JAPANESE SHOW ANTI-AMERICAN FEELING

COMMUNISTS BACKING RAILWAY STRIKE IN LONDON ISSUE STATEMENT

Anti-American Demonstrations in Japan follow Passing of the Exclusion Bill; Theatres Raided

TOKIO, June 7.—Anti-American feeling here has reached a serious height and demonstrations of opposition to the exclusion clause in the new American immigration bill are breaking out.

Gangs of "political ruffians" tonight forced several moving pictures showing American films to close. The ruffians also broke up a Saturday night dance which was attended by members of the foreign community. When the dance was at its height, they took possession of the floor and made a number of bitter anti-American speeches. Several American women fainted.

ARE CHOOSING STATION SITE

Experts Looking Over Ground Preparatory to Building Biological Station

Dr. W. A. Clemens, who was recently appointed to take charge of the biological station at Departure Bay near Nanaimo, accompanied by J. McHugh, resident engineer of the fisheries department, are here today to choose a site for the proposed new biological station which is to be established here. They are conferring with John Dybbavn, member of the biological board and will probably arrive at a decision today.

Dr. Clemens was until recently a member of the staff of the University of Toronto.

GETTING ROAD WORK STARTED

Preliminaries Being Done Now and One Camp Will be in Full Swing Next Week

P. W. Anderson, provincial government road superintendent, reports that some little difficulty is being experienced in getting the Kaien Island road work under way owing to the wet nature of the ground and the necessity of cutting a trail up from the salt water to suitable camping grounds. At the present time there is a small gang doing this work and, with other equipment arriving on the Gardner tomorrow, it is expected that the camp will be in full swing by the end of the week.

BRIDGE ON BELLA COOLA RIVER WAS WRECKED RECENTLY

Recent floods on the Bella Coola River caused the big bridge across that river at Hagensborg to be practically wrecked. P. W. Anderson, road superintendent, reports after a visit to the district. A huge tree, coming down the stream, became entangled in the piling and tore much of it away rendering the span unsafe and practically useless. The government has repairs well in hand despite the fact that it will practically mean the building of a new bridge.

MAN WHO HELD UP BANK MESSENGER NOT YET CONVICTED

Jury Disagreed as to Whether Murder or Manslaughter

MONTREAL, June 7.—The jury in the trial of Giuseppe Serafini, charged with murder of Henri Cleroux, bank of Hochelaga messenger in a bank car holdup on April 4, reported today that they had disagreed and were discharged. Serafini will be tried again in September.

The jury was divided as to whether they should convict for murder or manslaughter.

ANOTHER JAPANESE CABINET RESIGNED

TOKIO, June 7.—Japan is once more in political turmoil. The Kiyoura cabinet has resigned and the task of forming a new one will prove difficult.

Later today the Kayoura cabinet was commanded by the Prince Regent to retain office for the time being.

Manson and Kergin Address a Friendly Alice Arm Audience at Which Two Hundred are Present

ALICE ARM, June 7.—An audience of 200 voters which filled McDonald Hall to capacity was addressed here Thursday evening by Hon. A. M. Manson and H. F. Kergin. For two and a half hours Manson discussed the issues of the present campaign and why the Liberal government should be returned. He had the audience with him throughout and there was no disturbance of any kind. He gave a history of the McRae party—the party made at the Vancouver Club but for political reasons given a Vernon setting. He quoted from Searchlights and showed the inaccuracies in that publication.

Mr. Manson said he had no quarrel with the Conservative party as a party. It had produced able men but today was saddled with Bowser, a fact which doomed it in the eyes of the people. The mistakes of the Bowser regime were not errors of judgment but deliberate errors. For eight years Bowser had fought all constructive legislation while he was in opposition.

Kergin's Challenge

Mr. Kergin in a short address gave a brief account of his stewardship. He told what he had done and was trying to do and referred to several charges that had been circulated by the local opposition party in which he was alleged to have benefitted financially in the letting of road and bridge contracts. He discussed these and denied them in toto. He challenged any member present to take the platform and submit any evidence to the audience. The challenge was not accepted.

MILAN, Italy, June 7.—It is reported that the president of the Albanian National Assembly has been murdered by the insurgents.

London Strike Likely to Last Some Time as Small Unions Joining

Communists Issue a Statement in which they Welcome Spirit of Revolt among Workers

LONDON, June 7.—The railway companies are refusing to make any concessions demanded by the striking shopmen. With some of the smaller unions showing a disposition to support the men, the strike will likely be extended.

The transport workers union, which embraces the omnibus workers, absolutely refuses to support the strike. There is also a threatened strike for better pay on the part of the workers at the amusement park of the Empire exhibition.

Minister of Labor Thomas Shaw, speaking in the House of Commons, said the government would give the fullest protection to men working during the dispute.

Later Despatch
LONDON, June 7.—British communists today showed their hands in the railway strike which is continuing to spread while the people are awaiting a further statement of the government's intentions.

The communist party of Great Britain has issued a statement declaring that the workers have tried vainly to get their grievances remedied through constitutional trade union machinery and had decided to strike only after it was evident officials of the national union of railwaymen did not intend to act. It said the party welcomed this growing spirit of revolt.

STEAMSHIP SERVICE IS POSSIBILITY

Hon. M. H. Rushton Coming Next Week to Look Over Port Facilities

Hon. M. H. Rushton of the Fiji Islands is expected to arrive here on Wednesday next to look over the port in connection with the possibility of establishing a steamship service to the Islands from here. He has already been to see Sir Henry Thornton at the suggestion of the local board of trade and the board of trade has been notified that he is coming.

WOMAN CONVICTED OF FIRST DEGREE MURDER

Killed Dr. Baldwin and Threw Body Over Embankment in Trunk

LOS ANGELES, June 7.—Conviction by jury of first degree murder with a recommendation for life imprisonment was awarded Mrs. Margaret Willis, who murdered Dr. Baldwin on April 11, stuffed the body into a trunk and threw it over an embankment. The state charge that Mrs. Willis committed the crime in order to secure Baldwin's automobile.

NINETEEN REPORTED KILLED IN EXPLOSION

WILKESBARRE, June 7.—Nineteen men are reported to have been killed in an explosion at Loomis colliery yesterday. In 42 section where the disaster occurred, some are still entombed.

MILLIONS WILL NOT SAVE BOYS

Fathers of Alleged Murderers Declare Money Not to be Used to Defeat Justice

CHICAGO, June 7.—Their millions will not be used to save Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb, confessed slayers of Robert Franks, from the gallows, a joint statement by the millionaire fathers says. Only such defense as every human being is entitled to will be provided for their sons.

Assuring the facts to be as published, then the only proceeding they favor is a solemn investigation under the law touching the mental responsibility of their sons. Under no circumstances will the family of the accused boys use money to defeat justice.

ELEVATOR CO. FINANCING

Public Issue of Stock to be Made in July Copping Suggests

At the meeting of the board of trade last night a letter was read from G. A. Copping in regard to the Prince Rupert Grain and Elevator Company Ltd., which is capitalized at two million dollars and arrangements for the financing of which are said to be proceeding in London. Mr. Copping who is the promoter, says: "Printed matter is now being drawn up for the public issue, which it is proposed to make in July."

The board of trade is keeping in close touch with this concern and is co-operating so far as possible without committing itself or pledging its members.

WIDESPREAD FIRE AT FORT McMURRAY

Extends North and South 100 Miles and Seventy in Width

FORT McMURRAY, June 7.—Colonel J. K. Cornwall, who is here from the north today aboard the steamer Athabaska, reports that nearly the whole country is on fire from McMurray to 100 miles north and from 50 to 75 miles east and west. He says it is the worst fire in 25 years. There has been little rain in that district.

RAILWAY OFFER TO CO-OPERATE

Asks For Literature, Pictures and Charts and Offers Services to City

At the meeting of the board of trade last night the following letter was read from W. J. Black, European manager for the Canadian National Railways department of colonization and development:

"We are interested in securing as early a date as possible copies of all literature you have describing Prince Rupert and its advantages or attractions as a seaport and shipping, commercial, market or tourist centre, also any good charts or pictures dealing with these features, e.g., public buildings, cold storage, plants, scenic beauties, etc., in short what you would require if you were going to advertise your city in Great Britain. Pictures showing old historic scenes would also be appreciated, and we would like to have the most recent issue of one of your daily papers that might contain a history of the development of the city.

"The Colonization and Development Department of the Canadian National Railways is not only interested in locating agricultural settlers but also in interesting capital and exploiting the commercial and industrial possibilities of the cities and towns of the Dominion. We are at your service, and believe that with your co-operation we can probably be of some assistance to you; hence our request, and if you can let us have such material we will do our best to put it to good use."

NEED LIGHTS HECATE STRAIT

Petition Asking For Them Endorsed by Board of Trade Last Night

Capt. Barney Johnson, on behalf of the Hecate Straits Towing Co. and forty-five others interested are asking for the establishment of lights on several points in Hecate Straits. In a letter read at the board of trade meeting last night, President McLeod in the chair, he says:

"A light on Bonilla Island was promised many years ago, and, speaking from personal experience, the subscriber is strongly of opinion that a light should be installed on this island forthwith. Bonilla Island is one of the most prominent landmarks in Hecate Straits and it is absolutely necessary for vessels coming from the southward or westward, if safe navigation is required, to fix a definite position off this island for rounding Rose Spit or endeavoring to approach Prince Rupert either through Beaver Passage, Edge Passage or Brown Passage.

"Our lugs must make this island when crossing the straits with their valuable tows and at times must seek refuge behind it to avoid the loss of their rafts.

"We are convinced that if your body will take the matter up earnestly with the minister of marine through his local representative, Capt. Saunders, that at least an unwatched light will be placed on Bonilla Island. Such a light will be of great assistance to the trade of Prince Rupert, as numerous fishing boats, which make your city their home port, and the Prince John will be benefited thereby, to say nothing of the lugs which repair and buy

the supplies at yours." The application asks for lights in addition to the one mentioned at Breaker Point at the entrance to Campanian Sound and at the entrance to Otter Passage, Nepean Sound.

Endorsed by McCroskie Capt. E. McCroskie, harbor master at Prince Rupert, in a letter to the president of the board of trade, says he has had thirty years experience in command in these waters and he fully endorses all that Capt. B. L. Johnson says.

The matter was referred to the port committee of the board of trade with instructions to take the matter up at once with the proper authorities.





URGES PREVENTION OF BLINDNESS BY APPLYING REMEDIES

TORONTO, June 7. — (Canadian Press).—"One half of the blindness in Canada and in the world generally, is due to preventable causes," said Miss Hayhurst, Prevention-of-Blindness and Social Worker of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, recently, in speaking of the facts and figures in a report she is preparing for delivery before a number of Canadian Medical societies and social workers in the immediate future. "Blindness is almost always the result of abnormal, wrong conditions, ignorance, disease, dirt, illness, accident, shock, crime; therefore it is in the main, as preventable as other plagues such as small-pox, typhoid, venereal diseases or tuberculosis. It should be and often can be prevented. Think of the ravages of smallpox in older days, and of the negligible number of cases of this disease today. We hope the people of the next or following generation will be able to make the same comparison when speaking of preventable blindness. That old fatalism, which regarded afflictions as the Divine Will, and which made no effort to discover causes, then apply remedies, must go. This is the age of prevention. Let us then consider the facts regarding blindness and act upon them."

GRAIN LOADINGS STILL KEEP LEAD OVER LAST YEAR

Seven and Half Million Bushels Still in Elevators in Alberta and Saskatchewan

WINNIPEG, June 7. — Grain loadings of the Canadian National lines are holding the lead over last years figures by a wide margin, with the seasons loadings up to June 5, up to 150,917 cars containing 201,088,000 bushels over the same period of the previous grain season.

For the week of May 30 to June 5 inclusive grain loadings for the system in western Canada amounted to 3,620 cars with 4,991,000 as against 1,104 cars with 1,874,000 bushels for the same week last year. Of this amount Saskatchewan loaded 2,564,000 bushels and Alberta 1,427,000 bushels, leaving in store in country elevators along Canadian National lines in those two provinces 7,550,000 bushels and 4,923,000 bushels respectively.

Arrivals of Canadian National grain cars at Vancouver up to June 5, numbered 161,211 or an increase of 13,666 cars over the total sent to the western port of the previous crop.

Charles Harrison, pioneer land owner and resident of Massett Inlet, who left a few years ago for London, England, to take up his residence, is back in the city again. Mr. Harrison, who has always taken an active part in efforts to bring settlers to the Queen Charlotte Islands, now plans to have some Hebrideans placed there.
