## PREMIER SAYS WINNING ALL ALONG LINE

### FORMER M.P.P. FOR ALBERTA IS HELPING TO FIGHT HIGH FREIGHT RATES

#### Premier Oliver Wires that He Never Knew Election in which Things Looked Better Than Now

##### H. H. Stevens in supporting Bowser comes out openly in Opposition to Freight Rate Reduction for Province

The following telegram arrived here today addressed to Hon. T. D. Pattullo from Hon. John Oliver, Premier:

"Have just returned to Vancouver after another trip into portions of interior and in all my political experience I have never seen an election in which things looked better for the governmental party. We are standing to win all along the line.

"On reaching Vancouver I find that Hon. H. H. Stevens now comes out openly in his opposition to our fight for relief from the excessive freight rates which have been strangling British Columbia ever since confederation. The people are now realizing the connection between his sudden return from the East and his opposition to freight rate reductions and it is having a wonderful effect.

"If you and your friends continue the work until election day the result will be a clean sweep for the Liberal party."

#### MORE KILLED THAN REPORTED

Curious Way in Which Lives  
Were Snuffed Out Aboard  
Battleship Mississippi

SAN PEDRO, June 14.—Naval officers conducting the investigation on board the battleship Mississippi, where yesterday 43 men and three officers were blown into eternity, have not yet discovered the cause of the disaster.

Fierce heat and suffocating smoke choked the life from 46 men and sent twelve to the hospital. It was such a little blast compared with the injury caused, according to one of the survivors. It was just a small explosion like what would be made from a truck piled with celluloid, just a puff, then a little flame, then a bigger one like a continuous streak of lightning with hot suffocating smoke.

The menace of further danger was removed today when the last charge was removed from the big gun which can blow an ordinary vessel out of the water at ten miles.

No damage was done to the battleship and she was able to rush under full speed to the harbor where the hospital ship had a dozen tenders standing by to receive the bodies and the injured men.

The explosion occurred during gun practice.

#### NEW PREMIER FOR FRANCE

Edouard Herriot, Radical Leader  
Heads Government Under  
President Doumergue

PARIS, June 14.—Edouard Herriot, leader of the Radical party and head of the left bloc which was victorious in the recent parliamentary elections, today accepted the invitation of the newly-elected president, Gaston Doumergue, to form a ministry.

Herriot plans to go to London next week to hold a conference with Premier Ramsay MacDonald.

#### CLOUDBURST HITS TENNESSEE CITY

JOHNSTON CITY, Tennessee, June 14.—At least 22 persons are dead, probably more, in a terrific cloudburst that early today wiped out Carter's Bluff and Hunter near here.

#### HOSPITAL BOARD IS ASKING ASSURANCES

Want to Know to What Extent  
City Will Back Them in  
Paying Bills

The hospital board is seeking a more definite understanding with the city council regarding the city's offer to come to the aid of the board at the end of the year if it is necessary as a result of the fire protection measures that are to be undertaken at the hospital.

Speaking for finance committee at the hospital board meeting last night, S. K. Campbell said that an expenditure of \$1300 or \$1500 would be involved. With the per capita grant this year of 60c it was estimated that there would be a deficit of \$5,000 at the end of the year. In view of this it was important to know definitely how far the city would go with its assistance. The hospital board had no desire of going to the city for help if it could finance without a deficit or even with a small one but it would be more comfortable to know definitely what assistance might be expected.

Ald. MacDonald had no doubt the council intended to foot the whole bill if necessary. It might be wise, however, to receive definite assurance to that effect.

President D. C. McRae felt that, in view of the businesslike manner in which hospital affairs were being conducted, there was no doubt the council would meet the board.

The hospital finance committee is already in communication with the city with a view to having a more definite understanding arrived at.

#### STAR TELLS OF NEW STEAMER

Two Well Known Architects Have  
Plans on Hand: Will Make  
22 Knots

The new Vancouver evening daily "The Vancouver Star" has an article on the building of the new steamer for the Alaska run. The article says it will cost a million dollars and will employ 100 men many months. It says Prince Rupert has a "bulge" over other ports on the building of this steamer because it is a C.G.M.M. port. John Lockhart and T. Halliday are the naval architects whose plans will be followed. Mr. Lockhart built a number of ferry boats in New York harbor, designed a battleship for the United States navy during the war and the Princess Louis at Vancouver.

The new C.G.M.M. vessel will be a 22 knot liner with accommodation for over 500 passengers, her length over all being fixed at 300 feet.

#### WIRELESS OPERATOR KNOWN HERE RESCUES MAN FROM DROWNING

J. Legge Willis, well known in this port and formerly wireless operator on the steamers Chelohsin, Talaralife, Prince George and Givenchy, figured in a life saving feat at Bella Coola last Sunday, according to word received from the south yesterday.

The Pacific No. 1, Capt. Grann, of the Pacific Launch & Towing Co., was at Bella Coola that day, lying directly behind the launch Enilada. A young man and a girl in a canoe ventured close astern of the Enilada and the small craft was overturned when the big launch started to move. The girl was a good swimmer and easily made shore but her escort went down. Legge Willis pluckily plunged into the water from the Pacific No. 1, picked up the unconscious young man and carried him to shore where first aid soon brought him round.

#### ROSS MACKAY IS CONFIDENT

Says He Will Get More Votes on  
Islands Than Both Other  
Candidates

T. Ross Mackay, Provincial party candidate for Prince Rupert seat in the forthcoming provincial election, returned to town last night on the launch Eleanor Mac, Capt. W. L. Dass, after a campaign trip to all points on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

So optimistic is Mr. Mackay of his chances of election that he asserts he will not only receive more votes on the Queen Charlotte Islands than either Pattullo or Newton but more than both of them together.

Mr. Mackay visited the Islands just after Mayor Newton, the Conservative candidate. He declares that Newton lost more votes than he gained on his trip and that some people who were going to vote Conservative changed their minds after the candidate came in person. He says the Tory candidate spoke in his usual aimless manner and at one point he discoursed until 1 o'clock in the morning.

#### ANTI-AMERICAN MOVE IN JAPAN SUBSIDING

TOKIO, June 14.—Evidence is accumulating that the anti-American outburst on account of the Japanese exclusion is subsiding. A majority of newspapers favor a moderation of the boycott against American movies which is breaking down. Two of the largest theatres are ignoring the boycott.

#### Asking People to Back Oliver's Struggle for Western Grain Route

##### Former Member Alberta Legislature for Peace River says Liberal will be Elected in Mackenzie Riding.

That the Oliver candidate in Mackenzie riding will be returned by a handsome majority is the honest conviction of W. A. Rae, until recently member of the Alberta Legislature for Peace River who has pioneered in that country for sixteen years, and who was in the city last evening. He is in British Columbia taking part in the election campaign because he believes in the coast outlet for grain and he sees in the return of the Oliver government the only way of impressing upon the East that British Columbia is in earnest in the matter. Oliver is the only leader who is committed to this as a settled policy and who is ready to push it to the limit.

Mr. Rae says he has been following the campaign very closely and he finds that Mr. Bowser does not mention the western grain route, lower freight rates or northern development. General McRae would appoint a commission to inquire into what shall be done with the P.G.E. Oliver on the other hand will complete the P.G.E. if the Dominion Government or some private interest will not do it.

The visitor said they had evidently not made much headway in finding a Brule route and he had no doubt but the only feasible route lay through British Columbia.

**Looking for Stronghold**  
Speaking of the Mackenzie riding in which he had been campaigning for ten days, Mr. Rae says he had been all that time looking for Mike Manson's stronghold in the constituency but did not find it. D. G. McKay, the Liberal candidate, would carry his home town of Ocean Falls with a handsome majority. Chief Leicester, of the Clan MacRae evidently was not looking for many cheers for he had practically thrown up the sponge and was leaving for Portland.

Speaking of the province as a whole Mr. Rae said it was a good bet that General McRae would not get five seats. As for the Conservatives, it was worthy of note that a good many Conservatives had wired H. H. Stevens and Dr. Tolmie to stay away as Bowser had to be defeated at the polls in order to unite the Conservative and Provincial parties again.

**Bella Coola Valley**  
Speaking of his visit to Bella Coola, Mr. Rae said he had gone up the valley for forty miles and there was not a stretch of country on the Pacific Highway equal to it. It was interesting because it followed forty miles of the trail of Sir Alexander Mackenzie who came out to the coast there. It was an inspiration to see where the great discoverer first landed.

Mackenzie Park is to be set aside for a pleasure ground and a road seventy miles long built to connect with the interior. When this happens Bella Coola will be one of the show places of the Dominion and a great tourist resort. It will support McKay.

J. W. deB. Farris is billed to speak at Powell River and Mr. Rae says everywhere he went he found the greatest enthusiasm for the return of Oliver and the election of McKay, the Oliver candidate. Mr. Rae is now on his way to Prince George where he will step into the breach

#### SOCIALIST HAS DISAPPEARED

Matteotti, an Italian Deputy,  
Cannot be Found, and Foul  
Play Suspected

MUSSOLINI IS BLAMED

ROME, June 14.—Disappearance of the Socialist deputy Matteotti three days ago created the biggest political sensation since the Fascist rise to power. The opposition is doing its utmost to lay the blame on the Fascists although Mussolini is doing his utmost to bring those responsible to justice.

It is virtually established that Matteotti met with foul play.

#### CHINESE ARE INDIGNANT

Object to New Regulations in  
Regard to Immigration and  
Will Protest

VICTORIA, June 14.—Indignant over the new regulations requiring Chinese to register and file photograph and personal details with the immigration authorities, local Chinese state they will observe Dominion Day as a humiliation day in order to protest. They will hoist the Chinese flag at half mast and hang mourning wreaths on their homes. Similar observation of the day will take place at other Canadian cities.

#### CANADIAN FOOTBALL TEAM WINS AGAIN IN TEST GAME AUSTRALIA

SYDNEY, Australia, June 14.—By a score of one to nothing the touring Canadian all-star football team defeated a representative association eleven before 14,000 spectators in the second test match of the tour. The Canucks have now won six, lost two, and drawn four, including two test games.

#### Are We Behind Oliver's Fight?

If Oliver is beaten it will mean that British Columbia is not in earnest about the reduction of freight rates. At present there is discrimination against the West and Oliver is the only man who has ever shown any fight in regard to the matter. If the people support him it will show the Ottawa Government and the Railway Commission that we mean business in regard to this matter.

It is known everywhere in the East that the freight rates fight is the chief reason for appealing to the people at this time. It is necessary to show the rest of the country that the people are behind the premier. If they are not, it means to the outside world that they do not want the freight rates equalized.

#### What Does It Mean To Prince Rupert?

What does an Oliver victory mean to Prince Rupert? Ross Mackay is the McRae candidate. Bowser stands for the interests of the south and the group that nearly put Prince Rupert off the map prior to the advent of the Liberal Government at Ottawa. They are the same people. Tolmie and Stevens are working for them and they stand for everything that is opposed to Prince Rupert. #### WHY VOTE FOR OLIVER?

Ald. Macdonald felt that the medium of the Association might be used towards obtaining more equitable government grants for northern hospitals.





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## Pattullo's Record

There are a number of people living in Prince Rupert today who are not familiar with Mon. T. D. Pattullo's record either in this city or in Parliament. For their benefit and to remind others here who know but may have forgotten, here are some of the more important items:

### AS A PRIVATE CITIZEN

Pattullo took an option with others on the Woodworth Lake water supply to be turned over to the city. This source of supply had been alienated to a former president of the Conservative Association of Vancouver. Pattullo played a conspicuous part in creating a public opinion that forced the McBride-Bowser Government to take action which resulted in the transfer of the Woodworth Lake water record to the City of Prince Rupert. The right should have been reserved to the city in the first place but it cost the taxpayers \$15,000.

Pattullo secured the telephone franchise for the city. Two companies had franchises for the telephone service in Prince Rupert and Pattullo called a meeting of citizens through the Board of Trade to preserve the privilege for the people of Prince Rupert. He offered to install the system and give the citizens the opportunity to subscribe for stock in the enterprise rather than have it pass to outsiders. The meeting decided to call for subscriptions to install the system and turn it over to the city upon incorporation. Pattullo was one of the largest subscribers to the subscription and the system was turned over to the city. Pattullo's action saved the telephone system for the city.

### AS MAYOR OF PRINCE RUPERT

Pattullo initiated the bylaw for the hydro-electric project to be installed by the largest financial group in Canada and in a written statement he strongly urged its passage. Pattullo's opponents used the occasion both to defeat him and the bylaw. Had the bylaw passed, the strongest financial group in Canada would have been working for the city and it is the general opinion that this city would have now been several times its present size. The people who engineered the opposition at that time are trying to do the same thing today.

### AS MEMBER OF THE LEGISLATURE

As member for the electoral district of Prince Rupert Pattullo secured:

- The erection of the Provincial Government Buildings.
- A large appropriation for the Booth Memorial School.
- Five times the city's quota for soldier's houses. (This was made possible through other municipalities holding back for political or other reasons)
- Eighty-one acres at Salt Lakes for park purposes for the City of Prince Rupert and also annual grants to build the approach to the lakes.
- Appropriation for the building of the road across Cow Bay, linking up Third Ave. with the waterfront. The completed work was handed over to the citizens free of cost to them.
- An appropriation for building floats at Cow Bay.
- The Terrace bridge which is well advanced toward completion.
- The appropriation for the building of the Port Clements Tl-ell road, work on which has been proceeding for two years.
- Appropriation for the road out of Prince Rupert, work on which has already begun.

### AS A CABINET MINISTER

As a cabinet minister for the north, Pattullo has consistently fought for the rights of Northern British Columbia against heavy opposition from opposing political and other adverse interests in the south.

### AS MINISTER OF LANDS

Pattullo initiated and administered the Government's timber policy which increased the export timber business over 1200 per cent.

He initiated and administered the Provincial Government's grazing policy for the upbuilding of the stock industry.

He initiated and administered the Provincial Government's irrigation policy which saved the southern interior dry belt from ruin and preserved such prosperous towns as Vernon and Kelowna.

Pattullo has been one of the strongest influences in bringing about a vigorous immigration policy in the Dominion of Canada and has pledged the Provincial Government to co-operate in placing immigrants on the farms of the province. In this connection it is notable that when immigration stopped, emigration to the United States started and continued until the commencement of the present policy was beginning to be felt. The periods of heaviest immigration into the United States were the periods of greatest expansion, the largest increase of wages and the greatest shortening of hours of labor.

He secured the settlement of the foreshore question as between the Dominion and Provincial Governments, which has been outstanding since confederation. Also the Indian reserve question.

### GENERAL RECORD

Pattullo has been one of the most powerful influences in the progress of the Province and the City of Prince Rupert. He has worked consistently and persistently for the city. If elected he will continue to use his influence for the advancement of the city and district and for all Northern British Columbia. Such a man is worth a great deal to the district and is receiving the support of those who wish to see the district go ahead.

Business along the waterfront this week has been decidedly brisker than for some weeks past. The beautiful summer weather, general throughout the northern waters, has given much opportunity for remunerative work to be carried on by the halibut and salmon fishing fleet, the work and public pleasure boats. Halibut has been arriving in better quantities than for several weeks past and prices have remained firm. The fish arrivals this week have been marked by a number of large American schooners arriving, although there are still a number out on the northern fishing banks. At this time of year, it is customary for the American boats to go south for overhaul purposes and it is likely the exodus will commence in the near future. However, this will not materially affect the arrivals as those of the boats that go to Seattle for midsummer repairs will not go together and one or two absent from the fleet will not be seriously missed. There is still much activity among the home boats which are busy repainting and doing other necessary fixings at Cow Bay.

### Fish Business

From Monday to Friday 735,800 pounds of halibut has been marketed on the Fish Exchange. Canadians were high at 13.4c and 8c, and low at 11.4c and 6c. Americans were high at 15c, and 6.5c and low at 11.8c and 6c. After a long illness T. M. Orwig, the well-known Seal Cove boat builder, died on Monday morning in the General Hospital at the age of 70. He was a highly respected citizen and his loss is mourned by his many friends at Seal Cove and along the waterfront. He is survived by a widow, resident in the city, and a married daughter, Mrs. Reith, of Winnipeg. Interment was made yesterday at Port Essington.

### E. Lipsett's New Engine

The Canadian schooner E. Lipsett, Capt. John Petersen, is to be fitted with a new Frisco-Standard 30 horse power engine by Lipsett & Cunningham. The engine has been ordered by wire from San Francisco and immediately upon arrival installation will be made to permit of fishing being carried out until the closed season becomes effective in November.

Doe Clapperton was confined to his home during the week suffering with a slight recurrence of a former illness.

The tug R.F.M. arrived from the south on Thursday evening having in tow 350,000 feet of dimension timber for the Albert-McCaflery interests. Five hundred tons of coal is also expected to arrive from Nanaimo over the week end.

Danny Main, ex-fisherman and noted member of the Callie's football team, who has been visiting for some weeks with his sister in Seattle, returned to the city on Wednesday's boat.


