H. S. Hurn Delivered Interesting Discourse Before Rotary Club Yesterday

That the system of present day education would necesarily undergo a great change in future and that new systems, which had proved their value in the upbuilding of the initiative and character of the men and women of to-morrow, were steadily and surely coming to the front, was the opinion expressed by retiring public school principal H. S. Hurn in his address before he Rotary Club yesterday afternoon, on the eve of his departure for the south.

In opening his address the speaker said that a lot was heard about the bad situation in the world today-jealousy, greed and the like-and consequently people were running down the youth of the present day. In a way they were right because there was something wrong somewhere. Some people blamed the schools and the form of education and thought political institutions by reorganizing the senate or not or as to whether the Liberals or Conservatives were in power would not change industrial conditions. 

Volume Issued In London Dealing With War Points Out Deficiencies

LONDON, July 11. — Lessons from sins of omissions and otherwise, in the medical services during the war, have been compiled into an 11 volume edition of the Official Medical History of the Great War, recently issued. They should furnish the basis for the reorganization of the medical staffs of the forces of the great powers on a level with modern science, say the editors of this voluminous work,

The books deal frankly with the tactical and strategical errors of the medical service in the war, notably in areas typical of middle eastern conditions. No attempt has been made to gloss! these errors. The lack of cooperation between the combatant and medical staffs is frequently noted, and it is in this that the editors find the greatest lesson.







LONDON, July 11.—One of the oldest questions in England the legitimacy of children born out of wedlock-was settled in the House of Commons last week in favor of the child, after lively debate, in which women members took a prominent part.

Legitimacy means much here, in view of the hereditary titles and the passing down of huge estates, and in view of the admitted increase in illigitimacy in Great Britain.


