## BRITISH GOVERNMENT TAKES ACTION PREVENT PROFITEERING DURING STRIKE

### British Government Appoints Committee to Investigate the Strike and Report Conditions

LONDON, Feb. 19.—Premier J. Ramsay Macdonald announced in the House of Commons the appointment of three members to make a report on the strike. The decisions of the committee will not be binding on the House. The members of the committee will hear the testimony of employers and employees.

The cabinet council yesterday resulted in the issuance of a statement from Downing Street to the effect that prices were being raised by exploiters and the hope that this notice would result in the stopping of increases. Meantime the law officers of the crown have been asked to consider the powers of the government and to draft the necessary emergency measures.

### BUTCHERS EXPLAIN

LONDON, Feb. 19.—While businessmen are grumbling at the stoppage of mails through the dockers' strike, housewives are concerned over the evidences manifested yesterday of the intention of tradesmen to raise the food prices. The most notable increase was for meat, dealers in which issued explanatory statements purporting to show the increase was unavoidable and saying that they forthwith submit their reasons to the Government.

Fruit is another commodity in connection with which the public is likely to suffer, especially in oranges and bananas.

The action of the Government in holding a cabinet council meeting last night to consider emergency measures insuring food supplies and the subsequent official statement declaring there was no reason for the price increase, was heartily approved by the press this morning and the public is fixing its hopes thereon.

### ROAD TAX TO BE REPEALED

Ald. Collart's Amendment for Elimination of \$2 Levy Given Its Third Reading

Ald. Collart's bylaw amendment providing for repeal of the \$2 road tax with the retention of the 85 poll tax collection was given a unanimous third reading at last night's council meeting. Mayor Newton, Ald. Casey and Ald. Macdonald had expressed favor previously for the removal of the \$2 tax and retention of the 85 tax but it had been established that it would be impossible to do this without act of legislature. Therefore they decided to fall in with the nearest they could obtain to their desires.

Ald. Casey said he would support Ald. Collart's measure in the meantime but he intended later in the year to ask the council to petition the government with a view to having some revision made in the collection of the poll tax. Having this intention, he inquired if the council would still have the power to bring into effect the \$2 road tax. He was told by City Solicitor Jones that it would always have that privilege.

### INVITE PASTOR REMAIN HERE

Rev. G. G. Hacker Asked to Spend Another Year in Rupert; His Work Praised

The official Board of the Methodist Church in this city met last night and extended a formal invitation to Rev. G. G. Hacker to remain in this city another year in charge of the work of the church. Supper was served in the club room of the church, the meeting following directly after. After routine business had been transacted Dr. W. T. Kergin spoke briefly of the year's work. He said that both the Methodist Church and the city at large had benefited by Mr. Hacker's pastorate here and he moved that he be invited to remain another year.

Earl Barrie asked to be allowed to second the motion. Being forward of him to do so, but coming from the eastern city churches where the work was long established, he desired to say a word regarding the Prince Rupert Methodist Church. Many difficult situations arise in connection with young people's work, here as elsewhere, and Mr. Hacker had more than ordinary ability in handling them. "I consider him a 'find' and I just want to say so to the board," he concluded.

Mr. Hacker thanked the board for their confidence in him and outlined his program for the coming year. He said that the Sunday School, Canadian Girls, Tuxis and Trail Rangers' groups were steadily growing in number and enthusiasm. In this connection great praise was due to Miss Haddock, Mr. Barrie and the Sunday School teachers. Mr. Hacker also noted with gratitude an ever increasing number of men taking an interest in church work. He looked for a better year ahead.

### SUPERANNUATION IS PLANNED FOR RAILWAY

OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—A superannuation scheme for the benefit of employees of the Canadian National Railways is being worked out at a conference of representatives of the employees of the department of railways and the board of directors of the C.N.R.

### PRESBYTERIANS REACH OBJECTIVE FOR CHURCH

In the Presbyterian Church on Sunday Rev. H. R. Grant announced that the sum of \$10,300 had been subscribed toward the erection of the new church. This fully covers the objective which the committee set when the campaign for funds was commenced.

### Extensive Campaign to Settle Lands on Pacific Great Eastern Line by Provincial Government

VICTORIA, Feb. 19.—A campaign to secure settlers in Canada and Britain to settle on the rich agricultural lands tributary to the Pacific Great Eastern Railway is being launched by the provincial government under Hon. J. D. McLean, minister of railways, it was announced yesterday. Canada and Great Britain will be blanketed with advertisements telling of the settlement possibilities of the P.G.E. country.

The government will co-operate in aiding individual settlers to choose the best available land and allow them reduced fares on the line.

Land bordering on the railway from Clinton north to Prince George will be sold to settlers for about three dollars an acre for dairying and mixed farming, for which it is admirably suited.

In addition to large areas along the P.G.E., the Government is prepared to sell specially selected land in blocks under control of the Land Settlement Board. First attention will be paid to the disposal of these lands which are at Rose Lake, Alexandria, Ten Mile Lake, Queneel, Strathnaver, Woodpecker, Bridge Lake, Ganim Lake and Prince George.

The provincial government will also seek the assistance of the Federal Government in promoting the scheme and the federal department of immigration and colonization will be asked to assist in securing settlers for the Cariboo lands.

### EXTENSION OF STREET WORK

Seventh Avenue East to Get Treatment Similar to That Being Given Fifth Avenue East

Street reconstruction work similar to that now being carried out on Fifth Avenue East is planned for Seventh Avenue East by the city council. A local improvement initiative bylaw providing for timber matting and crushed rock surfacing on contour grade to a width of 15 feet was introduced at last night's meeting by Ald. Perry and given its first reading. The streets provided for in the bylaw are Seventh Avenue between McBride Street and Hays Cove Circle and Hays Cove Circle to Sixth Avenue.

### Steamer Amur Floated off Rocks Noon Today and Coming to Rupert

The Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co.'s steamer Amur, which went up on the White Cliff Island reef early on the morning of February 8 and has been fast there ever since, was floated off with the high tide at noon today. An examination is now being made of the vessel and, together with the salvage steamer Tees, she is expected here tonight at 7 o'clock. It is likely that the Amur will go on to the dry dock for survey and possibly some repairs will be made here if they are necessary. The steamer is understood to have no hole in her although it is believed that her seams are leaking. It will require docking to ascertain the exact extent of the damage.

### PRESERVE FOR ARISTOCRATS

LONDON, Feb. 19.—J. C. Fenton has been appointed solicitor general for Scotland. He is not a member of the House and consequently a seat will have to be found for him.

Some of the chief appointments to the King's household still remain closed preserves for the aristocracy under the Labor Government as evidenced by a Downing Street announcement stating that the King approved certain nominees for posts which became vacant when the Conservative Government fell. The notice announces the appointments will be of a non-political character during the present administration.

Under this new departure, the holders of positions under the late Government will be re-appointed. The appointees include Earl Gomer, Earl Shaftesbury, Earl Granard and others.

### FIRE IN NEW YORK IS FATAL

Thirteen Deaths Result and Many Are Burned; Scenes in Streets

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—Thirteen persons, one man, four women and eight children, including a baby are known to have lost their lives in a fire which swept a five storey tenement on the lower east side Monday. Several jumped to their deaths, when escape was cut off. The tenement was almost exclusively occupied by foreign born.

The screams of the dying and the seriously burned and the terrifying sight of the structure a roaring furnace, caused a frantic exodus from nearby buildings. Scores of people scantily clad gathered in the narrow streets, many kneeling in prayer. Many were rushed to the hospitals terribly burned.

Effort To Settle Lands Along P.G.E.

The action of the Provincial Government in opening a campaign for the settlement of the lands along the P.G.E. is one that is to be highly commended, if it is carried out in a business-like way and every effort made to help the incoming settlers with information, advice and instruction.

The province has to pay interest on the P.G.E. bonds and also has to meet an annual deficit on the railway. If by settling the lands the government can make the railway self-sustaining and thus remove the burden from the taxpayers it will deserve our eternal gratitude.

Must Not Neglect Lands To Northward.

While it is to be hoped that the lands along the P.G.E. will be speedily settled and while every person in the province would be willing to aid in such a worthy effort as creating a new and prosperous community along the valleys served by the provincial railway, it must not be forgotten that in the valleys of the Skeena, the Kispiox, the Bulkley, and the Nechaco there are also unsettled provincial lands, just as good, if not better than anything along the P.G.E. and subsidiary to a transcontinental railway which has a terminus at each end.

The Canadian National Railway has an immigration policy and results are looked for, but the province has an equal right to settle its own lands along the railway belt. If all the efforts of the province are devoted to settling the P.G.E. the other sections will suffer. There must also be a policy which will include the central B.C. lands.

Marketing Is Very Important Matter.

Marketing is a matter that must be considered in connection with any land settlement scheme. The P.G.E. trains at present start from nowhere and go nowhere. They do not lead to a market. On the other hand the national transcontinental railway that passes through the central B.C. valleys leads to certain definite markets at Edmonton, Winnipeg, Prince Rupert and the towns bordering on the Pacific.

Definite Settlement Work This Year.

The people of the north are confidently expecting that the governments will take definite action toward increasing the settlement of the lands along the Canadian National Railway this year. As before mentioned, the lands belong to the province, except those which are alienated, and where lands have been alienated the province got payment for the lands.

MANSON TALKS TO WOMEN ON MORAL TOPICS

Does Not Like Administering Liquor Act; Cocaine Parties Among Young

VICTORIA, Feb. 19. — "If one thing more than another is calculated to drive a man insane it is the administration of the liquor control department."

"It might surprise you to know how many young people are drug addicts." "In Vancouver last year a notorious trafficker was convicted who had been arranging cocaine parties for boys and girls, with the assistance of Vancouver men. Addicts are more to be pitied than punished. But as for those who traffic in the drug, I would add the lash to the sentence of conviction."

"I understand from press reports that the recent narcotic inquiry has given certain officers who were charged a clean bill of health. I should be loath to call into question any tribunal giving a man a clean bill of health, but I still feel that there were weeds in the garden which should be weeded out."

These were some of the interesting statements made by the attorney general in the course of an address before the Local Council of Women. The minister dwelt at length upon the multifarious duties falling to the lot of his department. Speaking more particularly concerning the liquor and narcotic problems and the administration of the Mothers' Pension Act.

People's Wish

Reminding his hearers that this is a democratic country, the attorney general stated that the government had gone into the liquor business not because it wished to but, in acquiescence to the wish of the people as shown by the majority of 33,000 who voted for government control.

Liquor administration was the most difficult matter coming under his administration. While there were honest men in the liquor business there were more who were immoral and inhuman, stopping at nothing in their efforts to circumvent the laws. With the exception of the drug addict there was no worse offender against the law.

"I speak bitterly because I have had two years of the most grueling task any man could have," said Mr. Manson. "If one thing more than another is calculated to drive a man insane it is the administration of the liquor department."

Narcotic Traffic

The narcotic traffic was insidious, wealthy and crafty, the possible profit of from 2,500 to 5,000 per cent proving a strong attraction to men of greed and no moral stamina. He warned the mothers present against the insidious campaign of the drug vendor who found many victims among the boys and girls who indulge in too much dancing unchaperoned.

## Here and There

Navigation of the St. Lawrence river is expected to open early in the month of April. According to preliminary schedules issued by the various steamship companies operating between Canadian Atlantic ports and Europe, 192 ships will visit the port of Quebec in 1924.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has inaugurated as a special feature the serving of afternoon tea, regularly on all dining, cafe and buffet cars throughout the system. The tasteful little menu which the company provides includes tea, coffee, chocolate, toast, muffins, cake, ice cream and preserves at reasonable prices.

The Spiller Company, a great British concern with \$150,000,000 capital, has completed arrangements for the establishment of facilities in Canada which will entail an outlay of \$6,000,000 to finish the plant of the Alberta Flour Mills in Calgary, with another \$2,000,000 to build an elevator at Vancouver.

The second of the two large paper machines recently installed by the Belgo-Canadian Paper Company at Shawinigan Falls, Que., has commenced operations. The machine, which is the product of the Dominion Engineering Company, is now producing newsprint. It will be tuned up and is expected to produce a commercial grade of newsprint at or above its daily capacity of 75 tons in the near future.

Speaking at Toronto recently, E. W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, declared that "what Canada is suffering from is lack of men, lack of capital and lack of those forward policies which will enable the country to realize within a reasonable time its own manifest destiny." He added that he did not believe in "exaggerated whisperings or in any statements which are calculated to destroy the belief of Canadians in their own country."

Captain S. Robinson, C.B.E., R.N.R., commanding the Canadian Pacific liner "Empress of Canada," was invested with the C.B.E. by Sir Harry Armstrong, British Consul-General at New York, when his ship arrived there on January 25th, prior to setting out on her great world cruise. Captain Robinson also received the freedom of the city of New York. These honors were in recognition of his gallant work when commanding the Canadian Pacific liner "Empress of Australia" at Yokohama, at the time of the Japanese disaster.

According to Canadian Pacific officials, immigrants from Europe who spend a few hours in Montreal on their way west are re-discovering America—or rather Canada—at a great rate. Some days ago there were eighty Scandinavians drumming their heels in the big waiting-rooms at Windsor Station, bored to tears. Then one of them suddenly discovered that the Province of Quebec, unlike Sweden, is not "dry." The rush of the Danes on Alfred's England was as nothing compared to that with which the delightful Scandinavian gentlemen emptied that waiting-room. So excellent did they find the beer that they did not show up again till train-time, when they announced unanimously, though with slight difficulty, that "Canada bane one fine country."

To be stranded in a strange city with no worldly assets but a suit of dress-clothes and yet to come out of the adventure victorious is to achieve something. Joe and Bill arrived in Montreal a few nights ago, their baggage consisting of the clothes they wore, two dress suits, an adequate quantity of the needful and an enthusiastic determination to see Life with a capital L. When they woke on the morning after, they found that someone had relieved them of everything they possessed except the dress suits they had slept in, and which they had worn for the previous night's affray. In this predicament they appealed to the authorities at the Canadian Pacific Windsor Station, for work whereby to earn enough to take them out of the wicked city. Sympathetic officials put them on the snow-shovelling gang. And here these two stout fellows, in their dress suits, Joe with his feet wrapped in sacking to keep them warm, labored heartily for four days, earning the price of their tickets back to the little old home town. ### PROPOSITION RUPERT CLUB

Would give City Frontage on Second Avenue in Return For Removal of Rock From Property

The Prince Rupert Club offered to the city council last night for its consideration a proposition whereby the club would turn over to the city 14 feet frontage on Second Avenue in return for which the city would remove rock from the remaining 61 feet of the club's property. **REDUCTION IN VALUATION OF DUTHIE LOTS**

**Municipal Court of Revision Also Decides to Drop Imperial Oil Tanks From Roll**

Subject to final ratification to be given when the court reassembles next Tuesday, the municipal court of revision decided yesterday afternoon to grant a reduction of 25 per cent in the assessment of J. F. Duthie's lots in Section 3, 15 per cent reduction in Section 4, and 10 per cent in Section 9. Mr. Duthie's solicitors had asked for a blanket reduction of 25 per cent. It was also decided similarly to remove from the assessment roll for the year the oil tanks of the Imperial Oil Co. on the Grand Trunk Pacific waterfront. The latter decision, meeting the appeal of the Imperial Oil Co., was made in view of the fact that no money is at issue since improvements though assessed are not taxed.

The foregoing decisions were made after a session of the court held in private on request of Mayor Newton. The appellants will be given the opportunity of appearing again when the court reopens in public session. There are about a dozen cases yet to be disposed of by the court, these being appeals for which no appellants were present in person on the opening of the court.

The assessment of \$1,900 and \$1,800 on lots 18 and 19, block 25, section 1, appealed by E. Bianco and F. Lanza, has been reduced \$100 in each case by the court. Oliver Pelouquin and R. H. Baschelet, who had entered appeals, received no reductions as they were satisfied with their valuations after the court had explained that they were equitable with those of surrounding property.

The session of the court yesterday afternoon was the first at which all members were present. Ald. Evitt, who had returned from a trip south, was sworn in.

**HYDE TRANSFER GETS A POWER CONNECTION**

**City Agrees to Put in Line to Waterfront Provided Applicants Pay Half the Cost**

The Hyde Transfer, which made application to the city recently for a power connection to a wharf at it proposes establishing east of Cow Bay, was granted the connection by the city council last night provided it bears half of the \$250 cost thereof. A report to this effect from the utilities committee was adopted. The Hyde Transfer requires 3 1/2 horse-power which will mean a revenue to the city of \$42 a year. Provision is made that should the sale of power on the new line increase 10 horse-power additional within a year, the Hyde Transfer will get refund of the \$125 it puts up.

Scientists of Europe Flock to East Prussia to Study Prof. Harms' Methods

Feb. 19.—Roosters may some day KOENIGSBERG, East Prussia, be transformed into hens and thus help increase the egg supply if promises of scientists are fulfilled. The promises are held out after several years of experiments with bugs, rats, guinea pigs and frogs.

The trick of developing a regulation, sure-enough female toad from a youngster who started out in the world as a male has actually been accomplished, it was announced here, and further experiments are being carried on with the view of bringing about perfection in these newest of freaks of nature. The discovery announced by Professor Harms, of Koeningberg, has attracted much attention in the scientific world, particularly among other experimenters who have been working for years on this particular sex problem.

Since Prof. Harms let the world know of his successes, with the humble toad, scientists from various parts of Europe have been flocking to his work room to hear the details of the transformation. The trick, it is said, is quite simple, after once nature's ways have been uncovered.

Other scientists, including Professor Steinach, of Vienna, who claims successes with gland operations on human beings, and Professors Hands and Schultz, have been experimenting along the same lines for years, principally with guinea pigs, rats and mice, and while they nearly reached their goal on several
