## MINING ACTIVITY TERRACE AND DISTRICT

### ALL WORLD POWERS TO UNITE IN DRAWING AGENDA FOR CONFERENCE

#### Sixty Mineral Claims Located During Summer Terrace And District

#### Lot of Good Work Done by Kalem Lake Mines Ltd. and Other Properties Being Rapidly Developed

Prospectors have been very busy this summer both to the north and south of Terrace, some sixty mineral claims having been recorded, most of which are in the Kitsumkalum Lake district on Maroon and Goat Mountains. While none of the finds have been of a spectacular character, many of the prospects are affording considerable satisfaction to the locators. From the samples of ores to be seen in Terrace, prospectors have every reason to spend money in development. Unlike most mining communities, however, the Terrace prospectors do not deceive themselves by thinking they have got something, before they know, first.

Development work has been continued on the older properties on Maroon Mountain, notably on the Motherlode, Bear and Black Wolf groups. The locators of the Black Wolf have disposed of this group of five claims at a very satisfactory figure. The new owners intend to continue developing the property and to bring it to the producing stage as rapidly as possible.

Another deal involving the sale of the Silver Dollar group, situated some three miles west of Cedar River Crossing, is pending.

**Portland Group**  
What is regarded as the best gamble in the district is the Portland group owned by the Kalem Lakes Mines Ltd. This is the prospect found by "Smithie" late of the G.T.P. and developed by Terrace capital. A double compartment shaft has been sunk for 61 feet on the main vein. At this depth the vein is increasing in width and in value. Assay returns show values in gold \$54.40 and in silver of \$14.75 per ton. W. S. Bacon, M.E., examined his property last month and reported very favorably upon the work already accomplished as well as on future prospects.

On Cedar River, the Silver Cup group have very good showings. The ore exposed is high grade, the smelter tests running to \$65 in silver and \$15 in gold.

A very promising silver lead property is being developed by Mr. Egan some three miles back from the lake and 2,500 feet up, while on the lake shore Joe Beloway is working on a very interesting gold-copper prospect.

**Road Needed**  
All Kalem Lake district is handicapped, however, by the road to Kalem Lake from Terrace being still uncompleted. There is rather more than a mile still to be constructed and the prospectors to whom this road means so much were in hopes of it being finished this year so that it would pack during the winter with the snow and be in fine shape by next spring. #### FLYERS AT SAN DIEGO

Great Reception Awaits U.S. Airmen at Southern California City Today

TUCSON, Arizona, Sept. 22.—The United States round-the-world flyers left here this morning for San Diego. They hopped from Dallas, Texas to El Paso, New Mexico, on Saturday and from El Paso here yesterday.

At San Diego a rousing reception will be tendered the flyers and a general holiday has been declared by the mayor for the occasion. There will be presentations including a handsome residence to Lieut. Smith. San Diego is his home town.

When the flyers arrive at Santa Monica after having left San Diego they will actually have completed the flight around the world.

**Canada in Welcome**

SEATTLE, Sept. 22.—Through the State Department, the Seattle Chamber of Commerce has issued an invitation for officers and men of H.M.C.S. Patricia, now in Elliot Bay, to participate with the city in welcoming the U.S. world flyers who are expected to arrive here towards the end of the week. It is also expected that a Canadian government airplane from Jericho Beach, piloted by Flight Lieut. MacLeod, will take part in the celebration.

#### HAL MCGIVERN NEW MINISTER

Will Visit Prince Rupert Next Month with Premier King and Other Cabinet Members

OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—H. B. McGivern, K.C., M.P. for Ottawa, has been sworn in as a minister without portfolio in the federal cabinet. Mr. McGivern will visit Prince Rupert next month with Premier King and other members.

#### Tornado Swept Through Three Eastern States Causing the Death of About Fifty People

ST. PAUL, Sept. 22.—A tornado which swept through portions of Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan caused the death of approximately fifty people according to reports received here today.

The damage from the storm will amount to several million dollars. Telegraph and telephone communication is badly crippled and many homes have been toppled over.

The brunt of the storm struck Thorpe, Wisconsin, where eleven people were killed.

#### FISHERMAN HAD NARROW ESCAPE

Made Getaway from H. & R. Just in Time Last Thursday Morning When Boat Sank

At least one member of the halibut schooner H. & R. had a narrow escape when that vessel sank near White Rocks last Thursday morning. It had been a stormy night and the H. & R. was anchored outside a small bay in which the Valorous and N. & S. were riding out the storm. Early in the morning Capt. Charlie Edwards was awakened and found that the boat had been blown ashore. One of the three members of the crew had not yet awakened and it was only in the nick of time that he got out. Capt. Edwards and his men were brought to port on the N. & S.

Besides the skipper Charlie Lowe and Jimmie Liske were members of the crew. It was the latter who had the narrow escape.

#### CHARGE WITHDRAWN

After having spent several hours at the case during the past few days, the city police—unable to furnish enough evidence to prove the charge—this morning withdrew the charge against Fong, Chinese, of keeping a gaming house. The charge against Tagabashi, a Jap, in the same connection, has been remanded for eight days.

#### SHOT OFF THE END OF THUMB SATURDAY

Douglas Frizzell Went to Hazelton Hospital for Treatment and Will be Home Wednesday

George Tite and his son Teddy accompanied by George Frizzell and his son, Douglas, went out on Friday night's train to Woodcock for some grouse shooting. On Saturday night, Douglas Frizzell was making his way home in the early dusk and, while on an overgrown trail, his shotgun accidentally went off, taking off the tip of his right thumb.

He went up on Saturday's night's train to Hazelton for treatment at the hospital there. The entire party will be back on Wednesday.

#### OIL TANK EXPLODES: SEATTLE TUG SINKS

Albion Caught Fire When Returning From Salmon Fishing Banks—Was Being Towed in

SEATTLE, Sept. 22.—En route from Bremerton in tow of the tug Margaret, the tug Albion sunk when a 16,000-gallon oil tank exploded. Earlier her crew of two had been rescued off Foul Weather Bluff in Admiralty Inlet and the fire was apparently extinguished. The Albion, which was uninsured, was en route from the salmon fishing banks when she caught fire.

#### League Will Prepare Agenda for Conference on Armament Reduction

#### French Representatives at Geneva do Not Like Newspaper Agitation Against Using British Fleet for Policing

GENEVA, Sept. 22.—The United States, Germany and Russia undoubtedly will be invited to participate in a World League of Nations commission which will prepare an agenda of the international conference for the reduction of armaments to be held in June next at Geneva.

A campaign by the British press against any attempt to place the British fleet unreservedly at the service of the League as a policing force against war has caused a pronounced chill in French circles in Geneva.

#### FELL OUT OF HOTEL WINDOW

After Being Precipitated Five Storeys, Portland Man Still Alive at Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Sept. 22.—J. H. Hepburn of Le Grande, Oregon, railway man, received injuries which it is believed may prove fatal when he fell on Saturday evening out of a window on the fifth floor of the Empress Hotel, Hastings Street East. The chair which fell with him was smashed to bits. He was rushed to the hospital where last night he was reported to be still alive. The cause of the fall is unknown. The man was alone in his room at the time.

#### HEBRIDEANS TO LIVE IN TOWN

Settlers Will Take up Land Within Municipal Boundaries of Port Alberni

VICTORIA, Sept. 22.—The Hebrideans, who are coming to Vancouver Island in large numbers during the next twelve months, will settle in Port Alberni instead of founding new settlements along Barkley Sound. It is announced by the Department of Lands, that negotiations for the purchase of lands for the settlers within the municipal boundaries of Port Alberni will be opened by the department immediately.

#### KETCHIKAN MAN IS CONVICTED

James Sidney Smith Gets Seven Years for Shooting Bert Grayle Last Spring

KETCHIKAN, Sept. 22.—James Sidney Smith, former policeman of Portland (Oregon) who is said by officials to have been dismissed from the force after being charged with having killed a man, has been convicted here of manslaughter and sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary for slaying Bert Grayle last spring. The shooting was in connection with a quarrel over bootlegging liquor, the police say.

#### ARTILLERY IN ACTION TODAY

Attacking Party Unable to Push Through Lines of Defence: Naval Vessels Desert

SHANGHAI, Sept. 22.—After battering at the Chekiang defence line since daybreak the Kiangsu artillery found itself unable to push the Shanghai troops back in the fighting which has been in progress today between Kueingta and Kiating, fifteen miles west of Shanghai. The Chekiang headquarters confirmed the report that the cruiser Haichow and several smaller naval vessels went over to the Peking Government.

One thing we want badly is that road to Galloway Rapids and then we want some of the suburban property put on the market in small lots and at reasonable prices. The provincial government is doing well in having the slashing done this year. The work is being continued and it is quite heavy.

The session of the Legislature will open soon and the estimates will be prepared before that time. This is just the time to get busy on the project and back up our member in his efforts to have the work done. He is on the job but he is only one. If we make ourselves heard it will strengthen his hands and make it easier for him to get a vote for the road.

Stability Of Labor Shown By Election.

The re-election of Tom Moore as president of the Dominion Trades Council and of F. M. Draper as secretary indicates a condition of stability in labor circles which is often not suspected. These are looked upon as safe men in that they do not run off after all the new fads which are constantly being brought forward.

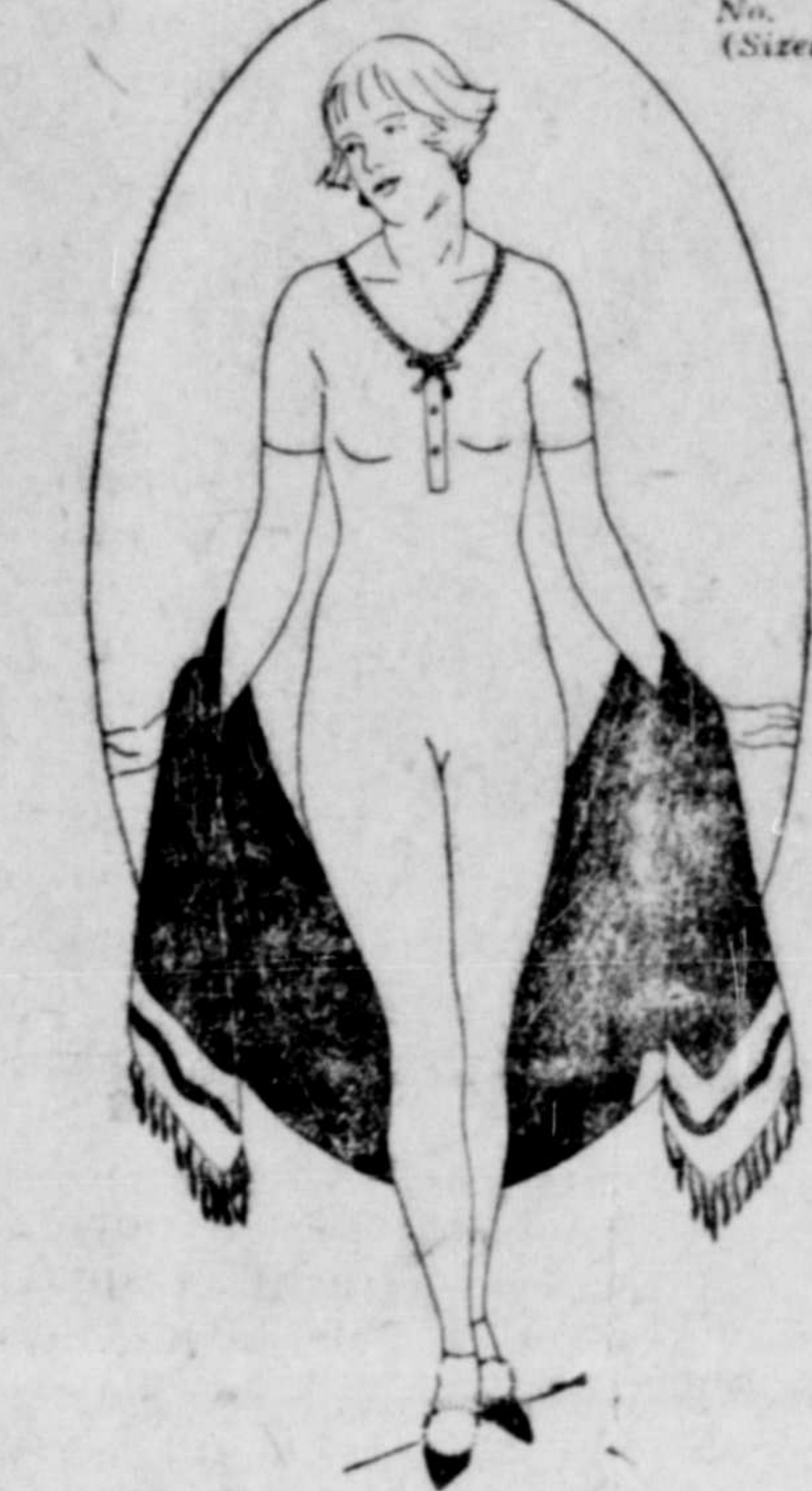

### In the Letter Box

#### LATE HARRY LIPSETT

Editor Daily News.

The many friends of Harry Lipsett were called on to feel the keen edge of bereavement last week. In a crowded chapel they met where, deluged with beautiful flowers, the remains of our old friend Harry slumbered quietly and peacefully. We listened in silence and sorrow to one of the most beautiful and inspiring burial sermons delivered by Rev. Mr. Falls, that I have ever heard. Fortune is Saved When Hero Falls in Love and is Married Aboard Steamer

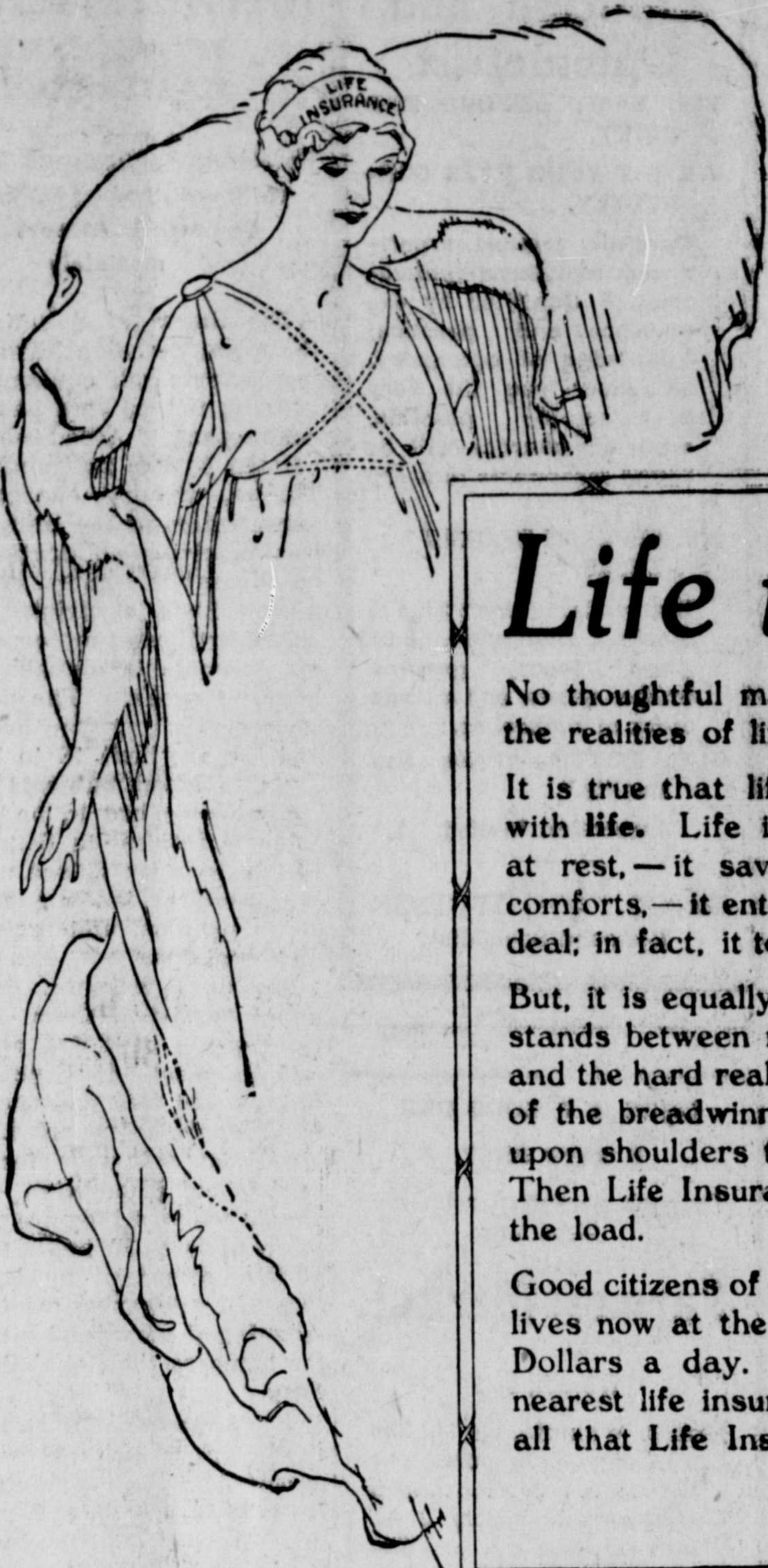

# RADIO STATIC

By The Daily News Radio Expert.

### Choosing a Set

The first question which confronts one who is contemplating the installation of a radio set is "what kind of set shall I buy?" The answer to this question however depends upon the answer to three others. First: For what service is your set intended? Second: What range do you want to cover? and Third: What price are you willing to pay?

A radio set is just like anything else in this world, inasmuch that the bigger the price you pay the better the article you receive, or ought to. It is not logical to expect that an outfit costing only a trifle will give the same results as a high priced one.

So far as Prince Rupert is concerned, the well known crystal set is quite out of the question, on account of its limited range. These crystal sets can only be guaranteed up to fifty miles on broadcast reception. Of course, much greater ranges are being often achieved with crystal sets, but these are freaks and not the average. On the whole they are unreliable for long distances.

Perhaps it might be well to state now that in order to satisfy the demands of the ordinary listener-in, a receiver located in the Prince Rupert vicinity must consist of at least two tubes in order to get fairly decent results with any volume at all. The reason for this is that the nearest broadcasting station of any power is 460 miles distant, air-line.

For those who desire to operate loud speaker regularly, three or four tubes are required. Two or three tubes, however, will give plenty of volume in the headphones without excessive noise, and after all, it is quality of reception, not quantity that should be sought for in receiving.

Do not forget also, that a three tube set consisting, as most three tubes sets generally do, of a detector and two stages of audio frequency amplification for volume, will not receive for longer distances than a single tube set consisting of just plain detector. The only difference is in volume of reception.

Upwards from the three tube set just mentioned, it depends only upon the personal taste of the buyer and upon his purse as to what set he will buy. A well designed and excellently finished receiver naturally costs more than just the plain article without any finish.

The price of a good dependable three tube set ranges from \$75.00 to \$125.00 complete. These prices vary directly as the number of tubes. For instance, a complete five tube neodymium retails here for around \$200.00

A great many people defer purchasing a radio set, because they think it will become out of date in a few years, and by that time represent a loss. They do not count the fun and pleasure in the meantime. They are not altogether correct, either, in their assumption. Does an auto-

mobile get out of date? Of course it does, just like clothes and boots. It is only reasonable to expect that improvements will be made in radio sets as well as automobiles. But most people do not put off buying an automobile on that account. In fact, a radio set bought now will be good for years to come. Any new improvements can be added, at any rate by the addition of a few more parts.

Last and not the least important, when you decide to buy radio apparatus, any standard advertised goods purchased from a reliable dealer will usually be found more satisfactory.

### EDMONTON ELEVATOR GETS FIRST GRAIN

Work Practically All Completed And Big Plant Ready For Business

EDMONTON, Sept. 22. — The first shipments of grain to the government elevator at Edmonton were taken in last week, thus avoiding the \$200 per day penalty which became effective in case the elevator was not ready to take in grain.

Cars were brought from the Gillespie Grain Company's elevator and will be used only for testing the shales upon which the grain is weighed. It will be probably two weeks yet before actual shipments of grain will be made to the elevator for ordinary purposes.

The machinery has all been installed and all concrete for the construction has been poured except for the completion of the work on a dryer building at the rear, which is to be used for drying grain.

There only remains a small amount of brick work to be completed and a general cleaning up around the big plant, and in a very short time the wheels of the huge industry will be turning smoothly.

A feature of the building of this big plant is that it has thus far been accomplished without labor troubles or accidents of a serious nature. What little labor trouble there has been was of a minor nature only, and was easily adjusted, while the accidents, of which there have been very few, have all been small ones.

### NAVAL RESERVE IS RECRUITING

Receiving Applications For Enrollment and Training to Commence Almost Immediately

Enrollment of volunteers for the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer reserve half company which is being formed here has already commenced. Asked what class of men he was receiving Lieut. Ponder, who has charge of the organization of the unit, said he was receiving applications for enrollment as seamen, engineers, telegraphists, electricians, ordnance artificers, motor mechanics, accountants, signalmen, buglers and cooks. The period of enrollment being for three years and the age limit 18 to 32.

**British Subjects**  
Applicants had to be British subjects resident in Canada, and willing to serve at sea or wherever required in time of emergency or when undergoing annual training.

The naval training, he said, would consist of from two to three weeks in H.M.C. ships or establishments at Esquimalt or Halifax and free passage to and from would be provided. Reservists may volunteer for longer periods but in addition to the annual training they are required to do at least 30 drills per year at the company headquarters. Pay and allowances whilst undergoing the annual training are the same as the Royal Canadian Navy.

**Temporary Quarters**  
Temporary quarters will be procured in the near future and pending the receipt of application forms from headquarters, intending applicants are requested to communicate by telephone at 772 or 781 giving address and the requisite form will be mailed with full instructions when received.

A naval service cutter with center board, complete with sails and suitable for rowing is already en route to Prince Rupert and training will commence almost immediately. When a sufficient number of men have been enrolled an active service naval petty officer instructor will be permanently located here.

This group is situated some five miles from the mouth of Hall Creek which flows into the lake and is some 4,000 feet up, being right on the edge of the timber line. The vein which carries gold values averaging about \$50 to the ton, can be traced for about two miles to the adjoining property of the Chiro Company who put in a concentrating mill some years ago.

**To Develop Property**  
The purchaser is J. M. Hoar of Seattle, who was in the district two months ago and is equipped to return in other two weeks to arrange for development work during the winter. It is expected that a concentrating mill will be put in and an airline to bring the ore down the mountain. The trail up to the creek will also have to be improved.

The purchase price is considered very satisfactory by the locators, who are proceeding with development work on their other properties in the same district.

### NEW KIND OF WHEAT LIKELY SUCCESSFUL

Marquis Is Now Beaten By Reward and Garnet For Early Ripening.

OTTAWA, Sept. 22. — The Central Experimental Farm here has completed distributing among 50 large western grain growers samples of two newly evolved wheat varieties, which promise to revolutionize the crop calendar and frustrate the devastating rust.

Branded "Reward" and "Garnet," both the new varieties are of exceptionally early maturity and ripen even before the Marquis, the earliest grade now grown commercially throughout the grain provinces.

Test plantings of these varieties at the experimental farm ripened before the rust season set in. Thus, although the new varieties are not considered rust-resisting, it is believed that if the promise of the tests materializes in commercial plantings, they will prove the long-sought means of frustrating the blight.
