THOUSAND NEW CARS NATIONAL RAILWAYS

HON. W. SLOAN WILL ASK AID FOR PROVINCE IN DEVELOPMENT OF MINING

Canadian National Railway is Preparing for a Big Increase in Business Summer and Autumn

MONTREAL, March 5.—With the placing of a large order for freight and passenger equipment, all to be built in Canada for the use of Canadian lines, the Canadian National Railways are preparing for summer and autumn traffic which is expected to break all records this year, says headquarters. The statement says that an order of 1,900 sixty ton box cars is being placed to add to the equipment necessary to the handling of western grain.

In addition to car orders, an order has been placed for fifteen mountain type passenger locomotives, five transfer freight engines of the Santa Fe type and thirty Mikado freight engines.

A total order of 95,000 tons of steel rails representing from 350 to 400 miles of steel is also ordered.

POOLING WHEAT ON PRAIRIES

Aaron Sapiro the Wizard Organizer of Chicago is in Charge of Drive

WINNIPEG, March 5.—Good success seems to be following the drives in the three prairie provinces to have the farmers form wheat pools for the marketing of their product. Aaron Sapiro of Chicago, who is here conducting the drive, is urging a union of all forces on the prairies with a view to controlling the market and compelling the payment of a reasonable price to the producers.

FIRST SALMON OF SEASON IN TODAY

Herring Run Continues in Harbor and Fredella is Busy Seining—Halibut Sales Light

For the past week, the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s schooner Fredella has been meeting with good success seining for herring in the harbor. This morning another good haul was taken off Cow Bay. The Fredella is doing the fishing and the W. R. Lord and Chief Legaic are being used as packers. Down the coast, the herring is also running well and the pounds at Captain's Cove and Jap Inlet are being filled.

This morning, the first salmon fare of the season was brought in by the First Place. The fish was caught near where the herring are running at Captain's Cove. The vessel had 300 pounds, 18.5c and 2c being paid for red and white respectively by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.

There was only one halibut boat selling at the Exchange today. It was the White Lily which disposed of 3,000 pounds to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. at 17.6c and 8c.

ANYOX MAN DIED IN HOSPITAL HERE

G. I. Simpson, Aged 25, and Native of Edinburgh, Passed Away this Morning

The death occurred in the Prince Rupert General Hospital this morning of G. I. Simpson, miner, who recently arrived in the city from Anyox. Deceased, who was admitted to the hospital on March 1, was 25 years of age and was a native of Edinburgh where his father, George Simpson, resides.

HANGMAN IN POLICE CELL

Twice Makes Scaffold and Digs Grave For Chinaman Without Result

(Special to Daily News) VANCOUVER, March 5.—Arthur Ellis, Canada's official hangman, got hopelessly drunk here last night, and spent the night in the police cell after being picked up by a cop on the street. He was later allowed to go.

The celebration started when he heard that the Chinaman, Chong Wong So, who he was to have hanged at Okalla on Thursday morning for murder, had been granted a new trial.

He has twice erected scaffolds and twice dug graves for this man. "His is a different suspended sentence to those he hands out to others," said a court frequenter.

ISAAC SWALWELL IS LAID TO REST WITH MILITARY CEREMONY

War Veterans and First Battalion Have Charge of Funeral

The funeral of the late Isaac Swalwell took place this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the B.C. Undertakers' Parlors to Fairview Cemetery. The ceremonies were of a semi-military nature and were under the joint auspices of the Great War Veterans' Association and the First Battalion North B.C. Regiment. Deceased served overseas with the 102nd Battalion and lost an eye in action.

A firing party, consisting of L. Connors, W. H. Waldorf, Sgt. S. L. Warrior, James Kelly, Sgt. Jepson, and Wright Davies accompanied the body to the cemetery and fired a volley as the remains were lowered to their last resting place. The Last Post was sounded by Fred Hardy. The North B.C. Regiment Band joined in the procession as far as Park Avenue.

Archdeacon G. A. Rix officiated and the pallbearers were J. G. Johnston, H. Wallace, W. Sullivan, A. J. Bishop, Gillis Royer and Oscar Nelson, the last two mentioned being members of the Moose Lodge of which deceased was also a member. There was a large turn out of lodge members as well as friends of deceased generally.

EXPERIENCED MAN IN CHARGE OF CAMERA ON BOARD THE THIEPVAL

Has Been Twice to Greenland and Had Unique Experiences

George H. Valiquette, who is aboard the Thiepval with Colonel Broome going on the trip north, will take pictures showing the route of the flight, the physical nature of the country flown over and the ports of call enroute. He will also take motion pictures of wild life on the many islands in the Pacific and of native life along the Siberian coast.

Mr. Valiquette is only 24 years of age, but already has had unique experience in the particular class of work which he will be called upon to perform. He went with Captain Bergier and J. D. Craig on both of the cruises of the Canadian government steamship Arctic in 1922 and 1923.

Youngest Professional

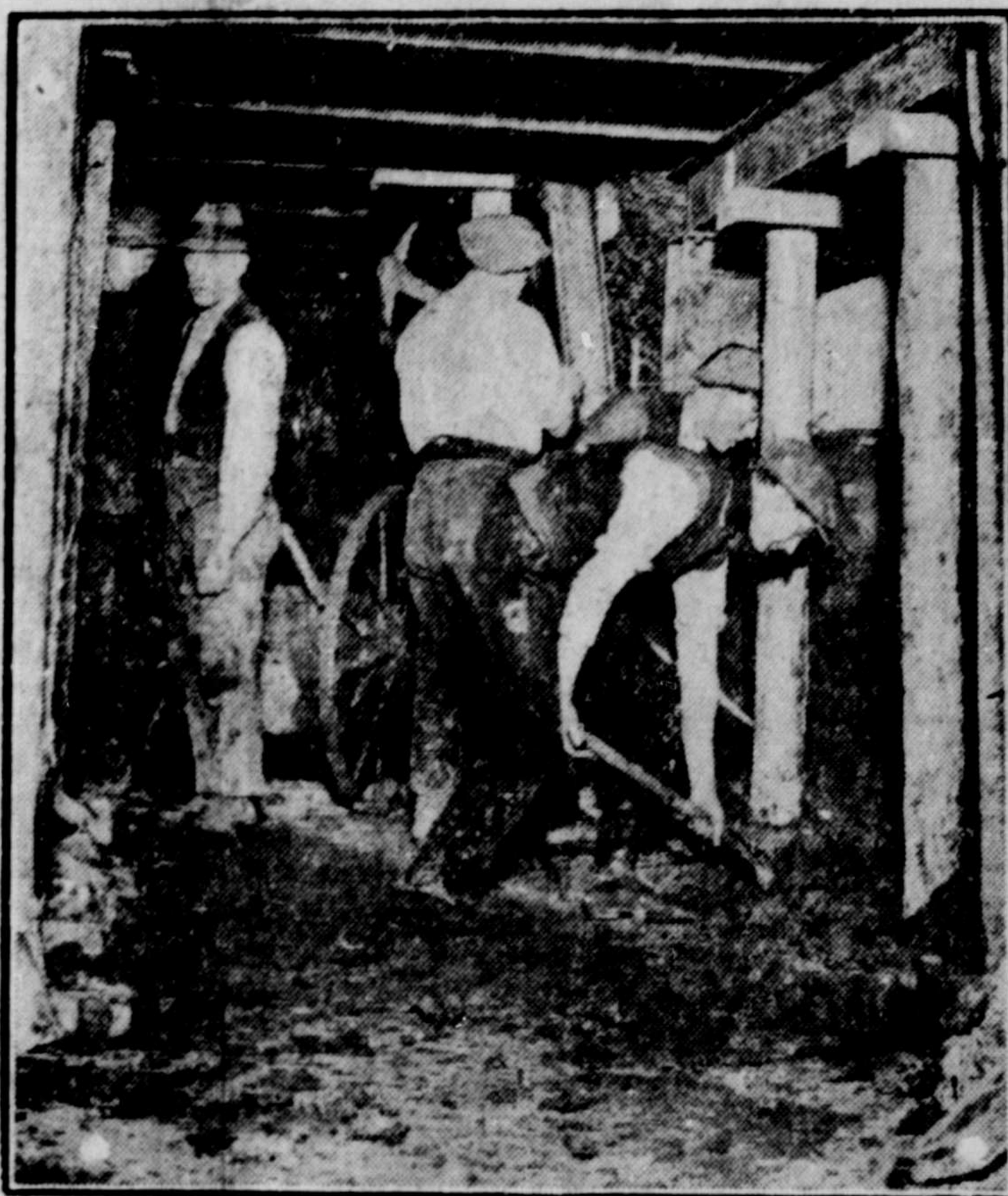
By reaching the latitude of 79 degrees north in 1922, at the age of 23, Mr. Valiquette established a record as the youngest professional moving picture photographer in the business and the taker of the most northerly scenes ever photographed for the films. He visited Greenland twice and amongst his interesting pictures are those taken of the trial of the Eskimo Nakulla at Pond's Inlet—the point farthest north that a Canadian court of justice has ever been held. Nakulla was convicted of having murdered Robert James, of Newfoundland, and was sentenced by Judge Rivet, of Montreal, to a jail term of ten years in the penitentiary at Stony Mountain, Manitoba.

Successful Experiment

In the 1923 expedition of the Arctic, an interesting experiment was made by the authorities, assisted by Mr. Valiquette. He took with him a projecting machine and at Pond's Inlet all the Eskimos in the settlement were brought on board and were shown the pictures taken of themselves during the 1922 expedition. They were also shown films of Canadian cities and of the world outside. The idea was to ascertain if the Eskimos were capable of receiving an intelligent impression of civilized life and customs. The experiment proved an unqualified success and it is considered that great good will rise therefrom.

When Nakulla was brought down to Quebec on the Arctic, he immediately recognized buildings, trains and automobiles as objects that he had previously seen on the screen at Pond's Inlet. He was by no means of brilliant mental attainments as compared with his brother Eskimos and the fact that his mind was capable of retaining the lessons of the motion pictures shown, proved that the films may be a valuable medium for carrying education to the Eskimo tribes in the Northland.

Lords Disapprove Air Policy of British Labor Government Announced by William Leach

LONDON, March 5.—The House of Lords yesterday registered disapproval of the utterances of William Leach, under secretary for air, in outlining the government's air policy on February 20. The Lords adopted without a division a motion by the Marquis of Londonderry that the House, while earnestly desiring further limitation of armaments so far as consistent with the safety and integrity of the Empire, affirms the principle laid down by the late government that Britain must maintain a home defense air force of sufficient strength to give adequate protection against air attacks by the strongest air force within striking distance of her shores.

William Leach in the House of Commons announced that the government had decided to maintain the late government's policy and not increase the air force for the present.

Progressives Will Back the Liberals in Reducing Tariff; Forke Threatens with big Club

OTTAWA, March 5.—Robert Forke, Progressive leader, outlining the attitude of the Progressives toward the government in the House of Commons yesterday said the Progressives were ready to support progressive measures whenever introduced. "If the government was ready to present such measures they know they will get our support. If not they will have to take the consequences."

Mr. Forke said he thought high protection, if persisted in, would spell ruin to the country. He declared the country needed economy, but of the right kind. The west was determined to have the Hudson's Bay Railway. He believed it would be completed in the not distant future.

Discussing taxation the leader of the Progressives suggested that the sales tax be removed from farm implements, adding that it would not be a bad move to take it off all along the line.

The former leader said he thought it might be well to have a parliamentary committee appointed to take matters affecting the Canadian National Railways under its peculiar care.

INFLUENZA SWEEPS OVER ENGLAND AND WEATHER VARIABLE

LONDON, Mar. 5.—An epidemic of influenza is prevalent in England owing to variable weather. Doctors are overwhelmed with calls for attendance.

The King and Queen have cancelled their engagements as both are suffering from influenza but the King is improving and was able to receive visitors at Buckingham palace Tuesday and to take a walk in the gardens.

FIRE DESTROYS YAHK

GRESTON, Mar. 5.—The larger half of the business section of the town of Yahk, 26 miles east of here, has been destroyed by fire. The total loss is at least \$25,000.

Sloan will Seek Aids to Mining Industry of Province from Ottawa

VICTORIA, March 5.—Federal Government co-operation in the development of the mining of the province will be urged by Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, in Ottawa next week in conference with the federal cabinet. He left here last night for the East and will ask for the abolition of all duties on mining machinery and a reduction of tariffs on all mining implements. Further he will request that a grant be given to aid in the construction of mining roads and trails, a bounty to supplement that offered by the British Columbia Government for the encouragement of the iron and steel industry in British Columbia.

GRAIN MARKET FOR EDMONTON

Mr. Sloan will seek to get control of the minerals in the Dominion railway belt and in the Peace River block transferred to the province.

Further the Federal Government will be asked to give serious consideration to the present export of products of Canadian mines for smelting in other countries and the securing of a uniform system of taxation of the mining industry by the Dominion and the Province.

Called by Ottawa

The conference was called by Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of mines for the Dominion and survey board has been asked for, the representatives from all the provinces of Canada are expected to be present. The main object of the gathering is to discuss methods by which the work of the mines department at Ottawa may be co-ordinated with the provincial departments to avoid overlapping and to forward the interests of mining throughout the country. It is possible some economies may be effected by the provinces and the Dominion as a result. Hon. Charles McGee, minister of mines, will represent Ottawa; Hon. J. O. Perrault will come for Quebec; Hon. C. W. Robinson will represent New Brunswick; Premier E. H. Armstrong of Nova Scotia, who is unable to attend, will send an official of his mines department, and Hon. William Sloan will represent British Columbia.

FORBES INDICTED BRIBERY CHARGES

Grand Jury Bring in Their Findings Following an Official Investigation

WASHINGTON, March 5.—Charles R. Forbes, former director of the Veterans Bureau has been indicted on charges of bribery in connection with the expenditure of vast sums of money by the bureau. The findings of the jury were as follows:

1. That one or more officials of the government used official information for purposes of speculation.
2. That two members of congress were paid certain sums of money.
3. That persons having no official connection with the government had possession of federal department secrets.
4. That money was accepted by certain individuals for the purpose of obtaining clemency for prisoners, through their intimacy with officials of the government.
5. That money was collected by certain individuals, not attorneys, for obtaining through such intimacies permits for intoxicating liquors.

VANCOUVER GIRL DROPS DEAD WHEN DANCING IN A NEW YORK REHEARSAL

Daughter of Former Proprietor of Strand Hotel Ends Her Career Suddenly

VANCOUVER, March 5.—Beatrice Shaw, daughter of the late W. H. Shaw, proprietor of the Strand Hotel here, dropped dead in New York last night while in the midst of a whirl in a dance which she was rehearsing for the vaudeville stage. She was educated here for a musical career.

SURVEY ROAD ALONG RIVER

Engineer Arriving from Victoria Today to Make Reconnaissance

To make a reconnaissance in order to find a possible route for a road from Prince Rupert to Terrace, D. Bergen, locating engineer for the provincial department of public works, will arrive in the city on the Prince Rupert this afternoon. Mr. Bergen will arrange for a small crew here to engage in the work which will commence as soon as possible. It will be the first time that a reconnaissance has been made of the project.

CZECHO-FRANCO TREATY RATIFIED YESTERDAY

PARIS, March 5.—Premier Poincare and the Czecho-Slovakian minister yesterday exchanged ratifications of the Czecho-Franco treaty, the papers in which were signed on January 25. The documents, although termed a treaty of alliance and friendship, are said by spokesmen of both governments to impose no military obligations.

Danger Of Getting Into A Rut.

There is grave danger of people living in a small place getting into a rut so deep that it is difficult to get out. There has been a comparatively quiet time in Prince Rupert for a year or more. The result is we are acquiring the quiet habit. We are getting so inured to the condition that we hardly know how to meet a crisis or how to help ourselves climb out of the hole in which we find ourselves. It is only by constantly fighting against the lassitude that overwhelms us that we can hope to hold our end when the real movement comes and with it the competition which is inevitable.

Refuse To Accept Seemingly Inevitable.

The person who makes a real success of life is the one who absolutely refuses to accept the seemingly inevitable. To find a way out and to improve conditions when they are bad is the only thing to do. It is better to do something foolish than to lie down and do nothing. Action is necessary to progress. Change is good, even if it is not always a change for the better. The divine discontent is what keeps men and women alive and makes them strike for better things.

Why Blame For Being Optimistic?

People are sometimes blamed for being too optimistic. They are sneered at and jeered at, but they are right. If they are not optimistic they should not be here. It is useless to stay in a place and give up hope.

Just now in Prince Rupert there is every cause for optimism. The people generally feel that the city will come into its own soon and that there will be something worth while doing. This is a good spirit to cultivate. And in the meantime it is well to keep ourselves in that attitude of mind which will give us an even start when there is improvement. We cannot afford to lie idle. Preparation should be our motto. Get ready for the move and do our little bit to help things move.

Anyox Becomes Optimistic.

The success of the Granby operations at Anyox are dependent on two things: the ability of the management to produce rapidly and economically, and the ability to market at a remunerative price. That is the basis of all success in business. Just now, according to the Granby News, there is a stiffening in the price of copper and the outlook is that the stiffening will continue and possibly the price of the metal will go up to a point where the company may show a profit. It has been a number of years since Granby paid a dividend but they will probably do it again before long if the price rises. The article of which mention has been made says: "Let us hope that the optimism so generally prevalent at present will be justified and continue to expand; and that the price of the Everlasting Metal will be stabilized and set at a figure where the producer can sell his output at a margin of profit which will give some return to those whose money is invested in the industry; where everybody would be more or less benefited."

RAPID CHANGE PUBLIC MIND

This Feature is Illustrated by Change in Attitude Toward British Premier

WAS MUCH DISLIKED

Ramsay Macdonald Was Always Opposed to War and Policy Clear Throughout

LONDON, March 5. — Ramsay Macdonald as prime minister is a striking testimonial to the public's infinite capacity for changing its mind. No man in Britain was more disliked by his countrymen than Mr. Macdonald in the heated, emotional years of the war. From start to finish he was against the conflict, and he never compromised with his principles.

Nor was Mr. Macdonald satisfied with passive resistance. With all the fire that is in him he violently and actively opposed the war. In consequence he lost his political position and was even expelled from his golf club.

Resigned Chairmanship

The longer the war went on the more bitter and active was Mr. Macdonald's opposition to it. At the beginning he found the majority of labor members against him, so he resigned the chairmanship of the party. When Labor later joined the Lloyd George coalition, he held aloof. In 1917 he tried to go to Russia, but members of the National Seamen's and Firemen's Union refused to man the ship should he come aboard. A few months later he planned to attend a conference at Stockholm which the Bolsheviks proposed as a step towards peace parleys with the working classes of the central powers. The government refused to give him a passport. The same year he was one of the moving forces in a conference at Leeds which resolved to seek establishment of workers' and soldiers' councils in the manner of the revolting Russians.

Beaten at Polls

The "khaki election" just after the war—that wild, flag-waving, parliamentary campaign with its hot and ardent cries of "Hang the Kaiser"—was disastrous to Mr. Macdonald. He was badly beaten at the polls, and lost his seat in the Commons. The Labor stronghold of Woolwich turned him down. For four years he remained on the outside, looking in, until the voters of Aberavon sent him back to Westminster in 1922.

Helped by the "wild men from the Clyde" as the more extreme elements of the Scottish labor delegation are called, Mr. Macdonald regained the leadership of his party, but only by a narrow majority. From the opposition benches this man, who had attracted little attention in his former parliamentary speeches, revealed as the days went on the gifts for debate that are looked for in leaders. More and more it became certain that if Labor came to power Mr. Macdonald would be prime minister.

Wanted Him Back

So it is. Politically he has come back. But he is still out of the modest golf club of his native village of Lossiemouth. One heard interesting stories on that subject as soon as it became certain the Conservative regime would fall and Labor would take charge of the government. It was said the canny ex-clubmates of Mr. Macdonald adopted a resolution just before Christmas week revoking the order that had ex-

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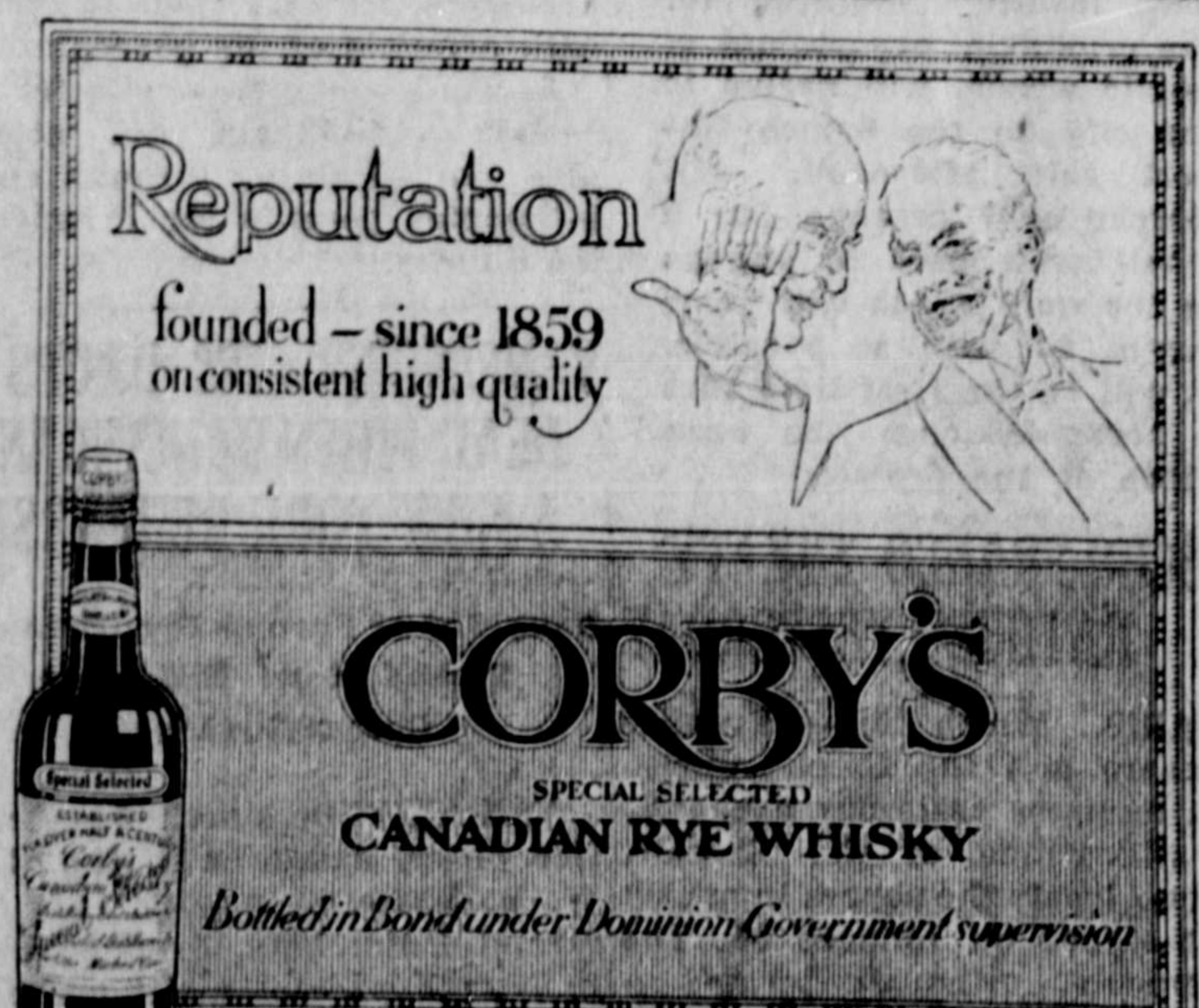

NEARLY NINE HUNDRED MILLION FISH EGGS COLLECTED LAST YEAR

Speckled Trout Handled as a Sideline by Government Hatcheries

OTTAWA, Mar. 5.—(Canadian Press).—During the autumn season of 1923 over 890,756,000 eggs of the most valuable and important species of fish were collected for incubation in the Dominion Government hatcheries. This is exclusive of the spring and summer operations.

Atlantic salmon eggs to the number of 23,261,000 were obtained as far as possible from fish that were purchased from the commercial fishermen and after they were stripped, were released again into the streams from which they were taken.

Over 400,000,000 whitefish eggs were obtained from the catch of the commercial fishermen or from fish caught in the Great Lakes which were ultimately placed on the market. In the Lake of the Woods and westward, fish were caught in pound nets operated for the purpose and were liberated after they were stripped.

Speckled trout have been handled in small numbers by the government hatcheries as a sideline to Atlantic salmon propagation. Motoring having brought the trout streams within reach of a larger portion of people than ever before, there has been a heavy toll taken of fish from fast streams. Various trout streams which were self-sustaining now require assistance. With this end in view some members of the hatchery staffs gave their full time during the autumn season to the collection of speckled trout eggs and a larger number than ever before was obtained.

Salmon trout eggs are taken from fish captured by commercial fishermen for the market and are a direct saving to the fisheries. Otherwise they would be a total loss so far as reproduction is concerned. Cisco or lake herring eggs were obtained from the commercial fishermen; 3,720,000 at Port Arthur and 19,100,000 in the Bay of Quinte. These eggs will be used to introduce the species into some lakes in the prairies which are unsuited for whitefish or pickerel.

PRINCE RUPERT BOY HEADS MEDICALS OF TORONTO UNIVERSITY

Jack Naden was Elected President at Enthusiastic Mass Meeting of Students

At an enthusiastic mass meeting last night, which closed a novel and closely-contested election campaign, medical students of the University of Toronto heard that they had elected J. R. Naden as their 1934-25 president by a majority of 147 votes says the Toronto Globe. In addition to the successful candidate there were four aspirants for Presidential honors, A. D. Kelly, T. G. Heaton, K.C. McCarthy and J. G. Falconer, son of the University's head. As each of these had been strongly supported, the issue was in doubt until the last moment, and Mr. Naden's election came as a surprise to many. In the race for the vice-presidency, W. B. Bremer was successful. A. G. Lambert was elected as secretary, treasurer, and A. E. Young as assistant secretary-treasurer.

Mr. Naden's campaign is alleged to have been unique in the society's history. It began some days ago, when calendars and blotters inscribed with the slogan: "Vote Jack Naden as President," were distributed with liberal hand.

Not long ago Mr. Naden was in the limelight for winning the prize for the best costume at the Hart House masquerade. He attended that function in the guise of a telephone, complete with mouthpiece and all, while his partner appeared as the receiver. Remembering this, the undergraduate body expected some novelties in his election campaign, and Mr. Naden proceeded to gratify that expectation.

Jack Naden is a son of G. R. Naden, deputy minister of lands at Victoria, and formerly a prominent businessman of Prince Rupert.

SPECIAL TAXES FOR EDUCATION PURPOSES

EDMONTON, March 5.—Choice of means of raising an education tax for city school purposes will be from the following, if the legislature grants the charter amendments which the special committee of council decided should be asked for:

- An income tax.
- A rental tax.
- A service tax.

Add to these a tax on horses and vehicles, including motor cars, and the list is complete.

It was admitted that if the government grants authority for the imposition of the various forms of taxation enumerated it did not follow that the council would apply all, but it was thought that the city should be given the power to use its discretion in such matters.

BRITAIN OUT AFTER AIR SPEED HONORS

LONDON, March 5.—With a view to capturing some of the big speed events of the year, and possibly to challenge for the Pulitzer trophy, a local aircraft company has decided to build a speedy airplane.

This will be a biplane with a Napier Lion engine giving nearly 600 h.p. and it is believed it will attain a speed of 270, and possibly 300 miles an hour. LA FOLLETTE IN POLITICS

Is Political Boss with Wide Influence in Several States

MAY BE INDEPENDENT

Speculation as to Action he will Take in Forthcoming Election

NEW YORK, March 5.—Robert M.—"Bob"—La Follette, Radical-Republican, "Boss" of Wisconsin, stormy petrel of the U.S. Senate, enemy of "the interests" and friend to Germany during the Great War, will play the big emotional scenes of the 1924 political drama. That is one of the best things he does. La Follette can "emote" thrillingly upon almost any conceivable subject, but he devotes most of his dramatic talent to depicting the villainies of the railroads.

La Follette can think up more hard names to call Wall Street and the transportation barons than even Hiram Johnson, but he does rather less talking than Johnson and displays more practical activity. Unlike Johnson, he is feared as well as hated in the realms of big finance. Unlike Johnson, too, he will probably wield an influence in the presidential race, though he is not expected to figure in the running himself. Johnson, trying to run with both hare and hounds, seeking the favor of both the "old guard" and progressive factions of the Republican party, has won comparatively little support. He is not even by any means certain of the backing of his own state, whereas La Follette is sure to control an important block of delegates in the national convention if he so desires.

Political Boss

The power that La Follette wields in his own state is probably but little realized by Canadians. Charles F. Murphy, of Tammany Hall is often regarded as the most powerful political boss in the United States, but Murphy's organization, while more picturesque, perhaps, is loose and haphazard as compared with that of La Follette in Wisconsin. Murphy at times is forced to cater to the ideas of his lieutenants and ward leaders. La Follette's word is law in the Wisconsin state organization. A politician there is either a La Follette man or not. If he is a La Follette man he does what "Bob" thinks proper without question or argument, and he gets elected when "Bob" decides to nominate him. It is certain therefore that if La Follette desires to influence the Republican convention he can have the Wisconsin delegates at his beck and call. He can control the delegates of North Dakota, and it is probable also that he could command a number from Minnesota and South Dakota. This would form an influential block which would make the Wisconsin senator a figure of no little importance in the convention.

Against Coolidge

La Follette is not likely to support President Coolidge in the convention. At the opening of the present session of Congress he waged a violent and successful warfare against the administration Republicans by lining up his little band of Progressives with the Democrats. Moreover, he issued a statement on President Coolidge's message to Congress in which he declared the President had presented "a stand-pat, reactionary theory of government," and had proved himself the champion of "the interests of the railroads, the profiteers, the coal magnates and our other overlords against the mass of the people." After this outburst it would be a bit inconsistent for La Follette to support Coolidge in the convention, and, whatever else he may be, La Follette is not inconsistent.

The Wisconsin senator is even less likely to support Hiram Johnson. He has no love at all for Johnson, against whom he has an old political score to pay. In 1912 La Follette had high hopes of securing the Republican nomination. He had waged a strong pre-convention campaign and, among others, he thought he had the California delegates lined up. Johnson, in "Bob's" view, stole the California delegation from him and

However, his third-party candidature might settle the fate of Coolidge. He might very well carry all the states from Wisconsin west to Oregon, and as these are nearly all certain Republican states that Coolidge could not very well spare, the result might be disastrous for the New Englander.

gave it to Roosevelt. Then, too, La Follette shares the view of many of the Progressives of the middle west that Johnson is much to chummy with the "reactionaries."

Third Party

There is a possibility that La Follette may become a third party candidate for the Presidency, although this is doubtful. The record of his political activities shows it to be unlikely. La Follette has never yet blocked the election of a Republican president or attempted to do so by throwing the electoral votes of Wisconsin to either a third-party candidate or to the Democrats. Though disappointed and sore at the shattering of his plans in 1912 he did not support the Bull Moose ticket in that election when Roosevelt broke away after his defeat by Taft in the convention. Wisconsin went to Hughes by a big majority in 1916, and overwhelmingly for Harding in 1920.

However, there is a possibility that La Follette, having become convinced that he cannot reform the Republican party in line with his radical ideas from within, may be considering a final attempt from without the breast-works. If he decides to make the venture it is certain he can have the opportunity. J. A. H. Hopkins, a member of the committee on Arrangements for the National Farmer-Labor-Progressive convention to be held in Minneapolis on May 30, issued a statement the other day in which he said:

Possibility of Election

"La Follette can be nominated and elected president of the United States. A word from him that he would accept our nomination would sweep like wildfire through the country and would unquestionably result in his unanimous selection by the National Farmer-Labor-Progressive Party Convention."

NEW CANADIAN FLAG WILL FLY IN LONDON

Blue Ensign Will be Replaced by Red as Result of Order-in-Council

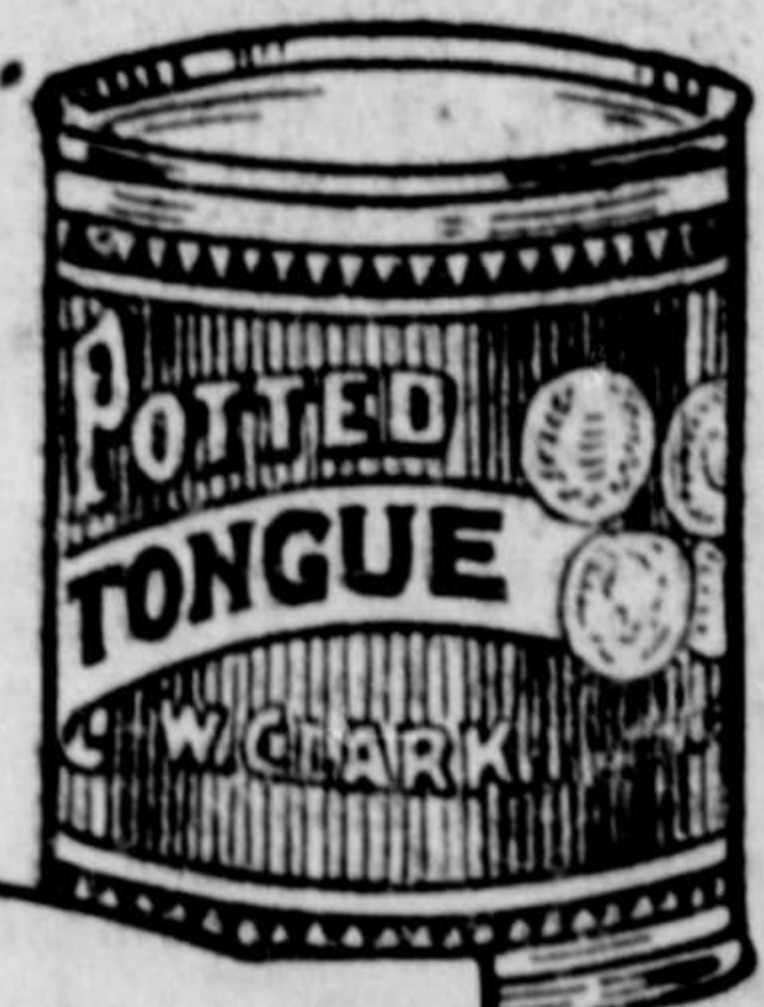
OTTAWA, March 5.—The practice of flying the blue ensign with the Canadian arms over the offices of the Canadian high commissioner in London has been stopped and in future the red ensign will be flown. On the recommendation of Premier King an order-in-council has been passed which sets forth that the flying of the blue ensign on land in the heart of London is manifestly irregular, this flag having been authorized in 1870 for use on Canadian government vessels.

The reason offered for flying the blue ensign in London, instead of the Union Jack, which is flown over all Canadian government buildings in Canada, is the need "very generally felt by Canadians in London for a distinctive emblem which will afford a ready means of distinguishing the character of the buildings over which it floats, and the portion of the empire to which they belong," in the language of the order-in-council.

The prime minister considers that this purpose would be served by the employment of the red ensign with the Canadian arms, this flag having been displayed from government buildings in Canada in the past, and being often spoken of as the "Canadian flag."

There will be no variation from the present practice in regard to the flying of flags from government buildings in Canada.

ARCHITECT'S FEE WORRIES OAK BAY

Municipal Council Passes Resolutions Urging Greater Control Over Schools

VICTORIA, March 5.—That the council views with dismay further curtailment of its already restricted power of control over school expenses in the interests of the taxpayer is the burden of a resolution passed by a meeting of the Oak Bay Council in relation to an amendment of the last session of the provincial legislature.
The situation arose over the policy of the 1923 school board in calling for plans for a new high school building. In the 1924 estimates the school board has the sum of \$5,400 for the payment of architect's fees.
In other years this would have been classed an "extraordinary" expense within the control of the council. Now, by the amendment complained of, the item is included in the ordinary estimates and as such out of the control of the council to alter or deny. As the high school plan has been dropped the plans are of little use, holds the council.
The resolution passed by the council, and to be addressed to the authorities on the point, follows:

The Resolution
"Whereas by an amendment to the Public Schools Act dated December 20, 1923, the words 'expenses incurred by a board of school trustees in preparing plans, specifications, and estimates of cost of new school buildings, and of additions or alterations to existing school buildings' have been added to the definition of 'ordinary expenses' in spite of the fact that such expenses are part of the cost of erection of school buildings and of all alteration thereof or additions thereto; and 'expenses necessary for the provision of adequate school accommodation' and are therefore 'extraordinary expenses,' for which, if necessary, sanction can be obtained at any time of the year;
"It is hereby resolved that the municipal council of Oak Bay views with dismay the curtailment of its already restricted power to exercise supervision over school trustees in the interests of the taxpayer;
"It is further resolved that steps be taken at the earliest moment to have the aforesaid amendment repealed; and that copies of this resolution be sent to the premier, the minister of education, the leader of the opposition, General McRae, and to the Union of British Columbia Municipalities."
Second Resolution
Legislation to give municipalities more control over school costs by placing a greater measure of control in the council is the burden of a second resolution on the same point, which reads as follows:
"Whereas the existing powers, financial and general of school boards, as established by the government, are extremely prejudicial to the finances of this municipality;
"And whereas, as regards the older children, the whole scope of state education has been extended so far, that it becomes a heavy burden on the taxpayer;
"Therefore it is resolved by this council that the municipality of Oak Bay shall endeavor to obtain legislation which shall lessen the immense cost of education and shall give the council proper control over all municipal expenditure."

WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC ORGANIZED IN RUSSIA

High Soviet Officials Alleged to be Members of the Ring

BERLIN, March 5.—A Russian white slave ring, with ramifications in Moscow, Petrograd, Nizhni, Novgorod and Kazan, supported by several Soviet high officials, has been uncovered following the death, two months ago, of a young girl.
An investigation led to the discovery of the ring, which operates in important Russian cities frequented by responsible Soviet workers, who protect the place, presumably for graft.
The ring was organized in 1921. Young women and girls in the Volga region were placed in the hands of the ring through officials of the Department of Commerce, who promised them positions with Soviet institutions in Moscow. Girls as young as twelve were taken into the traffic.

CAPE BRETON LABOR LEADER IS RELEASED

James B. McLachlan Out on Ticket of Leave; Was Sentenced for Two Years

DORCHESTER, N.B., March 5. James B. McLachlan, who was sentenced to imprisonment for two years for seditious libel, was released on ticket of leave. He was convicted in connection with labor troubles at Cape Breton.

ARRESTED FOR BETTING STREETS OF TORONTO

TORONTO, March 5.—Police made a sudden swoop upon betting places, arresting four men on charges of taking bets on horse races. Three of the men charged were arrested in a Greek restaurant at 8 Dundas Street East, while a man, 65 years of age was found, police allege, receiving bets on a street corner.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.
Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. How to Pre-empt Land, copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 800 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 4,000 feet per acre east of that Range.
Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.
Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.
For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."
PURCHASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 19, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."
Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 60 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.
HOMESITE LEASES
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.
LEASES
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.
GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on number of head, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, farmers and travelers, up to ten head.

KING TUT STYLES SAID TO BE WRONG

Persons Wearing Them in Ancient Egypt Would Have Been Thrown into Nile

CHICAGO, March 5.—If the venerable Tut-anh-amen could take a stroll in an American city today and his guide should inform him the women he saw were wearing "King Tut" styles, the monarch would call for his coffin and expire on the spot, declares Prof. T. G. Allen, of the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago.
"The styles are all wrong," he said recently, "being based upon ancient fashions which were executed in accordance with conventional designs and in no way reflected the life of the day. If any woman in Egypt, 3,200 years ago had dressed in what they now call 'King Tut' styles, her friends would probably have thrown her in the Nile."
