## Three Eritish Parties Issue Election Manifestoes Setting Forth Stand on Public Questions

LONDON, Oct. 13.-The Labor, Liberal and Conservative parties issued election manifestoes Saturday night. That of Labor was signed by Premier J. Ramsay Macdonald; J. R. Clynes, .ord Privy Seai and leader of the House of Commons; Robert millie, leader of the Scottish Radicals; and J. R. Lansbury, cader of the London Laborites. The Liberal document was acked by Premier Asquith and David Lloyd George; the Conervative by Stanley Baldwin, former premier and house leader of the party.

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



# IN ONTARIO

Plebiscite to be Taken on October 23 on Possible Government Control

TORONTO, Oct. 13 .- (By Canadian Press) .- Ontario is in the throes of another battle over the liquor issue, Oct. 23 being the date for the taking of the plebiscite on question of continuance or repeal of the present prohibition law known as the Ontario Temperance Act and the substitution of government control of the sale of spirituous liquors for beverage purposes. It is a straight issue between prohibition and government control, only two questions being before the voters. They are:

1-Are you in favor of the, continuance of the Ontario Temperance Act?

2-Are you in favor of the sale as a beverage of beer and spiritluous liquors in sealed packages under government control?

The voter will place an X after the question he desires to answer in the affirmative. A mark after both questions will spoil the ballot. The questions seemed to call for the answer "yes" or "no" after each and the first draft of the ballot prepared contemplated that form of verdict but following a conference call-'wets" and "drys," it was announced that the task of the voter had been reduced to the mere placing of a cross after one of the questions.

With a record of well over fourteen years of service between here and Vancouver behind her and a total mileage of 600,000 or considerably more than twenty times the distance around the world in those fourteen years, C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert steamed into port Saturday evening on her six hundredth voyage. After an easy 31 hour passage up the coast from Vancouver which could have been done in considerably less time. Capt. Harry Nedden, who is relieving Capt. D.
