UNITED STATES FLYERS ARRIVE AT SITKA

FINANCE MINISTER ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR DOMINION FINANCES THIS YEAR

Reduction in National Debt and Reduction in Taxation is Provided for in Budget

OTTAWA, April 10.—A reduction in taxation of \$24,000,000 is estimated by Hon. J. A. Robb, acting minister of finance, in his budget speech delivered in the House of Commons late today.

"Our budget," said Mr. Robb, "shows a reduction in the debt of \$30,000,000 from last year and a reduction in taxation of \$24,000,000 this year. We confidently expect that the reductions will give much impetus to trade and that it will result in greater development and prosperity of all the provinces of Canada."

Manufacturers of agricultural implements are to have "free entry" on pig iron, bar iron and bar steel when used in the manufacture of binders and reapers in lieu of a drawback of 99 per cent.

A summary of the taxation proposals for the fiscal year now beginning follows:

Sales tax reduced from 6 to 5 per cent on a large list of agricultural and dairying implements also on mining, quarrying, lumbering and logging machinery, provisions and breadstuffs.

Sales tax reduced fifty per cent on boots and shoes, biscuits, canned vegetables, canned fruits, jams and preserves.

Customs tariff reductions on agricultural and dairying implements, mining, quarrying, lumbering and logging machinery.

All fertilizers on free list.

Materials entering into the cost of aforesaid items and other implements on which the duty is reduced to be entitled to entry at seven and a half per cent under all tariffs.

All martin for fisheries to be made free of customs duties, sales tax on rubber boots is reduced from 6 to 4½ per cent.

Sales tax removed from cereal foods, macaroni, vermicelli, sago, rice, meats, salted or smoked.

Sales tax reduced from 6 to 2½ per cent on biscuits, canned vegetables, canned fruits, jams, preserves.

Sales tax on boots and shoes including rubber footwear reduced from 6 to 2½ per cent.

Sales tax removed from milk foods.

Materials entering into the manufacture of woollens to be exempt from sales tax.

Income Tax Same

There will be no change in income tax for fiscal year 1924-25. Certain changes will be made in the incidence of the Sales Tax. Well drilling machinery and apparatus will be exempted, while crutches will be free of both sales tax and customs. The value for free entry for purchases of traction ditching machines has been increased from \$3,000 to \$3,500.

For the better protection of revenue, sections of the Sales Tax referring to manufacturers doing business under \$10,000 a year will be repealed. The list of exemptions from Sales Tax will be enlarged in connection with the discount on importations under the British Preferential Tariff passed last session. It is proposed that in computing the ad valorem rate of duty on tea purchased in the United Kingdom in bond, the value for duty shall not include the amount of customs duty payable on tea for consumption in the United Kingdom.

ELECTION AND PLEBISCITE

VICTORIA, April 10.—Premier Oliver may go to Ottawa this week in order to press for action by the Federal Government on British Columbia problems. The decision to hold the beer plebiscite and the general election on the same date as announced yesterday has been decided upon in order to save the extra expense of two polls. No definite date is yet set but it is understood it will be probably in June or July.

NEW GERMAN BANK

BERLIN, April 10.—A new gold discount bank has been established here and will begin operations at an early date.

DAWSON SAYS MAY BE DAYS BEFORE CONTRACT IS LET

A telegram received from F. G. Dawson at Montreal states that the steamer tenders were opened on April 8 but on account of the numerous plans and specifications and prices submitted it will take some time to figure them out and it may be several days before the contract is let.

BUILD SMELTER PRINCE RUPERT

Stewart Editor Urges That This is the Most Suitable Point to Locate It

Unless Granby puts in a lead stack in order to care for the stock offering in this district there should be a smelter built at Prince Rupert, according to H. W. Rolston, editor of the Portland Canal News of Stewart.

Mr. Rolston passed through the city northbound last night after a holiday in Vancouver and Victoria and he noticed that the Vancouver Sun was advocating the erection of a smelter near Vancouver. He was quite outspoken in opposition to any such move, stating that it was not the suitable place for it. Already there were two on Vancouver Island, one each at Ladysmith and Crofton and neither of them were used. The Tacoma smelter was near enough to care for all ores offering in the district. Here, however, things were different and Mr. Rolston urged that Prince Rupert was the logical point where the ores from the interior and those from the coast points could be assembled. Somewhere between here and the Skeena River was, he thought, the most suitable location.

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

Air Cruisers Take off from Prince Rupert on Next Hop World Flight

Almost simultaneously at 9:30 this morning, the four United States round-the-world air cruisers took off on their flight from Prince Rupert harbor to Sitka—the next lap of their globe encircling cruise. On departing, Major Martin expected that they would reach Sitka in four hours. The distance from here to there, according to the fliers' charts, is 297 miles. Tomorrow, it is hoped, the flight from Sitka to Cordova, a distance of 540 miles, may be accomplished.

Weather conditions here were anything but promising and the take-off was made with a heavy rain prevailing though it was calm. Reports from Sitka, however, were more favorable and it was on the strength of these that it was decided to fly today.

At 9:45 the machines were reported heard but not seen over Port Simpson.

Major Martin and his officers rose early this morning at 5 o'clock in readiness to make an early start but, on account of the unfavorable weather outlook, decided to wait for a while. About 7:15 they left the Prince Rupert Hotel for Seal Cove and whether Germany would display commonsense or stupidity at the critical moment in her dealings with the powers. The hypothesis of experts that fiscal and economic unity of Germany must be restored to the Germans, is welcome here. While the signatures of the French experts, which, it is assumed, are appended to the findings, are taken as an indication of a French change of heart regarding the whole scheme of reparations settlement.

At 8:30 Lieut. Nelson taxied his machine from the mooring place to the middle of the harbor. Lieut. Wade, Lieut. Smith and Major Martin followed in order at intervals of several minutes. Lieut. Smith was the first to take the air at 9:20. Lieut. Nelson and Major Martin rose at 9:25 and Lieut. Wade was off at 9:27. After circling overhead a few minutes and gaining altitude the course of all four was set over Metlakatla and beyond with Lieut. Smith in the lead.

United States Consul A. E. Wakefield and Vice-Consul Fred Weaver were at Seal Cove at an early hour and bid the flyers farewell before they taxied off. The moving picture men were out and recorded all the proceedings attending the taking off.

EVICTIONS BILL IS INTRODUCED

Provides For Payment of Tenant's Rent by Local Authorities

LONDON, April 10.—The new Evictions Bill was given its first reading in the House of Commons Wednesday. It prohibits the eviction of a tenant that is unable to pay his rent because of financial distress and provides for reimbursement of the landlord by the local authorities paying such rent.

A tenant unable to pay rent is to be provided with a certificate of immunity from eviction. Local authorities must investigate and if necessary supplement the tenant's resources sufficiently to enable him to retain his home.

GERMANS NOT AGAINST PLAN

Only Few Newspapers Oppose Recommendations of Reparations Experts

BERLIN, April 10.—Editorial comment in the papers today inclines to the opinion that the report on reparations issued yesterday by experts constitutes a basis for negotiations. Only in isolated instances of nationalist organs is opposition to the recommendations voiced.

BRINGING DOWN BUDGET TODAY

Optimistic Outlook Indicated by Acting Minister of Finance J. A. Robb

OTTAWA, April 10.—A more optimistic financial position than has been possible since the outbreak of the war will be shown today when Hon. J. A. Robb, acting minister of finance introduces his budget to the House of Commons.

The general expectation is that there will be cuts in the sales tax and possibly a lightening of the income tax.

TWO HANGED LONDON TODAY

Third Man Condemned to Life Imprisonment Was Accessory to Murder

LONDON, April 10.—Sidney Murrell, 26 years of age, the Melbourne bank bandit and slayer of Russell Campbell, garage man of that village, and Clarence Topping, 23 years of age, formerly of Stratford, who shot to death Geraldine Durston, 18, his sweetheart here last November, were both hanged this morning.

Harry Williams who was also condemned to death as accessory to the Melbourne crime has his sentence commuted to life imprisonment.

SUDDEN DEATH LOCAL AGENT

Thomas Webster Herne Passed Away Suddenly Early Hour Today

The death occurred very suddenly at 5 o'clock this morning from hemorrhage of the brain of Thomas Webster Herne, government agent at Prince Rupert. Deceased was apparently enjoying the best of health up to the time he retired last night and his demise came as a terrible blow to his widow and a distinct shock to the many friends Mr. Herne had made officially and privately since coming to the city less than a year ago from Prince George to take up the post of government agent here. This morning all flags in the city raised at half-mast as a mark of respect.

Born in Scotland

The late Mr. Herne was born in Scotland on August 6, 1874, the son of Lieut.-Col. George Edward Herne and Mrs. Herne. He attended college in England and was a crack oarsman. He came to Canada twenty-three years ago and entered the B.C. provincial civil service in 1907 as a clerk in the Nelson agency. Two years later he was appointed assessor at Hazelton and in 1911 he was promoted to be government agent at Fort Fraser on the opening of offices there. He moved to Fort George during the summer of 1912 and, for eleven years, he administered the numerous duties attached to that extensive agency. Last year he was appointed government agent at Prince Rupert to succeed J. H. McMullin, now superintendent of provincial police.

A funeral service will be held at St. Andrew's Anglican Church, Archdeacon G. A. Rix officiating, tomorrow afternoon and the remains will be forwarded on the Princess Mary for interment in Victoria.

VICTORIA, April 10.—Opposition followers, Conservatives and Provincial alike, are busy making the government's plans for the coming election. Making Ready For
Provincial Elections.

Pattullo will be renominated but there is so far no opposition in sight. The Conservatives will undoubtedly have a man in the field but there seems to be no outstanding person in sight. The names of several local businessmen have been mentioned and of course Mayor Newton is a possibility.

Reparations Plan
Should Succeed.

The reparations plan as recommended by the committee of experts seems like one that might succeed. It goes further than many expected and clearly indicates, as the French newspapers say, that Germany is able to pay.

That the scheme of depreciating the currency was a deep laid plan seems clear from information which is gradually coming to hand. One man who was among the first to enter Germany after the war states that he was told semi-officially at that time that the currency would be depreciated.

If Prince Rupert is to have a future as brilliant as her prospects indicate, then she demands capital. This capital is to be found in her tourist trade, could we but realize this fact. Should we not then, avail ourselves of opportunity, and encourage so valuable an asset?

It is through tourist traffic that people of other cities are to become acquainted with Rupert's natural wealth. Therefore it is through this traffic that the investment of newcomers will bring development to our city. Vancouver and Victoria have adopted this policy of arresting the interest of tourists and we have seen how successful have been their efforts to encourage visitors.

Should Entertain Them

Tourist trade is the surest medium through which outside interest is to be stimulated, and this interest has proven absolutely essential to the progress of any city. When visitors pass through Prince Rupert we have no means of pleasure to offer them, and practically no available conveyance to places of interest. Consequently hundreds pass through here without imbibing any knowledge of our natural assets and our places of interest.

Then it behoves our citizens to employ some magnetic force which shall attract the interest of tourists, and encourage their investments. The cost of a tennis court, or other such facilities to provide pleasure to tourists, would be trivial in comparison to the gain we would receive, could we but arouse the interest of visitors. If our southern neighbors

have found this such a beneficial

policy, then we should find it doubly so.

We do not realize what a wonderful asset the Salt Lake would be to our city, were

we to turn a little attention to its improvement and swimming equipment.

Golf Links

Now that a survey has begun on our out of town road we may consider the prospect of golf links in the near future which might be placed at the disposal of tourists. Such movements as these could not fail to draw the attention of tourists and hence their capital.

Let it not rest, then, solely on a few energetic citizens or our city council to make such improvements, to attract tourists. Every citizen and organization should rally now towards increasing this trade, which will procure the financial means that our city demands.

RADIO MIND ACROSS SEA

Edmonton Lady Heard Sounds
and Felt Vibrations Sitting
Alone in Room 13

Another example of the supposed existence of ghosts has been cited by a well-known Edmonton lady, who asked that her name not be published. In a letter to the Edmonton Journal she says:

"It was when my son was somewhere in France and the mothers and fathers of Edmonton were eagerly scanning the bulletin boards and the daily newspapers for news of their beloved ones. I was stopping in an apartment house and had room No. 13. As I was sitting in my room one evening I heard groans and crying—not very loud but more like they were borne to me in vibrations. It gave me the impression that someone had suffered terribly in that room."

"As I heard it again the second evening I quite made up my mind that if it happened again I would ask for another room. The third evening I plainly heard my son crying as he used to cry when he was a little boy and hurt himself. The only difference was that the crying was in his man's voice. Then I felt sure that he was hurt."

Passed Her Bed

"As I awoke the next morning I fell rather than heard someone pass by my bed. Again it seemed like vibrations, almost as a wind blowing, only it seemed like a person and alive. About nine o'clock the same morning as I sat alone in the room I heard a rap, seemingly a short distance away. Then there was a loud knock upon the door as if someone had struck it with their fist. I arose and opened the door but nobody was there."

"It took generally about four weeks to hear from France. Then a wire came that my son had been wounded in the Battle of Cambrai, nearly a month before. This battle lasted three days. I felt that my son had been very near death and I called it vibrations. As he and I were constantly thinking of each other we did not need any modern invention such as the wireless to bring us together. Nothing could separate us. Even the sounds of that terrific battle were carried to me."
