

Labor Government Forced by Liberals to Change Policy or Face Defeat and Resignation POLICE BUSY

LONDON, April 3 .- The Labor government evaded otherwise inevitable defeat in the House of Commons yesterday in connection with the Rents Bill which was up for second reading by consenting to revision of an objectionable clause providing for non-eviction of a tenant if unemployed.

Right Hon. H. Asquith, Liberal leader, said that unless this was eliminated he would be compelled to vote against the second reading. This ultimatum meant that both Conservatives and Liberals-would oppose them and would have meant defeat







Province Newspaper has Long Editorial Article Criticising Proposed Action





LONDON, April 3 .- The Scottish peerage, once the strongest and most flourishing of Great Britain, now only contains 86 members, says the new issue of Debrett. At the time of the union of the parliaments of Scotland and England in 1707, the peerage enrolled 154 members, which included almost all the wealthiest men of Scotland, the clan chiefs and poitical leaders of the country. These peers were in almost absolute control of the country and owned most of the shipping interests, then the greatest commercial enterprise of the British

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age. and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series. 'How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department ands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Gov rnment Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Applications for pre-emptions are

o be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner, Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land." PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland. for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on ilmber land, not exceeding 40 acres. may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.
