Wonderful Career Of
New York Clergyman.

One of the outstanding figures for many years past in New York has been Rev. Percy Stickney Grant. He has had charge of a rich congregation yet he has consistently preached the gospel of the poor man and has taken advanced ground on almost every question of the day. For thirty-one years he has held the same position and the representatives of the old families have taken their Sunday sermons as a tonic and something to talk about.

Dr. Grant has usually taken the unpopular side on outstanding questions. He defended the burning of the U.S. flag in public, spoke up for W. Z. Foster, the Communist, testified for an I.W.W. agitator, excused the Soviet for executing the vicar-general, and yet through it all he was backed up by his wealthy congregation.

This parson stands for more liberal marriage laws and easy divorce. He strongly espoused the cause of free speech, and in later years, followed the modernist trend of religious thought in the direction of Unitarianism. In all this time he was openly hostile to his bishop, Dr. Manning, but he had a strong personality and never shirked an encounter. Even those who did not agree with the preacher, could but admire him.

Endowment For
B.C. University.

Those who looked askance at further expenditure on a British Columbia University at Vancouver will be gratified to learn that the sale of the 3,000 acres of Government land at Point Grey will not only pay for the buildings themselves, but also provide for a certain endowment fund, says the Victoria Times. If there be any doubt about the rate of sale of these lands it will be removed by a study of the building permits which are being issued by the municipality in which the area is situated.

An increase in the student body of 359 in 1916 to 1,400 in 1924; an announcement that the cost per capita is less at the University of British Columbia than at the provincial universities of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba; a declaration that less than seven per cent of the graduates from the Point Grey seat of learning have left for the United States—a gratifying contradiction to many hostile suggestions—support the contention that this province has an extremely useful investment in its University.

It is good to know also that a preponderance of students from workmen's homes are taking advantage of the educational facilities at the institution. This is an indication that it would be unwise to increase the fees charged. Such a course would certainly drive students to Eastern or American colleges.

Able To Cross
River On Ice.

The cold snap which we have been experiencing with the thermometer down to six above zero makes us all realize what the weather is like in the interior. Fifteen below zero is reported from Montreal and the River St. Lawrence frozen to such an extent that horses and sleighs can cross on the ice. That is something of which we have no experience here. The present weather is abnormal, although tradition says that one year the thermometer dropped below zero.

Dealing With
Reckless Driving.

It is most difficult to deal with reckless driving. Anyone who has driven much realizes, how now and then, he meets a road hog that makes his blood creep as he whizzes past within an inch of the hub of his wheel. This is usually an experienced driver who has taken a few drinks more than he should. It has made him reckless and he tries to see how close he can drive to the cars he passes without hitting them. No laws can deal with cases of this kind adequately because the driver under the influence cares for no law or anything else.

Another difficult case is the beginner who cannot drive well and who makes errors of judgment. There is no place at which a person can learn to drive except on the highway and he does so at the risk of an accident.

The reckless driving problem is one that will give trouble for many years to come.





CHAMBERLAIN DID NOT DISCUSS ALLIED DEBT

Measure Will be Introduced at Next Meeting of City Council Ald. Macdonald Announces

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Resuming the debate on the midges in reply to the speech from the throne yesterday Austin Chamberlain, secretary of the state for foreign affairs, stated that the subject of inter-allied debts was not discussed during his recent journey to Paris and Rome. During the conversations he had, he said, no attempt was made to make new treaties or come to fresh decisions.

Ald. Macdonald, chairman of the utilities committee, announced at last night's meeting of the city council that it was proposed to bring in a bylaw revising light rates at next week's council meeting.

The bylaw providing for a net monthly reduction of 50c per instrument in telephone charges was finally reconsidered and adopted.

The matter was left with the city solicitor with the request that he hurry up the presentation of the figures.

Here and There

Agricultural products harvested in British Columbia during 1923 were nearly \$4,000,000 in excess of the 1922 total, according to the annual report of the provincial department of agriculture. Total production for 1923 was \$59,159,798.

The ninth winter carnival at Banff, Alta., will be held from February 7 to 14, 1925. The curling bonspiel in connection with the carnival will run concurrently from February 9 to 14. Revelstoke has fixed its carnival dates for February 3, 4 and 5, 1925.

Tourists to the number of 100,000 are estimated to have entered the Province of Nova Scotia during the past season. These people have left approximately \$7,500,000 in the province, an increase of 25 per cent. over the previous year. The number of motor cars entering the province during the tourist season exceeded 11,000.

Canada Book Week was held from December 1 to 6 this year. Addresses, radio broadcasting and special displays in stores throughout the country drew attention to the objects of the week, which are to promote the reading of good books generally and to foster Canadian literature. The week was, as usual, a distinct success.

The foolhardy recklessness of certain motorists was recently strikingly illustrated at a public crossing on the Canadian Pacific Railway line at Blind River, Ontario, when a speeding auto approached the crossing so rapidly that the driver was unable to pull up, and ran his car into the side of a train which was passing at the time. Fortunately, no one was injured.

In recognition of its excellent exhibits at the 1924 exhibition at Toronto, the Canadian Pacific Railway has been awarded one of the medals specially struck off for presentation to the Dominion and Provincial governments, and to a limited number of other exhibits whose high class entries in the live stock and agricultural departments won them championship prizes.

The plans for the construction of an immense amusement centre at Victoria, B.C., to be called the Crystal Gardens, have just been announced by the Canadian Pacific Railway, which is responsible for the scheme. The gardens will include a salt water swimming pool 150 feet long, and a series of dancing floors, with tea rooms and gymnasium. Great quantities of plants, vines and shrubs will be grown in the structure, which is on the lines of a vast conservatory, containing 36,000 square feet of glazed glass roof surface.

A considerable increase in the sheep population of Canada, which has declined since 1920 from 2,255,020 to 1,575,000, is expected as a result of the recent importation by Alberta ranchers of 400 Rambouillet rams. These animals are merinos, with fine wool, bred in France from Spanish merino stock. Louis XVI obtained the first flock as a gift from the King of Spain. A heron of 20,000 western range ewes will be provided for the Alberta purchase. The enterprise is important, on account of the prevailing world shortage of wool.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over \$,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands not being timberland, for agricultural purposes, minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 19, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES
