FRANCE LAYS PLANS FOR BUILDING NAVY

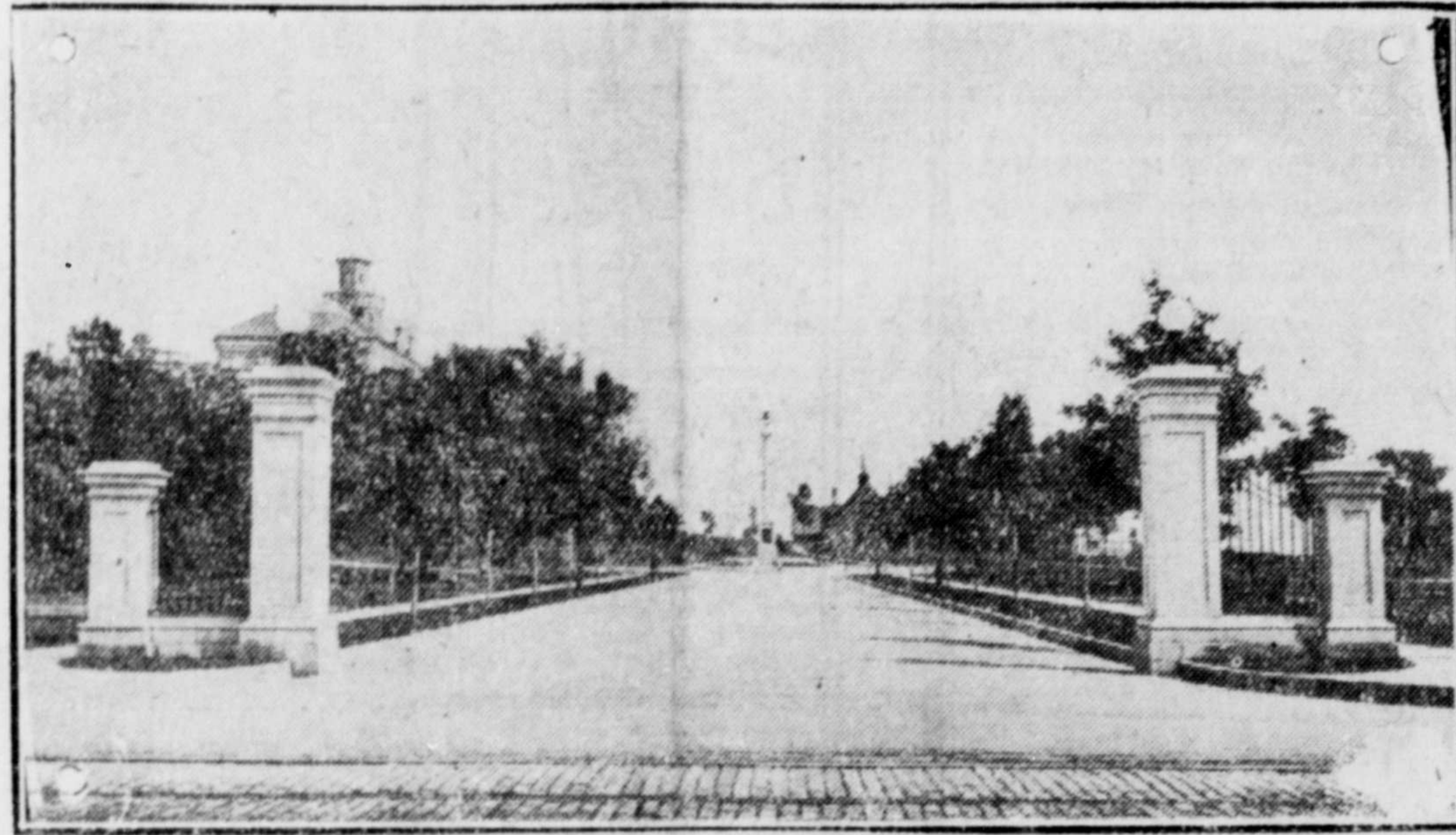
WILL BE ASKED BY GREAT BRITAIN ABOUT PAYING WAR DEBT TO HER

France Plans Ahead for Building of Navy Cost Ten Billion Francs

PARIS, Dec. 5.—France's new naval program is outlined in a report submitted to the chamber of deputies by a commission. It calls for the reconstruction of the fleet at a cost of ten billion francs, the work to be spread over twenty years.

Of next year's appropriation half a billion francs are to be spent on secondary ships.

Construction of ships of the line will not be assumed until the year 1932.

RENEW WHARF PORT SIMPSON

Was Taken Over by Federal Government from Hudson Bay Co. This Year, District Engineer Announces

Work which will practically amount to the rebuilding of the old Hudson Bay wharf at Port Simpson will be started shortly after the New Year by the federal department of public works announced J. P. Forde, district engineer, who returned south to his headquarters in Victoria on the steamer Prince Rupert this morning.

After having endeavored to do so for several years, the federal government finally took over the Port Simpson wharf this year from the Hudson Bay Company, Mr. Forde explained. It is contrary to the policy of the government to do work upon property that it does not own stated Mr. Forde. This is why the repairs to the Port Simpson wharf which have been needed so long have been delayed. Now that the department is in position to do the work it will be proceeded with as soon as possible. The department is a present working on the wharf at Bella Goola.

During his visit of two days in the city, Mr. Forde conferred with Fred Stork, M.P., on public works planned for this district next year. This work will, of course, be subject to the money voted by parliament and no announcements are being made at this time.

The snag boat Bobolink has been taken out of the water at Digby Island for the winter. Repairs to the craft will be effected at the marine station and the vessel will be taken on the pontoons at the local dry dock in the spring.

While his department has nothing to do with the building of the elevator here, Mr. Forde expressed satisfaction at the steps that had been taken that assured the erection of the facility at Prince Rupert.

U.S. VICE-CONSUL SERIOUSLY WOUNDED

BELGRADE, Dec. 5.—Henry Dayton, U.S. vice-consul here, was shot and seriously wounded in his home by a young woman who afterwards committed suicide by opening the veins of her forearm. Dayton is said to have told the woman their friendship must cease.

GOVERNMENT IS SUSTAINED BY FOUR MAJORITY

Provincials and One Labor Man Voted with Opposition in Legislature

VICTORIA, Dec. 5.—The closest division in the Legislature so far this session took place yesterday afternoon when R. H. Pooley, leader of the opposition, resisted the effort, made by the government to adjourn the debate on Canon Hinchcliffe's bill amending the Election Act to provide for the holding of by-elections within six months of the seat becoming vacant.

Hon. William Sloan moved the adjournment of the debate and his motion was carried on a division by 25 to 21.

Three members of the Provincial party and Brown the Labor man from South Vancouver voted with the opposition.

VANCOUVER MAN KILLED BY AUTO

Arthur McGill Dead—Thomas S. Darling Arrested and Charged With Manslaughter

VANCOUVER, Dec. 5.—Arthur McGill was almost instantly killed when he was run down by an automobile. Thomas S. Darling, the driver, was arrested and charged with manslaughter. He was released on \$10,000 bail.

ONTARIO PRISON IS FILLED WITH THOSE CAUGHT BOOTLEGGING

NORTH BAY, Dec. 5.—Ontario bootleggers are finding it more economical to spend six months in Burwash than to pay the fines of one or two thousand dollars, say the provincial police. The capacity of the prison farm is severely taxed and another big camp is being erected to care for the overflow.

BANDITS MAKE HAUL IN JEWELRY STORE

Three Robbers Entered Chicago Shop and, Holding up Employees, Seized \$150,000 of Precious Stones

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—Three robbers entered the Olsen-Ebann jewelry store here, held up the manager and employees and escaped with jewels valued at \$150,000.

Britain is to Ask France About Paying War Debt to Her and Note in Regard to it Will be Sent

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The British Government, it is officially stated, is expected to address a note to the United States and France in the next few days requesting those governments to inform Great Britain what steps are being taken or anticipated in settling the French war debt to us.

Such inquiries are regarded as natural as Britain has never been approached on the subject of the settlement of the French war debts to the British government. It is pointed out that Britain has a right to expect the same treatment from France as any other nation.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—London reports that Britain expects to inquire regarding the funding of the French debt to the United States, caused surprise here. Officials declare much of the agitation in the London press expressing fear that the French will be accorded more favorable terms than that allowed Great Britain is unwarranted.

ADVERTISING FOR TENDERS

Prince Rupert Rock Foundations to be Let in One Lump Contract

In this issue elsewhere is an advertisement calling for tenders for the foundation for the Prince Rupert elevator and dock and also a cross-sited pile foundation for the sacked grain warehouse to be erected in connection with it. The tender is to be in one lump sum and must be submitted before January 2 next. A check for \$10,000 must accompany the tender, the same to be retained as a bond for the successful fulfillment of the work in case of being the successful tenderer.

The cargo of liquor which the C.P.R. steamer Princess Ena was loading at New Westminster last week and which despatches said was consigned to the Yukon is instead to be taken to Mexico. This is explained by a recent Vancouver paper in making correction of its original story which was responsible for the press despatches arriving here.

SOVIET GETS LENIENT TO CAPITALISTS

Head of Economic Council Says Gone Too Far in Suppression

MOSCOW, Dec. 5.—The Soviet economic policy appears to be undergoing a gradual modification. The government is adopting a more lenient attitude toward private trading, private capital, foreign imports and concessions. Felix Dzerjidsky, head of the supreme economic council, told the council that Soviet legislation had gone too far in suppressing private capital.

LORD ROBERT CECIL WINS PEACE AWARD

Chosen Unanimously to Receive \$25,000 from Woodrow Wilson Foundation

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Viscount Cecil of Chelwood, formerly Lord Robert Cecil, is the winner of the \$25,000 award made by the Woodrow Wilson Foundation for meritorious service of public nature tending towards the establishment of peace through justice. He was chosen unanimously from among one hundred nominees.

HEART FAILURE NOT DROWNING

Doctor's Evidence Establishes that Peter Colligan was Dead Before he Fell in Water

Through expert testimony submitted by Dr. H. E. Tremayne at an inquiry yesterday afternoon into the circumstances attending the death of Peter Colligan, logger, at Khutzmateen Inlet last week, it was established that deceased had died not from drowning but from heart failure before he fell in the water. The condition of the lungs indicated that Colligan had been dead before he struck the water after falling off the log.

The funeral will take place tomorrow morning from the B.G. Undertakers Parlors to Fairview Cemetery.

BRITISH TOLERANCE IS SHOWN ONCE MORE

(Edmonton Bulletin)

Zagloul, former premier of Egypt, is to retire to a health resort in France or Italy. That is his share of the penalty for the murder of General Stack. His going of course is at the suggestion of his successor and with the consent of the tolerate British authorities. It is unfortunate that the ejection so long deserved was delayed until Zagloul had propagandized his followers up to a desire to commit murder and a willingness to provoke war. It is certainly hardly fair that the man who shot the Sirdar, if caught, will go to the gallows or to jail, while the man who inspired the crime will only retire for a season to the Riviera. There, no doubt, to consort with emissaries of Britain and plot further mischief for the too easy-going British officials.

Murder Mystery Develops as Result of Inquest Into the Death of Man at Klew Nugget

A murder mystery has developed out of the inquest over the body of an unknown man which was found on the beach near Klew Nugget in Gardner Canal about a month ago. The jury sitting before Coroner Norman A. Watt yesterday afternoon returned a verdict that deceased had apparently come to his death as a result of a gunshot wound inflicted by some person or persons unknown other than deceased. A rider recommended that the press be requested to give full publicity to the matter together with such description of deceased as could be obtained. The latter is being prepared by the provincial police today.

EXPLOSION IN A WELSH MINE

Fire Damp Causes Loss of Life at Wrexham, Wales

WREXHAM, Wales, Dec. 5.—Nine miners are known to have lost their lives and many are missing as a result of firedamp in a mine following an explosion early this morning. Eight were badly burned and their bodies have been brought to the surface.

ROTARY CLUB HEARS ABOUT REFRIGERATION

Interesting Uses for Plant Under Modern Systems of Manufacture

Oddities of the refrigerator business were told about at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday afternoon by J. S. Louis, Pacific coast manager of the Carbondale Machine Company, a Los Angeles concern that specializes in freezing plants. A few years ago these plants were used chiefly in cold storage plants and in breweries but today the conditions have changed and they are used in all sorts of unexpected places. His company put a 1300 ton plant in the Ford Car factory. By using refrigeration they are enabled to get twice the strength in steel and thus the car can be built lighter than would otherwise be the case.

Refrigeration is also used in the manufacture of films by the Eastman Kodak Company which freezes to 29 degrees below zero.

Cooling theatres is one of the branches of their business. In a Los Angeles theatre they have just put in a 130 ton plant to reduce the humidity. A hospital in Cincinnati just installed a plant and a frog farm in Wisconsin uses refrigeration to send the frogs down into the mud.

In the manufacture of mercerized goods it is necessary to keep the temperature exactly at seventy degrees and this is attained by refrigeration. The gloss on the material is obtained at that temperature.

The address proved most interesting and at the close the speaker was thanked by President W. T. Kergin.

Frederick McGaughy Pays Penalty for Murder on Gallows

LINDSAY, Dec. 5.—Frederick W. McGaughy was executed at four o'clock this morning for the murder of his sweetheart, Beatrice Fee, last May. Ten seconds after the murderer stepped on the gallows the execution was completed.

ANDERSON TO GO TO 'FRISCO

Vancouver Lawyer Asserts he Will Face Trial—Nat Bell Visited States but Returns

VANCOUVER, Dec. 5.—F. R. Anderson, the Vancouver barrister, arrested in connection with the seizure of the steamer Quadra, declares that he intends to return to San Francisco to face his accusers but not until just before the time of trial in January. This is his reply to the report that his bail is to be increased to \$50,000 if he returns.

Nat Bell, one of the shareholders of the Consolidated Liquor Exporting Co., for whom a warrant was issued in connection with the Quadra affair, has returned to Vancouver without having been apprehended.

Need Of Manager Clearly Shown.

When it becomes necessary to hold a public inquiry in order to find out if a city foreman is doing his duty, it is about time there was a change of the system of governing the city. How can it be possible to get a competent foreman if he is to be subject to this sort of thing? He may be wrong. If he is, he should be replaced, but it should be done as quietly in the city business as it would be in that of a private concern. To give employees the idea that all they have to do if they are called down is to appeal to the city council, is subversive to all discipline.

We believe that every workingman has a right to good treatment. If a man earns his money at any respectable calling he is worthy of all respect. Because a man works at day labor does not in any way stigmatize him or place him in a lower plane than his fellows. If he does his work well and uses his intelligence he will soon get a better job.

At the same time if I am working at day labor I do not expect a committee of the council to hold a public inquiry over the conduct of my foreman and call me to give evidence against him. There must be some better way of carrying on the work of the city than that. Even if the foreman is exonerated, untold harm will have been done in the matter of discipline.

Say Goodbye To Provincial Party.

We might as well say goodbye to the Provincial Party. As a matter of fact its fate was sealed the day of the election. It made a spasmodic effort to defeat the Oliver Government and it met with a measure of success in that it almost achieved its object. Now the men who were the real movers behind the scenes are howling because the elected members do not carry out the purpose of the movement. General McRae, like a wise leader, stayed away from the meeting and let them wrangle among themselves. It will be very interesting to read the more extended accounts of the Victoria gathering.

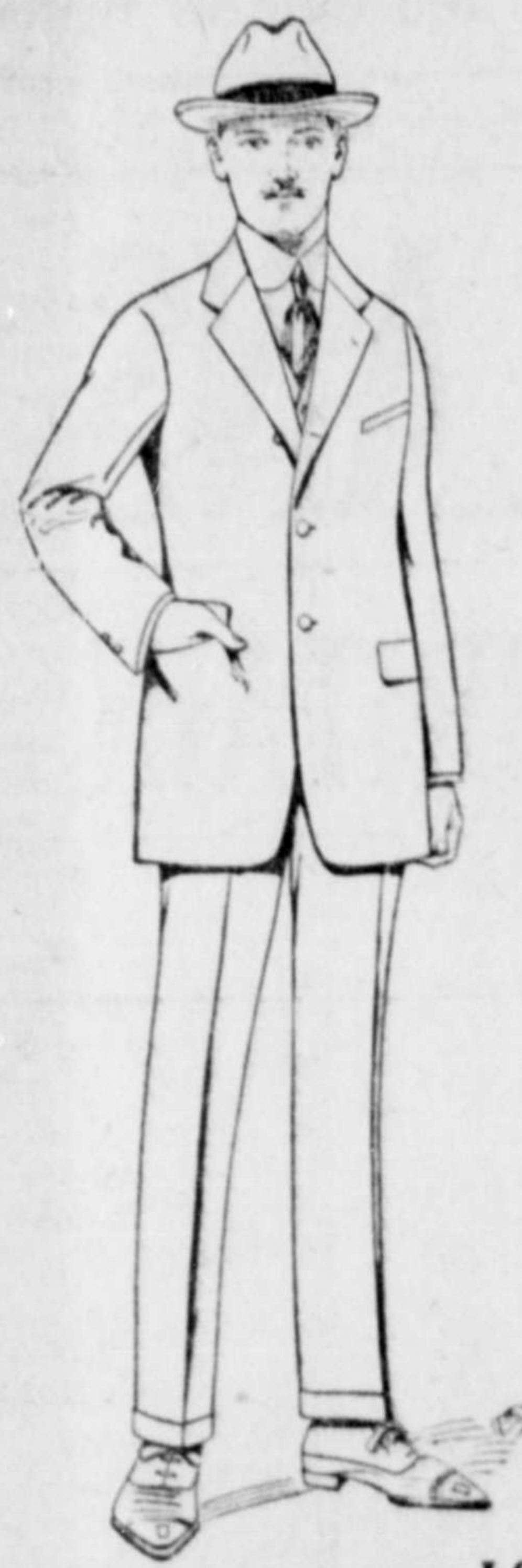

Chief Dudward of Port Simpson, one of the best known Indian residents of British Columbia, died at his home about 11 o'clock this morning. He was 65 years of age and practically all his life was spent in Port Simpson. He was a most industrious and progressive man.

VICTORIA PRACTICALLY FREE FROM DRUG RING

Chief of Police Says There are a Few Addicts Well Known to the Force

VICTORIA, Dec. 5.—A former police constable of this city, Thomas Palmer, who is now a candidate for the position of police commissioner here, has been making charges that the drug traffic was just as bad in Victoria as in other cities of the coast. This is denied by Chief Fry who made a statement to the board of commissioners as follows:

"With reference to the statements made as to the number of addicts in the city of Victoria, I can say that the city has never been freer from drug-taking than it is at the present time, and in

comparison with other Coast cities, stands out as one of the cleanest in this respect. While there may be two or three known or suspected addicts, I wish to press the point that the police are fully cognizant of the few drug-takers in the city—these are mostly victims of unfortunate circumstances caused mainly through disease, or as the result of days gone by when the use of drugs was not an infraction of the law.

"I wish to emphasize that the statements appearing in this connection are groundless and that the police are fully aware of what little use of drugs there is in the city today."

In the Letter Box

COURT HOUSE FLAG

Editor, Daily News.

The ordinary person—unless particularly observant—might walk along Second Avenue, inspect the Totem pole, and proceed towards the Court House without being disturbed by any unusual sight or incident. However, the writer is not blessed that way, and covering that route yesterday afternoon, I was brought to a sudden stop at McBride Street by a sight which practically brought tears to my eyes.

A well-known writer has said—if I quote correctly—if in moments like these that one feels the entire inadequateness of the English language, and assuredly, Mr. Editor, I felt that words could not express my thoughts at that particular moment.

My eyes rested on the flag pole of the Court House, and "The

This statuette is an exact copy of the famous Venus, and like the original, it has no arms. Dr. Edde therefore concludes that the Venus de Milo never at any time had arms, and he believes that the sculptor when he had carved out of the stone such a divine form, gave up all idea of adding arms.

When the Venus de Milo was discovered on the island of Milo a large reward was offered to anyone who could find the arms, but in spite of extensive search, nothing was discovered.
