# Robbery at Seattle is Daring But Suspects Already in the Cells

SEATTLE, Aug. 9 .- Three men and two women including a former city policeman are held by the police as suspects in connection with a robbery yesterday afternoon from four employees of the Bon Marche, when bags containing \$14,000 in cash and \$9,900 in checks were carried off. The robbery was committed at the busy time when the clerks were returning to the store.

The bandits pounced on the employees, grabbed the money bags, fired a few shots from their revolvers and then dashed off in a car. Joe O'Neil, a former policeman, was soon arrested after a chase in the railroad yards two blocks from the store.




