Imperial Preference Will be Defeated by Parliament says London Newspaper this Morning

LONDON, Jan. 26.—The proposals of the Baldwin govern-ment for trade preference with the British Dominions as elaborated at the Imperial Conference in 1923 will not be adopted by the administration, says the Westminster Gazette.

The conference report on Imperial Preference will be laid before the House of Commons but the government does not regard itself bound to the pledges of its predecessors. A free vote of the Commons is to be taken, which the newspapers predict will result in the rejection of the program as the Liberals will support the Laborites in hostility thereto.

JOHNSTON, Ills., Jan. 26.-Thirty miners were killed and two are missing and two others probably fatally injured in an unexplained explosion on the main level of the McClintock coal mine here. Sixty of the 375 miners working were entombed, and a few escaped uninjured.
