Strike Reduces Service on British Railways and Causes Increase Motors

LONDON, Jan. 21.—Great Britain's main railways are being run on skeleton schedules today as a result of the strike of locomotive crews on all lines, which took effect at midnight. The strike was started by the Associated Society of Engineers and Firemen after an overwhelming vote of members against the acceptance of the reduction of pay decided upon by the railway wages board. It is not supported by the national union of railway employees, the big nation wide organization, nor by the railway clerks.

The unionists claim the loco motive men are coming out solidly, resulting in curtailment of the service.

The railway companies express the hope that they will get a better service going in a day or so. They congratulated themselves on having delivered London its milk today.
