SWEETENING VICTORY FOR CONSERVATIVES

WON BRITISH ELECTION YESTERDAY WITH BIG MARGIN OVER ALL PARTIES

People of Great Britain Put Crushing End to Their First Labor Government Experiment

Liberals Sink to Weak Position--Latest Return Gives Tories, 387; Labor, 148; Grits, 40; Other Parties, 13

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The Conservatives swept the boards in the general election which took place yesterday throughout England, Scotland and Wales and the north of Ireland. Out of a total of 588 returns received up to six o'clock this evening the Conservatives have secured 387 seats, making a majority over all parties so far of 186 and placing them in a predominant position in the country to carry out the policies for which they have stood. The total membership of the House of Commons is 615, so that there are few places yet to hear from. There were 583 seats contested, the balance having gone by acclamation.

The victory is looked upon as a direct refusal of the nation to move in the direction of Bolshevism and is undoubtedly a blow to the red element that was trying to carry the labor party with it.

One of the most striking things about the returns is the practical wiping out of the Liberal party as a factor in the Government of the country. Labor has taken its place permanently as the official opposition and the forty members of the old party will find themselves without any considerable influence in the New House.

Labor Crushed

The people of Great Britain put to a crushing end their first experience with a Labor government returning the Conservatives to power in parliament with one of the strongest majorities recorded during the last century—almost two to one. In this sweeping political change, the Liberals sunk to the weakest position experienced by them since the realignment of parties more than ninety years ago.

At 4:30 this afternoon, the Conservatives had made a net gain of 138 seats while the Liberals lost 100 and Labor, 38.

The severest blow for the Liberals was the defeat of their leader—Hon. H. H. Asquith—by Mitchell, the Labor candidate in Paisley. A Liberal record of 92 years in this seat was thus broken. Mr. Asquith says he will find another seat and stand again.

Sir Hamar Greenwood won a three-cornered fight in East Walthamstow with a plurality of 3,066 over the Laborite. Greenwood ran as an anti-Socialist and constitutionalist.

Lloyd George Elected

Ex-Premier Lloyd George was re-elected polling 16,053 to 3,401 for his Labor opponent, Prof. Zimmern.

Attorney General Patrick Hastings, whose conduct of the Campbell prosecution was perhaps the most important single indirect cause of the downfall of the Labor government, was returned in his seat at Wallsend by a 2,000 plurality over S. Showers, the Conservative.

Premier Ramsay MacDonald was re-elected in Aberystwyth with 2,100 plurality over Capt. Williams, Liberal.

Phillip Snowden, chancellor of

the exchequer, was returned in west Yorkshire.

Winston Churchill, Constitutional, was elected with 9,000 plurality.

Clear Majority

Frank Hodges, civil lord of the admiralty, was defeated in Lichfield, Staffordshire, by R. Wilson, Conservative, whose majority was 2,000.

Even if the Conservatives should lose all the remaining seats, they would have a clear majority which bids fair to be the greatest the party has ever had.

Premier Macdonald declared today that defeat was sometimes the finest thing that could happen to any party. With the present state of trade and the general outlook, he asserted that he did not envy the Conservatives their job.

Women have fared rather badly so far. Only Lady Astor and Miss Williamson, Laborite, have been elected.

Early Returns

Earliest returns last night indicated that a change was likely to take place. At one o'clock a gain of thirty seats had been made by the Conservatives and this gradually increased, until half past two.

Miss Margaret Bondfield, whose parliamentary record was considered noteworthy, was defeated by less than a thousand votes by a Conservative, Sir Arthur Holland.

Tom Mann, the Labor communist, was badly defeated in Nottingham East by E. Brocklebank, Conservative.

Lady Astor was re-elected for Plymouth.

One of the notable features of the election was the defeat in Paisley of Right Hon. H. H. Asquith, former premier and leader of the Liberal party.

FISH ARRIVALS

Four American Boats Sold 83,000 Pounds at Exchange This Morning

Four American halibut boats sold catches totalling 83,000 pounds at the Fish Exchange this morning. There were no Canadian arrivals.

Sales were as follows: Sunner, 35,000 lbs., at 14.4c and 7c, to the Royal Fish Co.; Sitka, 23,000 lbs., at 14c and 7c; Taloosh, 14,000 lbs., at 15.5c and 7c, to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.

MORE HALIBUT MARKETED HERE

Total Already Half a Million Pounds Higher Than Any Previous October

With one more day to go the halibut sales show that the arrivals here this month have been 2,628,500 pounds, which is nearly half a million pounds more than for any previous October. This has been done in spite of the bad weather which has prevailed.

The total sales for October last year amounted to 1,844,100, and in 1922 they were 2,164,100.

TERRACE LADY PASSES AWAY

Funeral of Mrs. John Jones Took Place on Tuesday From Anglican Church

The funeral took place at Terrace Tuesday of Mrs. Emma Blanche Gordon Jones, wife of Arthur Jones of that place at the age of nearly 49 years. She was born at Gibraltar.

Mrs. Jones was held in high esteem in the community and her demise is greatly regretted. She passed away on Sunday after a long illness extending over three years. The funeral took place under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid of the Anglican church and the funeral services were conducted by Rural Dean Marsh in the Anglican Church, arrangements being in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers.

Besides the widower, there is also a sister at Terrace, Mrs. Arthur Jones.

TENDERS ARE IN FOR CRYSTAL GARDENS FOR C.P.R. AT VICTORIA

Tenders Have Been Received for Construction of Crystal Gardens in Victoria

VICTORIA, Oct. 30.—Seven tenders have been received for the construction of the Crystal Gardens, the new amusement centre to be erected here near the Empress Hotel by the C.P.R. These tenders are now under consideration and it is understood the contract will be let and actual work commenced before the beginning of the year.

CAMBRIDGESHIRE STAKES RUN OFF

Twelve Pointer, First; Bachelor's Point, Second; and Verdlet, Third

NEWMARKET, England, Oct. 30.—Twelve Pointer, owned by the Duke of Westminster, won the Cambridgeshire Stakes. Bachelor's Point was second and Verdlet, third.

Vancouver Grand Jury Urges Reform Police Organization to Effectually Check Crime

VANCOUVER, Oct. 30.—In their presentation to Mr. Justice Murphy, who presided at the criminal assize court here, the Grand Jury yesterday declared the whole defective system of both the Vancouver and the provincial police and secret service branch of the Canadian Mounted Police to be wrong and badly in need of reorganization.

Supporting this conclusion the Grand Jury cited several murder and bank robbery cases in the city which the police had failed to solve and in connection with which no arrests had been made.

The political choice of a crown prosecutor, the report declared, to be the weak link in the system of Justice.

The Grand Jury recommends that the chief inspector of the city detective force be honorably superannuated for his long and faithful services and that highly trained outside men be engaged to superintend the suppression of crime in Vancouver.

Dealing with the drug traffic, the report claimed that the peddling of contraband narcotics to addicts was not on the wane or in any way becoming less. Deadly narcotics, the report continues, are almost entirely manufactured in Germany and exported and it is suggested that international steps be taken to stop the traffic.

Indians have reported to the provincial police the finding of a body on a beach near Klew Nuggett in Grenville Channel believed to be that of Walter Bates, a native of Hartley Bay, who was drowned last June. The matter has been taken up with the coroner.

Walter Bates was about 32 years of age and was the son of Peter Bates. He was working out of Butedale Cannery and fell overboard one night from a seine boat. It is believed that he was tripped up with the line of another boat that was in tow. The accident occurred in Graham Reach.

HALIBUT SCHOONER PICKED UP BY KODIAK

Adrift off Icy Cape with its engine totally disabled, the Seattle halibut schooner Akutan, Capt. Olson, was picked up at noon yesterday by the halibut vessel Kodiak and towed into shelter at Dixon Harbor, according to information given out at local U.S. Customs headquarters says the Juneau Empire. The disabled ship carried a crew of 13 and had a cargo of approximately 37,000 pounds of halibut.

Word of the rescue of the Akutan was brought here by the rescuing vessel which is commanded by Capt. Ole Larson. The Kodiak was too heavily loaded to handle the Akutan into port here. Customs officials today sent out the cannery tender, Francis E. a Tee Harbor boat, to Dixon Harbor to bring the Akutan into this port. The tender left from Auk Bay at noon today and will return here as quickly as it can make the trip.

The Akutan is rated at 57 gross and 43 net tons. It is owned by Rude & Bjork, of Seattle.

Vancouver and Rupert Becoming Increasingly Important - Thornton

General Overhaul of Freight Rates Urged by President of Canadian National Railways in Address

BRANTFORD, Ont., Oct. 30.—That the entire structure of freight rates should be re-examined by the Railway Commission with a view to re-adjusting them so that satisfactory arrangements could be made to the country at large was advocated by Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways in an address delivered before the Brantford City Council, citizens and representatives of adjoining municipalities at a luncheon held in the Brantford Golf and Country Club yesterday.

Sir Henry made the foregoing recommendation following the introduction in his address of the discussion over the Crow's Nest agreement. "The Crow's Nest agreement," said Sir Henry, "has become a distinct issue." The railway companies avail themselves of the judicial procedure for the determination of this controversy and they applied to the railway commission for settlement as this was a function of that body. It was right and proper that the matter should be referred to them any other procedure would have been a violation of business judgment, common sense and protection of your interests. The case was fully argued by both sides and the commission rendered its decision.

Some Dissatisfied

"But this is only part of the story. A large number of people and a large section of the country was dissatisfied with this decision it was not to be expected that any decision in this matter would be unanimously received but he who regards a decision as unjust or unfair has the same right of appeal as his neighbor. It is the same with sections as with individuals they can avail themselves of judicial procedure and carry the case to the supreme court, for courts are provided for the purpose of settling cases between individuals, corporations and contestants. People who have a difference do not go into the street and shoot each other up. Differences are not settled by force of arms but in course of justice. That is the procedure in all civilized countries. It seems to me the settlement of the Crow's Nest agreement should proceed in an orderly fashion through various tribunals and whatever decision ultimately may be reached, the railways will accept in good faith."

TWO KILLED WHEN LOWERING A DORY

JUNEAU, Oct. 30.—Two deaths have resulted from an accident on a fishing boat in Hoonah which occurred last Sunday.

Andrew Fulton was killed almost instantly when he became entangled in the winch with which he was lowering his dory from his gas boat.

Mrs. Fulton tried to rescue him and also became caught, suffering a crushed thigh and internal injuries. She was brought to the government hospital in Juneau on the Estebeth Monday and died Tuesday morning. The body was shipped to Hoonah on the Estebeth last night.

Mr. and Mrs. Fulton are survived by two grown sons who reside in Hoonah.

EIGHT KILLED IN EXPLOSION

NELSON, Oct. 30.—The death list in the Farron railway disaster on the Kettle Valley Railway said to have been the result of an explosion on the train, rose to eight last night with the officials of the Canadian Pacific Railway reporting the finding of two bodies, an unidentified Hindu and a young Doukhobor woman said to be Miss Mary Strelloff of Nelson.

Sidelights on a Great Industry

A BAR TO INDUSTRIAL PROGRESS

A complete consensus of the business men of British Columbia, outside the lumber industry, see in the Timber Royalties Act of 1914 a very serious obstacle indeed to the industrial progress of the Province.

Important trade organizations all over B.C. have gone on record as demanding the removal of the impediments in the Act to the free expansion of our trade and commerce.

It is agreed that when conditions seem favorable, as they now do, for a trade revival it is peculiarly unfortunate that the presence on our statute book of this out-of-date piece of experimental legislation should threaten to paralyze the chief purchasing power of the province.

Apart from being an all-round hindrance to improved business conditions the present Timber Royalties Act has many inherent defects that justify its amendment. 1—It is a pre-war instrument which is not applicable to a post-war economic situation. In common with many other 1914 measures it has no justification for existence in the vastly different conditions of today.

2—It is founded on an absolutely unsound economic basis. Royalty is essentially a levy on a raw material. The present Act taxes wages, equipment and every factor entering into the cost of producing and distributing the manufactured product. There is no precedent for a measure of this nature. The B.C. Lumber Industry is due for a revival with resultant good business all round. But the Royalty Act of 1914 effectively bars the way.

IMMENSE COST OF MAKING PICTURE

Half a Million Feet of Film Was Used in Shooting Scaramouche

The enormous amount of money and material used in making a big film spectacle is illustrated in the case of "Scaramouche," Rex Ingram's production of Rafael Sabatini's story of the French Revolution, which is being shown here Friday.

"Scaramouche" easily exposed as much raw film as "The Four Horsemen," which held the record for some time. More than 500,000 feet of film was used during the "shooting" of the picture.

The amount of raw film consumed, however, is only one item in the cost of producing pictures of any size. The actual "shooting" process is not the chief expense, what is "shot" makes the debit side of the ledger mount up.

The biggest item was the construction of sets representing the palace of the Tuilleries, an old chateau and city streets of the France of 1789. Kennels, pens, stables and cages had to be built for dogs, pigeons, ducks, cats, oxen, horses, canaries, peacocks and other birds and animals. Carriages and coaches had to be reconstructed with perfect historical accuracy. Costumes had to be made for the 10,000 persons who appeared in the mob scenes. There were uniforms for the soldiery, and outfits of especial magnificence for players representing the nobility.

11,200 Persons Involved

The total number of persons involved in some capacity in the production reached the figure of approximately 11,200. Ten thousand of these made up the mob that rushed through Paris when the Revolution broke. Of those with definite other places in the picture's making were 30 principal players, 34 assistant directors, 8 research experts, 22 cameramen with their assistants, 23 property men, 65 electricians, 55 costumers, 54 wig makers, 11 architects, 630 carpenters, 75 plasterers, 88 painters and scenic artists and 48 chauffeurs and teamsters.

On the sixty-acre location where the duplicates of streets of Paris, Gavrillac and Rennes were constructed, 412 tons of cobblestones were used for paving, besides 610 tons of gravel and sand. For the buildings 762,264 feet of lumber was necessary. Also 310 tons of plaster, 4,000 pounds of nails, and 200 tons of casting plaster.

TO CROSS PACIFIC IN 32-FOOT BOAT

Four Men Set Out From Tacoma In Small Craft—Honolulu is Their Destination

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 30.—Aboard a 32-foot boat four men from this city have set out on a cruise across the Pacific, with Honolulu as their destination. The cruise was planned by Karl Rathfon, an experienced navigator of small craft, and his boat is the Idle Hour.

The Idle Hour has a 10-horsepower motor, a beam of 11 feet and a depth from the deck of six feet. Rathfon declared she could ride any wave the Pacific could raise. She sailed with half a ton of iron filings as ballast, in addition to large supplies of fuel oil and provisions. The men have no radio, but expect passing vessels to report their progress occasionally. They plan to cruise down the coast to San Pedro, Cal., then across to the Hawaiian Islands.

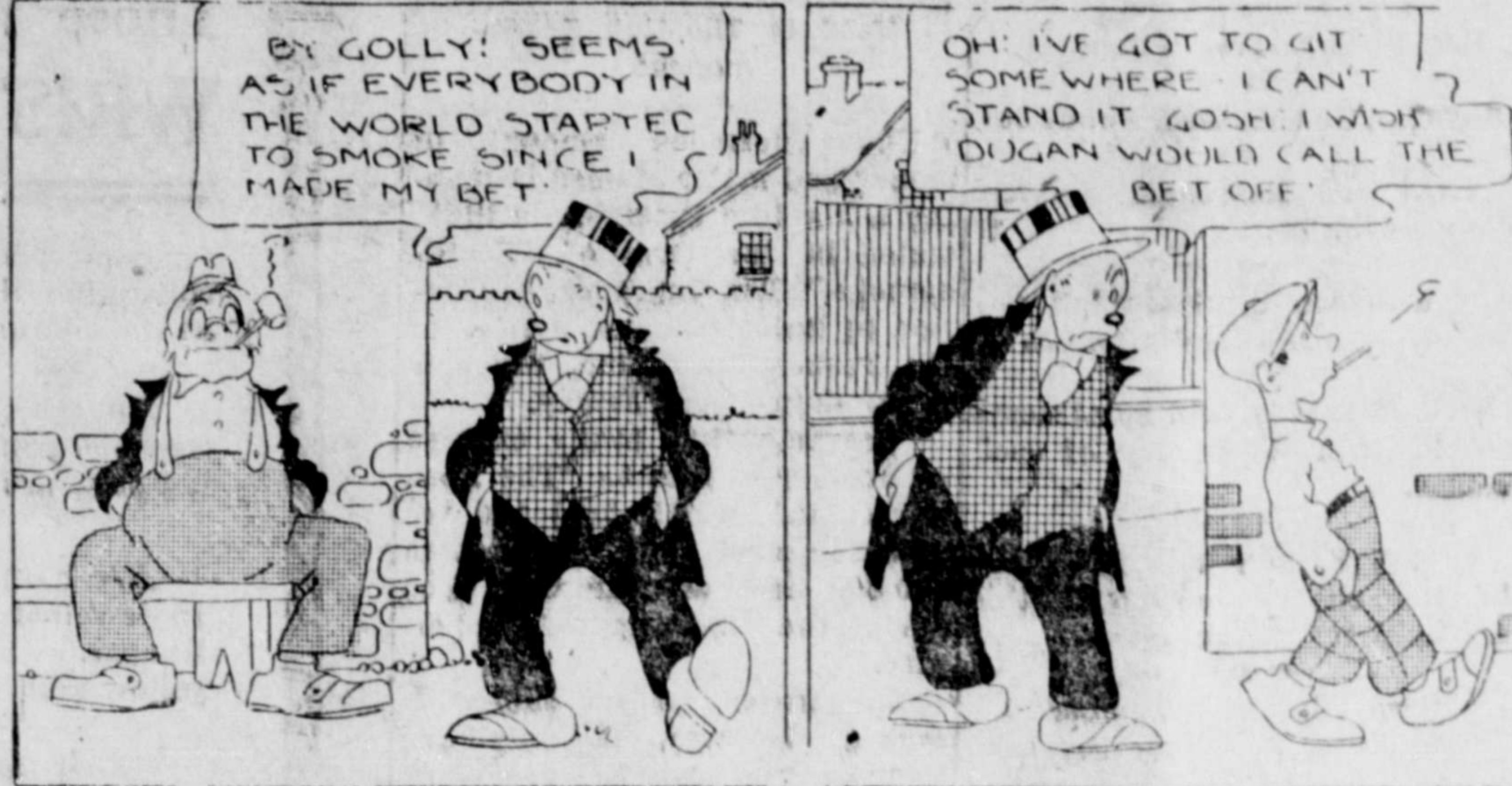

VANCOUVER AND RUPERT BECOMING INCREASINGLY IMPORTANT SAYS THORNTON

(continued from page one)

future examination of or action taken in respect to the Crow's Nest agreement will be removed from the field of politics. Economic questions such as this are never satisfactorily settled in legislative halls. It would be very unsatisfactory to Canada if economy questions were settled as a result of a political agreement.

Dominion Viewpoint

Sir Henry pointed out that no matter how the Crow's Nest agreement was decided more or less dissatisfaction would be evinced in certain sections of the country. He emphasized the fact that he did not want to say anything which might be regarded as unsympathetic to the western provinces as he had just returned from a tour of the west and he had the highest regard for the courage, tenacity and high citizenship of the farmers in the west, but one must examine all problems from a universal point of view and not from a sectional aspect. Sir Henry emphatically declared that the subject of freight rates must be considered from a dominion wide point and that fundamentally the rates must be such as to enable farmers successfully to market their products in the markets of the world. The wealth of the nation, he pointed out was based on agricultural products and he said it was axiomatic that freight rates must be of such a character as to permit the farmers of Canada to compete against the farmers of other countries throughout the world. This principle was just as important to the manufacturers of the east as to the agriculturalists of the west.

Rates Inconsistent

"The settlement of the Crow's Nest agreement reaches much farther than most people imagine," continued Sir Henry. "It involves the whole freight rate structure. Our present freight rates have evolved as the country grew, they have grown inconsistently, unsatisfactorily and somewhat illogically. I would recommend a re-examination of the whole freight rate situation. This task can best be done by the railway commission and I make this suggestion quite irrespective of whatever decision may be made in connection with the Crow's Nest agreement."

"It must be remembered that the freight channels are changed. Vancouver and Prince Rupert are growing increasingly important. Somewhere in the west there will appear a traffic divide. West of the divide, traffic will go to the Pacific coast; east of the divide to the Atlantic seaboard. There was a day when traffic moved east and west. The day is also coming when traffic will move more and more north and south as the trade union increases."

Routes Changing

"With the march of time and events traffic routes are changing. Freight rates of thirty years ago, which were then in the interests of the Dominion are not so today. In the interests of the Dominion of Justice and of tranquility I think the railway commission should undertake a study to see whether we may not lay down a more successful structure of freight rates in the interests of the whole country than they are today."

This is the proper way of approaching a problem of so much economic importance to all our people."

Sir Henry arrived at Brantford from Montreal yesterday morning and subsequently met the members of the Chamber of Commerce and representatives of adjoining municipalities in conference. Subsequently he was tendered a luncheon which was presided over by J. Hamm, president of the Chamber of Commerce and among the speakers were Mayor F. W. Billo, W. G. Raymond, M.P. for Southbrant, W. J. Riesberry, agent Canadian National Railways, Brantford, who introduced Sir Henry and W. B. Raeb.

Presentation



BOOM STICKS ARE SHIPPED

Forty Car Loads Going to Great Lakes; Tie Cutting in Progress

Camps have been opened and preparations generally for the cutting of ties in the interior this winter for the Canadian National Railways are well under way reports P. S. Bonney, district forester, who returned on last night's train from a ten day trip up the line. Sub-contractors are well advanced with operations in the bush and have already commenced cutting. Some of the main camps have already made from 6,000 to 8,000 ties. Big camps already opened are those of the Hanson Timber & Lumber Co., at Sheraton, Priestly and Decker Lake, and those of J. McNeil of Telkwa at Perow and Tye Lake. It is expected that the railway will be requiring about 600,000 ties this winter. This is a considerable reduction

From the contracts let last year, Interior pole camps are temporarily closed down now pending an improvement in market conditions. Mr. Bonney reports, it is hoped that the present heavy stocks of poles will be sold during the coming winter or spring making it possible to open the camps again.

Successful Drive
A successful drive of piles was carried out this season from Cariboo Creek above Hazelton to the booming ground at Cedar, a distance of some 50 miles—Mr. Bonney states. About 12,000 or 13,000 pieces were thus delivered by the Hanson Timber & Lumber Co. The success carrying out of this expedition should open opportunities for development of the industry the Skeena River by making it possible to get at stands which have hitherto been inaccessible. The Royal Lumber Co. and Van Meter are at present shipping 20-foot spruce boom from Hanall and Vancouver respectively to the Great Lakes. This business involves about 400 pieces which, shipped twelve to the flat car, means the use of some thing like forty cars. The business will be used by Eastern pulp companies in their local operations.
