KARACHI, Apr. 26-Stuart MacLaren, the British airman attempting to fly around the world, was forced to land at Pallee, 172 miles from Ajmere in Rajputana province, Western India, while enroute from Karachi to uled stop. He will probably be held up for a few days.

Germany Reparations Report is Accepted by Four Allied Powers

PARIS, April 26.-Replies of the big four allied powers to the reparation commission's communication regarding the expert report have been received and all accept the committee's report wholly. France alone raises the question of procedure. while Italy categorically declared the report to be "an indivisible whole," which should be taken in its entirety without condition or qualification.

BERLIN, April 26.-Acceptance of the Dawes report as basis of reparations by the league of German industrialists is

announced. Political circles regard this as significant as pledging the support of an organization whose influence is indispensible to the solution of the German economic tangle.

## Re-election of Poincare is not at all sure says Canadian Press **Correspondent Political Review**

PARIS, April 26.- (By Canadian Press).- The four-year term of the present Chamber of Deputies being up this year, Premier Poincare has decided to appeal to the country on May 11. In doing so he has not been without courage, because most of the members favored an extension of the life of this Parliament until the spring of 1925.

The last election was fought on November 16, 1919, when the issues centered exclusively around the foreign policy of France. As a result the groups elected had almost the same policy-that of making Germany pay for the cost of the war.
