Ditchburn, Commissioner of the Indian Department in B.C., returned to his office Thursday from a Northern tour says the Victoria Times, - He announced, at any rate for the present, a merger of the Naas and Queen Charlotte Island agencies under the charge of W. E. Collison, agent for the former terri tory. The latter agency is vacant by the resignation of Thomas Deasy, relired. The Q.C.I. reserves contain the most advanced! aborigines in the province, and direct supervision, it appears, has become less urgent.

Mr. Ditchburn found the Indians well employed, lfaving been busy in pole cutting orders all winter, and now passing on the canneries for fishing. The trapping nomads of the Stikine and adjacent agencies have not done! so well, owing to the open Winter having deprived them of many game animals, which retired to remote areas of the nor-June, 1924, for the pur-libern forest and muskeg.

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age. and by allens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. 'How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department ands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Gov. rnment Agent

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and \$,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Di vision, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed

forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

PURCHASE Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved

Crown lands, not being timberland for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) and \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands." Mill, factory, or industrial sites on

timber land, not exceeding 40 acres. may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage. HOMESITE LEASES


