly melted. No permanent injury, he said, was done to his eyes. His head, ears and hands were covered and not burned.

The fire, he said, probably resulted from an explosion of gas in the bilge, where it had drained from the broken feed pipes.

The hull sank, but was later raised and the engine recovered.

Loss \$15,000

The loss, said Dr. Young, is all of \$15,000. He did not know whether or not there was any insurance carried. Insurance, in the past, had been looked after by the Board of Missions directly.

The loss of the boat, he said, is a serious matter to the work of missions in the territory as the boat has been a vital factor in carrying it on successfully.

It is essential that a vessel be available, he added, and he with others interested will start at once to replace the *Lois* with a suitable craft.
