The other day the Western Milling Company of Calgary reported that they could get twenty cents a barrel better rates on flour from Calgary to Vancouver than from Calgary to Prince Rupert. Now comes a Winnipeg firm telling practically the same story.

A. Mackenzie, of the Prince Rupert Exchange, wrote the Maple Leaf Milling Co. Ltd. asking for quotations here. They replied in part:

"We happen to be in the position of being able to quote you a better price f.o.b. Vancouver than at Prince Rupert."
