LONDON, March 15-An earth tremor of sufficient violence to overturn light furniture accompanied by a rumbling noise startled the villagers of Haddenham, Cambridgeshire, this morning. Seismologists here have no record of the movement.

WASHINGTON, March 15 .- An earthquake was recorded here early this morning. It was rather pronounced and is estimated to have been at a distance of 5,900 miles.

VICTORIA, March 15 .- A severe earthquake was recorded at Gonzales Hill Observatory early this morning. The shock continued for two hours. The centre was estimated to be 4,000 miles away in the vicinity of Japan, South Kamchatka or in the Panama vicinity.




