EDITORIAL

UNFORTUNATE WIRE OF MAYOR NEWTON

The Daily News does not wish to take issue with Mayor Newton on the question of the establishment of a grain elevator here. This paper is just as keen as His Worship is that grain shipping facilities should be established at the port and, for the past year or more, we have been just as insistent and, we believe, effective in our demands as he has been. However, the telegram of protest sent by the mayor to Ottawa yesterday and which is published today was both untimely and ill-advised.

It is the usual practice, we believe, to make votes for public works in a successive manner. This is done so that the estimates at any one time may be kept down to a reasonable level. Having made the decision to build an elevator at Prince Rupert, it is no doubt the intention of the government to get the project under way and finished as soon as possible. To ensure such being done, it is reasonable to believe that the estimate of \$150,000 was made at a time when a larger estimate might possibly have been rejected, as it is well known the present rule at Ottawa is to limit necessary expenditures at any one time as far as possible.

It would be unfortunate if an unwarranted faux-pas at this time should kill the whole undertaking. If the mayor had known or chose to admit, if he had known, the difficulties that have had to be so carefully managed to impress the advisability and necessity of getting a definite start made on an elevator here, he might not have been quite so quick to make a protest when a step has been taken in the right direction.

In the meantime, the News feels justified in accepting what has been offered with the intention, however, of fighting to the last ditch if the necessity arises (and we do not think it will) to fight to have the money voted to complete the elevator. Such action as the mayor has taken we believe is dangerous. This view is concurred in by the city council and the board of trade.

PRINCE SAILS ON AUGUST 25

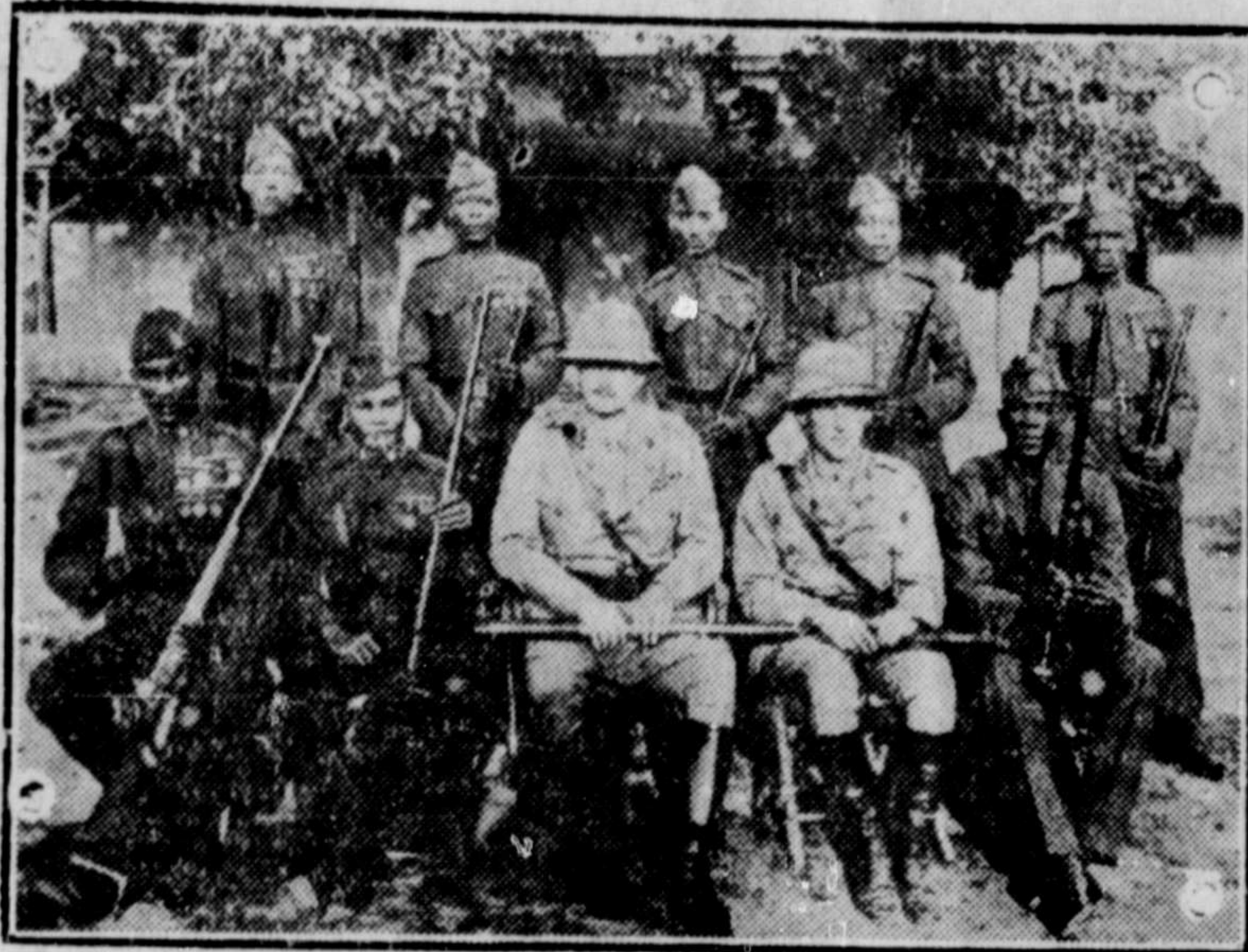
Will Embark For Canada, With Four or Five Friends, as Ordinary Passenger

No special arrangements are being made for the trip, the Prince's request being that he travel as nothing more or less than a first class passenger.

VANCOUVER ROWING CREW AT OLYMPIAD

Had Stiff Work-out Yesterday and Will Draw For Their Competitors Today

PARIS, July 10.—The Vancouver four-oared rowing crew entered the Olympic events with a stiff work-out yesterday afternoon. They draw today to decide their position in the competition on July 15 in which they will oppose eight other crews.



The little republic of Haiti in the West Indies will be represented in the Olympic games by its crack rifle team, and Haiti is pulling strongly for its sole representatives in France.

Decision is Reached That Arbitration is Best Means to Apply

PARIS, July 10.—Premier Macdonald of Great Britain and Premier Herriot of France decided yesterday upon arbitration as a way out of their difficulties with regard to the application of the Dawes' plan for reparations payment.

Premier Macdonald conceded to Premier Herriot that the reparations commission should not be robbed of its right to say when Germany was in default on that plan. Herriot agreed in exchange to give up France's preponderance of votes in the commission.

Herriot also consented to an American sitting with the commission and voting on the question of whether Germany was failing to carry out her obligations.

Premier's Statement

LONDON, July 10.—Premier Macdonald declared today in the House of Commons that he had made his trip to Paris to remove an unfortunate situation which threatened to destroy the work that had made possible the holding in London on July 16 of an inter-Allied conference on the Dawes' report. He said that the British Government's view was that the report should be put into operation without delay. Great satisfaction is expressed today throughout British officialdom over the results of Premier Macdonald's visit to Paris.

Two New Field Records are Hung up by Nurmi, Great Finn, Winner of Important Races at Olympiad

COLOMBES, France, July 10.—Paavo Nurmi, the great Finn, crowned himself as a double Olympic winner and one of the greatest distance winners of all times today when, two hours after winning the 1,500 metre race in Olympic record time, he won a thrilling victory in the 5,000 metre event from his fellow countryman, Ritola, setting another Olympic and world's record. Nurmi's time in the 5,000 metre race was 14 minutes and 31.3-5 seconds, bettering the previous Olympic record by more than five seconds and the world's record, made by himself in Sweden in 1922, of 14 minutes and 35.3-10 seconds. His time for the 1,500 metre event was 53.3-5 seconds, three seconds faster than the previous record. United States and Finland are leaders in points so far, the former having 157 and the latter 103.

CHARLES BRYAN NOMINATED FOR VICE-PRESIDENT

NEW YORK, July 10.—Charles W. Bryan, governor of Nebraska and brother of William Jennings Bryan, was nominated for vice-president by the Democratic National Convention early this morning. There was only one ballot after which the convention adjourned sine die.

CANUCKS WIN NINTH GAME

Defeated Team Representing South Australia by Score of Three to Nil

ADELAIDE, July 10.—The touring Canadian football team this afternoon defeated a team representing South Australia by a score of three goals to nil. The team work of the Canadians was brilliant and especially good was their defence.

The Canucks are being royally entertained and were the guests of the Lord Mayor at a civic reception. On Saturday they will play the final test match of their tour here. Their record to date is nine games won, five lost, and six drawn.

VANCOUVER HAS ANOTHER FIRE

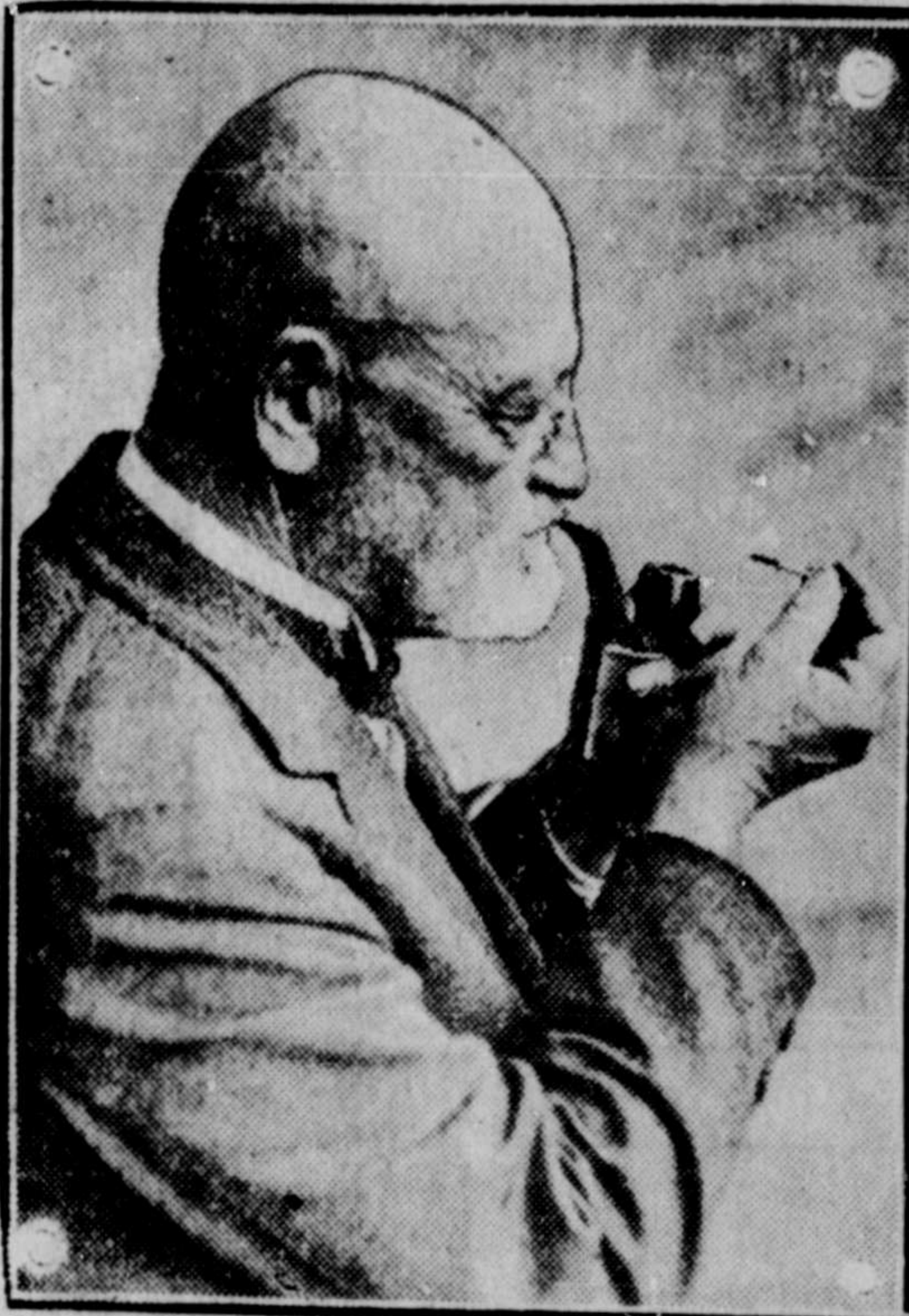
McAllister Mill and International Junk Co. Building Destroyed

LONDON, July 10.—The Conservatives retained their hold on Lewes division of East Sussex in the parliamentary by-election made necessary by the recent appointment of Lieut.-Col. Campion to be governor-general of West Australia. The vote was: Capt. Beamish, Conservative, 9,584; Capt. Hall, Labor, 6,412; Howard Williams, Liberal, 2,718.

Speedy Counter Action Follows Messages Sent East by Mayor Newton

A storm of protest resulting in the emergent calling of special meetings of the city council and the executive of the Prince Rupert board of trade was raised last night when it was learned that Mayor Newton had sent telegrams to Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, premier of Canada; Fred Stork, M.P., and Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, charging them with failure in carrying out their promises in having placed in the supplementary estimates the sum of only \$150,000 to commence the construction of a terminal grain elevator here. The import of the mayor's message was repudiated in no uncertain terms by both bodies and messages deploring its sending were immediately sent to Mr. Mackenzie King, Mr. Stork and Sir Henry Thornton.

In addition to these telegrams were also sent by the Board of Trade to Mr. Mackenzie King and Mr. Stork thanking them for their success in having the item included in the estimates.

Council Meeting

The special meeting of the council was held in the mayor's office and His Worship and all the aldermen with the exception of Ald. Exitt were present. Unsuccessful efforts were made to have the mayor reconsider his action and withdraw the message but these were unavailing. As a last resort, Ald. Macdonald and Ald. Casey were constituted a committee after the meeting to further interview the mayor with a view to having him, at least, postpone his action. Despite these efforts, however, his telegram was sent. Following it up the council, on motion of Ald. Collart, seconded by Ald. McMorrie, despatched the following: "With reference to the telegram sent tonight by Mayor Newton regarding the grain elevator at this port, the city council has gone on record as being unanimously opposed to its sending."

The council was called together by Ald. Collart immediately on being advised that the mayor's wire had been sent.

Board of Trade

The council of the Board of Trade, at a brief session in the board office attended by members of the city council and by President S. J. McLeod, unanimously

caused the following telegrams to be sent on motion of E. C. Gibbons and C. H. Orme: To Premier King and Fred Stork, M.P. "The Prince Rupert Board of Trade extends to you and the government its hearty thanks for the successful placing of an amount in the estimates for the terminal grain elevator here." To Premier King, Fred Stork and Sir Henry Thornton: "The Prince Rupert Board of Trade strongly deplors the personal action of Mayor Newton in his telegram of criticism re terminal grain elevator. It is absolutely contrary to the general feeling of the citizens."

DAVIS PLEASES GREAT BRITAIN

Satisfaction Expressed at Choice of Democrats For U.S. Presidency

MAYOR'S WIRE IN PROTEST AT ELEVATOR VOTE

Says Citizens are Disappointed and Officials Absolutely Failed

The following was the telegram sent last night by Mayor Newton to Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, prime minister; Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, and Fred Stork, M.P.:

"Very great disappointment over the small appropriation for grain elevator. It is viewed as meaning there will be no elevator here for year and a half at earliest. Citizens led to believe million would have been placed in estimates to complete elevator this year. Consequently strong feeling existing both you and Sir Henry Thornton have absolutely failed in your promises to build up this port. Couldn't you yet at this session secure million appropriation for elevator and award Rupert-Alaska ship contract to local dry dock. We would be pleased if you could.

MAYOR NEWTON GIVEN REPLY

Sir Henry Thornton Expresses Surprise at Criticism Against Railway For Elevator Vote

Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, wired to S. J. McLeod, president of the Prince Rupert board of trade, today as follows:

"I am much obliged for your message of July 10. I have telegraphed the mayor as follows: "I do not understand why you should express criticism of the Canadian National Railways in the matter of the construction of a grain elevator at Prince Rupert. The railways have nothing whatever to do with the matter. It is one that is entirely under the control of the government to whom I have already expressed a favorable recommendation as to the construction of an elevator at your port."

OLIVER STILL LIBERAL CHIEF

Cabinet Determined to Retain Him and Seat Will be Fought After July 14

VICTORIA, July 10.—Liberals all over the province seem to be a unit behind Premier Oliver and will not hear of his retirement. The veteran politician is 68 years of age but has many years of service ahead of him. The Premier would not be averse to returning to private life, but there is no outstanding man to succeed him. Every one of his cabinet is determined that he shall remain premier, so that after the counting of the absentee ballots on July 14, it is expected that an early announcement will be made regarding the Premier's plans. A seat will be probably selected for him from the four or five which have been gladly offered by successful Liberal members elect.

Usk Development Will Benefit District.

The resumption of mining and milling operations at Usk will make that a busy place once again and, if the project for a pulp mill as announced yesterday, goes through it will become one of the most important places along the line of the Canadian National Railways between here and Edmonton. People who have interests at Usk, in view of recent developments, are very hopeful of the future. They say that Usk is the logical place for a pulp and paper mill.

White Prince Rupert people would like to see, such a plant here, the next best thing will be to have one as close as Usk. The city will benefit considerably from it. Business will be increased generally and the railway will get more goods to haul.

It is stated by recent arrivals from the Islands that a pulp mill is being planned for Buckley Bay but, at the time of writing, it was impossible to get anything definite on this.

Peculiarity Of Human Nature.

Human nature and the power of the big whip were amply demonstrated in the course of the Democratic presidential nomination balloting which ended yesterday at New York. After fighting bitterly for days and developing factional feeling that equalled if not exceeded the heat of the ultimate battle between Democrats and Republicans, in a very short time, after the movement in that direction started, things were smoothed over and everybody rushed to make the choice unanimous. Davis did not, of course, figure in the heat of the battle that waged for nearly ten days and nobody was surprised at the outcome. One cannot help but wonder, however, why the party managers could not have brought about an agreement sooner than they did. The effect on the body politic at large must have been anything but beneficial to the interests of the party concerned. However, it is an American faculty and, in a lesser degree Canadian, to be able to bury feelings rapidly and work up enthusiasm in another direction.

Chances Of Settlement In Britain Are Good.

Prospects for a settlement of the reparations question in Europe look better now than they have since the end of the war and the signing of the Treaty of Versailles. Germany seems to be favorable to accepting the terms of the Dawes' report and yesterday the welcome news came from the mouth of Premier Macdonald, following his conference with Premier Herriot, that "full and successful accord" had been reached between France and Great Britain. Italy, Belgium and the other less important Allied powers may be expected to fall in line and in any case they have not been delaying the settlement of late for the chief differences have lain between Britain and France. Subject of course to the proposals of the premiers being ratified by the representatives of the people, it really looks as if a solution was to be reached out of an exceedingly vexed problem of long standing.

FINE YACHT VISITS PORT

Hal Roach, Movie Director, and Party Were Here Over-Night

The palatial American yacht Gypsy, Capt. Dickason, owned by Hal Roach, the well known motion picture producer of Culver City near Los Angeles, put into port at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon and moored at the Prince Rupert Boathouse dock. On board the yacht, which is making a leisurely tour of the Pacific coast, were Mr. and Mrs. Hal Roach, Mr. and Mrs. D. Whitney and J. Amiston. The Gypsy called at Seattle, Vancouver, Butedale and Swanson Bay on her way up the coast. Considerable wet weather was met with on the trip although no particularly rough seas were encountered. All the travelling is being done in the daytime in order that the scenery may be taken in.

The yacht is a masterpiece of comfort and elegance. 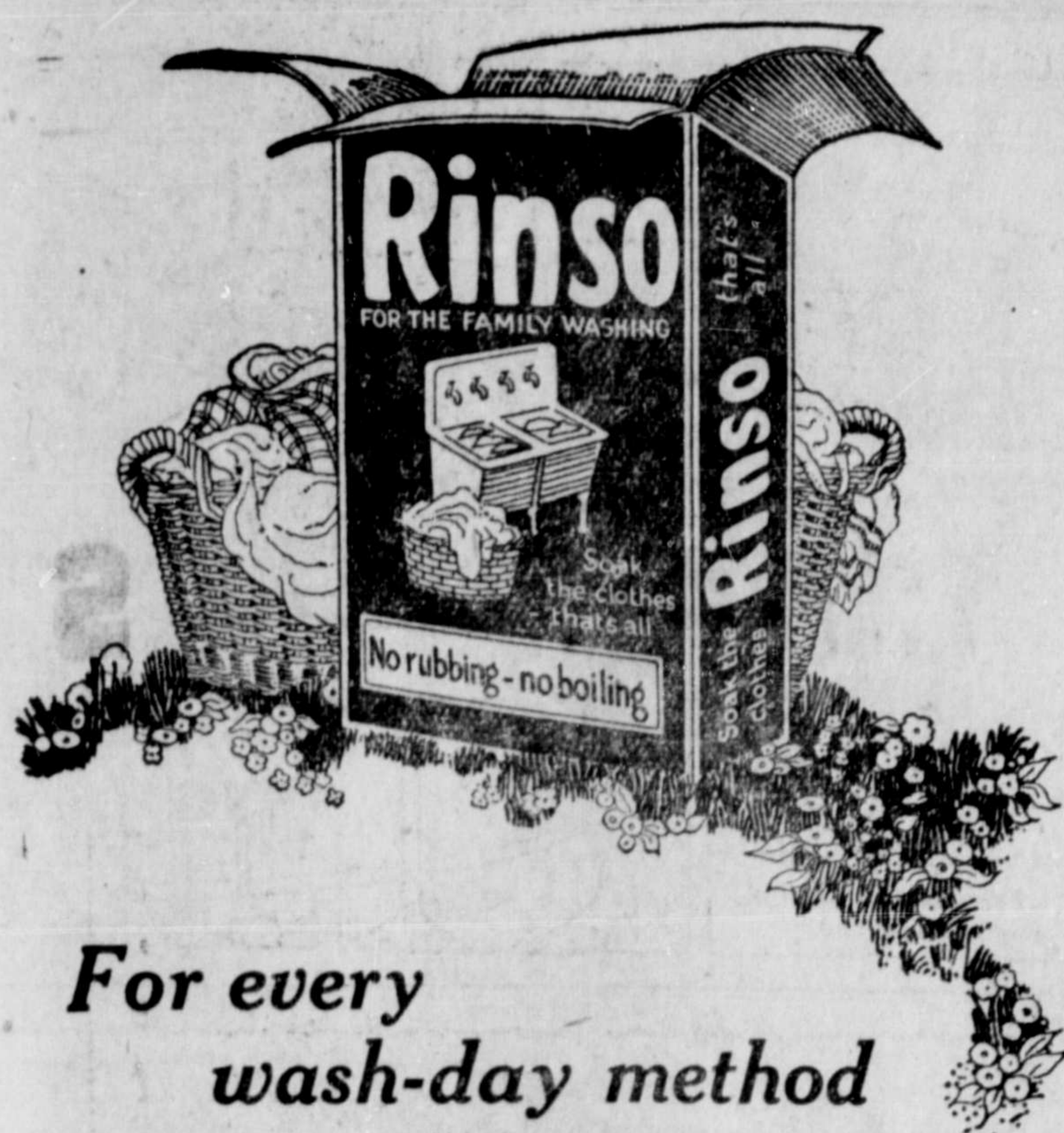

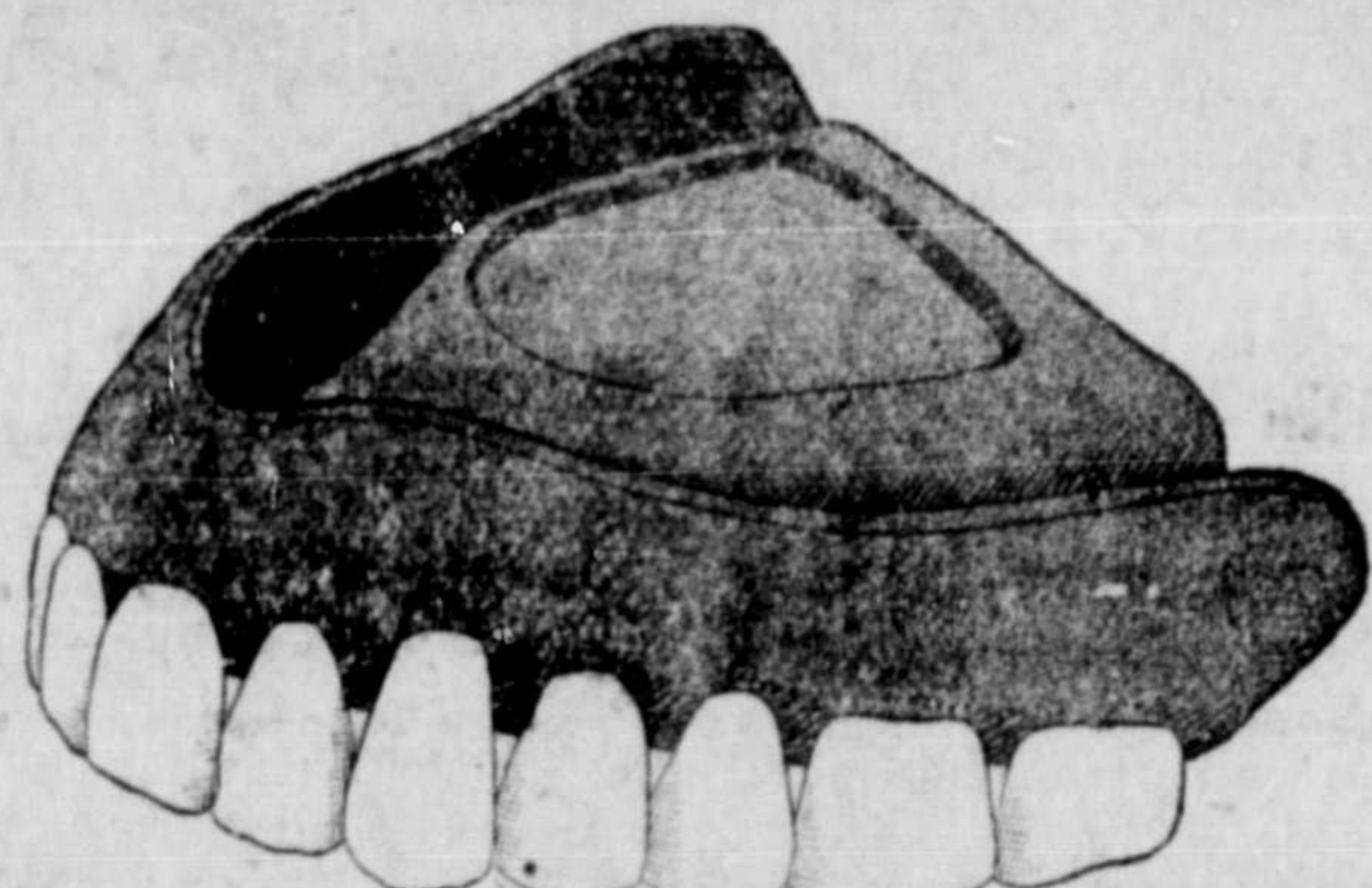

Here and There

In response to the appeal of the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, Que., for \$600,000, to meet present needs, the Canadian Pacific Railway has supported the plea by subscribing \$15,000 to the fund.

Canada will soon be the mecca of many moving picture directors, according to Herbert Brenon, producer for Thomas Meighan, who recently arrived at Banff to film the big outdoor scenes for James Oliver Curwood's "The Alaskan."

The fish catch of the world approximates \$1,000,000,000 a year in its cost to the consumer, of which \$780,000,000, goes to those who harvest it, statistics furnished by the United States Fish Commission declare.

The value of the tourist traffic to Canada is proved by figures supplied by the Parks Department of the Dominion Government, which show that the enormous sum of \$136,000,000 was spent by tourists in this country in 1923. This represents the Dominion's fourth largest source of foreign cash income.

On her arrival at Quebec, June 14, the Canadian Pacific steamship "Empress of France" broke the record for the fastest time made between that port and Southampton, England, from which she sailed, having maintained an average speed of over 19 knots. This vessel also holds the record for the run between Quebec and Liverpool.

Arrangements for the Pageant of Empire, to be held at the British Empire Exhibition, July 21-August 30, are now rapidly completing. Episodes showing the history of Canada and the other Dominions as well as of the Mother Country from the earliest times to the present day are being organized with the assistance of prominent residents of the Dominion now in London.

Hon. J. E. Perrault, Minister of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries for the Province of Quebec, on his return from a recent extensive trip to the Temiscaming district of that province, stated that there were over 2,000 prospectors exploring the gold-fields of Quebec and at least a million dollars would be expended in development work in the region during the course of the season.

According to figures prepared by the freight department of the Canadian Pacific Railway, the export grain movement via Vancouver reached a total of 48,971,930 bushels on May 31, 1924, compared with a total of 17,357,715 bushels as on May 31, 1923. In each instance the figures cover the crop year commencing September 1st. The increase is therefore 31,584,215 bushels or 181.5 per cent.

Enthusiastic celebrations took place at Vancouver and Victoria, B.C., when the special service squadron of the Royal Navy, headed by H.M.S. Hood, the largest warship in the world and flagship of the squadron, visited those places recently. The squadron is expected on the Atlantic seaboard in August, when efforts will be made by Canadians on that coast to outdo the Pacific cities in the warmth of the welcome they extend. The anticipations are that thousands of visitors will gather at Quebec and elsewhere to demonstrate their affection for the officers and men of the fleet.

"You may say that Canada is becoming one and more interesting to Englishmen and before long additional English capital will be used here in the development of industries. I am very optimistic and I believe that we are now progressing towards an era of unprecedented prosperity. What we need more than all now is the immigration of good men who will become an asset to this country," declared Sir John Aird, President of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, on his return from Europe recently aboard the Canadian Pacific steamship "Empress of France."

HOPE TO SCALE MOUNT GEIKIE

Party of Mountain Climbers Left Jasper Park Lodge Yesterday

WINNIPEG, Man., July 10.—Hopeful of claiming for Canada the honor of being the first to scale the hitherto unconquered heights of Mount Geikie, 10,854 feet in height and one of the greatest peaks in Jasper National park, a party composed of Cyril G. Wates of Edmonton, M. D. Geddes of Toronto and Val E. Fynn of St. Louis left Jasper Park Lodge yesterday to make a third attempt at this climb. With the party is A. F. Slack, photographer at Jasper Park Lodge and Tommy Barford, seventeen year old Edmonton scout who will act as camp helper.

This is Cyril Wates third attempt on Mount Geikie, twice before, when within an ace of reaching the peak with Dr. Bulyea of Edmonton, he has been compelled to give up, though each time determined to return and conquer. This year professional duties prevent Dr. Bulyea from attempting the climb.

Mr. Geddes is a member of the Alpine Club of Canada and an enthusiastic climber. Mr. Fynn has had many years experience in climbing in different parts of the world and all are hopeful of success in their present attempt. The party are expected to stay in the Mount Geikie region for about two weeks, giving them time to make four attempts, if they succeed earlier they will cross the Geikie Valley to Ice Fall lake and attempt to scale Mount Simon, another hitherto unclimbed peak 11,000 feet in altitude. Later they will come out to Mount Robson to take part in the Alpine Club camp there.

OF INTEREST TO ANGLERS

Dominion Fisheries Issues Statement Setting Out Regulations and Suggestions

One of the principal attractions of this country is undoubtedly the facilities for sport and angling is one of the best in this district according to a statement issued by the local Dominion Fisheries office.

Some of the areas of water where trout may be found in abundance are difficult of access and it may be that the more easy of access the waters are the more intensively they are fished.

In order to preserve these areas for sport, it is advisable that every angler should live closely up to the regulations, and it is possible that the regulations are violated chiefly through ignorance and the following extracts from the Dominion Regulations affecting angling in Northern British Columbia will doubtless be of value:

Angling
Definition—"Angling" shall mean the taking of fish with hook and line held in the hand, or hook, line and rod, the latter held in the hand but shall not include set lines tied to a boat, or jigging.

(a)—In angling no one shall use more than one rod with one

line attached thereto, or one line held in the hand; and except under the provisions of section 29 of these Regulations, no one shall fish for, catch or kill, any steelhead, or cutthroat, rainbow or dolly varden trout or trout of any kind, in non-tidal waters otherwise than by angling.

(b)—No one shall fish for, catch or kill, on one day, by angling or trolling, or by both means, more than twenty-five cutthroat, rainbow or dolly varden trout, salmon trout or rocky mountain white fish, or of the different species named than will in the aggregate amount to more than twenty-five fish.

Restrictions
Sub-Sec. 1.—In the waters of the mainland east of the 121st meridian and in that portion of the mainland lying north of a line running due east and west through the town of Clinton, no one shall fish for, catch or kill trout of any kind from November 15 in each year to March 31 following, both days inclusive.

Sub-Sec. 2—(a) No trout of any kind under eight inches in length shall be taken from the water and if caught shall immediately be returned to the water alive and uninjured.

(b) No trout under three pounds in weight shall be bought, sold or exposed for sale in the Province of British Columbia, nor shall any trout be bought, sold or exposed for sale in British Columbia during the close season provided therefore.

Fishing for trout through the ice in any of the lakes or streams in British Columbia is prohibited.

Section 39.—The fry of food fishes shall not be at any time destroyed.

Lakelse District
The body of water known as that portion of Scallabuehan, Salmon and Williams Creeks, emptying into Lakelse Lake, Skeena River District, Province of British Columbia, lying within two hundred yards of the mouths thereof, and those portions of Lakelse Lake extending a similar distance from the mouths of the above mentioned creeks has been set apart for the propagation of fish from July 16 to September 30 in each year, both days inclusive.

Some Suggestions
If undersized fish are caught, never grasp them while the hand is dry; but better far, do not take them out of the water.

When these small fish seize a hook, it is usually a very simple matter to slip the hand down the line to the hook without touching the fish at all, and it is usually quite easy to release the fish without even taking hold of it because it is only on very rare occasions that the hook has penetrated to any depth, and certainly seldom over the barb.

If only undersized fish are being caught in any particular part, a true angler would leave that area.

Do not endeavor to take all the fish in the stream in one day—it might be that you will wish to spend another day on these waters.

Every angler is a true sportsman, and no sportsman will take risks with fire. When leaving camp make doubly sure your fire is out. Remember: "No forests, no fish."

PREPARE ROUTE YANKEE FLYERS

American Advance Agents Have Started Their Work in the North Atlantic

LONDON, July 10.—With the departure from London to Copenhagen of Lieut. L. D. Schulze, preparations for the American round the world flight in the British Isles reached completion this week.

Lieutenant Schulze will go to Denmark to load a small trading vessel with gasoline, oil and other supplies for the Greenland base of Angmagssalik. The supplies include a knock down raft, with which fuel will be floated to the planes when the aviators alight on the water off Greenland, where he will establish an anchorage.

Lieutenant Schulze will keep a trading vessel off Greenland, maintaining communication by the ship's wireless with the meteorological office in London, sending weather reports to Lieutenant C. E. Crumrine in Iceland.

Lieutenant Crumrine, who is now in Iceland, will store supplies at Hofnufnarfjord on the east coast and Reykjavik on the west coast, keeping in cable and wireless communication with meteorologists in London, who at a conference just held with the American air offices here promised to supply weather reports for the flight over the sea between the Orkney Islands and Iceland while the fliers await favorable climatic conditions at Kirkwall in the Orkneys.

RICE HAY IS GOOD FOR ARMY HORSES

MANILA, July 8.—The United States army within the last year has purchased 8,000,000 pounds of rice hay, which has been found satisfactory as fodder for horses and mules. After July first the commissary expects to enter into contracts for about 10,000,000 pounds of this hay and it is hoped to encourage farmers to produce the entire quantity of hay used by the army in the Philippines.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 3,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

PURCHASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

HOMESITE LEASES
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

LUMBER SHIPMENTS AT VICTORIA LIGHT

VICTORIA, July 10.—Lumber shipments for the month of June from the port of Victoria show a distinct decrease, falling off from the figures of the preceding months. This is ascribed, principally to the closing of the Japanese market. Figures compiled at the local customs show the following exports: 593,173 feet of lumber; 481,500 pieces of fir laths; 575 bundles of doors and 730 cords of pulpwood.
