

Flight Delayed until Tomorrow; Airmen Not Ready in Time

The final touch to repairs of Major Martin's machine was given at the dry dock this morning at 9,50 and the plane went through the ensuing tests satisfactorily but, at a few minutes before twelve o'clock, it was decided that the machine could not be oiled up and refuelled and make the next hop to Sitka without taking chances of finishing up in the dark so the take-off of the United States round-the-world squadron will take place early tomorrow morning. To that end, the machine is being prepared this afternoon and the four will be ready by the time now appointed.

LONDON, April 9. - Having been forced to drop the government rents bill for the time being. Premier Macdonald announced in the House of Commons yesterday that the government would adopt the bill of Ernest Simon, Liberal, known as the "Prevention o? Evictions Bill." He said the government would give this bill all facilities to insure progress, after being subjected in committee to additions and amendments. which he thought would prove satisfactory to all sides.
