## VANCOUVER LAWYER SKIPS FROM STATES

### LOCAL CHURCH CARRIED FROM SILLS BY FORCE OF GALE ON SATURDAY

#### Anderson Skips Bail and Arrived Vancouver Other Bail is Doubled

VANCOUVER, Dec. 1.—F. L. Anderson, the Vancouver lawyer, who was arrested in San Francisco in connection with the steamer Quadra seizure, returned to Vancouver Saturday without permission of the United States authorities but declared he intended to return to San Francisco for the trial of his case in January. He was released on bail of ten thousand dollars but denied permission of the court to leave its jurisdiction.

When it was learned that Anderson had returned to Vancouver District Attorney Sterling intimated in San Francisco that he would take steps to secure forfeiture of the bond.

"I expect nothing else than an attempt to forfeit my bail," said Anderson, when shown the report. "The action of the United States authorities along this line will simply be in keeping with the way they treated me from the time of my arrival at San Francisco."

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 1.—The district court forfeited the ten thousand dollars bail put up by F. L. Anderson. Anderson's leaving without permission of the court is "but another illustration of the cynical disregard of the laws of the United States by the defendant said Judge Partridge. He said Anderson could be extradited.

#### CANON GOULD OF TORONTO IS HERE

Preached in St. Andrew's Anglican Church Last Evening on Possibilities of Racial Unification

Canon S. Gould, general secretary of the Canadian Church Missionary Society, preached in St. Andrew's Anglican Church last evening. He spoke on the possibilities of religious and racial unification. The peoples of the world today were divided in nationality, color, creed and in other ways but, after all, they were one in the image of God although God's imprint made varieties he stated.

Canon Gould arrived in the city from the East on last night's train and will go south on the Cardena tomorrow afternoon. He is visiting the West on a tour of inspection. He is one of the most important church officials in Canada. Tomorrow he will address the Women's Canadian Club in the Boston Grill.

#### PRINCE JOHN IS IN FROM ISLANDS

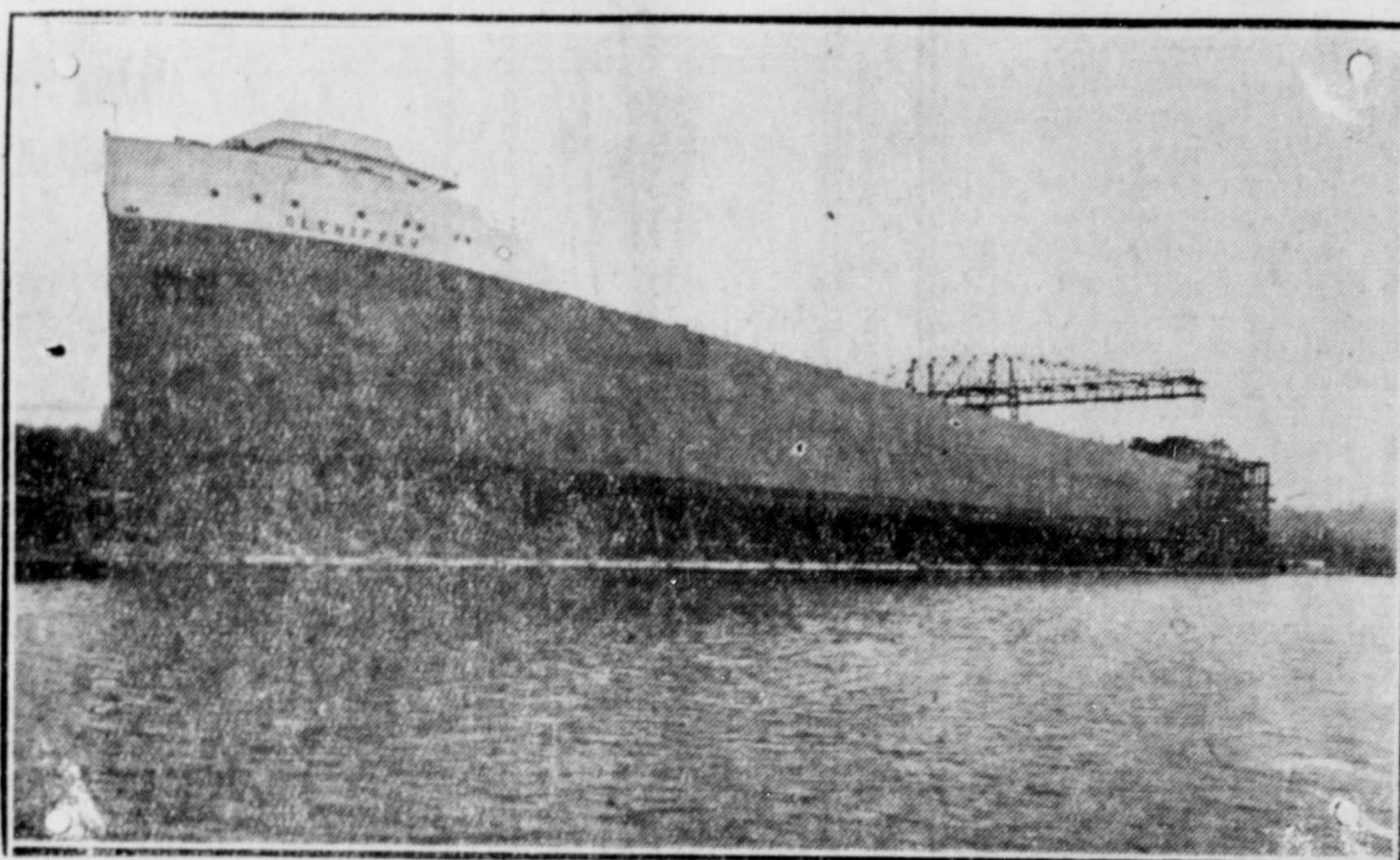
Had Rough Passages Both North and Southbound—Several Relieving Officers Aboard

After a rough voyage both southbound and northbound with the exception of the crossing of Heale's Straits yesterday from Massett Inlet to Prince Rupert, C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. E. Mabbs, arrived from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands at 11 o'clock last night. She brought a light freight and passenger list, there being about 30 first-class passengers for here.

The John was late in leaving Vancouver having not got away from there until Monday night—two days late. She went in to Allison Harbor off Queen Charlotte Sound and was further delayed. The vessel will return south on the same route at 8 o'clock this evening and it is expected will make up the two days that she is now behind on her schedule.

Bert Robson, the regular purser, is still holding down the office of the John but Chief Engineer Alex. Munro of the Prince George is in charge below and Chief Steward Adam Ramsay from the Prince George is supervising the work of feeding the Island passengers' palates. Captain McLean and Chief Engineer Mulhern, regular officers of the John, are ashore in Vancouver and Chief Steward Danny Main is on a long desired vacation.

#### DELKATLA BRIDGE IS NOW COMPLETED

After having spent two months at Massett building a new bridge across the Delkatla Slough, thus connecting up Massett and Delkatla, E. Woodworth of Smithers, who has been in charge of the job for the provincial department of public works, returned to the city on the Prince John last night. The bridge, which has been demanded by the residents in the locality for some time, fills a long felt need. It is about 1100 feet long.

Mr. Woodworth will return to the interior on the train this afternoon accompanied by Fred Roth of Hazelton who was associated with him on the job and who came back with him last night.

#### PEPALL CLEAR FROM CHARGES

Defeats Efforts of Immigration Authorities to Have Him Extradited

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 1.—Andrew Pepall, an alleged figure in a Canadian bond scandal, has been cleared of immigration charges brought against him last summer, defeating extradition efforts on the part of the Canadian authorities.

An order was received from Washington dismissing the original warrant of arrest which charged Pepall with illegally entering the United States.

#### PERMITS ISSUED TWO NEW BLOCKS

H. Yamanacka Erecting \$7,500 Structure on Third Avenue A. S. Lewis Building on Second

#### SOVIET GOVERNMENT SECURES ITS INCOME FROM GRAIN AND SUGAR

MOSCOW, Dec. 1.—Soviet Russia's budget for the coming year amounts to \$1,500,000,000, but its income from state industry and trade is only \$5,000,000. During the first eight months of this year only \$3,500,000 of this sum was realized, of which industry contributed a profit of \$2,100,000 and trade about \$1,400,000.

These revenues, small as they are, show a slight improvement over those of last year and are derived principally from the export of grain and the production of sugar and oil.

#### MAY LOAD LUMBER AND CATTLE HERE

Arrangements May be Made to Have Canadian Scottish Come North Next Month

The steamer Canadian Scottish may come north next month to load lumber from the Georgetown mill and 60 head of Bulkley Valley cattle for Japan. It was stated, however, at the C.G.M.M. office this afternoon that definite arrangements for the call here had not yet been made.

#### RESIGNATIONS FROM GRAHAM ISLAND ASSN.

D. R. Willemar of Massett and C. A. Milligan of the same place both write to ask that publicly be given the fact that they have withdrawn from the Graham Island Miners' Association. Mr. Willemar's letter to the association reads:

"In view of the fact that the association, of which you state I am a member in good standing, held a meeting of which I was not notified, and further in consideration of the fact that reports, the accuracy of which I cannot vouch for, are printed in the newspapers without my knowledge and sanction, I herewith tender my resignation to take effect immediately."

Mr. Milligan's letter of resignation states that he does not approve the manner in which the association is being conducted.

#### OIL WELL FIRE LOS ANGELES

Million Dollar Damages and One Death Result of Blaze

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 1.—One death and property damage approaching a million dollars was caused by a fire which broke out at the Santa Fe Springs oilfield, southeast of here. The fire burned all day and by night had destroyed eight oil derricks and several small tanks. J. Mills, aged 65, a night watchman, died of heart disease caused by shock and excitement from the event.

#### Saturday's Gale Moved Church of St. Peter at Seal Cove from Its Sills and Damaged Building

The southeast gale on Saturday afternoon, the velocity of which was officially recorded at 58 miles by the Digby Island meteorological station, did considerable damage about the city.

The east end of town seem to have been particularly hit, the most serious damage having been the taking of St. Peter's Church at Seal Cove off its mud sills. The tall structure was blown off its foundations and the north side deposited on the muskeg leaving it in a slanting position with the other side on the sills. It was moved several feet.

#### HOME BANK OFFICIALS SENTENCED

TORONTO, Dec. 1.—C. A. Barnard, director of the Home Bank, was sentenced to 18 months and 6 months less one day in the Ontario reformatory on charges arising out of the failure of the Home Bank.

Lieut. Clarence Smith, auditor of the bank was given four months at the reformatory and indeterminate terms of four months thereafter.

Sydney Jones, auditor, got four months in the reformatory and indeterminate terms of four months.

Ocean Smith, chief accountant, was released on suspended sentence.

#### RED UPRISING IN ESTHONIA CHECKED

Communists Attacked Government and Military Buildings but are Dispersed—Martial Law Proclaimed

REVAL, Esthonia, Dec. 1.—Armed Communists attacked certain government and military buildings this morning. The attack was immediately suppressed and order restored. No disturbances are reported from other towns. Martial law was proclaimed and the attacked buildings are held by troops.

MRS. HANKINSON WAS BURIED YESTERDAY

Wife of Smithers Doctor Laid to Rest at Interior Town

The funeral took place at Smithers yesterday afternoon of Mrs. Lucretia Sangster Hankinson, wife of Dr. C. H. Hankinson of that place who died at the hospital after a long illness.

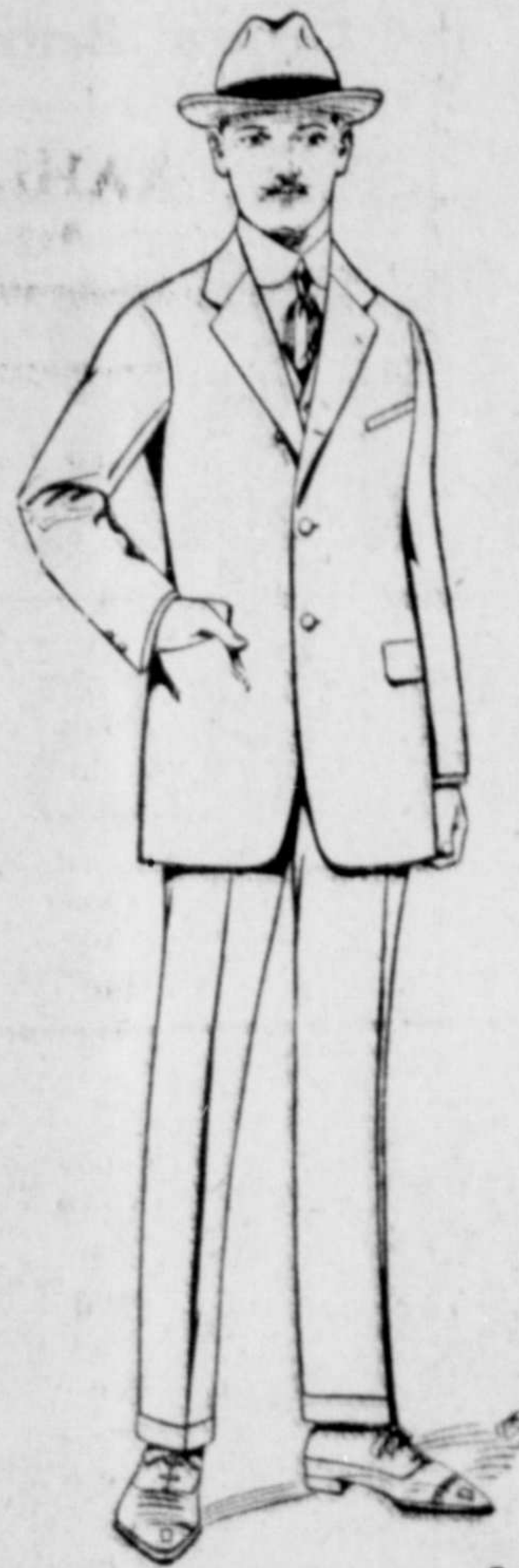
The deceased lady had always taken an active part in the welfare of the community being a great worker in connection with the Union Church Ladies' Aid and of the Hospital Auxiliary. She was also a member of the Rebekahs Lodge. The last time she took part in public affairs was when she gave her assistance in connection with the Church Christmas Tree and concert at the end of last year. It was soon after that she was forced to give up her community and social activities and was confined to her home practically an invalid up to the time of her death, which was caused by valvular disease of the heart.

The late Mrs. Hankinson was born in Guysboro, N.S., on September 15, 1895, and came west to Alberta to accept a position as school teacher. It was while teaching that she met Dr. Hankinson who was then attending college in Edmonton, and to whom she was married on September 11, 1918.

In addition to Dr. Hankinson, three little sons, a father and two sisters are left to mourn her loss. Charles Hadley, the eldest boy is four years old, Hazen Wood, 2 1/2 years and Elmore Llewellyn one year and three months. The father, D. C. Sangster, is a contractor in Smithers. One sister, Miss Jean Sangster is a school teacher at Vulean, Alta., and Isabel, the other sister is the wife of Roy Elsey, a principal at Vancouver.

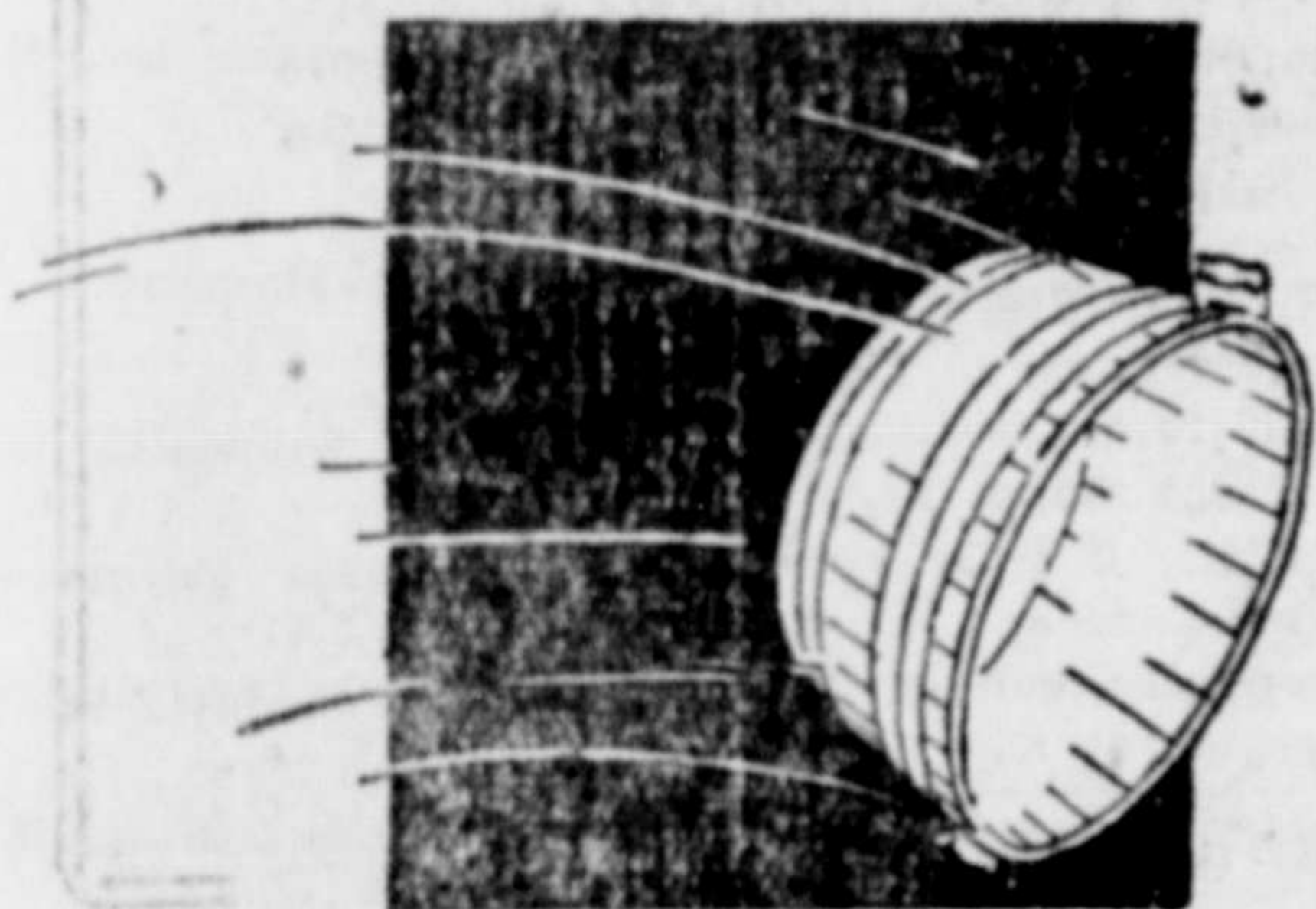

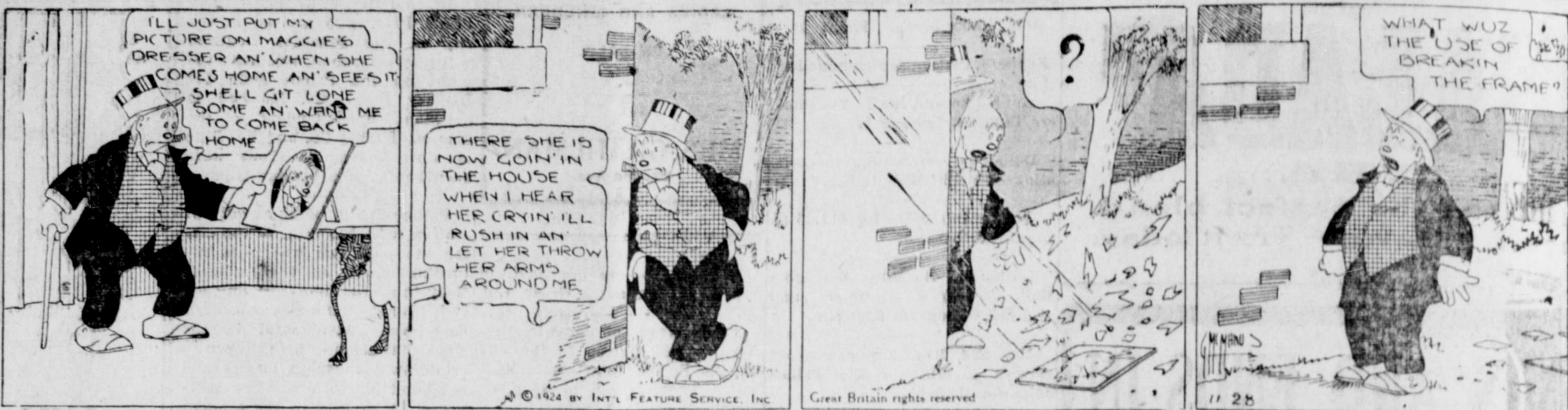

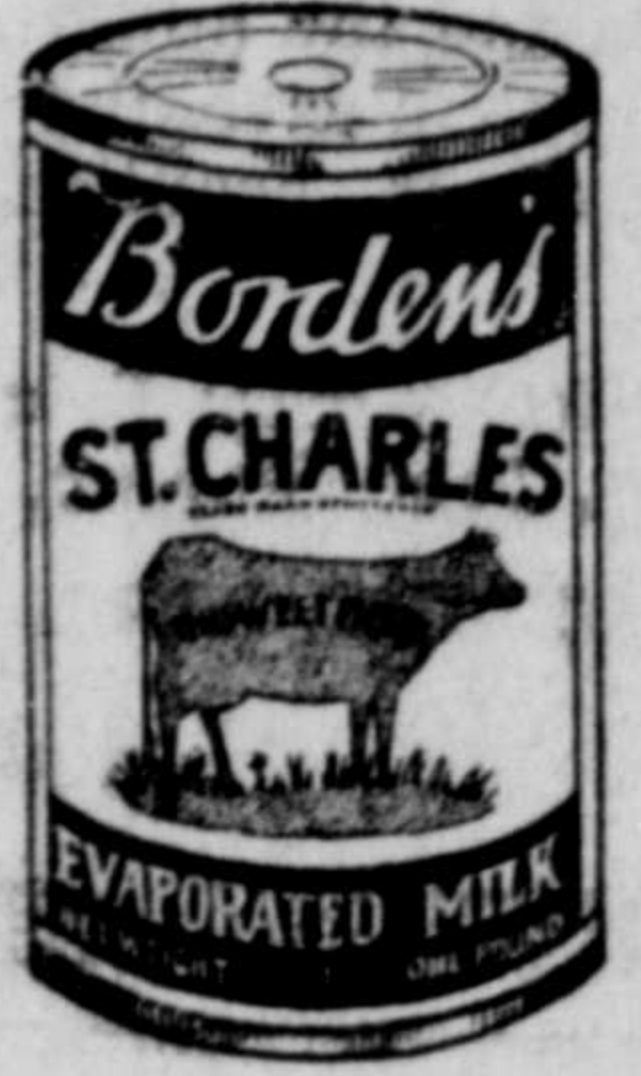
