GERMAN LIBERAL GROUPS WIN ELECTIONS

INTERIOR POLICE DO SMART WORK ROUNDING UP HOLDUP MAN SMITHERS

German Elections Bring Gains to Supporters of Dawes Plan With Anti-Semitism Wiped Out

BERLIN, Dec. 8.—Strong gains by Social Democrats with a consequent strengthening of the section favoring adherence to the Dawes plan was the feature of the returns of yesterday's election throughout Germany. Provisionally the final results at noon today gave the Social Democrats 127 seats against 49 at the last May elections. The Clerical and German Democratic parties, the other two Liberal parties represented in the government increased their representation by two and three respectively.

The Bavarian People's Party increased by three, and the German Nationalists two over Stresemann's German People's Party yesterday. The Communists and Extreme Nationalists lost eighteen each and General Ludendorff's Anti-Semitic Party was practically wiped out.

The Socialists, who will enter the new Reichstag the strongest party, made their chief gains at the expense of the Communists.

Among the notables returned are Chancellor Marx, former Chancellor Scheidemann, Stresemann, Admiral Von Tirpitz, Prince Otto von Bismarck, Count Von Bentlow and Ludendorff himself.

FAIRMAuthor DIED SATURDAY

Passed Away Following Street Car Accident at Los Angeles When Skull Fractured

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 8.—The famous author, Mrs. Gene Stratton Porter, died Saturday night as the result of an accident when an automobile was struck by a street car. She suffered a fracture of the base of the skull and died soon afterwards.

Mrs. Porter had an eventful literary life and is particularly well known for her love of nature and the books and poems in which birds figure largely.

When only eighteen years of age, Mrs. Porter, then Miss Shellenberger, edited the general department for recreation. For two years she was on the natural history staff of Oulding and for four years was specialist in natural history photography for the Photographic Times annual almanac.

It is for her stories of the Lumberlost that Mrs. Porter is known to thousands of people, young and old. In all her books, birds figure largely and several of her publications deal with them alone.

EDMONTON AND P. R. ELEVATOR

Newspaper of That City Appreciates Action of Government in Building Here

Tenders have been called for the construction of an elevator at Prince Rupert with a capacity of a million and a quarter bushels says the Edmonton Journal. Work is to be commenced early in the year and should be finished in time to participate in the handling of the 1925 crop. The decision to build an elevator there was taken last June. The Edmonton board of trade was one of the bodies which passed resolutions calling attention to the strong claims which Prince Rupert had for such facilities.

GOLD DISCOVERY ON GLACIER CREEK YUKON TERRITORY

DAWSON, Dec. 8.—A mild stampede to Glacier Creek, 60 miles west, occurred following the finding of ore by George Kennedy the well known prospector, showing 40 ounces of gold to the ton in a well defined vein which the discoverer says he traced for several miles.

Expect that Princess Kathleen and Princess Margaret Will Make Trips to Alaska in Summer

It is expected that the two new C.P.R. steamers Princess Kathleen and Princess Margaret, which will arrive on the coast from the Old Country next spring will be seen here during the summer. The company has announced that there will be at least four extra tourist sailings to Prince Rupert and Alaska next year and it is possible that these trips may be taken by the new boats. The Princess Kathleen and Princess Margaret are said to surpass in elegance any steamer now plying in the British Columbia and Alaska coastwise service.

CHILKOOT LIBELED RESULT COLLISON

East Asiatic Co. Ltd. Claims \$45,000 from Union Steamship Co.—Ships Being Repaired

The Union steamship Co.'s freighter Chilkoot has been libeled by the East Asiatic Co., Ltd., for \$45,000 as a result of the collision a week ago last Saturday outside of Vancouver harbor with the plaintiff company's motorship Peru. In the meantime, the Union Steamship Co. has put up a bond for \$32,000. It is claimed by the Chilkoot's owners that this is the limit that she could be assessed under the Canada Shipping Act. An inquiry into the circumstances of the accident is to be held shortly.

The Chilkoot is undergoing repairs to stem and hull at the Wallace shipyards, North Vancouver. The contract, it is understood, was for \$32,000. The Peru is being repaired at Victoria, the damage having amounted to \$18,000.

FOLLOWING HIS FAMOUS FATHER

Son of Ralph Connor, Presbyterian Minister at Giscome, Lives in Shack Near Town

Following in the footsteps of his distinguished father, Rev. J. Gordon, son of Rev. Charles W. Gordon, the famous Canadian author "Ralph Connor," is making a humble beginning in the ministry. He is now in charge of the Presbyterian church at Giscome, the mill town on the Canadian National Railway east of Prince George, and resides in a shack about three-quarters of a mile from town. "Ralph Connor's" first church was at Banff when that town, in the matter of development, was not nearly as advanced as is Giscome today.

SEVENTEEN SAILORS BURNED AT SAN PEDRO

One Dead as Result of Fire Aboard Boat in Harbor

SAN PEDRO, Dec. 8.—One unidentified navy sailor is dead and seventeen sailors and two civilians are seriously burned as a result of the burning and sinking of the private water taxi Lamoyne in the harbor. Forty-five men were aboard when the craft caught fire in mid-channel. The injured were taken aboard battleships.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 8.—Eleven unarmed civilians were killed and several seriously wounded when seventy bandits sacked the town of Tapalpa. Stores and residences were looted.

Holdup is Followed by Arrest at Smithers of Man From Rupert

SMITHERS, Dec. 8.—There was great excitement here Sunday morning when word spread that a holdup had taken place in the Smithers Hotel at about 9:45. A man had arrived on the train from the west and registered at the hotel. He sat in at a poker game and lost a few dollars.

After breakfast the new arrival asked that the game start again and he followed three men into a side room. When they sat down he drew a gun and demanded that they fork over the money or "you are dead men."

He took \$100 from a colored man named Jackson and made a clean getaway.

The provincial police were notified and were on the trail in a few minutes, the man being organized by Corporal Service, who is in charge there.

The robber took to the woods, going east from Smithers. The Mounted Police blocked the roads to Telkwa while the Provincial Police scoured the country between. Tracks were found in the snow by Constable This who followed them and came upon the man hiding in the bush three miles from town. The fugitive attempted to pull a gun but the constable was too quick, arrested his man and brought him back to town where he gave the name of Mike Sevek. He is about 20 years old and came from Prince Rupert, where it appears he worked on the road. He was arrested here at 4:15 and the police are being congratulated on their prompt action and the speed with which they secured results.

STORE BURNED AT HAYSPORT

Mrs. Dupuis Loses Post Office in Early Blaze: Cold Storage Saved

The post office and store at Haysport owned and operated by Mrs. Dupuis was destroyed by fire this morning and it was with difficulty the cold storage plant adjoining, owned by the Maritime Fisheries Ltd., was saved.

It is not known how the fire originated. Part of the loss is covered by insurance.

AMHERST, N.S., Dec. 8.—Twenty-one miners were entombed and one man killed in a stope of the Springhill mines Saturday afternoon, following one of the worst bumps in the history of the mine. A heavy fall of earth took place on the 5,000 foot level. Four bumps in succession brought down the roof of the mine, cutting off the miners and crushing to death John Sweeney beneath the debris.

KLEW NUGGET
MAN WAS SHOT

Was Probably Lying Down When Wound Inflicted by 44 Calibre Bullet.

ONLY SKELETON LEFT

Several theories may be advanced to account for the fate of the unknown man whose body was found by the provincial police on the beach at Klew Nugget in Grenville Channel south of here on October 29 last but the most likely now seems to be that he deceased had been shot on board some vessel several months ago and his remains thrown overboard, later drifting to the shore where they were found. The local provincial police have been busy running down all possible clues so far it has been impossible to reach even an idea of identification. Such description of the remains as it has been possible to obtain are now being posted in accordance with the instructions of a coroner's jury which sat on the case last week.

A hole and fracture in the skull point to murder by shooting. The bullet hole was so located that the possibility of it having been self-inflicted is considered unlikely. The man was probably in a lying position when the wound was inflicted for the bullet apparently entered from above. A 44-calibre bullet was used.

There was nothing in the pockets of the clothes to establish identity and the clothes themselves were of a very ordinary character. The remains consisted of little more than a bundle of bones held together by the clothes which fell to pieces when touched. These clothes consisted of a light khaki overshirt with collar attached, heavy unshrinkable undershirt of "Blastic" make, black sweater coat, dark blue trousers with white stripe, heavy police braces and leather belt with metal buckle. No shoes were found and there was no coal.

The teeth offer perhaps the most effective means for possible identification but some of these were missing. On the upper jaw there was a gold back-tooth to three artificial teeth held by gold canines. On the lower jaw, the right second molar was missing possibly since death.

The man was of fairly tall stature and his weight is believed to have been at least 180 pounds. He is believed to have been of middle age.

The body is believed to have been in the water from 6 to 12 months possibly longer. There was little if any flesh left. The bones had been scattered along

the beach probably by birds except the skull and trunk which was fairly intact. These bones were only held together by the clothes.

It is believed that the body was swept in by the tide to the point where it was found. A westerly wind may have assisted to blow it in from the north and possibly from the sea.

The skull is being retained by the police but the remainder of the body has been buried.

HOME BREW WHISKEY DEMORALIZES INDIANS

Inspector Mead Tells of Difficulties in Enforcing Law in Manitoba

WINNIPEG, Dec. 3.—The indiscriminate peddling of home brew whiskey by unscrupulous white men to Indians settled along the banks of Lake Winnipeg, and of the northern parts of Manitoba, is causing appalling conditions in these parts of the province according to F. J. Mead, inspector of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police who recently returned to Winnipeg from a three-week's trip to the far north.

Legitimate business men and fur traders are being driven out of the country, declared Inspector Mead, as the result of the unchecked activities of the illicit trafficker, who he said, secured the entire fur catch of the Indians in exchange for "hooch," which for the most part was a vile concoction, driving the Indians crazy with resultant disorder and crime.

"The Indians," asserted the Inspector, "are being slowly but surely demoralized and their conduct is causing grave anxiety to the authorities. Their love for whiskey is such that they would dispose of their dearest possession for a bottle of moonshine."

One peddler, according to Inspector Mead, after a recent treacherous payment brought back with him to Winnipeg \$1,300 out of a total of \$1,500 paid to a certain band of Indians, every dollar of which it is alleged was spent for whiskey.

Mounted Police are making strenuous efforts to stamp out this illicit traffic, but their work,

the inspector declared, is being hampered at every turn by the unwillingness of the Indians to give the necessary information.

Furthermore the task of the authorities is rendered more difficult by the fact that those engaged in the traffic possess unlimited financial means and are thus able to take advantage of every technicality of the law.

Several earloads of cattle from the Lakes country have been sent to P. Burns & Co. at Prince Rupert this fall, says the Omineca Herald. The best results were not secured as animals just off the grass do not stand a trip so well as those that have been properly finished on grain. The quality

of the beef is not so good either. Thus far the best animals received in Rupert were the black Poles. They seem to be better rustlers and better able to stand the drive and the train trip. The cattle in the Lakes country are pretty well cleaned up and the Burns buyer will start in the Bulkley Valley. After this year's experience there is no reason why the interior cannot supply Prince Rupert with the kind of beef required. Any objections found at this time can easily be overcome by the farmers.


