That may be better than allowing the present unsatisfactory condition but there does not seem any good reason why we should be tied by the ideas of the men who framed the Canadian constitution. They are dead and buried and their bones have returned to dust and many of their ideas have also passed to a long rest. The present generation is well able to legislate for the present and they can do that without the aid of a Senate, or at any rate without an archaic body such as the present Canadian Senate.
