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Hollow Victory for IWA

∧ N IRONIC outcome of the recent lumber strike \ is that the large operators, at whom the IWA centred its main argument, may emerge from the dispute in a comparatively stronger position than before.

Having fared badly in the already weakened United Kingdom market as a result of their labor difficulties, B.C. lumber companies must now switch their attention to the United States. Although selling below the border is not a simple matter under the best of circumstances, the larger companies are considerably better equipped for it than the small. Lumber shipped to the U.K. required little preparation as British importers accepted it in its rough green form. For Americans it must be dressed and dried, which means putting it through expensive dry kilns and planing machinery. Here lies the difference between the two general sets of operators. While the large companies have all the necessary equipment and need only to concentrate on making sales, the small outfits are almost totally unprepared. Having sold to the U.K. so long and so successfully, they are short on the processing equipment required for the American market. Consequently, before they find new buyers they must finance themselves for capital expansion. Should their fortunes continue in their present direction, there is no doubt that many will have to sell out or close down. As the smaller mills produce at least half of the coast forest lumber output, such a development carries a serious threat to many workers and the province as a whole. Considering these factors and the loss of income suffered by IWA members as a result of the strike, we have even at this late date not determined exactly what comprised the victory that the IWA leaders claimed.
