THIEPVAL SAILS FOR ALEUTIAN ISLANDS

COMMUNISTS GLOAT OVER DISTURBED CONDITIONS OF THE WORLD TODAY

Thiepvai Sailed Today for Alaska, Aleutian Islands and the Orient

Is Making Preparations for the British Round the World Flight Which is to Call Here

VANCOUVER, March 1.—Loaded with supplies for distribution in Alaska and the Aleutian Islands and the Kamchatka peninsula for the use of the British airmen on their around the world flight in the early summer, H.M.C.S. Thiepvai sailed today on a six thousand mile voyage which will eventually take her to Yokohama. Aboard the vessel is Colonel Broome of the Royal Air Force who is in charge of the flight across the Pacific and trans-Canada portion of the air journey.

CRIMINAL WAS FROZEN DEATH

Escaped From Box Car and Nearly Killed Police Officer When Arrested

PORT ARTHUR, March 1.—Reports from Silver Mountain state that Peter Lonjack attempted to murder Sergeant V. Reay of the Ontario police whom he shot when the officer attempted to arrest him a week ago. He escaped from a box car and was later found dead, having been frozen to death in a deserted lumber camp thirteen miles from Silver Mountain.

It has been definitely announced that the airmen will make a stop here on their eastward flight if they get as far as this. No supplies are needed here, however, and there is nothing much for Colonel Broome to do, especially as he has available the information gathered by Lieut. Bissell of the American expedition, which is planning a flight in the opposite direction but following a somewhat similar route.

RIVER STEAMER STRUCK ROCK

Went Aground Near Canton on Trip From Hong Kong in South China

HONG KONG, March 1.—The British river steamer Hong Shan bound from Hong Kong to Canton with more than seven hundred passengers aboard struck a rock in a dense fog and went aground twelve miles from Canton. Many of the passengers have been taken off and a British warship is standing by to lend aid if necessary.

MANY KILLED IN EXPLOSION

Amanite Company Loses Storage Building and Hundred Are Injured

NEW BRUNSWICK, New Jersey, March 1.—Eight people are known to have been killed and twelve more are believed dead while about one hundred were injured in an explosion which destroyed the storage building of the Amanite Company on the property of the Nixon Nitration works near here.

GERMAN SHIPYARD WORKERS LOCKED OUT

Refused to Work Nine Hours Instead of Eight and Shipyards Close

KIEL, Germany, March 1.—Shipyards owners locked out the entire staff of 43,000 men here yesterday because they refused to work a nine hour day instead of eight.

SHIPPING AIDS ARE SUGGESTED

Capt. E. McCoskrie Submits List of Improvements to Facilitate Entering Harbor

The following list of suggestions for improvements in the way of aids to navigation for trans-Pacific shipping entering the harbor of Prince Rupert has been submitted by Capt. E. McCoskrie, shipping master and harbor pilot, to the Prince Rupert Board of Trade with the request that it use its influence towards having them carried out by the federal government:

1. To establish wireless to Triple Island lighthouse would be invaluable to keep in touch with pilotage boats, etc.
2. To place a light on the highest point of the Butterworth Rocks would be a great assistance to all mariners to obtain a fix of position on entering from Hecate Straits.
3. To remove the dangerous pinnacle rock in Alexander Patch which has only 10 feet of water over it at low water, and is in a straight line with all ships coming in or out to Brown Passage. During the calm weather of summer months this rock can be easily drilled and blasted to a depth of about eight fathoms.
4. Georgia Rock and Falcon Rocks could also be removed and would make the harbor approach more secure and afford good anchorage, etc.

B.C. MAN MAY BE ON COMMISSION

Premier Mackenzie King Promises Oliver to Give Matter Every Consideration

VICTORIA, March 1.—Premier Oliver was assured today in a telegram from Premier W. L. Mackenzie King that his request that a British Columbia man be appointed to the Board of Railway Commissioners would have all consideration from the Federal government when the question of making the appointment was considered. Commissioner Nantell, however, does not retire from the board until October of this year.

LOWER FREIGHT RATES ON B.C. CONSUMED GRAIN AS WELL AS EXPORTED

VICTORIA, March 1.—Our fight for lower freight rates includes reductions on grain to be consumed here as well as on grain for export. Premier Oliver said, in connection with numerous complaints against existing rates on grain shipped to British Columbia for consumption. The premier said consumers of grain in British Columbia were suffering from serious rate discrimination.

COOK WON IN SIXTH AGAINST GUS. SPALLA

BERLIN, March 1.—George Cook, Australian heavyweight, defeated Giuseppe Spalla in the sixth round. Giuseppe is a brother of Erminio Spalla.

LUDENDORFF IN WITNESS BOX

Denounces Marxism and Communism and Objects to Jews: Explains Aims

MUNICH, Mar. 1.—Ludendorff, one of the chief defendants in the trial of those held responsible for the Bavarian Putsch, in giving evidence yesterday at the trial, denounced Marxism and communism. He declared the Jews had no more right than the English or French to obtain authority in Germany. He admitted being a monarchist but considered the monarchist question insoluble at present.

VICTORIA, March 1.—The Young Liberals of Vancouver in a fast hockey game won their second victory in the playoff for the Pacific Coast championship, defeating the Shelly all star coast champions last night with a score of three to one. The final game will be played off in Vancouver next Wednesday when the Young Liberals meet Seattle.

CARLOW CANDIDATE ESQUIMALT RIDING VANCOUVER BANTAM SCORES A VICTORY

VICTORIA, March 1.—Frank Carlow, president of the Victoria Liberal Association has been chosen to contest the Esquimalt riding in the Liberal interests at the next election. It is understood that he will be opposed by the sitting member, R. H. Pooley.

Communitistic Leader sees Great Hope for future and Declares Japan on Verge of a Revolution

MOSCOW, March 1.—The removal of headquarters of the Third Internationale from Moscow to a central country with a greater percentage of industrialists after the first decisive victory over European bourgeoisie is advocated by Zinovieff, chairman of its executive. In reviewing the organization's accomplishments in Pravda, he says communitistic revolutionary theories are making great progress even in America, and Japan is on the verge of a revolution.

The Internationale has not changed its belief, he says, that revolution will march through Europe by way of Germany. He said the pre-historic war period of the communitistic internationale was ended. Now begins the real struggle for the overthrow of capitalism and the creation of an internationale federation soviet and socialistic republics.

SEEK CO-OPERATION BOARDS OF TRADE OF CITIES ON PRAIRIES

Local Board Will Communicate With Other Boards With View to United Action

At a meeting of the council of the board of trade held in the city hall yesterday it was decided to communicate with all the principal boards of trade on the prairies forwarding them a copy of the resolution passed by the Edmonton board and asking them to pass a similar one and also to take the matter up with their private members and with the premier, the finance minister, minister of public works and minister of trade and commerce. The resolution of the Edmonton board urged the government to provide facilities at this port for shipping grain as an alternative route with Vancouver.

WOMEN'S BILL CROWDED OUT

That May be the Fate of the Franchise Measure: Government Favorable

LONDON, March 1.—By passing the second reading of the bill giving women the right to vote at the age of 21 the House of Commons yesterday accepted the principle of the Adanson Bill. Formerly the age at which women could vote was 31.

Following the favorable vote on the measure the House declined to refer the bill to a committee of the whole House so its future depends upon whether the time will be spared from the essential business in the present session to put the bill through its further stages.

The bill was introduced by a private member and the government is not responsible for it. Further, a number of controversial changes are proposed in the existing law affecting municipal franchises and other matters.

Hon. J. R. Clynes, Lord Privy Seal and leader of the House of Commons, explained that the government was favorable to the principle of the measure and said that they would do whatever was possible for it.

P.G.E. PAPERS BEFORE PUBLIC

Provincial Party Lawyers And Auditors are Examining Everything Looking For Irregularities

VICTORIA, March 1.—Auditors and lawyers representing the Provincial Party started an exhaustive examination of the books and documents of the provincial department of railways yesterday in preparation for the re-opening of the Royal Commission on Pacific Great Eastern Railway affairs. The production of all estimates and costs in the construction of the railway is requested by the Provincial Party representatives and these will be laid before them.

FRENCH FIGHT IN PARLIAMENT

Blows and Kicks Exchanged During Turbulent Scene in Chamber of Deputies

PARIS, March 1.—Blows and kicks were exchanged in a turbulent session of the Chamber of Deputies yesterday which ended only after the suspension of the session and the forcible expulsion of the belligerents. The trouble occurred between the socialist groups and the royalists and members of the right.

SPENDS LARGE SUM AT ANYOX

Community League Provided Sports and Entertainments at Cost of \$10,000

MUCH CASH ON HAND

Annual Meeting Hears Reports and Elects Officers for Coming Year

ANYOX, March 1. — The Community League held its annual meeting in Recreation Hall Wednesday night, February 27, with President Harper in the chair. The secretary presented a report covering the activities of the league for 1923, and explained in detail, also a balance sheet showing the financial condition of the organization as at the end of December 31. It was shown that after paying some \$10,000 for general activities during the year, which included sports, entertainments and community service, the league had sufficient cash on hand to pay all existing liabilities and still have a balance in the bank in excess of \$3,000; this apart from equipment, which had an appraised value of \$15,656.82.

For the ensuing year, it was pointed out, a considerable sum of money would be required for alterations to the tennis courts, improvements in connection with children's playgrounds and work on the ball grounds. All branches of the league's activities were in a healthy condition, the library being maintained at a high standard, new books and periodicals being constantly added, while the gymnasium was in continuous use throughout the day and evening. The report was received and filed.

Good Work of Council

The secretary took occasion to mention the good work accomplished for the benefit of the citizens of Anyox by the members of the retiring council, who were entitled to the thanks of the entire community, in the interest of whom they had labored so unselfishly. R. H. Manzer moved a vote of thanks to the members of the council for their excellent service while in office. Nominations were then in order and some thirty names were submitted, about twenty agreeing to stand.

These being some mention of the secretary's duties, Dr. Harper outlined a few of the things done by the secretary, who was accorded a vote of thanks by the meeting for services rendered. After some discussion of various matters, the meeting adjourned.

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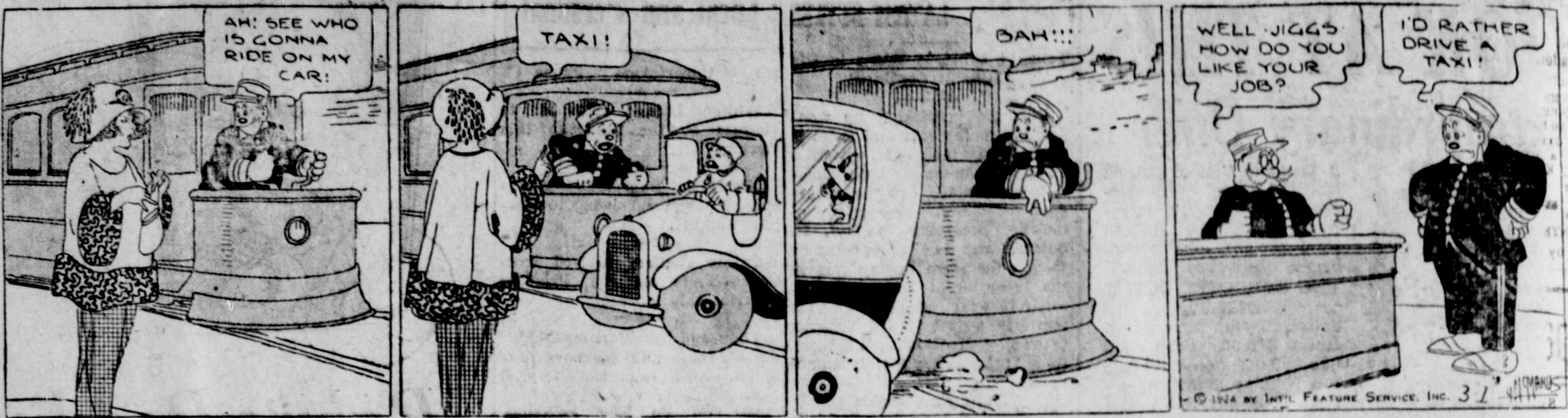

MANY ENTRIES IN DOG DERBY

Several New Teams to Take Part on Tuesday Week

THE PAS, Man., March 4.—(By Canadian Press).—The dawn of a new month finds the mushers of the North Country eagerly awaiting the firing of the starter's gun which eleven days hence will send more than one hundred huskies, comprising probably eleven racing outfits, away on their annual two hundred mile mush through deep-covered snow trails in competition for the world's dog racing championship—the The Pas Dog Derby.

Probably never before in the history of the race, which has now become a classic of its kind, has such keen interest been manifested in the event. There is a possibility that in Manitoba teams will have competition from entries of Minneapolis and St. Paul when the outfits are started in the long test of endurance on March 11.

Two months ahead of "Derby Day," as it has become known in the North, owners, drivers, and trainers, commenced the daily working out of their teams, dashing secretly over the long course and taking good care to conceal the time made, and they have been training strenuously ever since. The record for the event was made in 1923 by Charles B. Morgan's team of The Pas, Man., driven by William Grayson. By winning last year's race for the third successive year, Morgan won permanent possession of the Burns' trophy in 26 hours, 52 minutes.

Several new teams, made up of young and speedy dogs, are expected to start a week from next Tuesday in an effort to gain a leg on the new Goynes-Rice Memorial trophy, which was presented to The Pas Dog Derby Association for annual competition by A. I. Maltes, of The Pas. The trophy perpetuates the memory of the late Grant Rice, a local newspaperman, who worked out the details for the first race in 1915, and Walter Goynes, winner of the 1920 race, who perfected the plans for the initial contest. Goynes was drowned in Moose Lake, Man., when he went through the ice with his dogs a couple of years ago.

The admiral of the Mosquito fleet reports that rough weather has again been experienced on the deep sea fishing grounds, which has proved to be a drawback to fishing and has in consequence reacted upon the total of halibut Jares landed at this port during the past week. In addition the heavy arrivals of last week has caused both the Canadian and American boats to get "bunched." The light landings have jumped prices on the Fish Exchange considerably over those prevailing last week. The total landings for Monday and Tuesday amounted to 88,000 pounds while on Wednesday only two American schooners arrived with 9,000 pounds of halibut between them, the sale being held over until Thursday. However, the lull in landings has permitted those engaged in the fish business to do various repair work to machinery and other gear and to get their breath—so to speak—for the next periodical push.

Many halibut boats of the home fleet, which have been overhauling for the past few months, have left port this week. These departures practically bring the home fishing fleet up to its full complement, and will result in a considerable increase to future Canadian arrivals. The new 60 foot Doreen schooner, now on the dry dock completing engine installation, will be leaving for the high spots early this month. This addition to the Canadian fleet will greatly enhance future landings.

The real Mosquito fleet is getting licked into shape and the little fellows are rapidly taking on an active service appearance. A portion of the Mosquito fleet is at Seal Cove, while Bone Yard Creek and the ways around Cow Bay are filled to capacity with this class of craft, which are undergoing necessary overhauls prior to receipt of mobilization orders from the old man—meaning the admiral.

Several native fur arrivals are reported this week from the Gardner Canal and Wark Canal districts. Mink and marten predominated in the catches which found a ready local market. According to local fur buyers the skins arriving this season are of fine quality.

Yacht Club Doings

The first of spring-like weather on Sunday morning brought out pleasure boat owners in great force and the local Yacht club premises took on quite a midsummer atmosphere. A bunch of members were down at the float at an early hour looking to batteries, coils, spark plugs and other equipment. Much physical exercise was enjoyed by the turning of disused flywheels and many members doubtless suffered with sore shoulders and aching muscles as a consequence. However, the majority of the owners

got the various gadgets functioning and hit out on trial trips. Grabbing and flounder fishing across the harbor was indulged in by several until late in the afternoon.

Jimmy's Fine Craft

The good ship Viner, Capt. Jimmy Thomas, is the latest addition to the local commercial fleet. Jimmy steamed into port from Vancouver on the bridge of his new craft at 8 o'clock on Wednesday night having traveled the distance in 58 hours actual running time. Bob Frizell accompanied the skipper on his trip north. The Viner is a fine, sturdy craft measuring 52 feet long by a 14 foot 7 inch beam and derives a healthy speed of 8 knots per hour from a 40 horse power Standard engine. Her carrying capacity is 20 tons. The Viner was formerly engaged in the "rum running" game between Vancouver and San Francisco but is now of obsolete tonnage. In the pilot house are two bunks and in the pilot house addition is sleeping accommodation for three. The galley is situated in the fore'sle. Bad weather was encountered on the homeward trip, the voyage across Milbank Sound being particularly dirty. The Viner will be operated by skipper Thomas in the fish packing business for the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.

Budding Skippers

Messrs. Tattersall, Mackay and associates, members of the junior fleet, have purchased the old Kilowatt hull from the city and are now endeavoring to rig up a speed enter at Seal Cove. The Kilowatt was formerly in use by the city electrical department on Shawatians lake. The boys are rustling up engine parts and other mechanical requirements with which they intend to build something that will save man power. To date they have met with unqualified success and are already the proud-possessors of a spark plug and a piece of copper wire. A kindly disposed person has promised to give the boys a cracked flywheel and a useless carburetor. When completed the machine will be capable of doing nothing, nohow and will take them nowhere at anytime so that a very enjoyable time will be spent by all during the long summer evenings. It is said the mechanical staff and executive of the newly acquired craft will draw lots as to who shall be skipper, first mate and purser. Those not drawing a lucky number will do strictly as they are told.

The schooner Annie Tuck, Capt. Joe Babcock, came off the dry dock early in the week after having repairs made to the hatch and deck. Annie was recently in a bad blow and suffered somewhat from the effects. The schooner cleared for the high spots on Thursday afternoon.

New Gee Gee Arrives

Glen Hebb, master of the horses for the Albert-McCaffery interests is happy once again. A fine new horse arrived on the steamer Princess Beatrice to take the place of the late lamented Nigger. According to eye witnesses the horse was landed with much difficulty and did not take very kindly to the new surroundings. Doc Clapper-ton, who took a prominent part in getting the quadruped on to terra firma, said he nearly got more kick out of the new horse than some men would get out of a new distillery. Wire hawsers were used as headropes but even they failed to hold the kicker securely. Glen decided that his new charge needed a severe schooling and to this end has placed it in the Lindsay college for unruly horses for at least a full term.

Boats of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s fleet have been busily occupied during the week fishing for herring in the harbor. A considerable quantity

has been obtained.

The Canadian schooner Bingo, Capt. Axel Anderson, made an endeavor to clear for the deep sea fishing grounds on Tuesday last but the gale outside the harbor forced him to return. However, the Bingo eventually cleared port on her initial trip of the season.

Inez H's New Engine

The fishing schooner Inez H., owned and operated by the Ness Brothers, recently returned from Vancouver after having a 40 horse power Standard Semi-Diesel engine installed. Final touches to gear, etc., are now being done aboard and the boys will in all probability clear for the high spots early in the coming week.

The Canadian schooner Hippo and the logging boat Ruby Mae, the latter skippered by ex-Alderman Currie, are on the McLean ways for general overhaul.

The power boat Taplow, of Port Simpson, is at the dry dock for the installation of a new 12-15 horse power Vivian engine. Repairs are also being done to the pilot house.

The schooner Swing, Capt. Eric Rosang, is being overhauled preparatory to a dash to the high spots.

The Canadian schooner Koyosu returned to port over last week end under the command of Capt. Dave Ritchie, her new owner and skipper. According to report everything worked fine and Dave is tickled with his new net.

The schooner Cape Swain was also in the storm and for that reason transferred her fare to the Hanaco owing to the lightness of the catch.
