COMPLETE REPORT ON REPARATIONS TODAY

AMERICAN FLYERS AGAIN DELAYED: ELECTIONS TO TAKE PLACE MIDSUMMER

Flight Delayed until Tomorrow; Airmen Not Ready in Time

The final touch to repairs of Major Martin's machine was given at the dry dock this morning at 9.50 and the plane went through the ensuing tests satisfactorily but, at a few minutes before twelve o'clock, it was decided that the machine could not be oiled up and refuelled and make the next hop to Sitka without taking chances of finishing up in the dark so the take-off of the United States round-the-world squadron will take place early tomorrow morning. To that end, the machine is being prepared this afternoon and the four will be ready by the time now appointed.

ELECTION AT MIDSUMMER

Will Take Place Same Time as Beer Plebiscite in June or July

(Special to Daily News) VICTORIA, April 9.—The beer plebiscite will be held simultaneously with the general election, it was learned today, following final cabinet conferences on the question last night and this morning. The date of the election will not be set for some time but it will be midsummer—June or July. It may be that the revised voters list will not be ready until then.

The holding of a simultaneous election and liquor vote is a complete reversal of the government's previous plans. Rapid developments followed the arrival in Victoria of influential Vancouver Liberals, who successfully argued for simultaneous votes.

News of the change of plans is being flashed to Liberal chiefs in the province, who will be told to gird their armor for the fray. The fight is on.

BASEBALL OPENS COAST LEAGUE

Seattle Wins First Game Against Los Angeles and San Francisco Beats Portland

SAN FRANCISCO, April 9.—The baseball season on the coast opened yesterday with four Coast League games in which Seattle, San Francisco, Oakland, and Vernon were victors. The earlier games are being played in the south because of weather conditions. The scores yesterday were as follows:

SHIPYARD LOCKOUT MAY BE TOMORROW IN GREAT BRITAIN

Vote Has Been Taken at Southampton and Result Depends on It

LONDON, April 9.—Lockout notices which will close all shipbuilding and ship repair yards in Great Britain and turn 100,000 men into the list of the unemployed unless the Southampton workers resume work, is due to take effect tomorrow. Whether the shutdown occurs depends upon the result of the ballot taken at Southampton yesterday which will be counted in London today.

Nothing contrary having been given out this morning from Major Martin's announcement last night that the machines would take off this morning, the departure was being awaited by citizens generally and, the most of the morning up until noon, there was a large assemblage of spectators on the commanding points around Seal Cove.

The decision to delay the take-off was reached at a conference of the pilots on the ground. Major Martin was for pushing off as soon as possible but the opinion of the other pilots was that it would not be safe to attempt the flight to Sitka this afternoon. It would have been at least 2 o'clock when Major Martin's machine would be ready for the air.

At 10.30 this morning the machine which had been damaged was removed from the dry dock pier by using the large crane and, a few minutes later, Major Martin opened up on his test flight. The plane took to the air nicely and behaved well while flying over the town and came down to its mooring place at Seal Cove where it now is with the others. Refueling the machine, which includes the heating of oil and other essential delays, would have taken probably a couple of hours.

Weather reports received at nine o'clock were favorable. It was cloudy and calm at Prince Rupert with visibility good; Sitka reported clear, calm weather with good visibility but Ketchikan reported it raining and calm with poor visibility.

Flyers Were Ready
The flyers checked out from the Prince Rupert Hotel bright and early this morning and removed their baggage to their planes. They have registered again this afternoon for the night.

A new copper plate cowling was made at the dry dock and installed on Lieut. Wade's machine to replace the aluminum one that blew off into deep water on Monday.

Major Martin expressed his appreciation of the work done at the dry dock for the cruisers. He also referred to the splendid service that had been given his party by Jarvis McLeod, local flight representative.

CHLOROFORMED BODY FOUND IN OWN HOME

Esquimalt Man Had Army Mask Tied Over Head and Bottles by Side

VICTORIA, April 9.—With an army mask securely tied over his head and two empty bottles nearby, the chloroformed body of Bernard G. Ruddleok, 50 years of age, was found in his home today. He was a civil engineer engaged in construction work at the Esquimalt graving dock.

AXE FALLS AT PORT CLEMENTS

Cleanup of Liquor Sellers by Police Following Liquor Board Activities

The axe has fallen at Port Clements. This morning launch Pachena arrived home from there bringing provincial police officers Spiller, Gibson and Ponder who conducted a raid following investigations of liquor board operators there, gathering in a round dozen alleged lawbreakers.

Oscar Dunlop and William Hastie of Port Clements were brought here by the police charged with selling liquor and will be tried here. J. Morgan was convicted and sentenced by Magistrate Mallory to 6 months in jail. Others charged with selling are Josephine Rosseau, Alice Hall, and Babe Shannon. A man named Stewart was unlawfully in possession of liquor. John Locker is charged with having a still.

Four girls are charged with being inmates of a disorderly house. They are Blanch Ford, Mrs. Blackburn, Peggy O'Neill and another.

All remaining cases will be heard here by Magistrate Mallory.

NEWFOUNDLAND TO PROSECUTE

Squires Will Have to Answer to Courts For Money Shortage

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 9.—The disposition of more than \$200,000 shortage in the accounts of the controllers department will be the subject of a government investigation, according to the Evening Advocate, the official organ of the Warren government.

The advocate intimates that the department of justice has decided to prosecute all implicated in the recent report. This was taken to mean that Sir Richard Squires, former premier, will be prosecuted on the basis of the Walker Royal Commission finding against him.

WEATHER IS NOT EXPECTED DELAY FLYERS TOMORROW

The barometer is high and steady today and indications point to good weather. It is not considered likely that weather will prevent the United States airmen from taking off for Sitka early tomorrow morning.

Reparations Commission Makes Report with Recommendations as to Conduct of German Finances

PARIS, April 9.—The report of the experts who have been engaged for the past three months in the task of ascertaining Germany's capacity to pay reparations, was handed to the reparations commission today. Two committees, under the chairmanship of Brigadier General Charles G. Dawes and Reginald McKenna respectively, have gone as deeply into the intricacies of many problems connected with reparations and approached the task "as businessmen anxious to obtain effective results."

Expenditures on Public Works and other Departments of Civic Government shown in Estimates

LABOR FORCED DROP A BILL

Ramsay Macdonald Says Will Adopt Private Bill Securing Similar End

ANTI-STRIKE REFUSED

LONDON, April 9.—Having been forced to drop the government rents bill for the time being, Premier Macdonald announced in the House of Commons yesterday that the government would adopt the bill of Ernest Simon, Liberal, known as the "Prevention of Evictions Bill." He said the government would give this bill all facilities to insure progress, after being subjected in committee to additions and amendments, which he thought would prove satisfactory to all sides.

FOUR PUMPS ON WRECKED BOAT

Attempt Will be Made Shortly to Take Rodman Off—May be Beached for Temporary Repairs

The salvage tug Nanoose is still standing by the Admiral Rodman, stranded on the mainland in Grenville Channel opposite Point Calvert and two and a half miles south of Gibson Island. Three six-inch pumps and one eight-inch pump have been placed aboard the vessel and they are taking the water out. Her stern is in the water at all stages of the tide. Shortly an attempt will be made to remove the vessel from her present position and she will be beached so that temporary repairs may be made in order that she may be taken south. There is no room in the dry dock here for her.

CHURCH UNION FAILS ONTARIO

Bill Withdrawn From Private Bills Committee of Legislature

TORONTO, April 9.—The Church Union bill was withdrawn from the private bills committee of the Ontario Legislature this morning. The action means that there will be no Church Union legislation go through the Ontario Legislature this session.

Chamber of Commerce is Investigating Possibility of Establishing Route

VICTORIA, April 9.—Passenger and mail air service between Victoria and Vancouver may soon materialize if the plans of the chamber of commerce, which has appointed a committee to investigate are found feasible. It would be the first service of its kind in Canada, it was stated.

LEIPSIK, April 9.—The Association of German Aristocrats has more than tripled in membership during the last three years. From an organization founded by 30 noble Prussians some 50 years ago, it now claims an enrollment of 15,000.

The association has become very active in education work, and has established schools in several population centers where members of aristocratic families may take courses in cooking, household management and nursing, and learn other duties pertaining to the home. A recent report of the directors sets forth plans for additional housing facilities for old people's rest homes conducted by the association, where dependent aged men and women of the society may spend their last days in peace and comfort.

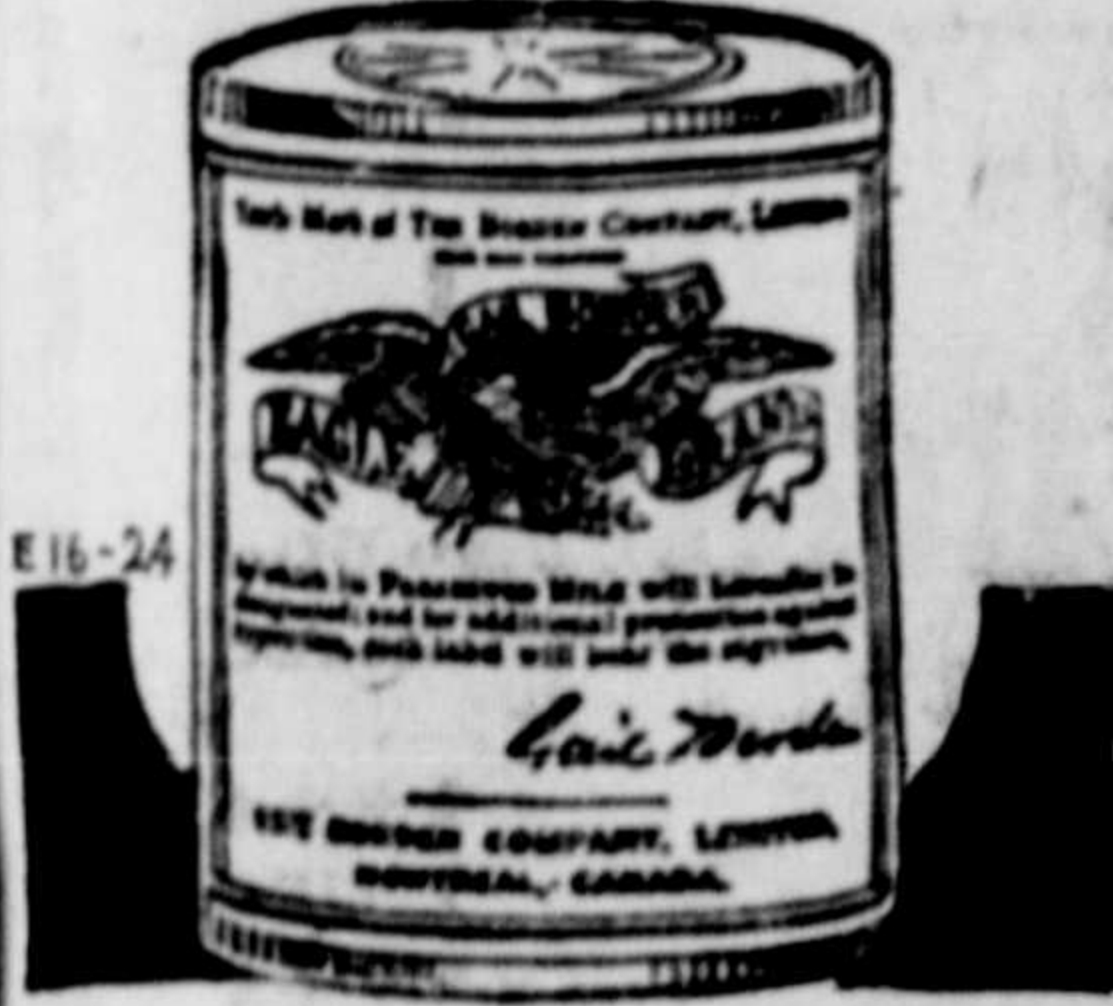

CIVIC BANQUET TO THE AIRMEN

Union Jack and Old Glory Entwined at Official Reception to U.S. Army Men

INTERESTING SPEECHES

With Old Glory and the Union Jack unfurled and crossed at the head table and the singing of "God Save the King" and "The Star Spangled Banner" to open and close the proceedings, Prince Rupert's combined official reception and send-off at an enthusiastic and well attended banquet was held last night in St. Regis Cafe. Having been arranged in a hurried manner, the program was more or less of an impromptu nature. There were about 100 citizens present, one representative of the various organizations in the city having been invited.

Mayor Newton presided and seated around him at the head table were Major Martin, flight commander, Lieuts. Smith, Wade Nelson, Arnold and Harding, United States Consul A. E. Wakefield, Jarvis McLeod, local flight representative, the aldermen, S. J. McLeod, president of the Board of Trade, and other prominent citizens were interspersed among the guests from the head table down. The speakers of the evening were Mayor Newton, Major Martin and U.S. Consul Wakefield. Contributing to the program were John E. Davey, Alex. Clapperton and A.R. Hunter with solos and Harold McEwen with a habitant recitation. Music was furnished by an orchestra comprising A. A. Ensson, Kenny Reed and W. Vaughan Davies, the latter also being accompanist to the soloists. The blessing was pronounced by Bishop Bunoz. Toasts were proposed to the King and the President of the United States and to Major Martin and his fellow flyers.

Mayor Newton
"We are here tonight as representatives of the various public and semi public organizations, orders and church influences to bid a semi-public welcome to the air travellers who are in our midst," said Mayor Newton in opening. "Last Sunday, on the arrival of the machines from Seattle, it had been hoped to extend some courtesies in view of the expectation that our guests would not be remaining so long. Though our plans were limited, climatic conditions prevented a matured reception and the city council decided last night that it would be but fitting to show some mark of respect to our visitors. As a result we are here tonight.

Whole City There
"I would explain that this affair was hastily gotten up and, as accommodation was limited, it was necessary to confine ourselves to inviting but one representative of the many organizations in the city and from the number of men you will realize, Major Martin, that we are well supplied with organizations here even though our air may not be fully metropolitan. Through the representatives of these organizations you have the entire city here to give you a hearty welcome. None of your own people in United States felt more grieved at the slight accident which occurred while you were landing on Sunday than did the people of Prince Rupert. None could have been more sorry that even an accident of the slightest nature should have marred that day's splendid flight under such disadvantageous circumstances. Now we are more pleased that you have come to realize today that the results of that accident were not so serious as you had at first anticipated and that you still have the hope of going off with your fellow flyers as soon as weather permits. (Applause).

Wishes for Future
"Major Martin, in view of the plans set for tomorrow, is desirous that he and his men may not be detained too long here tonight. As a result our proceedings will be as brief as possible.

"On behalf of every citizen of Prince Rupert, Major Martin, I would like to express our pleasure at having you visit Prince Rupert—the one foreign stop between the two great United States territories. We fervently hope that the remainder of your flight may be marred by not even as slight a mishap as that which

occurred on Sunday. In that spirit, the citizens of Prince Rupert—one and all—wish you Godspeed and a safe and successful return home from the great adventure upon which you are embarked."

Jolly Good Fellows

After rousing applause which followed his Worship's address, the assembly joined in singing "For they are Jolly Good Fellows" and giving three cheers, a tiger and grizzly bear for the guests of the evening.

Major Martin

Following the toast to himself and his fellow flyers, Major Martin, amid enthusiastic applause, rose to respond. "It has certainly been a great pleasure to be with you people of Prince Rupert," he said. "At first I did not realize how great the pleasure was going to be. On Sunday it seemed like the whole world was on my shoulders. After having set my heart on this flight, it looked as though every opportunity in the world had gone. While I was landing there on Sunday it looked to me like total disaster. However, all of us are carrying good luck tokens and, while none of us believe in them and would have thrown them overboard on Sunday, I at least have taken heart again. I can promise you that, with one more chance, I will get in no predicament like that again.

"Again let me express the great pleasure it is for us to be here. The spirit of Prince Rupert is simply wonderful. Your willingness to help us, your interest in our undertaking and your co-operation on every possible occasion has been a revelation to us."

Tribute to Wade

Major Martin then went to tell of the intention to leave for Sitka today and outlined the progress of the proposed cruise round the world and home again to Santa Monica, the starting place. The hop from Seattle to Prince Rupert on the entire voyage. Expecting good weather conditions on leaving Seattle, the flight, instead of being a pleasant one as anticipated, had proven to be a fight to the finish with more than once the possibility seeming very close that they would have to make an emergency landing enroute. Major Martin paid tribute to the prowess of Lieut. Wade who had come ploughing through by himself, after failing to leave Seattle with the others. Like in other things, company made confidence in flying and there was always a greater sense of security when planes were flying together, despite the fact that it might be impossible to communicate one with the other.

"If at all our stops we meet people who are so anxious to help us as you are here in Prince Rupert, the entire flight will be most pleasant indeed. We are very grateful to all of you," Major Martin concluded.

Consul Wakefield

Referring briefly on opening to the visit of the late President Harding in Vancouver last summer, which he declared had been an event to cement more closely the love that exists between the two North American nations than any other in history, U.S. Consul Wakefield stated he could only reiterate the expression of pleasure which had been voiced by Major Martin in the magnifi-

cent welcome that had been accorded his fellow countrymen on their visit here. Embarking to achieve a feat that had never before been attempted and in the accomplishment of which four American flying machines and one British were now engaged, Mr. Wakefield assured the visitors that they had the heartiest wishes of all Prince Rupert with them.

"I am not surprised at your expression of gratitude on the goodwill that has been shown you here," continued Mr. Wakefield. "I could have told you beforehand the reception you might have expected to receive. I can tell you from my five years in the consular service here that all United States visitors, especially those who have been here officially, have been welcomed with open arms and in a manner far in excess of what might have been expected.

Spirit of North

"This is a pioneer city and the people, unlike those in larger and more metropolitan centres where views are more restricted, have a broader vision. I can assure you that you will receive similar receptions everywhere you go in the progress of your northern flight. All will be eager and ready to assist you.

"I cannot help but think tonight of those you have left behind you. How anxiously they will follow your movements! Having met you now, I know that all of us here in Prince Rupert will also feel that way. We will feel alike for you and those you have left behind. Those who you have left behind, I am sure, will feel much more heartened when they learn of the magnificent reception accorded you at Prince Rupert and which you owe to Mayor Newton and the officials you have met and greeted."

In order to allow the visitors to take their rest, the proceedings broke up shortly before 10 o'clock with the singing of "God Save the King" and the "Star Spangled Banner."

PREPARING FOR BIG CONVENTION

Republicans of United States to Meet in Auditorium at Cleveland

CLEVELAND, April 9. —Great preparations are being made here for the holding of the Republican National Convention.

Hopkins declares that athletic events which have led previously to confusion, disorder and possibly rioting have been witnessed there with noteworthy decorum and restraint.

The secret of making ends meet, is not infrequently, the difference between Success and Failure. Adaptability to hard Circumstances in order to study them with a view to overcoming them, is a mere stepping-stone to the foot of the born Inventor. And, however we look at them, Inventors are "born" as well as "made."

An Inventor has the ability to step off, into Space as it were, to "take the plunge" to quote the man in the street, which more timid, or more sophisticated folk, lack.

Most Inventors come out of two desires. A desire to save labor, and a desire for better service. But an even more fundamental stage lies back of these. The period in some man's life, of Rock-bottom Necessity. And so there has come down to us from the Ancients, who were fond of putting Truths into adages the pithy statement, that "Necessity is the Mother of Invention."

The Age of Necessity, is therefore the Age richest in Inventions. The Inventions of a fundamental order, those that saved mankind from extinction, rather than those that spared his strength.

Regarded from this viewpoint what people more rich in Invention than the Indian? What people more capable of "making ends meet"? What people closer in spirit to the Secrets of Nature? What people so able to see possibilities, "a way out" where no way apparently exists, as these simple people of the woods, lakes, rivers, plains and mountains?

From these Fundamentalists, the Pioneer had at once most to fear and most to learn. It was this antithesis which sharpened desire to take-up the land and hold it against the veritably embodied Spirit of Circumvention. And it was when the early pioneers began to appreciate the cleverness of the Indian and the Indian began to appreciate the qualities of life as introduced by the new people, that one began to learn of the other and to prosper by exchange of experiences and by exchange of the inventions for which each stood.

The Indian and the pioneer have this in common. Both were always face to face with Necessity. Danger was clear-cut . . . everywhere. No getting away from it. And to some extent it is interesting to be able to decipher in most of the primitive inventions of the Indians, whether their habitat was the shores about the Great Lakes, the Prairies from the Lakes of the Woods to the foothills of the Rockies, or the Rockies themselves or the littoral of the Pacific, a certain something, like an Atmosphere, a curious Fragrance, suggestive of Danger . . . a bizarre note . . .

GRIM PARIS PRISON TO BECOME MUSEUM OF ANCIENT JUSTICE

Instruments of Torture Used In Ancient Days to Instill Fear of Crime

PARIS, April 9. —The old "Conciergerie," the medieval prison on the Island of the City in the heart of Paris, will be transformed into a "Museum of Justice and Police," where children of the primary and high schools may come to study the evolution of the methods of detecting crime and administering justice through the ages.

The sombre walls of the prison, with its dark dungeons, still contain all the instruments of torture in use during feudal times to extract confessions from men charged with crimes or misdemeanors. Documents showing the plots, counter-plots and intrigues of the Renaissance, and the uprising and violence of the nation during the Revolution have been preserved in its cellars.

A bill has been introduced in the Chamber of Deputies by M. Petitjean, requesting the government, in view of the great crime wave now sweeping France, murders, acts of violence and thefts, to gather these historical relics into a museum, so as to instill in the minds of youth a salutary fear and horror of crime.
