## NEW BRITISH CABINET APPOINTED TODAY

### CUSTOMS OFFICERS WILL HAVE DUTY OF ENFORCING HALIBUT TREATY

#### Winston Churchill Gets Prominent Position in Baldwin's New Cabinet

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Winston Churchill promises to play an important part in the government during the next few years. He was selected by Premier Stanley Baldwin to hold what is looked upon as the most important position in the cabinet, that of Chancellor of the Exchequer. Beyond that there were no surprises, the following being the complete list of ministers so far: Prime Minister and First Lord of the Treasury and leader of the House of Commons, Stanley Baldwin; Chancellor of the Exchequer, Winston Churchill; Secretary for India, Earl Birkhead; Secretary for the colonies, Lord Amery; Foreign Secretary, Austin Chamberlain; President of the Council and leader of the House of Lords, Marquis of Curzon; Lord Privy Seal, Marquis of Salisbury; Lord Chancellor, Viscount Cave; Home Secretary, Sir William Joynson; First Lord of the Admiralty, William Lord Bridgeman; Secretary for War, Sir Laming Worthington Evans; Secretary for Air, Samuel Hoare; Secretary for Health, Neville Chamberlain; Secretary for Labor, Sir Arthur Wexland; President of the Board of Trade, Sir Philip Lloyd George; Attorney General, Sir Douglas Hogg.

KITSILAS, Nov. 7.—The Salvation Army Native Corps at Kitselas wish to thank the people of Terrace for their help for the new hall that is now almost finished. The collection amounted to \$12,225. #### ICE PREVENTS ZANNI FLIGHT

Argentinean Airman Will Continue Flight Next Year—Awaits Instructions at Tokio

TOKIO, Nov. 7.—Major Pedro Zanni, the Argentine aviator who announced this week that he had abandoned his proposed attempt to fly over the transpacific air lane from Japan in the approaching winter season, reached his decision when word was received here that the ports of Petropavlovsk and Paramushira were ice-bound. This condition ended the possibility of obtaining ships to lay in supplies along the route. Major Zanni has three plans of action for the future. Subject to approval of a committee of three in Buenos Aires, to which he has cabled, the Argentine aviator would remain in Japan until spring and continue his flight as outlined, or he will proceed to Europe, making a flight across the Atlantic to Buenos Aires, or he will make a flight from New York to Buenos Aires.

**Resources Exhausted**  
The Argentine aviator said he had exhausted every resource in an effort to continue the flight along the original route across the Pacific, but he was regretfully compelled to admit the impossibility of making a successful attempt at this season. Major Zanni was hopeful that the Buenos Aires committee would agree to his plans concerning other routes.

#### JOSEPH BUSSINGER PREPARING TO SHIP ORE FROM VENUS MINE

Two Car Loads to Go to Trail Smelter as Test of Possibilities

SMITHERS, Nov. 7.—There are prospects of ore shipments being made from the Venus Group this winter. Joseph Bussinger of Telkwa who has done considerable work on these mineral claims was in town the fore-part of this week and stated that he is making preparations to ship a couple of cars of ore to the smelter at Trail, B.C. He has just finished building a road from the mine to connect up with the Provincial Highway and is getting things in readiness to commence hauling as soon as sleighing comes.

The assay returns of samples taken from the vein on the Venus Group show average values of about \$100.00 per ton and Mr. Bussinger is taking out the two cars in order to give the property a test to determine if it can be operated profitably at the present time. This work will be closely followed by other miners and prospectors in the district who have similar holdings and all hope that he will be able to get good returns and continue to ship indefinitely.

#### Customs Officers Will Act as Enforcement Officials Under Provisions of Halibut Treaty

Customs officers will act as officers for the enforcement of the halibut close season on the Pacific coast which, under a treaty finally reached between the United States and Canada, will begin on November 16 and end on February 15 announced Jarvis McLeod, local customs collector, on receipt of an official document from Ottawa this morning.

One of the clauses of the regulations received by Mr. McLeod reads as follows:

"As the customs officers are in a much better position than fishery officers to enforce the prohibition, the Department of Customs and Excise, at the request of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, has authorized all customs officers to become officers for the enforcement of the aforesaid provision. Hence, you will exercise very careful supervision over the movement of fishing boats entering any waters under your supervision and take over any halibut on board such vessels and sell it. Fisheries officers are being instructed to co-operate."

Under the close season treaty, fishing other than that for halibut is not prohibited but, should any halibut be taken and retained by Canadian vessels or boats while engaged in other fishing, it must be used by the crew of such boat for food or, immediately after the vessel arrives in port, be handed over to the officers to be disposed of to the highest bidder and the proceeds deposited to the credit of the receiver-general.

Halibut vessels may not outfit and clear for the banks after November 12. To be sold, halibut arriving in port after November 15 must be proven to have been caught prior to the commencement of the close season.

#### YALE REMAINS CONSERVATIVE

Grote Sterling Defeats Daniel Sutherland by a Substantial Majority

VERNON, Nov. 7.—Yale federal constituency remains in the Conservative column, Grote Sterling, Conservative, having defeated his Liberal opponent, Daniel Sutherland of Kelowna with only eight small polls to hear from. At 9.30 last evening Sterling had a majority of 419.

#### ONLY TWO SEEKING MAYORALTY CHAIR

Mayor Owen and Ex-Mayor Taylor Will be the Only Candidates in Vancouver It is Expected

VANCOUVER, Nov. 7.—There will be only two candidates for the mayoralty at the forthcoming election, according to the opinions of municipal politics prophets. Mayor W. R. Owen will run for re-election and L. D. Taylor, former mayor, will also be in the field.

This year there is no labor candidate and it is not expected that there will be another candidate reckless enough to stack up against Mr. Owen and Mr. Taylor.

#### URGES DEVELOPMENT OF A CIVIC SPIRIT

L. T. Hopkinson, chairman of the Tariff field commission that is visiting in the city, yesterday told the Rotary club, of attending a Rotary luncheon in Florida where they were putting on a campaign to make the state of Florida the summer playground of the United States. Success followed their efforts because they all pulled together and took pride in the development of their own city.

The people here were the ones who knew their own problems best. He liked to see a people who boasted of the place in which they lived rather than in some other. There were some who climbed the mountain to get a better view of the needs of their home town. This was the sort of civic pride to be admired.

#### SMITHERS MERCHANT LEAVES FOR SEATTLE

Relieves in Interior Centre but Daughters Health Makes Move Necessary

SMITHERS, Nov. 7.—Mrs. and Mrs. I. Anger and their daughter Miss Winnifred left on Wednesday morning for Seattle and intend to make their future home at Renton, a suburb of that city. Mr. Anger has conducted a gents' furnishing and tailor establishment for a number of years in this district but was obliged to sell out and seek a milder climate on account of his daughter's health, which has not been of the best since an attack of ptomaine poison a couple of years ago.

Mr. Anger who was the first merchant tailor to set up in business in the interior, came to Hazelton from Seattle in 1911 with a stock valued at \$5,000 and opened up there on May 15 of that year. He also conducted a store in New Hazelton for three years, moving on to Smithers in May, 1920, where he purchased the building known as the Red Front Store on Main Street. This he has now leased, part of the lower floor to the Newbery Bakery and the balance including the upstairs to Shield's Grill. He regrets having to leave Smithers and stated that there has always been a good business here for a tailor.

Several years ago, Mr. Anger purchased a small fruit and poultry farm about three miles from Renton which has since been rented, but he now intends to give this his attention and go in for poultry breeding on a large scale and in addition will also open up a store in the town.

Cricket experts reporting the

### MOVE TO CLOSE PRIVATE SCHOOLS IN WASHINGTON

Ku Klux Klan Said to be Responsible for Movement in Neighboring State


TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 7.—An initiative measure to be voted on at the general election in November, causing a hot fight here and in other cities and communities of the state, proposes to close all private schools in Washington to pupils under 16 years of age. It is based on an Oregon law passed

by referendum two years ago, but declared unconstitutional by the federal district court of appeals and now before the supreme court of the United States.
