

Mr. Graham: I know my hon. friend is not very friendly to the Prince Rupert scheme of the Grand Trunk Pacific, but so long as we oppose every proposition to give the Grank Trunk Pacific traffic, so long will the Grand Trunk Pacific give us a deficit.

The Grand Trunk Pacific was not intended to be sawed off at both ends; the original scheme was to have a line of ships connecting at Prince Rupert with the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Transcontinental; and although condtions have somewhat changed, yet the fact stands, and canbe controverted, that the route from eastern or from western Canada to the Orient via Prince Rupert is shorter than any other route by a good many miles. If we are to export our grain or other products by the shortest route at the lowest cost, Prince Rupert must be developed and utilized; there is no question about that. My hon, friend also forgets that there is a vast territory which, when opened up, will be tributary to Prince Rupert and will be many miles closer to Prince Rupert than to Vancouver. 




