## PREMIER IS WELL RECEIVED IN COURTENAY

### CHINESE REDS SET FIRE TO CITY OF CANTON WHERE SITUATION SERIOUS

#### Prime Minister's Party Delayed by Storm When Bound South for Comox

Get Great Reception at Courtenay and Cumberland and are in Victoria this Afternoon

(Special to Daily News)  
COURTENAY, Oct. 16.—The Premier and his party got a dusting on the way south on the destroyer Patricia and some of the members of the party were bowled over by an attack of mal de mer. They were rather a sorry looking lot on their arrival at Comox wharf. However, they received a genuine welcome from the citizens of Courtenay, Comox, Cumberland, Sandwick and the other centres of population here and very soon were themselves again. They were surprised at the extent of the farming country here and at the general appearance of prosperity. They got a splendid reception everywhere and especially at the mass meeting in Cumberland where they received an ovation from the coal miners. The party expects to be in Victoria today.

COURTENAY, Oct. 16.—Eight Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and members of the party disembarked from H.M.C.S. Patricia at Comox yesterday morning. The last part of the voyage from Prince Rupert was made in the face of a southeast gale but the Premier and his colleagues landed none the worse for the experience.

Yesterday afternoon the Prime Minister was formally welcomed to the town and district by Acting Mayor Stimms and later at a civic dinner held here. Afterwards the Premier drove to the town of Cumberland, six miles distant, where he addressed a public meeting.

Premier King received a deputation from the returned men under the Soldier Settlement Board in the Comox Valley.

Today the party is in Nanaimo and later is expected to reach Victoria where they are due at a reception in the afternoon and at a dinner in Government House in the evening.

Tomorrow the Liberals of the city will entertain the Premier and in the evening he will address a public meeting.

#### LUMBER SHIP IS ASHORE TODAY ON COLUMBIA RIVER

PORTLAND, Oregon, Oct. 16.—The steamer Eastern Knight is ashore on the Columbia River a short distance from Astoria but is expected to refloat on the next high tide. The vessel has a cargo of five million feet of lumber.

#### MANY LIVES LOST IN RUSSIAN FLOODS

River Amur Overflows Its Banks Submerging Villages and Causing 400 Deaths

MOSCOW, Oct. 16.—Four hundred lives have been lost in disastrous floods rising in the River Amur in the Nikolaievsk region. Two villages were submerged.

#### BALDWIN MAKES AN ATTACK ON LABOR PLATFORM

Ridicules National Ownership and National Control; Says Leaders Cheap Jacks

LONDON, Oct. 16.—Former Premier Baldwin addressed a large audience in Queen's Hall yesterday ridiculing what he called Labor's universal cure of national ownership and national control to set things right. He described the labor ministers as cheap jacks, always full of enthusiasm and never doing anything. He pictured Premier Macdonald as being overborne, helpless in the hands of the extreme socialist wing of his party and predicted that the labor party would never accomplish anything until it killed this "old man of the sea."

#### PORTLAND CANAL ORES MAKE GOOD SHOWING IN SACRAMENTO EXPOSITION

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 16.—Portland Canal district was well represented in the mineral display at the exhibition in connection with the annual convention of the American Mining Congress here. It was the first time British Columbia had been represented at the congress and the exhibit was a comprehensive one, including ores from all parts of the province and especially from the northern districts. A national exposition of mines and mine equipment was staged in connection with the convention.

#### EDMONTON INVITES TENDERS FOR SCHOOL

Will Erect Fourteen Room Modern Structure North of C.N.R. Tracks

EDMONTON, Oct. 16.—Edmonton is calling of tenders for the erection of a new fourteen room school to be located on a site already owned by the city north of the C.N.R. track. It is to be of reinforced concrete.

#### ITALY WILL SPEND MONEY ON PUBLIC WORKS AS RELIEF

ROME, Oct. 16.—Premier Mussolini announces that his cabinet will shortly approve the expenditure of an additional six million lire for public works in order to relieve the housing and unemployment problems.

#### NEW PLANE ENTERS CROSS-CHANNEL SERVICE

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The largest single-engined passenger-carrying airplane ever built will shortly be put into service between England and the continent. The air screw will be nearly 16 feet long and the plane has adjustable wing flaps, which help to reduce the landing speed and add to the safety of the plane. The cruising speed will be about 105 miles an hour, and the plane will carry 14 passengers.

#### LURE ENGLISHMEN

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The number of men emigrating from England during 1923 totalled 159,000, or 46,000 more than in 1922, according to statistics published in the Board of Trade Journal. The women's total is 108,000 as against 83,000 in 1922. The net loss to the country by excess of emigration over immigration was 208,695.

#### WAR VETERANS SEMI-ANNUAL

#### MANY CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATES IN FIELD IN BRITISH ELECTION

LONDON, Oct. 16.—According to the official list, the Conservatives will have 530 candidates in the field to contest the 615 seats in the House of Commons. This is considerably in excess of the number at the last election.

#### ONE FISHING BOAT

Only one fishing boat sold her catch at the exchange this morning. She was the Pelican which 5,000 pounds of halibut which sold to the Cold Storage Company at 18 and 7.

#### Chinese Reds are Burning City of Canton; Looting is Proceeding and Many Leave

HONG KONG, Oct. 16.—Fires started by Chinese Reds are burning fiercely in five different parts of Canton, according to word received here this morning. The situation is serious as the buildings are of an inflammable nature and are crowded close together. Many of the streets are so narrow that it is possible or those living upstairs to reach each other from the windows. The method adopted by the Reds is to pour kerosene into the open gutters which usually run down the centre or at the side of the narrow streets. This they ignite and the buildings catch fire easily.

Lawless bands are looting the stores and the whole city is very much disturbed.

The river steamers, of which there are a number plying between Canton and Hong Kong, are crowded with refugees coming here to escape the dangers of the rioting.

#### MACDONALD IS LOSING VOICE

Addressing About Twenty Meetings Daily Begins to Tell on Him

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The speeches of laborites yesterday dwelt mainly on what they term the unholy pact of Liberals and Conservatives to keep labor out of power. Some Liberal papers urge the extreme importance of the Liberal party preserving its complete independence. They declare that any other policy would be suicidal.

Premier Macdonald's voice is beginning to show the strain of addressing about twenty meetings daily, but he continues to prosecute a vigorous campaign. He addressed a huge gathering at Manchester last night.

#### SHENANDOAH OFF TO CAMP LEWIS

Big United States Navy Dirigible is Making Flight From San Diego Today

SAN DIEGO, Oct. 16.—The United States navy dirigible Shenandoah cast off from her mooring mast at North Island and headed for Camp Lewis near Tacoma, Washington, at 9.15 this morning.

#### ELECTION RIOTING IN BELFAST WHERE MEETING STOPPED

BELFAST, Oct. 16.—Election rioting occurred here last night growing out of an attempt of Harry Midgley, labor candidate, to hold a series of outdoor meetings. There was much stone throwing during which Midgley was struck on the head and others were injured. The proposed meeting was abandoned.

#### TENDERS CALLED FOR CRYSTAL GARDEN FOR C.P.R. IN VICTORIA

VICTORIA, Oct. 16.—Tenders are being called for the erection of the big building to be used as an amusement centre and to be known as the Crystal Garden on the land granted for the purpose by the city at the back of the Empress Hotel. One of the big features of the building is to be a salt water swimming bath.

#### RADIO FOR LEPER COLONY

MANILA, Oct. 16.—The leper colony on the Island of Culion, consisting of some 5,500 persons, is to be connected with the outside world by wireless. A radio receiving set has been donated by an electrical company for the benefit of the lepers, and the work of installing the apparatus on the island has been commenced by the bureau of posts.

#### COMPLIMENT TO SCHOOL STAFF

S. E. Parker Presents Medals and Certificates at Meeting of Parent Teachers Association

The presentation of medals and certificates was the chief business of the evening at the meeting of the Parent Teachers Association last night in the Booth School, Mrs. Arnott presiding.

S. E. Parker, chairman of the school board, made the presentation and, in doing so, spoke highly of the efficiency of the school staff. Of something like fifty pupils who presented themselves for examination in connection with entrance to the High School only two failed, a record Mr. Parker said, which had been surpassed by no other school in the province.

Th Governor General's bronze medal went to Rosemary Winslow of Borden Street school, who was only eight marks behind the highest pupil in the province.

The Bank of Montreal medal for the largest number of cooking prizes was taken by Aleita McKinley of Booth School.

Archdeacon Rix gave an interesting and instructive address on "Impressions of a Teacher" drawing illustrations from his own experience as a teacher and pupil.

The Parent Teachers Association will present the schools with some books and, in doing so, will confer with the school board in order to prevent overlapping.

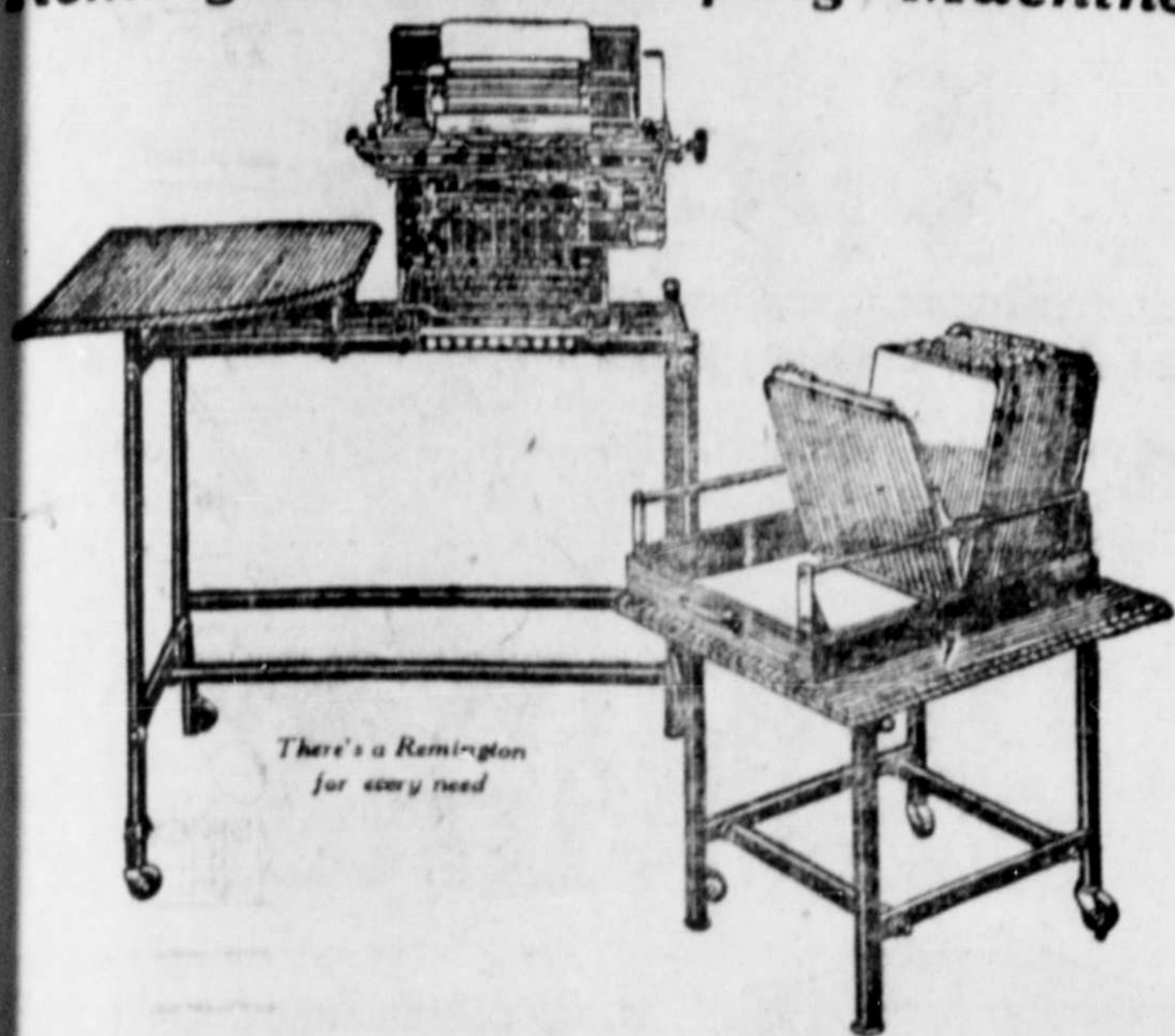

**In the Letter Box**

RESPONSIBLE FOR BOYS

Editor Daily News.

In yesterday's issue of the Daily News appeared the heading "Young Boys Caught Stealing" which raises a question we as a community are bound to answer. There is no man so materialistic as not to have at times a little sentiment and kindly thought engendered in his breast, and who does not admit the necessity of training and helping the young of both sexes during the most impressionable and dangerous period of their existence. The work of the philanthropic societies of this city in providing playgrounds for our children, cannot fail to gladden the hearts of every lover of his fellows—particularly of the younger ones. But to the further question; Is it enough? What is being done is but small, beside the work that waits the doing.

Influence of Training

The child is father to the man, said Wordsworth in one of those jewel sentences, seven words long, that has and will stand the test of time. The state

is but a conglomeration of individuals, and every individual is largely what he is by virtue of the training which he received, or did not receive in youth. These things are platitudes whose truth is all admitted. Yes, but so many people believe the truth of the platitudes and act as though they disbelieved them. Adolescence is of all periods the time when most help is needed when careful handling and sympathetically-wielded authority can effect its best results; and particularly is this so of the boy. For at that most difficult age, the boy, as a rule, is first allowed—and often compelled to meet the garish enticements, the sly temptations and the devious allurements of life, armed only with the pitiful weapon of inexperience. To add to his armour, to aid him in the fight, to provide a means whereby he can avoid permanent harm, what finer or more fitting work is there for any one to do?

Under Privileged

To provide the young with play-grounds and kindergartens; the school boy and the school girl with the opportunity of playing games after school; to provide the boy who has left the school days behind him with some means of "filling in his time" are all great objects and worthy of your earnest consideration.

Particularly in need of help is that class of our youthful citizens which we may designate the "under privileged" boys, whose parents cannot through poverty, or some other reason, provide the help, whose homes do not provide the haven they so greatly need, and lacking which they are exposed to dangers, from which children with good homes are immune.

Help Urgently Needed

It is for boys of the "under-privileged" class—and they are to be found in every town—that systematic help and interesting surrounding are most urgently needed. The surface of "boy-work" in this city has only been scratched. There are plenty of wealthy, kind-hearted men amongst us, many of them able to recall the deep desire for sweeter air which dogged their younger days, to whom the opportunity now afforded them to extend the activities of such societies as those engaged in the good work, will heartily appeal. The school can never take the place of a good home, nor can any one society guarantee the happiness of these young lives—we all must work together to ensure that the feet of Rupert's

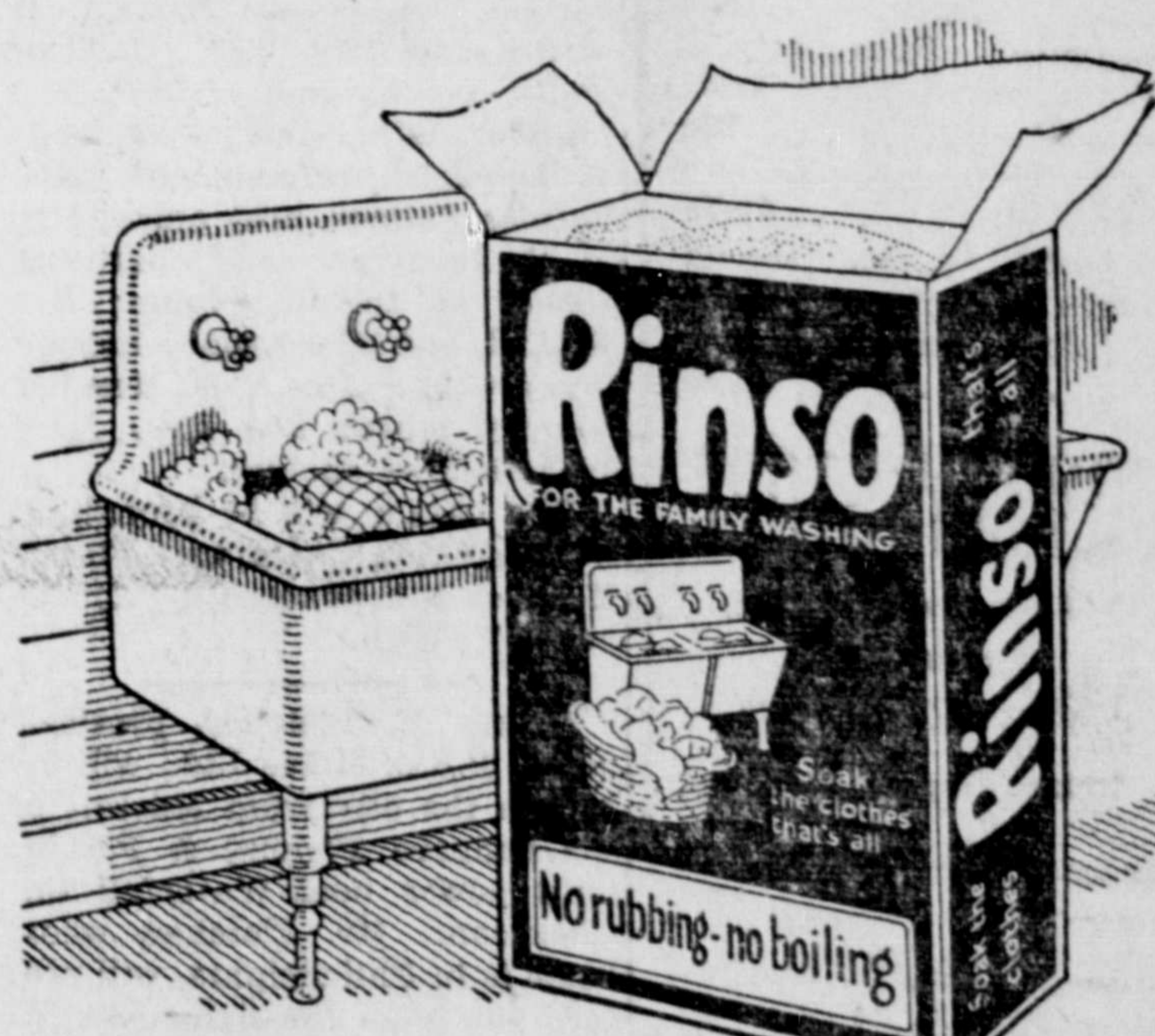

## RUPERT QUOTED IN DIATRIBE

Saturday Tribune of Vancouver Refers to Conditions Here in Front Page Editorial Article

The Saturday Tribune of Vancouver has the following in which Prince Rupert conditions are mentioned:

"Mayor Owen has pulled a hornet's nest about his ears with his eleventh-hour heroics about cleaning up Chinatown. Unless he takes a hint, he will find himself the centre of a crowd of very angry citizens whose anger he has stirred up. His puerile and puffing policy of 'cleaning up Chinatown' when the whole city needs cleaning up, and his method of advertising on the front pages of the daily press a 48-hour warning to all denizens of the underworld before any police action is taken has angered instead of mollified the public.

"Vancouver morally is no worse than any other seaport and not half so bad" as Prince Rupert for instance, where organized vice is in the saddle and the "red-tight district" of Comox Avenue is accepted as one of the town's regular industries, as legitimate as the shopping district. But if Mayor Owen is out to "clean up" Vancouver, why not have it preceded with an business lines and not made a mockery of.

#### Faded Business Openly

"For nine months Mayor Owen has done the honors at the City Hall and presided over the Police Commission. Hold-ups, bank robberies, murders occurred without disturbing his calm equanimity. Gambling joints have been running and book-makers have plied their business openly at cigar stands and in business offices. Immorality was made to pay heavy license fees through the bail bond system. It looked as if Mayor Owen had settled down to a policy of laissez faire.

Even when political interests decided to make one of the Commissioners a sacrifice, the Mayor sat calmly by without blinking an eyelash while the politicians threw the Jonah overboard. Not by so much as a blink did he give any intimation that he was the responsible head of the Police Commission. Nothing was altered. Not until election time draws near does the Mayor waken up from his sloth—to warn all the undesirables of the city that they had better quit for a few days because the police are go-
