# TO BE LARGE REDUCTION IN EXPENDITURES

## LARGE SUMS OWED CANADA BY EUROPEAN COUNTRIES; ROUMANIA HIGHEST

### Estimates for Year Reduced Nearly Twenty Seven Millions

Reductions are made in Every Department of Federal Government; Total Expenditures to be Four Hundred Million

OTTAWA, March 20.—Estimates for the financial year 1924-25 were presented to Parliament today by Hon. J. A. Robb, acting minister of finance in the absence of Hon. W. S. Fielding. They provide for total expenditures amounting to \$400,571,859, a reduction below the total amount of the main estimates of 1923-24 of \$26,939,385 and a reduction of \$46,373,715 under the total of the main and supplementary estimates for 1923-24. Practically every service shows a decrease.

### CHURCHILL IS AGAIN BEATEN

Fell Before Conservative in one of London Constituencies Yesterday

RECOUNT ORDERED

LONDON, March 20.—Right Hon. Winston Churchill, standing as an independent and anti-socialist candidate lost the fight in the parliamentary election for the Abbey division of Westminster to Otto Nicholson, a Conservative.

The fight was a four cornered one and was hotly contested and Churchill lost out by 33 votes. The total vote was as follows: Nicholson, Conservative . . . 8,186

### IMMENSE SUMS FOR OIL LEASES

Nearly Fifteen Million Dollars Bid for Indian Lands in Oklahoma

PAWBUSSKA, Okla., March 20.—Oil operators bid a total sum of \$14,923,000 for the leases of Indian lands in this year's auction. Five bids were for over a million dollars each. The largest was \$1,990,000 for a quarter section.

Today the members of the Osage tribe meet to consider the leases.

### LOCAL FIRM WINS IN SMITHERS CASE

Action Between D. Pritchard of Moricetown and F. G. Dawson Dismissed by Judge Young

The county court case at Smithers on Tuesday between D. Pritchard of Moricetown and F. G. Dawson Co. Ltd. of Prince Rupert, in which the sum of \$270 was claimed over a cartload shipment of potatoes, was dismissed by Judge Young. Plaintiff was represented by L. S. McGill of Smithers and Milton Gonzales of Prince Rupert had the case for the local firm.

### NAVY WON

PORTSMOUTH, March 20.—In an inter-service football game played here yesterday resulted in a win for the navy over the air force, the score being 1 to 0.

### PEOPLE LOOK TOWARD CANADA

T. H. Johnson Says British Seem to Have Confidence in Labor Government

That there is more general confidence in the Macdonald government today than there was when the Labor Party was returned to power a few months ago and that the government is there to stay for some time is the opinion of T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., who is just back from a trip to the Old Country. At first there was a general feeling of nervousness which soon gave place to great surprise when it was shown that the new Premier and his government were not as red as had been expected. The administration is making progress and is giving better satisfaction than had been anticipated. There is no indication of its going out in the near future.

### Taxes High

Speaking of general conditions in the Old Country, Mr. Johnson says that the people are not satisfied with conditions and many are considering emigrating. Wages have come down but the cost of living has not decreased proportionately. Taxes are high and the prices asked for ordinary living requirements such as food and clothing are surprising. Many commodities are actually cheaper in Prince Rupert than they are in England.

Canada and other overseas Dominions are much in the eyes of the ordinary classes. Mr. Johnson attended two lectures in Hull, under the auspices of the Canadian Pacific and the Canadian National Railways, on Canada and its attractions to emigrants. The largest halls in the city had been engaged and they were filled to overflowing. Thus the interest in Canada is indicated, Mr. Johnson avers. He expects to see much immigration to this country from Great Britain in the near future.


### Good Prospects Here

Comparing British Columbia with other provinces as a result of his trip across Canada, Mr. Johnson expresses the opinion that this province is enjoying more prosperity and has better prospects than any other.

Mr. Johnson went to the Old Country to attend a unique celebration of the golden wedding day of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Johnson of Hull, on January 5. For the first time the entire family of ten children was assembled under one roof. Members of the family came from far afield, a son, Stanley Johnson of Vancouver being present besides Mr. Johnson of this city himself. Telegrams were received from all parts of the world and included among the guests of the occasion were friends from Norway.

### NEW SERVICE COAST BOATS

Twice a Week Between Prince Rupert and Vancouver on April 28

### MAY CHARTER VESSEL

The Canadian National Railway announces that effective April 28 the company will inaugurate a double service between Vancouver and Prince Rupert, Anox and Stewart, leaving the Terminal City every Monday and Thursday northbound, and from Prince Rupert every Thursday and Sunday southbound says the Victoria Times.

This schedule will remain in effect until June 2, when the company will have a boat northbound from Vancouver on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays, and from Prince Rupert on Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays, operating on the same schedule as last year.

If the company finds a suitable ship that it can charter the schedule will be extended to include Alaskan ports. The representative in the Old Country looking over a list of prospective liners is expected to be heard from shortly. Unless a ship can be chartered, however, the company will not enter the Alaskan service until next year, when the new steamship Prince Henry will be delivered by her contractors who are to build her.

### EIGHTEEN WERE ALIVE IN SUB.

Communication with People in Vessel Established by Tapping

TOKIO, March 20.—Eighteen men were still living last night within Submarine 43 which sank on Tuesday off Sasebo, according to a despatch to the Tokio papers. The rescuers established communication with those inside the submarine by tapping the shell of the vessel.

LONDON, March 20.—In a rugby football game played yesterday in the army rugby cup finals the 2nd Battalion Welsh Regiment won over the Welsh Guards 7 points to 3.

### NUMBER JAPANESE IMMIGRANTS FEW UNDER AGREEMENT

OTTAWA, March 20.—Premier W. L. Mackenzie King stated in the House of Commons yesterday that under the terms of a new agreement with Japan for the control of immigration, the Japanese anticipated that the number of domestic servants and agricultural laborers coming to Canada would not exceed 150 annually.

### BOB JAMES HONORED BY WAR VETERANS

Popular Member of Association Receives Presentation on Eve of Departure for McBride

After the regular business meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association last night, an impromptu entertainment was staged in honor of R. James, popular member of the association, who is leaving tonight for McBride, to which point he has been transferred in the service of the Canadian National Railways. Several speeches were made testifying to the great assistance Mr. James had given the association in many ways and to the high regard in which he was held by the members as a whole. The honored guest was then presented with a well-lined purse.

### PAY FOR LABOR IS RAISED TO \$3.50

VICTORIA, March 20.—Laborers in Saanich municipality adjoining this city to the north are to be paid \$3.50 a day and rock and powder men will get an extra 25c. This is a slight increase over wages formerly paid.

### LEFT FOR SEATTLE

VANCOUVER, Wash., Mar. 20.—The United States army aviators left here this morning on the fourth leg of the world flight for Seattle at 10.20.

### Nearly Fifty Millions Owing Canada by European Countries Result of Advances During War

OTTAWA, March 20.—Most of Britain's indebtedness to Canada on war account has been wiped out by cash payments or adjustments and credits incident to Britain's handling of Canada's commitments overseas.

In February, 1924, Britain had been debited with \$66,880,496. She has been credited with \$62,000,000 debt owed by other European countries making a formidable total on which no payments have been made.

He was given a cheering reception from the Labor and Liberal benches as he went to the table between his introducers to swear allegiance to the King and the constitution.

### CHARGED WITH CASHING OF WORTHLESS CHECKS

Harvey D. Copp, who was recently paid off the engineering staff of the steamer Canadian Scottish, appeared in the police court before Magistrate McClymont this morning to answer to a charge of obtaining the sum of \$10 from H. H. Hemmings on a worthless check issued on the Royal Bank of Canada. Adjournment was made until tomorrow and it is likely other charges will be laid of a similar nature. He was arrested on Mr. Hemmings' complaint by Sergeant McGlinchy early this morning. Copp is still in jail, no application having been made for bail.

#### For And Against New Ball Grounds.

There is naturally a difference of opinion in regard to whether action should be taken to provide a ball ground suitable for the younger boys at the corner of McBride and Sixth Street. There is a rather natural disinclination to interfere with the course of traffic by diverting the street but those who have families or who are interested in games and sports feel that the benefits to be derived would be far greater than any disability the city would suffer.

While the proposed ground might not be large enough for a full size ball park it would be sufficiently large for any of the younger set to use and would not be difficult to make. There seems to be no other site in the city, centrally located, that could be converted into a ground as easily as this one.

There may possibly be legal difficulties that would be difficult to overcome, but as the streets belong to the city it would not seem to be an insuperable difficulty.

Financing is another matter. That is a program for the city to wrestle with. It would be a good thing to find out exactly what the construction of the grounds would cost so that people may have an intelligent idea of the problem which presents itself.

#### Would be Suitable For Football.

Football players say that the proposed ground would be excellent for their game. It would be large enough and suitable in every way for the purpose. There would in this game be no danger of kicking the ball beyond the confines of the ground through some resident's window. If this ground could be secured it would prove a great impetus to sports in the city, providing opportunity for games which under present conditions cannot possibly be played owing to the congestion at Acropolis Hill.

#### Would Be Great Thing For City.

It would undoubtedly be a great thing for the city if this Sixth Avenue and McBride Street grounds could be made. As they are at present the four plots at the four corners have little value as playgrounds. Consolidated they would be just what is needed. The plan is worthy of every consideration and if there are strong objections they should be clearly stated. It is noted that most of the objection comes from those who have no children or who are more interested in the financial aspect than in the welfare of the young people of the city.

#### What About The Gyro Club Proposal.

In view of the present situation what is to be done about the Gyro's Club proposal? The aim of that club is excellent and the members have shown most commendable energy in raising money to provide for the youngsters. If the larger plan goes ahead, some other site must be found for the Gyro playground, but just which requires careful consideration. The government grounds at Market Square are not available for sports or games but are to be beautified. Some other place must be secured.

Should this playground plan not be found suitable, then it is hoped that the Gyros will be given every encouragement by the civic authorities but just how and where is a matter which will have to be decided after investigation.

## BACK FROM CALIFORNIA

Large Numbers Returning to British Columbia on Every Boat

VICTORIA, March 20.—Avowing that it is impossible to live on an equable climate, on wonderful scenery, on paved highways, or on the cordiality of welcoming handshakes, scores of Victorians who left their homes in the past three or four years in capitulation to the lure of California's advertising, are now returning north to the city to swim on the crest of the rising wave of prosperity which is beginning to sweep over the whole of the Pacific Northwest.

On March 3 last year only three persons arrived on the Dorothy Alexander to make their homes again in Victoria at a time when the Admiral Line was maintaining only a fortnightly schedule of arrivals from California. On March 3 this year the Emma Alexander brought 412 passengers from Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego, to British Columbia, of whom 92 were bound for Victoria. The company is now maintaining a weekly schedule of arrivals.

The number of Victorians returning to the city from California on our steamships now greatly exceeds the number leaving for the South. Mr. W. M. Allan, local manager of the Admiral Line states, "Last year the traffic figures revealed that the number of travelers bound for California was much greater than the number of those making the northern journey to the city on the Admiral liners, but this year the situation is reversed."

Erstwhile Victorians returning to California after a holiday spent in their former homes have frequently been heard to declare their intention of returning to British Columbia as soon as possible to share in the increasing good fortune of the North.



**FLIERS HOP OFF APRIL 1**

Preparations Being Made for Start from Seattle: Will Pass Over Nanaimo

**TAKING OFF WHEELS**

VANCOUVER, March 20.—The four planes which will leave Seattle for Prince Rupert on April 1 have not yet commenced their round the world flight. In Seattle they will install entirely new engines of the Liberty type and the landing wheels will be changed to floats which will be used at Prince Rupert and Alaska and throughout until they reach the coast of China. A squad of mechanics will be busy getting them ready.

"Vancouver is hardly likely to see the American planes," say local air board officials. "This city is too far away for a practice flight, and on their way north to Prince Rupert, a distance of 650 miles, they will not come near this city. The maps and routes we have sent them follow more the steamer routes."

Although the machines will undoubtedly make practice flights before hopping-off on the Prince Rupert leg of the flight, and the new engines will be given thorough work-outs, none of these work-outs is expected to bring the planes in to Canada.

**May Convoy Them**

Residents of Nanaimo will probably see the machines when they are en route to Prince Rupert, as the course mapped out takes the fliers directly over that city.

If the take-off is at a favorable time of day machines from the Jericho station of the air-board may convoy the United States flight for a few miles to wish them good luck and good-speed, but no official arrangements have yet been completed in this regard.

**NEW COMPANY FOR STEWART**

**Barite Gold Mines Ltd. Formed to Work Mineral Claims on Bear River**

VICTORIA, Mar. 20.—A certificate of incorporation has been issued to the Barite Gold Mines, Limited (non-personal liability), with the head office at 513-514 Campbell Building this city. This company has been formed chiefly for the purpose of acquiring, working and developing the Barite mineral claims situated on the north side of Bear River, about twenty-two miles from Stewart, in the Portland Canal mining division.

Mr. H. Quickstad of Seattle, president of the newly-formed company and late owner of the claims, states that there are three distinct ore veins on the property, the chief vein ranging from six to twelve feet in width and traceable on the surface for a distance of some fourteen hundred feet, while the two parallel veins, quite similar to the principal one in size, are traceable on the surface for a distance of about one thousand feet and are connected with the principal vein by lateral or cross veins carrying ore of a similar nature. There is also a porphyric dyke running parallel with and about forty feet distant from the ore veins, which old miners consider as practically infallible evidence of rich mineral deposits. The ore consist of fine grained galena, carrying values in gold, silver and lead. An assay of surface ore taken from this property, made by the U.S. Assay office at Seattle, shows values as follows: Gold, \$100; silver, \$11.51, and lead, 43.60 per cent. Total values, \$203.31.

**ELEPHANTIASIS ONE OF DISEASES OF TAHITI**

**Men's Limbs Swell to Prodigious Size and Permanently Deformed**

PAPEETE, Tahiti, March 20.—One of the perils that menace the settler in the South Sea Islands is the strange disease called elephantiasis. This malady, which is prevalent on Tahiti and the neighboring islands, is an affection of the lymphatic system caused by the invasion of a microscopic worm called "filarii Sanguinis."

There is a wide difference of opinion as to how the infection enters the system. Some investigators declare that the mosquito plays host to the worm until he enters the human body with the mosquito's attack thereon; others believe that the infection comes from drinking impure water, while the natives hold that the disease is contracted from walking in certain infected districts, through the pores of the feet, in much the same manner that hook-worm invades the body.

**Europeans Get It.**  
Many Europeans who have settled in the various islands have contracted the disease. Indeed, on some islands every

European resident suffers from it in a more or less advanced stage.

Elephantiasis takes the form of a chronic intermittent chill and fever, with inflammation and swelling of the lymphatics. With each attack a deposit of morbid lardaceous matter is left in the tissues of the arms and legs, and in time these become permanently deformed and of prodigious size.

The only treatment is residence in a cold climate. For this reason a goodly number of whites who have settled in the islands during the past few years, and who do not know how to take care of themselves in the tropics, have been compelled to abandon their homes and go to a cold country for a prolonged sojourn.

**YOKOHAMA POPULATION IS ON THE INCREASE**

YOKOHAMA, Japan, March 20.—Although tens of thousands of citizens driven from this city by the great quake of last year are straggling back and trying to re-establish their homes, the population of Yokohama is still 150,000 less than it was on the morning of the fateful first of September, according to police statistics.

Yokohama's population now is 294,250; on September 1 it was approximately 450,000.

**ANTI-SUBMARINE MUST KEEP PACE WITH ALL LATEST DEVELOPMENTS**

LONDON, March 20.—Lord Chelmsford, at the annual dinner of the Institution of Electrical Engineers, told of several things he has discovered during

the short time he has been First Lord of the Admiralty. One of the most interesting, he confessed, was to find that while a development of the potentialities of the submarine was going on, there was quite close an anti-submarine department. As submarines went ahead in one direction the anti-submarine department was informed of it and immediately proceeded to devise something by which the submarine could be countered. It was through electricity that nearly all those things were devised.

PREMIER MACDONALD ON PROTECTION AND CAPITAL LEVY POLICY

Will not be Happy Until National Debt of Britain is Paid Off or Materially Reduced

LONDON, March 20.—Much importance is being attached to the statement of Premier Macdonald on capital levy and protection made during his speech in the House of Commons.

"Capital levy is in exactly the same position as protection. It cannot be enacted in this parliament. We shall not deal with capital levy. No change of that character can be made until a majority of the country is in favor of it. I have not the least doubt that Mr. Chamberlain will go on propagating his doctrine of protection, but, until he or somebody else produces some scheme which will save this country from the exceedingly bad effects, as I think, of a too heavy national debt, increasing the cost of production, diminishing the purchasing value of money, oppressing the wage-earning classes in mass, as I think, until the national debt is diminished and paid by honest means, I regard two means as dishonest, one repudiation and the other inflation—until the national debt is paid off—"paid off" is too long—until the national debt is diminished, until its burden becomes of the nature that can be borne by the people, by the whole body of producers, functions of master and man and so on, I cannot be happy, because I do not believe the country is going to be free to compete in the markets of the world as soon as we enjoy normal conditions again."

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS. Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects.

PRE-EMPTIONS

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASING

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.
